[4] Barbora Krejcikova (CZE #12) vs. [LL] Sara Sorribes Tormo (ESP #54) Krejcikova leads 1-0

Krejcikova and Sorribes Tormo have met only once before which was ten years ago at Luxembourg qualifying... Krejcikova is No.4 seed for the second time in 2024, also at Adelaide... Krejcikova enters Abu Dhabi off the back of a QF finish at the Australian Open (I. eventual champion Sabalenka)... Sorribes Tormo entered the main draw as a lucky loser and defeated Linda Noskova to reach the 2r today... Sorribes Tormo's two career titles were both achieved on hard court (Cleveland 2023; Guadalajara 2021)... Sorribes Tormo owns five Top 20 career wins, most recently No.16 Kudermetova at Cleveland last season

Anhelina Kalinina (UKR #32) vs. [8] Liudmila Samsonova (#15)

First meeting

Samsonova reached the final last season at Abu Dhabi (I. Bencic in F)... Both Samsonova and Kalinina fell in their opening matches at Brisbane, Adelaide and Australian Open, each posting their only 2024 match win in the 1r here in Abu Dhabi... A win today for Kalinina would equal her career best result on hard court, also reaching QF at Zhengzhou and Hobart in 2023 and Cluj-Napoca in 2022 and 2021... Three of Samsonova's four career titles came on hard court (Tokyo, Cleveland and Washington DC in 2022)

[1] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #5) vs. [Q] Danielle Collins (USA #71)

Rybakina leads 2-1

Rybakina defeated Collins in their two most recent encounters in 2023 (3r at Australian Open; 1r at Adelaide 1)... Rybakina is No.1 seed for the second time in her career (also at Adelaide this season)... Rybakina earned her sixth career title at her 2024 opener in Brisbane (d. Sabalenka in F)... As a qualifier, Collins defeated Naomi Osaka to reach 2r today... Collins owns 12 career wins over Top 10 players, most recently over Caroline Garcia at San Diego 2023... One of Collins two career titles came on hard court (San Jose 2021)

[LL] Cristina Busca (ESP #74) vs. [Q] Heather Watson (GBR #156)

First meeting

Both players are making their Abu Dhabi debuts... Busca entered as a lucky loser while Watson won her way through qualifying, both matches going three sets... Watson scored first Top 20 win in almost two years courtesy of triumph over No.16 Kudermetova in 1r... Busca scored 8th Top 50 win over Wang Xinyu in opening match... Watson owns four hard court titles, most recently at 2020 Acapulco

CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached four finals across 2023, winning first WTA 1000 title at Dubai (d. No.1 Swiatek in F) in addition to San Diego (d. Kenin in F), and finishing R-Up at Birmingham (l. Ostapenko) and Zhengzhou (l. Zheng Qinwen).
- Ended 2022 season in fine form, lifting back-toback titles at Tallinn (d. Kontaveit) and Ostrava (d. Swiatek). Also completed career doubles Slam by winning US Open w/Siniakova.
- Made strong start to 2022, finishing R-Up at Sydney (l. Badosa) and reaching QF at Australian Open (l. Keys) before missing several months w/arm injury.
- Lifted maiden WTA title at 2021 Strasbourg, followed by sweep of singles and doubles titles at Roland-Garros. Roland Garros was just her fifth Slam main draw in singles; only two women have won a major with fewer main draw appearances to their name.
- Also won Prague title (d. Martincova in F), reached final at Dubai (l. Muguruza) and qualified for WTA Finals in singles for the first time. Recorded best results at US Open (QF) and Wimbledon (R16) last year
- Posted another record-breaking year in doubles across 2021 - in addition to singles title at Roland Garros, won doubles title too in Paris, along with Madrid, Gippsland Trophy, WTA Finals and the gold medal at Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games (all w/Siniakova)
- Enjoyed breakout year in singles in 2020, posting career-high ranking of No.65 (November 16) and making R16 at Roland Garros and reaching second WTA SF at Linz
- Also reached two doubles finals last year, finishing R-Up at Dubai (w/Zheng) and winning Shenzhen (w/Siniakova)
- In Mixed Doubles, defended Australian Open title (w/Pavic), having triumphed in Melbourne a year earlier with w/Ram
- In 2019, advanced to QF at Bucharest in addition to winning four ITF Circuit singles titles on clay in North America and Europe, winning 20 of her 21 matches during this stretch
- Also in 2019, posted second Top 20 doubles season highlighted by titles at Toronto and Linz, and R-Up finish at Indian Wells (all w/Siniakova).
 Won Australian Open mixed doubles title w/Ram
- In 2018, won first two Grand Slam trophies at Roland Garros (d. Hozumi/ Ninomiya in F) and Wimbledon (d. Melichar/Peschke in F) both w/Siniakova, the first pairing to complete the Roland Garros-Wimbledon double since Kim Clijsters and Ai Sugiyama in 2003; also became

