MATCH NOTES - THURSDAY, AUGUST 8, 2024

[1] Coco Gauff (USA #2) vs. [Q] Yafan Wang (CHN #72)

First meeting

Now 20 years old, **Gauff** made three quarterfinals at the Canadian Open as a teenager; only Gabriela Sabatini and Andrea Jaeger have reached more QFs at this tournament as a teenager... A win today would see **Gauff** equal Elena Rybakina (15) for the third most wins in WTA-1000 tournaments during 2024; only Danielle Collins and Iga Swiatek have more... **Gauff** owns 6 singles titles on hard court including US Open 2023... For the first time at a WTA 1000, **Gauff** is the No. 1 seed; she has been top seed at 3 tournaments in her career... **Gauff** has won 37 matches so far in 2024 and is ranked No.4 on Tour for match wins, behind Iga Swiatek (50), Elena Rybakina (40) and Danielle Collins (38)... **Wang** makes her tournament main-draw debut appearance through qualifying... **Gauff** enters the week ranked No.5 on the PIF Race to WTA Finals Leaderboard... This is **Wang's** 16th appearance at a WTA 1000 with her best result being R16 runs at Miami 2018 (I. Kerber) and 2019 (I. Q. Wang)... **Wang** is seeking her first Top 10 win of 2024 season and third overall, having defeated No.7 Caroline Garcia at US Open 2023 and No.5 Elina Svitolina at Miami 2019... The best result by a Chinese woman at Toronto was Runner-Up run by Li Na in 2012

[Q] Ashlyn Krueger (USA #82) vs. [15] Leylah Fernandez (CAN #25)

Fernandez leads 1-0

Fernandez won the only previous meeting earlier this year at Eastbourne... **Krueger** is making tournament debut; her best result at WTA 1000 events was 3r run at Madrid 2024 (I. Bejlek)... **Krueger** owns 4 wins in career over Top 50 players, most recently No.16 Ekaterina Alexandrova at Madrid 2024... **Krueger's** sole career singles title has come on hard court at Osaka 2023... **Fernandez** is making 5th appearance at Rogers Cup, where her previous best result was reaching 3r in 2023 (I. Collins); this is her 26th appearance at a WTA 1000 with her best result being QF run at Doha 2024... **Fernandez** owns 5-0 record in 2024 season against qualifiers... The 2021 US Open finalist, **Fernandez** owns 3 singles titles on hard court, all coming at WTA 250 level – Hong Kong (2023) and Monterrey (2021, 2022)

Yue Yuan (CHN #42) vs. [2] Aryna Sabalenka (#3)

First meeting

Yuan is making her seventh WTA 1000 appearance, highlighted by QF run at Indian Wells... **Yuan** is seeking her first career Top 5 win (previously 0-2); earlier this year, **Yuan** recorded her first career Top 10 win at Indian Wells defeating No.8 Qinwen Zheng... **Sabalenka** is making her 48th appearance at a WTA 1000, having won five WTA 1000 titles... **Sabalenka** is making her sixth tournament appearance, having reached the SF in 2021... Having won the Australian Open and finished as runner-up at Brisbane, Madrid and Rome this year, **Sabalenka** ranks No.3 on the PIF Race to the Finals Leaderboard

[WC] Naomi Osaka (JPN #95) vs. Elise Mertens (BEL #35)

Osaka leads 4-2

This is their seventh meeting overall and third this year; they split their two meetings this year with Mertens winning at Indian Wells and Osaka winning at 's-Hertogenbosch... **Osaka** is making 5th appearance at Toronto, where her previous best result was QF run in 2019 (I. S. Williams)... **Osaka** is making her 40th WTA 1000 appearance, having won titles at Beijing 2019 and Indian Wells 2018... **Mertens** is making 6th appearance at Rogers Cup, where her previous best result was QF run in 2018 (in Montreal, I. Svitolina)... **Mertens** is making her 51st WTA 1000 appearance, having twice reached SF at 2020 Cincinnati and 2021 Dubai... **Mertens** also sits atop the PIF Race to WTA Finals Leaderboard in doubles along with her partner Hsieh Su-Wei

Elina Svitolina (UKR #34) vs. [11] Marta Kostyuk (UKR #20)

Svitolina leads 1-0

Svitolina is making her 76th appearance at a WTA 1000, having won four titles, including three in 2017 (Dubai, Rome, Toronto) and 2018 Rome... **Kostyuk** currently sits at No.14 on the PIF Race to the WTA Finals leaderboard; she has been ranked in the Top 8 as recently as the week of May 6... **Kostyuk** is making her 26th WTA 1000 appearance, highlighted by a SF run at 2024 Indian Wells... **Kostyuk** is currently the top-ranked Ukrainian, while **Svitolina** is the No.3 ranked Ukrainian; Dayana Yastremska (at No.27) is No.2...


