MATCH NOTES – DAY 4 – WEDNESDAY MAY 29, 2024

[1] Iga Swiatek (POL #1) vs. Naomi Osaka (JPN #134)

Tied 1-1

A battle today between a reigning and former WTA World No.1 and two four-time Grand Slam winners... Swiatek will extend her streak atop the PIF WTA Rankings this fortnight and will hold on to the top spot after Roland Garros; she currently has 11,695 ranking points, her highest ranking points total; only Serena Williams compiled a higher ranking point tally as WTA World No.1... Swiatek has established a 3,557 point lead atop rankings... Swiatek is 17-2 in R64 at Slams, including 5-0 at Roland Garros, having won 16-straight; lost 2 of her first 3 second-round matches at Slams in 2019... Swiatek is currently on a 13-match winning streak on clay; her best winning streak on this surface was 18 between Stuttgart and Warsaw in 2022... Swiatek has won her last 31 matches against players outside the Top 100, last tasting defeat to No.338 Konjuh at 2021 Miami... Swiatek also owns a perfect 19-0 record against players outside the Top 100 at the Slams, dropping only five sets across all 19 matches... Osaka is a four-time Grand Slam champion (Australian Open 2021, 2019; US Open 2020, 2019) and entering her 25th Grand Slam main draw... Osaka is approaching her 60th Grand Slam main draw win, defeat of Bronzetti in 1r took her to a 58-19 record across the Majors... Osaka is 16-1 in R64 matches at the Slams with her only loss coming at 2017 Australian Open (I. Konta)... Osaka's best career result on clay is semifinal which she has reached once at Stuttgart in 2019... Osaka owns a 2-3 record vs. the reigning WTA World No.1 player, with wins against Halep (2018 Indian Wells) and Barty (2019 Beijing)... A win today for Osaka would be her first Top 10 win since defeating the now-retired No.9 Kiki Bertens at 2020 Brisbane

[3] Coco Gauff (USA #3) vs. [Q] Tamara Zidansek (SLO #131)

First meeting

Following her 1r win over Julia Avdeeva, Gauff has now registered 50 Grand Slam match wins (50-17), becoming the eighth player representing the United States of America to register 50 wins before turning 21... Only Mary Joe Fernandez (20), Kathy Rinaldi Stunkel (19) and Chris Evert (17) have registered more wins at Roland Garros than Coco Gauff (16) before turning 21 among players representing the United States of America in the Open Era... No player has converted more break points at the Slams this year than Gauff; she has converted 38 break points including her opening round win... Gauff is 12-3 in second round matches at the Slams with last loss coming at 2021 US Open... Gauff has lost just one of her last 13 matches against qualifiers (Anna Kalinskaya at Dubai 2024) and also just one loss in the last 20 meetings against players outside the Top 100 (Sofia Kenin at Wimbledon 2023)... Zidansek has advanced past the second round at a Slam three times, including twice at Roland Garros – 2022 (via walkover) and 2021 when she achieved her best result across all Grand Slams with a semifinal (I. Pavlyuchenkova); also achieved her only career Top 10 win over No.7 Bianca Andreescu in the first round (1-7 vs. Top 10 in career)

[Q] Katie Volynets (USA #108) vs. [5] Marketa Vondrousova (CZE #6)

First meeting

This Volynets sixth time reaching the main draw of a Slam as a qualifier (11th GS main draw overall)... This is Volynets fourth meeting against a Top 10 opponent; she has two wins defeating No.6 Ons Jabeur (2024 Indian Wells) and No.9 Veronika Kudermetova (2023 Australian Open)... After losing in the opening round of the Australian Open, Vondrousova notched her first win of the season in the opening round (she had a personal-best 14 wins at the Slams last year)... The last left-handed player to win the title at the French Open was Monica Seles in 1992, the only other left-handed player to win the title during the Open Era was Martina Navratilova

Camila Osorio (COL #77) vs. [8] Ons Jabeur (TUN #9)

Jabeur leads 2-0

Osorio bidding to match best Slam result by reaching 3r today (also 2021 Wimbledon)... Osorio owns two Top 10 wins in career, most recently over No.4 Garcia at 2023 Rome... Best result by a Colombian woman at Roland Garros was R16 run by Fabiola Zuluaga in 2004... Osorio's 1r win over Kalinina snapped losing streak of three consecutive openers at the Slams... Jabeur is 14-4 in R64 matches at the Slams, including 4-0 at Roland Garros ... Jabeur fell 2r at last Slam contested, falling to Mirra Andrejeva at 2024 Australian Open... Jabeur has won both previous meetings with Osorio, all coming at Slam level, and hasn't dropped a set... Including 1r win over Vickery, Jabeur owns seven match wins in 2024 – entering 2023 Roland Garros, had 11 wins to her name... Jabeur is a three-time Slam R-Up (2022 Wimbledon and US Open, 2023 Wimbledon)

