## MATCH NOTES – DAY 6 – SUNDAY, MAY 12, 2024

### [5] Maria Sakkari (GRE #8) vs. [30] Anhelina Kalinina (UKR #31)

**Tied 1-1**

After splitting a pair of three-set matches, Sakkari and Kalinina will face off for the first time on clay... Sakkari (61) is five victories away from equaling her mother Angeliki Kanellopoulou (66) for the most WTA match-wins on clay of any Greek player in the Open Era... Sakkari reached the semifinals at 2019 Rome as a qualifier (l. eventual champion Karolina Pliskova)... Sakkari has won one WTA 1000 title, at 2023 Guadalajara, and has reached three more WTA 1000 finals, all on hard court... Kalinina reached her first WTA 1000 final here in Rome last year (retired in final due to left thigh injury)... Kalinina has posted four Top 10 wins, most recently beating No.2 Aryna Sabalenka at 2024 Miami... Kalinina is one of three Ukrainians to reach the third round this week (also Svitolina and Yastremska; all three are playing on Center Court today)

### [32] Dayana Yastremska (UKR #33) vs. [2] Aryna Sabalenka (#2)

**Yastremska leads 3-0**

Yastremska has won all three of their previous encounters, but this will be their first meeting in more than four years... Yastremska has notched four previous Top 10 wins, including over Marketa Vondrousova en route to her first Grand Slam quarterfinal at this year's Australian Open... Yastremska saved two match points in her first win of the event against Laura Siegemund... Currently ranked No.33, Yastremska was ranked No.158 just 12 months ago... Sabalenka has won six of her last seven matches after reaching her third career Madrid final last week... Two of Sabalenka's 14 career titles have come on clay, both in Madrid in 2021 and 2023... Since the start of the 2020 season, Sabalenka (22) is one of only two players to register 20 or more WTA-1000 match wins on clay, along with Iga Swiatek (28)

### [16] Elina Svitolina (UKR #19) vs. [23] Anna Kalinskaya (#26)

**First meeting**

Svitolina is making her 10th appearance at Rome, where she won back-to-back titles in 2017 and 2018... Svitolina is a four-time WTA 1000 titlist, also taking the trophy at both Dubai and Toronto in 2017... Six of Svitolina's 17 WTA singles titles have come on clay... Kalinskaya has posted 13 wins over Top 20 players, most recently Jelena Ostapenko at 2024 Miami... Kalinskaya reached her first WTA 1000 final earlier this year in Dubai as a qualifier, where she beat No.9 Ostapenko, No.3 Gauff and No.1 Swiatek in succession... Overall, Kalinskaya is 5-0 against Top 10 players this year

### Sara Sorribes Tormo (ESP #47) vs [9] Jelena Ostapenko (LAT #10)

**Sorribes Tormo leads 2-0**

Sorribes Tormo won the two previous meetings (including a win in 2014 at an ITF Circuit event); their last match-up came eight years ago at 2016 Linz... Sorribes Tormo is making her 24th WTA 1000 appearance; her best result at the WTA 1000 level has been a three-time quarterfinalist – 2021 Miami, 2021 Montreal and 2022 Madrid... Ostapenko is a two-time finalist at the WTA 1000 level (this is her 64th appearance); she was runner-up at 2016 Doha and 2018 Miami... Sorribes Tormo is 2-16 vs. Top 10 (1-7 mark on clay with lone win coming at 2020 at Billie Jean King Cup over Naomi Osaka)... A semifinalist last year, Ostapenko is defending 390 points; she will need to reach the QF to have a chance at staying in the Top 10