- Won second career singles title at Cleveland 2023 – qualified and defeated three seeds (No.3 Kudermetova, No.9 Stephens and No.4 Alexandrova) en route to the title.
 - Missed start of 2023 season with a left foot injury before returning at Bogota in April. Made R16 at Roland Garros (l. Haddad Maia) in best Grand Slam of the season.
- Best result in 2022 was SF at Palermo (l. eventual champion Begu). Also made QF at Guadalajara [250], Monterrey, Istanbul, Madrid and Lausanne
- Reached career-high ranking of No.32 on February 7, 2022
- Posted first Top-50 finish in 2021 at No.36 after her breakout season, winning her maiden WTA singles title at Guadalajara (d. Bouchard in F)
- Other notable results in 2021 included reaching the QF at Miami (l. Andreescu), Montreal(l. Ka.Pliskova) and Abu Dhabi (l. Kostyuk); made SF runs at Monterrey (l. Fernandez), Parma (l. Siniakova) and Cleveland (l. Kontaveit)
- Made her best Grand Slam run in 2021 by reaching the 3r at US Open (l. eventual champion Raducanu)
- Won ITF/\$80k title in Cagnes-Sur-Mer-FRA in September 2020; overall owns 10 singles titles and five doubles titles on the ITF Circuit
- Also in 2020, made QFs at Ostrava and Prague, and 2r at Australian Open and US Open - has now reached this stage at all four majors
- Has lifted two career doubles titles at 2018
 Monterrey (w/Broady) and 2019 Rabat
 (w/Martinez Sanchez); also reached final at 2019
 Mallorca (w/Martinez Sanchez). Career-high
 doubles ranking of No.40 (February 3, 2020)
- Made 2r for the first time at a major in 2018, as a qualifier at Wimbledon (l. compatriot Suarez Navarro)
- Reached first career WTA SFs in 2017, at first Bogotá and then Gstaad
- Fell 1r on Grand Slam main draw debut at 2016 Roland Garros (as qualifier, l. Pavlyuchenkova)
- In 2016, reached maiden tour-level QF at Seoul
- Also in 2016 made QF at WTA 125k Series event at Honolulu (l. eventual champion Bellis) and won two titles on the ITF Circuit at \$25K ITF/Sao Paulo-BRA (d. Mitu in F) and \$50K ITF/Essen-GER (d. Muchova in F). Finished as R-Up at \$100K ITF/Sharm El Sheikh-EGY (l. Vekic in F)
- Scored first WTA main draw win over Pavlyuchenkova (via ret.) at 2015 Charleston

- the first team ever to win the girls' (2013) and ladies' doubles title at SW19
- Rose to WTA doubles World No.1 on October 22, 2018
- Highlight of 2017 was R-Up finish in first WTA singles final at Nürnberg (l. Bertens in F). Also made QF as qualifier at Bastad (l. Garcia). Only other tour-level appearances were 1r exits at Bucharest and Québec City
- Contested five WTA main draws in 2016, progressing to 2r at two events: Kuala Lumpur and Prague
- Lifted maiden WTA doubles title at 2015 Québec City (w/Mestach)
- Advanced to first WTA doubles final at 2014 Luxembourg (w/Hradecka, l. Bacsinszky/Barrois)
- Reached 2r on WTA debut as qualifier at 2014 Québec City (l. Hradecka)
- On ITF Circuit, owns 14 singles and 19 doubles titles
- Made professional debut at \$10K ITF/Piestany-SVK in 2010

