This is the fifth WTA 1000 of the year and first WTA 1000 on clay-courts. 96 players will compete for the singles title at the two-week, outdoor red clay event. The 32 seeded players receive first-round byes.

Three players - Iga Swiatek (Doha, Indian Wells), Danielle Collins (Miami) and Jasmine Paolini (Dubai) - have captured titles at the first four WTA 1000 tournaments this year.

World No.1 Iga Swiatek tops the draw. Swiatek reached her first Madrid final last year, but fell to Aryna Sabalenka. After her first-round bye, Swiatek will meet either Wang Xiyu or Ana Bogdan in the second round.

Swiatek is spending her 100th and 101st weeks at No.1 during Madrid.

Located in Swiatek's section is Elina Svitolina, the No.16 seed, and two-time Madrid finalist Victoria Azarenka, the No.23 seed. Either of those former Top 10 players could be a fourth-round opponent for Swiatek if the top seed advances.

No.5 seed Maria Sakkari, a Madrid semifinalist last year, could meet Brazil's Beatriz Haddad Maia, the No.11 seed, in the Round of 16 if seedings hold.

Former World No.1 Caroline Wozniacki is competing as a wild card as she continues her return from maternity leave. Wozniacki, who reached the Madrid final in its inaugural WTA 1000 edition in 2009, meets a qualifier in the first round.

Sloane Stephens enters the tournament after winning her eighth career title last week at Rouen, it was her second clay court title. A 2019 semifinalist in Madrid, Stephens will open her 10th Madrid main draw facing Martina Trevisan.

No.3 seed Coco Gauff, the reigning US Open champion, will face either Arantxa Rus or 17-year-old Brenda Fruhvirtova in her opening match.

Another returning mom and former World No.1, Naomi Osaka, floats in Gauff's section as a possible Round of 16 opponent. Osaka will play a qualifier in her opening match.

No.4 seed Elena Rybakina enters the tournament after winning the Stuttgart championship on Sunday. She comes into Madrid as this year's leader in titles (3) and match-wins (26).

Rybakina will play either Lucia Bronzetti or a qualifier in the second round. If seeds hold, Rybakina might meet No.25 seed Marta Kostyuk in the third round, which would be a rematch of Sunday's Stuttgart final.

Defending champion Aryna Sabalenka sits at the bottom of the draw as the No.2 seed. Sabalenka has been the most successful Madrid player of late, taking the title in 2021 and last year. In the second round, Sabalenka will play either Elisabetta Cocciaretto or last week's Rouen runner-up Magda Linette.

No.13 seed Danielle Collins, is on a 13-match winning streak after taking titles in Miami and Charleston.

Through the first 19 tournaments of the year, Iga Swiatek sits atop the WTA Finals Leaderboard – which includes only points earned during the 2024 season. Elena Rybakina sits at No.2 followed by Aryna Sabalenka at No.3 and Danielle Collins at No.4.

NO.1 SEEDS IN MADRID

The top seed has reached the final four times in Madrid winning the title twice – 2009 (Dinara Safina) and 2013 (Serena Williams). Iga Swiatek has won two of the last four WTA 1000 titles – both as the No.1 seed.

At WTA 1000 tournaments the No.1 seed has won the title in 3 of last 22 editions.

- Rybakina (Brisbane, Abu Dhabi, Stuttgart) leads the Tour with three titles this year, while Ostapenko (Adelaide, Linz) and Swiatek (Doha, Indian Wells) have won two each.
- Swiatek continues her reign atop the WTA Rankings. The weeks of Indian Wells marks 100th and 101st week as WTA World No.1, the 9th most in WTA history.
- Four times this year the No.1 seed and No.2 seed met head-to-head in a tournament final. During the entire 2023 season the No.1 seed and No.2 seed met in four finals. The last time the No.1 seed and No.2 seed met more than four times in tournament finals in a season was 2013 (9 times).
- Qinwen Zheng made her Top 10 debut after the Australian Open (on Monday, January 29). She is the first Chinese woman to crack the Top 10 since Li Na (February 1, 2010).
- Five players made their Top 100 debut in 2024: Renata Zarazua (Jan 8), Maria Timofeeva (Jan 29), Brenda Fruhvirtova (Jan 29), Arina Rodionova (Feb 5), Erika Andreeva (Feb 19), Maria Lourdes Carle (Mar 4) and Hailey Baptiste (Mar 18), Jessica Bouzas Maneiro (Apr 15), Julia Riera (Apr 22)