### [13] Danielle Collins (USA #15) vs [22] Caroline Garcia (FRA #23)

**Collins leads 4-0**

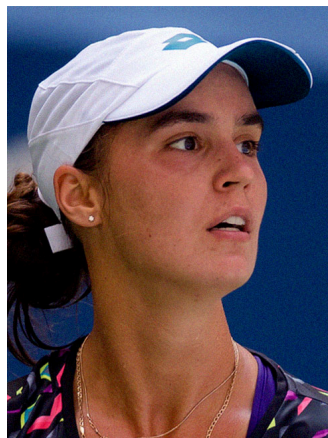
Collins has won the four previous meetings in straight-sets, most recently at 2024 Miami en route to Collins title run... Both Collins (career-high of No.7) and Garcia (career-high of No.4) are former Top 10 players... This is Garcia's 85th WTA 1000 appearance, highlighted by three titles 2017 Wuhan, 2017 Beijing and 2022 Cincinnati... Collins is making her 35th WTA 1000 appearance, having won a title at 2024 Miami... Garcia has won three clay-court titles – 2014 Bogota, 2016 Strasbourg and 2022 Warsaw (all at the WTA 250 level); Collins has won two clay-court titles – 2021 Palermo (WTA 250) and 2024 Charleston (WTA 500)... Collins has won 17 of her last 19 matches with her only losses in that stretch coming against WTA World No.1 Iga Swiatek (Indian Wells) and World No.2 Aryna Sabalenka (Madrid)

### PLAYER NOTES

- Making sixth main-draw appearance at Rome; previous best result was SF run in 2019 (qualified, l. eventual champion Karolina Pliskova)
- After 1r bye, defeated qualifier Varvara Gracheva so far this week, reaching the Rome 3r for the third straight year
- Faces No.31 Anhelina Kalinina in 3r today; owns 114 wins in career over Top 50 players
- Owns 8-4 career record against players from Ukraine (1-0 in 2024)
- Owns one career singles title on clay - at 2019 Rabat (d. Konta in F)

- Both of her two WTA singles finals have come on clay, finishing runner-up at 2021 Budapest (l. Putintseva) and 2023 Rome

## CAREER MILESTONES

- Won first WTA 1000 title in 2023 at Guadalajara (d. Dolehide in F). Also finished R-Up at Washington (l. Gauff). Contested WTA Finals for third consecutive season (was first alternate and went 0-3 in Group Stage following Muchova withdrawal).
- Finished 2022 ranked No.6 for the second consecutive year; a four-time finalist in 2022 including runs to the final at two WTA 1000 tournaments – Indian Wells and Guadalajara [1000]; returned to the WTA Finals advancing to the semifinals, falling to eventual champion Caroline Garcia.
- Climbed as high as No.3 in the rankings (March 21, 2022), the highest ranking ever achieved by a Greek woman.
- Historic 2021 season was highlighted by her becoming first Greek woman to break into the Top 10 (at No.10, September 27) as well as the first from her country to qualify for the WTA Finals.
- In 2021, also reached third WTA final at Ostrava (l. Kontaveit), while advanced to SF at Roland-Garros, US Open – defeating three Top-20 ranked opponents at both events – and WTA Finals in Guadalajara
- Posted a Tour-leading nine Top-10 wins in 2021, including two over the World No.2 (Osaka at Miami and No.2 Sabalenka at WTA Finals)
- Broke into Top 20 on February 24, 2020 for first time, at No.20
- Scored third and fourth Top-5 wins of her career in 2020, over No.5 Svitolina at Ostrava and No.5 Bencic at St. Petersburg. Previous wins came over No.5 Ka.Pliskova (2018 Rome) and No.5 Kvitova (2019 Rome, via ret.)
- Upset No.10 seed Keys to reach the R16 for the first time at one of the four Slams, at 2020 Australian Open (l. Kvitova)
- Qualified for WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai in 2019 for first time in career (fell in RR stage). That season won maiden WTA title at Rabat, recovering from a set and break down to defeat Konta in final
- Highlights of 2018 were reaching her first tour-level final at San Jose (l. Buzarnescu) and scoring maiden Top-5 win over No.5 Ka.Pliskova in 2r at Rome
- Notched first Top-10 victory of career over No.6 Wozniacki en route to first WTA SF of career at 2017 Wuhan
- Broke into Top 50 for first time at No.49 on October 9, 2017
- In 2023, made 3r at Australian Open, achieving best Grand Slam result (l. Krejckikova). Finished runner-up at Rome (l. Rybakina via ret. w/left leg injury), equalling her best Tour result (also runner-up at Budapest in 2021). 2023 ranking peaked at No. 25 on May 22 and closed out the season with QF at Zhengzhou (l. eventual champion Zheng).
- In 2022, reached four QF, at Charleston (l. Jabeur), Madrid (l. Teichmann), Eastbourne (l. Ostapenko) and Cluj-Napoca (l. eventual champion Blinkova). Also won WTA 125 tournament at Limoges in December
- Posted first Top 100 season in 2021, finishing on a career-high ranking of No.52
- Reached first WTA singles final at 2021 Budapest (l. Putintseva) and was a quarterfinalist at the Transylvania Open (l. eventual champion Kontaveit)
- Ranking was further boosted in 2021 by five ITF Circuit titles, taking career haul to 15 at that level
- Upset Kerber in 1r at 2021 Roland Garros to advance to 2r (l. Collins); also reached 2r at the US Open, where she was defeated by Kerber
- Broke into Top 100 on July 12, 2021, following title run at \$100k ITF/Contrexeville-FRA
- Best result of 2020 was R-Up finish at \$100k ITF/Midland-MI, USA. At WTA level, fell 1r twice (including US Open) and in qualifying three times (including the year's other two majors)
- Highlight of 2019 was reaching 2r at Jurmala (d. Siniakova, l. Tig) and winning ITF Circuit title at \$25k Perov-CZE
- Made her Grand Slam main draw debut at 2018 US Open – came through qualifying to make 2r (l. Stephens)
- Also in 2018 made second tour-level appearance of her career, falling 1r at Washington DC (as qualifier, l. Bonaventure)
- Sidelined for 10 months at the end of 2015 w/shoulder injury, playing only 12 matches in 2016 season
- As a junior was runner-up in girls' singles at 2014 US Open (l. Bouzkova) and doubles champion at 2014 Australian Open (w/Kulichkova)