- Has represented Spain in Fed Cup in 2015-17 and 2019-20; best win came over No.10 Osaka (straight sets) in qualifying tie vs. Japan in February 2020
- Played first WTA main draw event at 2015 Rio de Janeiro (as qualifier, l. Ormaechea)
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2012 Barcelona (l. 1r)
- Played first professional event at \$10k ITF/Vallduxo-ESP in 2010



- Made third round of Grand Slam for first time at 2023 Australian Open after qualifying (l. Swiatek). As a qualifier, notched first Top 20 victory over Belinda Bencic at 2023 Cincinnati (l. Paolini).
- Also in 2023, lifted maiden title at WTA 125 Limoges (d. Jacquemot)
- In 2022, made 2r at Lyon (as qualifier, l. Yastremska), Lausanne (as qualifier, l. Waltert), US Open (as qualifier. l. Collins) and Portoroz (as qualifier, l. Haddad Maia). Also made SF at WTA 125K Series events in Contrexeville and Andorra
- Appeared in main draw at a major for the first time at 2021 US Open, falling 1r (as qualifier, l. Teichmann)
- Scored first Tour-level win during 2r showing at 2021 Belgrade (d. Kovinic, l. Sasnovich)
- Fell 1r on WTA main-draw debut at 2021 Bogota (l. Parrizas Diaz)
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2019 Wimbledon
- Won first ITF Circuit title in 2017, at W15 event in Santarem, Portugal
- Owns four titles in singles and seven in doubles on ITF Circuit

- 2023 season highlighted by SF run at Nottingham – qualified but lost to eventual champion Boulter in SF. Also had QF runs at Hua Hin (l. Wang Xinyu) and Warsaw (l. Wickmayer).
- Best results of the 2022 season were runs to R16 at Wimbledon (l. Niemeier) and 3r at Miami (l. Bencic)
- At 2021 Birmingham became only the third British woman to make SF at the tournament (l. eventual champion Jabeur)
- Broke back into Top 50 at No.49 (March 2, 2020)
 her highest ranking since June 15, 2015 (No.47)
 after a campaign in which she lifted her fourth career title and first since 2016 at Acapulco (d. Fernandez in F)
- Highlight of 2019 was R-Up finish at Tianjin (l. Peterson)
- Won mixed doubles title at Wimbledon in 2016 (w/Kontinen, d. Farah/Groenefeld in F) and finished R-Up in 2017 (w/Kontinen, l. Hingis/Murray)
- Represented Great Britain at 2016 Rio Olympics, reaching 2r in singles (l. Svitolina), 2r in doubles (w/ Konta, l. H.Chan/Y.Chan) and QF in mixed doubles (w/A.Murray, l. Bopanna/Mirza)
- Hit career-high singles ranking of No.38 on January 19, 2015 after title run at Hobart
- Two Top-10 wins of her career came over against No.8 A.Radwanska (2015 Indian Wells) and No.9 Cibulkova (2017 Eastbourne)
- Struggled throughout 2014 season with a right rib injury and missed two months in 2013 due to glandular fever (Miami to Roland Garros)
- Enjoyed a breakthrough 2012 season, winning Osaka to become first British woman to win a WTA singles title since Sara Gomer in 1988
- Broke into Top 100 on June 6, 2011 and made Top 50 debut on October 15, 2012
- Made WTA main draw debut as a wildcard at 2010 Miami and recorded first main draw match win at 2010 Eastbourne
- Played first professional event on ITF Circuit at 2009 ITF/Jersey-GBR
- Member of Great Britain Billie Jean King Cup Team, 2011-22 and Great Britain Olympic Team, 2012, 2016
- Won US Open junior singles title in 2009 (d. Buchina in F)