Clara Tauson (DEN #72) vs. [9] Jelena Ostapenko (LAT #11)

Tied 1-1

Previous two meetings were decided in 3-sets... Ostapenko won her only Grand Slam title here in 2017, defeating Halep in the final... This is Ostapenko's 33rd Slam main draw appearance and she has reached the QF or better at all of the majors... From Ostapenko's eight previous Roland Garros appearances, she has made it past the 2r twice (2017 won; 2020 3r)... Tauson is appearing in her fourth Roland Garros main draw, with her most recent and best result achieved last season with 3r (l. Avanesyan)... Ostapenko is 15-6 in second round matches at the Slams (2-2 at Roland Garros)... The two players have faced each other already this year with Ostapenko winning at Linz... Tauson has won two of her 11 meetings against Top 20 players, most recently No.12 Barbora Krejckova at 2023 Cleveland... Tauson has twice advanced past the second round of a Slam, including 2023 Roland Garros

[11] Danielle Collins (USA #10) vs. [Q] Olga Danilovic (SRB #125)

Collins leads 1-0

The two faced off earlier this month in May at Madrid, a 3-set match decided in 2h, 43min... Entering Roland Garros, Collins led the Tour in clay-court match wins (15), ahead of Swiatek (14)... In the last three seasons combined, Collins had 13 wins on clay... Collins enters Roland Garros after advancing to the finals at Strasbourg (l. Keys in F) earning her return to the Top 10; earlier this year she won a clay-court title at Charleston; she is one of four Americans to win a clay-court title this year; the last time four different Americans won a clay-court title in a season was 1999... Danilovic is 1-2 in R64 matches (1-1 at Roland Garros), while Collins is 8-9 in R64 (2-2 in Paris)... This is Danilovic's fifth Grand Slam main draw appearance and she looks to equal her best result (reached 3r in 2023 at Roland Garros)... Danilovic has one career Top 10 win, defeating No.10 Julia Goerges at 2018 Moscow International... Danilovic is trying to reach the third round at Roland Garros as a qualifier for the second time; in the Open Era, only six women have reached the third round at Roland Garros multiple times as a qualifier

Donna Vekic (CRO #40) vs. [18] Marta Kostyuk (UKR #20)

First meeting

After winning her first match vs a Top 20 opponent this year (at Dubai, d. No.2 Sabalenka), Vekic has dropped her last three meetings vs. Top 20 opponents (3-18 vs. Top 20)... Kostyuk is currently ranked No.20, equaling her career-high ranking first achieved earlier this month; she also currently sits at No.9 on the WTA Finals leaderboard... Vekic has lost in the second round of a Slam in three of her last five R64 matches; she is 10-11 in second round matches at the Slams... Kostyuk owns a 7-3 record in second round of Slams

Sofia Kenin (USA #56) vs. [21] Caroline Garcia (FRA #23)

Kenin leads 2-0

First meeting for the pair on clay and at Slam level... Garcia is making her 14th Roland-Garros appearance since her 2011 debut as a 17-year-old wild card, losing to Sharapova in 2r... Owns 17-15 record in R64 matches at the Slams (3-7 at Roland Garros; her 7 losses in 2r is the most at any Slam)... Garcia's best result in Paris was QF in 2017 (l. Ka.Pliskova)... Garcia has won the Roland-Garros doubles title twice, in 2016 and 2022 (both w/Mladenovic)... Garcia is a three-time clay court champion, including here on home soil at 2016 Strasbourg... Kenin reached the Roland-Garros final in 2020 (l. Swiatek)... It was Kenin's second Slam final that season having won Australian Open earlier that year... Kenin own's five wins in 2024 across all levels, four of which have been on clay... Last US champion here was S.Williams in 2015

[32] Katerina Siniakova (CZE #33) vs. [WC] Chloe Paquet (FRA #136)

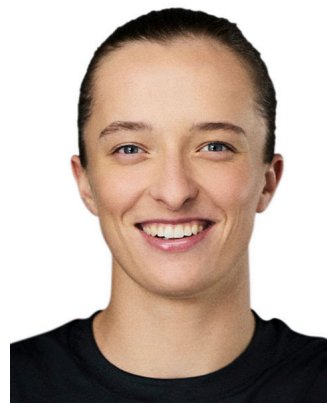
Playing in her 38th career Grand Slam, Siniakova is seeded for the first time at a Slam... A two-time doubles champion at Roland Garros (2018, 2021)... Siniakova is 8-9 in second round matches at the Slams (4-1 at Roland Garros, 4-8 at the others)... This is Paquet's second time reaching R64 at a Slam, having lost in second round in 2017... Last year at Roland Garros, no Frenchwomen advanced to the R32... Paquet defeated No.47 Diana Shnaider in 1r for first main draw win at a major since 2017 snapping an 0-7 losing streak in Grand Slam 1r matches... Paquet is looking to reach 3r of a Slam for first time in her career