Paula Badosa (ESP #40) vs. [4] Jelena Ostapenko (LAT #11)



- Owns 9-1 career record against players from China, with record in 2024 standing at 2-0, having defeated Yuan at Indian Wells and Zheng at Rome
- Owns 35-4 career record against qualifiers (7-1 in 2024)
- Owns 6 singles titles on hard court including US Open 2023
- Is No. 1 seed this week; has been top seed at 3 tournaments in her career, and first at a WTA-1000 event
- United States has won Rogers Cup 11 times, most recently by Jessica Pegula in 2023
- Is currently ranked No.2; this time last year was ranked No.7
- Has won 37 matches so far in 2024; she is ranked No.4 on tour for match wins, behind Elena Rybakina, Iga Swiatek (50), Elena Rybakina (40) and Danielle Collins (38)



CAREER MILESTONES

- Won debut Grand Slam singles crown in 2023 lifting title on home soil at US Open (d. Sabalenka in F). Picked up another three titles in 2023, marking first WTA 1000 title at Cincinnati and debut WTA 500 title at Washington DC, in addition to WTA 250 Auckland. In doubles was co-ranked No.1 with Pegula after US Open.
- In 2022, reached maiden Grand Slam final at Roland-Garros (l. Swiatek); was the youngest major finalist since Sharapova won 2004 Wimbledon
- Made Top-10 debut on September 12, 2022, following QF run at US Open (l. Garcia)
- Highlight of 2021 campaign was completing singles-doubles title sweep at Parma; defeated Q.Wang in singles final and teamed up w/McNally to win doubles
- In 2021 also reached SF at Adelaide and Rome, while at the Slams made QF at Roland-Garros and R16 at Wimbledon
- Finished R-Up in doubles at 2021 US Open (w/McNally, l. Stosur/Zhang)
- First cracked the Top 50 on February 24, 2020 at No.49, following a R16 appearance at Australian Open to tie her career best Grand Slam result during run, defeated V.Williams in 1r and her first Top-5 opponent in No.4 Osaka in 3r (l. eventual champion Kenin in 3s)
- Enjoyed breakout season in 2019, highlighted by maiden WTA singles title at Linz (as lucky loser, d. Ostapenko in F) - earned her first Top-10 win en route to title over No.8 Bertens in QF
- At 15y 214d, her title run in Linz made her youngest to win a WTA tour-level title since Vaidisova (15y 177d) won Tashkent in 2004
- Also claimed maiden WTA doubles titles at Washington, DC (w/McNally, d. Sanchez/Stollar in F) and Luxembourg (w/McNally, d. Christian/Guarachi in F)
- By winning the doubles title at Washington, DC at 15y 144d, became the youngest player to win a doubles title since May 1995 (Hingis won Hamburg at 14y 219d)
- Reached R16 at 2019 Wimbledon on Grand Slam main draw debut defeating V.Williams in 1r (l. eventual champion Halep) - followed with 3r showing at US Open (as WC. l. Osaka)
- Made WTA main draw debut as a wildcard at 2019 Miami where she earned her first WTA main draw win over good friend McNally (l. Kasatkina in 2r)

