Rybakina leads 1-0

They met earlier this year at Adelaide in the R16... This is Rybakina's second time as the No.1 seed at a Tour-level draw (also 2024 Adelaide, where she reached the QF)... Rybakina earned her sixth career title at her 2024 opener in Brisbane (d. Sabalenka in F)... Bucsa entered as a lucky loser after Zhu Lin withdrew (GI Illness)... Bucsa scored 8th Top 50 win over Wang Xinyu in opening match... The last time a lucky loser reached the SF at a WTA 500 tournament was 2016 New Haven (Johanna Larsson, SF)

[2] Ons Jabeur (TUN #6) vs. [6] Beatriz Haddad Maia (BRA #12)

Jabeur leads 2-1

Jabeur won the first two meetings, including wins at an ITF event in 2016 and 2023 Stuttgart (QF); Haddad Maia won most recent meeting at 2023 Roland Garros (QF)... Haddad Maia has 9 career Top 10 wins, including 4 last season... A semifinalist here last year, Haddad Maia (I. eventual champion Bencic) is making her first QF of 2024 season... Haddad Maia owns 9 Top 10 wins in career, having lost her previous only meeting with a Top 10 opponent in 2024 to No.1 Swiatek at United Cup... Jabeur is making tournament debut... Jabeur owns 34 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.6 Marketa Vondrousova at WTA Finals 2023

[4] Barbora Krejcikova (CZE #12) vs. [8] Liudmila Samsonova (#15)

Tied 1-1

After splitting their two meetings in 2023, this is their first meeting this year; Krejcikova won the match-up at 2023 Stuttgart, while Samsonova won at Abu Dhabi... Samsonova is through to her 16th quarterfinal at the Tour-level; this is her first QF of 2024 after reaching the QF stage (or better) 6 times in 2023... Krejcikova reached the QF at the Australian Open (I. eventual champion Sabalenka)... Samsonova reached the final last season at Abu Dhabi and held 3 championship points (I. Bencic in F)... Three of Samsonova's four career titles came on hard court (Tokyo, Cleveland and Washington DC in 2022)

Tied 1-1

First meeting in nearly three years... Kasatkina won their first meeting at Madrid 2018 while Cirstea took the most recent win at Roland Garros 2021...Kasatkina is making her second consecutive QF here at Abu Dhabi, after losing to Zheng in QF at Abu Dhabi 2023...Kasatkina is making her third QF of 2024 season, having reached QF at Brisbane (I. Sabalenka) and Adelaide (R-Up)...Kasatkina has a 7-1 record against opponents outside Top 20 in 2024... Both of Cirstea's two wins of 2024 season have come here at Abu Dhabi, including her win over No.9 Sakkari, which is her 20th career Top 10 win and first in 2024... Cirstea's last QF appearance on the tour was at US Open 2023 (I. Muchova)...With a win today, would be her first SF since Miami 2023 (I. Kvitova)... Cirstea is through to her 57th Tour-level QF... Cirstea has reached the QF stage six times at WTA 500 level events; she is seeking her first SF appearance at a WTA 500 level since 2013 Stanford (SF)

 Australian Open (l. Sabalenka in 3s); made Top 10 debut following tournament (January 30,
 2023). Also in 2023 won first WTA 1000 title at
 Indian Wells, and finished R-Up at two further
 WTA 1000 finals at Miami and Rome. Qualified
 for first WTA Finals, going 1-2 in Group Stage.
- Lifted maiden major at 2022 Wimbledon (d. Jabeur in F)
- Last season also finished R-Up at Adelaide (l. Barty) and Portoroz (l. Siniakova)
- Best result of 2021 were SFs at Eastbourne, Olympics and Chicago [500], and QFs at Abu Dhabi, Roland Garros, San Jose and Ostrava

- Won back-to-back Slam matches for the first time during 3r showing at 2020 Australian Open (l. Barty)
- Won maiden WTA singles title at 2019 Bucharest (d. Tig in F), breaking into Top 100 for the first time in the following week's rankings at No.65 (July 22, 2019)
- Also in 2019, went on to make Top 50 debut on September 16, 2019, after reaching second career final at Nanchang (l. Peterson), produced SF appearances at Luxembourg and 's-Hertogenbosch, and made Grand Slam main draw debut at 2019 Roland Garros, falling 1r (as qualifier, l. Siniakova)
- Finished 2019 campaign with 57-21 win-loss record (across all levels) to end season at No.37, up from 2018's final ranking of No.191. On the ITF Circuit in 2019, lifted silverware on three occasions: back-to-back at \$25k Moscow-RUS and \$25k Kazan-RUS, and at \$60k ITF/Launceston-AUS
- Highlights of 2018 included reaching maiden WTA QF at St. Petersburg (l. Goerges) and clinching title at \$15k ITF/Kazan-RUS
- First Top 10 win came over No.7 Garcia at 2018
 St. Petersburg
- Made WTA qualifying and main draw debut at 2017 Moscow (as qualifier, l. Begu in 1r)

- Made third round of Grand Slam for first time at 2023 Australian Open after qualifying (l. Swiatek). As a qualifier, notched first Top 20 victory over Belinda Bencic at 2023 Cincinnati (l. Paolini).