- Making 7th appearance at Roland Garros, where her previous best result was reaching 3r in 2016 (l. Halep), 2018 (l. Keys) and 2019 (l. Siniakova)
- Enters 2024 Roland-Garros on a special ranking of No.46 (actual ranking is No.134)
- Overall this is her 25th Grand Slam main draw appearance, and owns four Grand Slam titles: Australian Open (2021, 2019), US Open (2020, 2018)
- Is 16-1 in R64 matches at the Slams with her only loss coming at 2017 Australian Open (l. Konta)
- Overcame Lucia Bronzetti in 1r to snap three consecutive opening round losses at the Slams - Australian Open 2024, US Open 2022 and Wimbledon 2022
- Approaching her 60th Grand Slam main draw win, defeat of Bronzetti taking her to 58-19
- Bidding today to reach 3r of a Slam for the first time since 2022 Australian Open
- Faces No.1 Iga Swiatek in 2r today; owns a 2-3 record vs. the WTA World No.1, defeating Halep (2018 Indian Wells) and Barty (2019 Beijing) and losing to Ka.Pliskova (2017 Toronto) and Halep (2018 Australian Open and 2018 Rome)
- A win today would mark her first Top 10 win since overcoming now-retired No.9 Kiki Bertens at BRISBANE 2020
- Best career result on clay is reaching the SF at STUTTGART in 2019
- Best result by a Japanese woman at ROLAND GARROS was SF run by Kimiko Date in 1995
- Since returning from maternity leave at the start of the 2024 season, her best result has been QF run at Doha (l. Pliskova)
- Is currently ranked No.134; this time last year was ranked No.404; would return to Top 100 by advancing to R16 at Roland Garros
- 4 of her 12 match wins so far in 2024 came on clay

PLAYER NOTES

- Making sixth appearance at Roland Garros, where she is a three-time champion, lifting the title in 2020 (d. Kenin in F), 2022 (d. Gauff in F), and 2023 (d. Muchova in F)
- Overall this is her 21st Grand Slam main draw appearance, and in addition to three titles here in Paris, owns a further major at 2022 US Open
- At Australian Open, made the SF in 2022 and at Wimbledon reached the QF in 2023
- Bidding to win a title at the same event in three consecutive years for the second time, after Doha (2022-24)
- Defeated Leolia Jeanjean in 1r on Monday to move to a 20-1 record in Slam 1r matches (6-0 at Roland Garros)
- Has now won 15 consecutive matches at Roland Garros, first time this has happened since Justine Henin who won 24 consecutive matches between 2005-2010 at this event
- Faces fellow four-time major champion Osaka today for third time in career, and first time meeting at Grand Slam level
- Is 17-2 in R64 at Slams, including 5-0 at Roland Garros, having won 16-straight; lost 2 other first 3 second round matches at Slams in 2019
- Has won her last 31 matches against players outside the Top 100, last tasting defeat to No.338 Konjuh at 2021 Miami
- Swiatek also owns a perfect 19-0 record against players outside the Top 100 at the Slams, dropping only five sets across all 19 matches
- Owns 3-1 career record against players from Japan
- 9-time clay court champion: ROME, MADRID in 2024; ROLAND GARROS, STUTTGART in 2023; ROLAND GARROS, ROME, STUTTGART in 2022; ROME in 2021; ROLAND GARROS in 2020
- Only player from Poland to reach 2r (Frech and Linette fell in 1r)
- Is currently ranked No.1; this time last year was ranked No.1; will stay atop the PIF WTA Rankings after Roland Garros regardless of results
- During last year's EUROPEAN CLAY swing reached won ROLAND GARROS and Stuttgart, made QF at ROME and finished R-Up at MADRID

CAREER MILESTONES

- Played 2022 Tokyo in September before taking a 15 month break to give birth to daughter Shai in early July 2023

In 2022 had success at Miami, where she fell to Swiatek in the final, her first final since the 2021 Australian Open. Also reached the semifinals at Melbourne 250 #1 (withdrew before semifinal with Kudermetova w/abdominal injury)