- In 2023 competed in first full season in three years. From February to August, posted 46 - 10 match record on ITF circuit. In August lifted WTA 125 Stanford title (d. Rakhimova) and reached 2r at US Open (as qualifier, l. Boulter). Began the year ranked No. 418 and by the end of 2023 had climbed back into Top 100.
- Played five months on the ITF circuit in 2022, before taking more time away from the sport from May onwards.
- Returned to the Tour in 2021, but continuing covid travel challenges made Wimbledon her last tournament of the year (reached 1r as a qualifier, l. Siniakova).
- Played only six tournaments in 2020 due to covid restrictions, ending her season in March after reaching QF in singles and R-Up in doubles (w/M.Kato) at Monterrey.
- Reached first WTA singles final in 2019, defeating Kenin to lift title at Acapulco; made Top 50 debut the following week before hit career high-ranking of No.47 on October 7
- Other highlights were SF runs at Shenzhen and Seoul, and QF showings at Hua Hin, Mallorca and Tianjin
- Matched best result at WTA Premier Mandatory level by making R16 at 2019 Miami (also reached this stage in 2018 at same event, as qualifier); during Miami run defeated No.5 Svitolina for best win by-ranking of career (bettering defeat of No.20 Stosur at 2014 Guangzhou)
- Contested the main draw of each Grand Slam in a calendar year for the first time in 2019, reaching 2r at both Australian Open and Wimbledon (also made this stage at 2016 and 2018 US Open)
- Season highlight in 2018 was reaching SF at Taipei City (l. eventual champion Babos), where she also won doubles title w/Duan
- Strong performances at WTA 125K Series events in 2018 highlighted by R-Up finish at Zhengzhou (l. S.Zheng)
- First broke into Top 100 on April 2, 2018
- Season highlight in 2017 was reaching SF at Nanchang. Missed first half of 2017 due to illness
- Having fallen in qualifying at all four Grand Slam events in 2015, made Grand Slam main draw debut at 2016 Australian Open (l. Sakkari in 1r)
- Member of Chinese Fed Cup Team, 2016, 2018-19
- Made WTA singles main draw debut at 2014 Guangzhou, advancing to SF (l. Niculescu).

- Made professional debut in May 2018 as a qualifier into the \$25K ITF/Osprey, FL-USA
- Member of US Billie Jean King Cup team in 2022
- Former Junior World No.1 (July 2018); won 2018
 Roland-Garros girls' title (d. McNally in F) and
 2018 US Open doubles title (w/McNally), while
 finished R-Up at 2017 US Open girls' event (l.
 Anisimova) becoming the youngest girls' singles
 finalist in tournament history at 13-years-old
- Defeated No.20 Stosur en route to register first Top 20 win
- Contested WTA qualifying for the first time at 2012 Beijing
- Winner of 10 singles and six doubles titles on ITF Circuit
- Played first event of career at ITF/Quanzhou-CHN in 2009



CAREER MILESTONES

- 2023 was a difficult season for Badosa; while she made the SF at Adelaide #2, reached backto-back QF at Charleston and Stuttgart and an additional QF at Rome, she withdrew from Roland Garros with a back injury. Her last match of the year was at Wimbledon, where she fell in the R64. She ended her season afterwards due to continuing injury
- In 2022, Badosa rose to career-high ranking of No.2 (April 25), won one title, at Sydney and advanced to SF at Indian Wells, Stuttgart and San Jose
- Captured the first two WTA singles titles of her career in 2021 at Belgrade (d. Konjuh in F) and Indian Wells (d. Azarenka in F
- Qualified for AKRON WTA Finals Guadalajara, where she advanced to the SF stage
- Broke into the WTA Top 20 on October 18, 2021 after winning the Indian Wells title and reached the Top 10 on November 8, 2021
- Nominated for 2021 WTA Most Improved Player of the Year (won by Krejcikova), as voted on by members of the media
- In 2021 also advanced to SF at Madrid, Charleston and Lyon and QFs at Roland-Garros, Cincinnati and Olympics
- At 2020 Roland Garros, upset former finalist Stephens and 2017 champion Ostapenko en route to reaching R16 for the first time at a major. That year also reached SF at Istanbul (l. Bouchard)
- Campaign in 2019 highlighted by SF run at Palermo (l. Bertens) and QF showing at Seoul (l. Y.Wang); also fell 1r on Grand Slam main draw debut at Australian Open (as qualifier, l. Birrell)

- Came through qualifying at 2015 Madrid, fell 1r to Errani via ret. w/left leg injury
- Continued at ITF Circuit level during 2013-2014 before playing second WTA qualifying draw at

- Won sixth career title at 2023 Birmingham (d. Krejcikova in F) and reached SF at Rome; in doubles achieved R-Up at Doha (w/L.Kichenok)
- At 2022 Dubai, lifted fifth career singles title (d. Kudermetova in F); finished R-Up at Eastbourne (l. Kvitova) and Seoul (l. Alexandrova) as well as SF at St. Petersburg and Doha
