[9] Jelena Ostapenko (LAT #10) vs. [2] Aryna Sabalenka (#2)

Sabalenka leads 2-0

Ostapenko has made her fourth quarterfinal at the Internazionali d'Italia, becoming the tournament where she made the most quarterfinals in her career (level with Eastbourne)... **Ostapenko** has reached her 11th WTA 1000 quarterfinal, where she has a record of 7-3.... **Ostapenko** is looking to make back-to-back semifinals in a single WTA level event for the second time in her career after having done so in Eastbourne 2021-2022... **Ostapenko** is seeking her third title of 2024, after winning Adelaide and Linz; this is the second time in her career she has won two titles in a year (also 2017)... **Sabalenka** has won the pair's previous two matchups, though both matches were played on hard courts... **Sabalenka** has the most winners of any player at WTA clay court events this season (396)... **Sabalenka** has spent 24 hours and 22 minutes so far during WTA clay court events, the most time spent by any player on Tour.... Since 2021, only Iga Swiatek (5) has reached more semifinals at clay-court WTA 1000 events than **Sabalenka** (4)

If Sabalenka wins...

- *it will be the first time that the WTA World No.1, No.2 and No.3 have advanced to the semifinals of a WTA 250 event or higher (outside of the WTA Finals) since 2013 Roland Garros.*
- it will be the second WTA 1000 semifinal that features the WTA World No.1, No.2 and No.3 (also 2013 Doha)
- it will also be the first time that the WTA World No.1 and No.2 have reached the semifinals at backto-back WTA 1000 semifinals since 2013 Miami and Madrid

[24] Victoria Azarenka (#24) vs. [13] Danielle Collins (USA #15)

Azarenka is making 15th appearance at Rome, where she was a finalist in 2013 (I. S. Williams in F)... **Azarenka** owns 10 singles title at WTA 1000 events... **Azarenka** has reached her seventh quarterfinal at Rome; with a win today, would be her third semifinal of 2024 season (after Miami and Brisbane)... **Azarenka** has 203 match wins at WTA 1000 tournaments, the most at the tournament level since it was introduced in 2009... **Azarenka's** record in WTA quarterfinal matches stands at 66-38 (2-2 in 2024)... **Collins** is making fourth appearance at Rome and has reached her first quarterfinal at Rome this year... **Collins**' best result at WTA 1000 events was champion run at Miami 2024 (d. Rybakina in final)... **Collins'** record in WTA quarterfinal matches stands at 15-14 (2-2 in 2024)... **Collins** has won two singles titles on clay: Charleston 2024 and Palermo 2021... **Collins** is one of three American women in the singles quarterfinals at Rome (w/ Gauff and Keys) and is looking to join Gauff in the semifinals: the last time two Americans reached the Rome semifinals was 2016 (S.Williams def. Keys in F)

- Has won two clay court titles, both at Madrid (d. Barty in final 2021; d. Swiatek in final in 2023)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Won sixth career title at 2023 Birmingham (d. Krejcikova in F) and reached SF at Rome; in doubles achieved R-Up at Doha (w/L.Kichenok)
- At 2022 Dubai, lifted fifth career singles title (d. Kudermetova in F); finished R-Up at Eastbourne (l. Kvitova) and Seoul (l. Alexandrova) as well as SF at St. Petersburg and Doha
- Won two doubles titles in 2022 at Birmingham and Cincinnati (both w/L.Kichenok); qualified for WTA Finals reaching SF Lifted first grass court title at 2021 Eastbourne (as WC, d. Kontaveit in F)
- In 2021, also finished R-Up at Luxembourg (l. Tauson), made SF at Indian Wells (l. Azarenka), reached QF at Rome and represented Latvia at the Tokyo Olympics (l. Vesnina in 1r)
- Won doubles title at 2021 Moscow (w/Siniakova)
- Highlights of 2020 season included three Top 10 wins and reaching QF at Strasbourg
- Finished R-Up in doubles w/Dabrowski at 2020 Doha (l. Hsieh/Strycova)
- 2019 season saw her capture third career title at Luxembourg (d. Goerges in F) right after finishing R-Up at Linz (l. Gauff)
- Also R-Up in mixed doubles at 2019 Wimbledon w/Lindstedt
- 2018 campaign highlighted by finishing R-Up at Miami (l. Stephens); beat No.9 Petra Kvitova and No.4 Elina Svitolina to register multiple Top 10 wins in the same tournament for the first time
- Reached SF at 2018 Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Kerber) to become first Latvian woman to reach final four at All England Club
- Achieved career-high ranking of No.5 on March 19, 2018
- In doubles won title at 2018 Doha (w/Dabrowski)
- Enjoyed career-best season in 2017, finishing the year in the Top 10 for the first time (at No.7); was No.44 at end of 2016 (first Top 50 finish) and No.79 at end of 2015 (first Top 100 finish)
- Champion at 2017 Roland Garros (d. Halep in F) becoming first woman to win first tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Barbara Jordan at 1979 Australian Open. Also became the first unseeded player to lift the trophy in the Open Era and the first Latvian player to reach the championship match at a Grand Slam
- Followed up title run with QF appearance at 2017 Wimbledon; also won title at Seoul (d. Haddad Maia in F) and reached final at Charleston (l. Kasatkina)
- Qualified for debut WTA Finals in 2017 went 1-2 in group stage

- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid.
- Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- Rose to career-high No.2 in rankings on August 23, 2021
- In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejcikova/Siniakova in F)
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10
- Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitova in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the 'Sunshine Double' by winning back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejcikova/Siniakova in F) and Miami (d. Stosur/ Zhang in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Shenzhen in doubles (w/Mertens), going 1-2 in the round-robin stage
- Enjoyed breakthrough season in 2018, lifting two titles, at New Haven (d. Suárez Navarro in F) and Wuhan (d. Kontaveit in F), winning 46 matches and finishing at No.11 in the rankings
- Also in 2018, was R-Up at Lugano (I. Mertens) and Eastbourne (I. Wozniacki), made SF at Cincinnati, reached five QFs and produced a career-best Grand Slam run to R16 at US Open
- Entered Top 50 on April 16, 2018, after Lugano run, and Top 20 on August 27 of the same year,

- Made Top 10 debut at No.10 on September 11, 2017
- In doubles, won first and second career titles in 2017, at St. Petersburg (w/Rosolska) and Stuttgart (w/Atawo) Breakthrough result of 2016 season was reaching final at Doha launching her into Top 50 at No.40 (l. Suárez Navarro); also in 2016 reached SF at Katowice and QF at Birmingham and Florianopolis ending year at No.44
- Ended 2015 at No.79 for first Top 100 finish (up from No.308 in 2014). Having leapt 229 spots, was second highest year-end rankings jump, after Kasatkina who went from No.370 to No.72 (298 spots)
- Highlights of 2014 were reaching first career WTA final at Quebec City (l. Beck) and 2r at Wimbledon and US Open
- Scored first Top 10 win over No.9 Carla Suárez Navarro in 1r at 2015 Wimbledon
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2014 Tashkent as WC advancing to 2r (l. Pervak)
- Played qualifying at Moscow in 2012
- Member of Latvian Billie Jean King Cup team in 2013-2022
- Began professional career playing ITF in 2012 winning first career title at \$10k/ITF Stockholm, SWE; owns seven career ITF titles

following New Haven title

- Broke into Top 100 at No.76 on October 16, 2017 after reaching first Tour-level final at Tianjin (l. Sharapova). Also in 2017 made SF at Tashkent (l. Babos) and lifting WTA 125k Series title at Mumbai (d. Jakupovic)