- At 2016 Australian Open, by reaching 2r (d. Y.Wang, l. Suárez Navarro) became the first woman from Greece to win a main draw match at a Slam since Daniilidou d. Ka.Pliskova at 2013 Australian Open
- Reached first career WTA QF at 2016 Istanbul (as qualifier, l. Kovinic)
- Fell 1r on WTA main draw debut at 2015 US Open (as qualifier, l. Q.Wang)
- WTA qualifying debut came at 2012 Palermo
- Made debut on ITF Circuit in 2010; owns seven ITF Circuit singles titles and five in doubles

## OTHER INFORMATION

- Recently ended six-year coaching partnership with Tom Hill; currently working with David Witt
- Parents are Konstantinos and Angeliki; brother is Yannis (studies at Boston University) and sister is Amanda. Introduced to tennis by parents at age 6; mother played on WTA; achieved a Top 50 singles ranking
- Born and raised in Athens; moved to Barcelona at age 18 to train
- Favorite surfaces are hard and clay; favorite shot is serve
- Tennis idols are Serena Williams, Rafael Nadal and Roger Federer
- During free time enjoys going back to Greece and seeing friends.
- Working with Anton Korchevskyi
- Formerly trained in Trnava, Slovakia at the Empire Academy, under the tutelage of Vladimir Platenik; formerly worked with Dinara Safina
- Started playing tennis aged six
- Favorite surface is hard

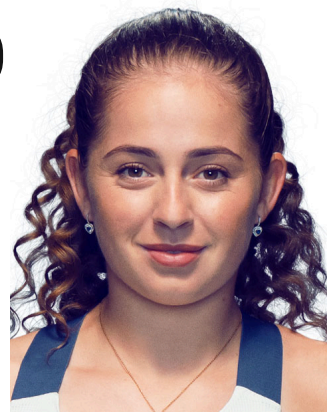