- Won 2021 Australian Open (d. Brady in F) to become first woman since Seles in the early 1990s to win each of her first four Grand Slam finals - is the 16th woman to win four or more majors in the Open Era
- At 2020 US Open, came from a set and a break down to Azarenka and win third Grand Slam title of career
- Also last season was R-Up at Western & Southern Open - withdrew w/left hamstring injury before final against Azarenka
- Won second Grand Slam at Australian Open (d. Kvitova in F); became first Japanese player to reach World No.1 ranking following the tournament
- In addition, won back-to-back titles for first time in her career at Osaka (d. Pavlyuchenkova in F) and Beijing (d. Barty in F); defeated No.1 Barty in Beijing final for second career victory over world No.1 (also beat Halep at 2018 Indian Wells)
- Enjoyed break-out season in 2018, posting a 40-20 record resulting in a No.5 (first Top 10 season), up from No.68 in 2017
- Won the first two titles of her career in 2018, at Indian Wells (d. Kasatkina in F) and debut Grand Slam crown at US Open (d. S.Williams in F)
- En route to the Indian Wells title, defeated five-time major champion Sharapova, and A.Radwanska, Ka.Pliskova and Halep. Only set dropped all fortnight was against Sakkari in R16
- Reached one further final in 2018, at Tokyo [PPO] (l. Ka.Pliskova)
- In reaching R16 at 2018 Australian Open, became youngest Japanese player to reach R16 at a Slam since Sugiyama at 1995 Roland Garros (19y, 342d) and the youngest player from Japan to reach R16 in Melbourne since Date in 1990 (19y, 122d)
- Book-ended 2017 season with QF showings at Auckland and Hong Kong; other highlights included 3r runs at Wimbledon and US Open
- Scored first Top 5 win of career when she defeated No.5 V.Williams at 2017 Hong Kong. Upset win over defending champion and No.6-

- Won six titles across 2023, including winning fourth Grand Slam title at Roland-Garros (d. Muchova in F) and going undefeated at the WTA Finals in Cancun (d. Pegula in F). Finished season as WTA World No.1 player for second consecutive year.
- In 2022, lifted second and third Grand Slam titles, at Roland-Garros (d. Gauff in F) and US Open (d. Jabeur in F)
- Triumph in Paris was the last of six straight titles during 37-match winning streak - joint-longest unbeaten run on Tour since 1990
- Won two titles in 2021, at Adelaide and Rome. Other highlights included QF at Roland-Garros and SF at Ostrava and qualifying for WTA Finals Guadalajara (fell in group stage)
- Also finished doubles R-Up at 2021 Roland-Garros (w/Mattek-Sands, l. Krejciikova/Siniakova)
- Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland-Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland - man or woman - to win a Grand Slam singles title and first from her country to reach a major final since A.Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon
- Ranked No.54, she became the lowest-ranked woman to win the Roland-Garros title in the Open Era and the lowest-ranked finalist since 1977 (No.56 Mihai). At 19y 132d, is the youngest champion in Paris since Monica Seles (18y 187d) in 1992
- Also became the first player to win her debut Tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Jelena Ostapenko at 2017 Roland-Garros
- Won WTA Most Improved Player of the Year for 2020, as voted on by members of the media. Also won the 2020 WTA Fan Favorite Award
- Ended 2019 season ranked No.61 after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Lugano (l. Hercog) and R16 run at Roland-Garros (l. Halep). That year also reached 3r at Toronto (l. Osaka) and made 2r five times (incl. Australian and US Open)
- Broke into Top 100 at No.88 after R-Up finish at 2019 Lugano
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2019 Auckland
- Ended 2018 season ranked No.175 (up from No.690 in 2017), after posting 42-6 record and winning four titles on ITF Circuit
- Member of Poland's Billie Jean King Cup team, 2018-20, 2021-22
- On professional debut, came through qualifying to win title at \$10k ITF/Stockholm-SWE in 2016; owns seven singles titles at this level

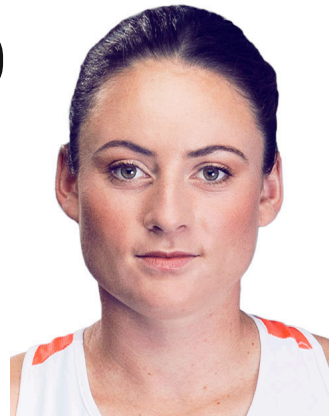

CAREER MILESTONES

- Won debut Grand Slam singles crown in 2023 lifting title on home soil at US Open (d. Sabalenka in F). Picked up another three titles in 2023, marking first WTA 1000 title at Cincinnati and debut WTA 500 title at Washington DC, in addition to WTA 250 Auckland. In doubles was co-ranked No.1 with Pegula after US Open.
- In 2022, reached maiden Grand Slam final at Roland-Garros (l. Swiatek); was the youngest major finalist since Sharapova won 2004 Wimbledon
- Made Top-10 debut on September 12, 2022, following QF run at US Open (l. Garcia)
- Highlight of 2021 campaign was completing singles-doubles title sweep at Parma; defeated Q.Wang in singles final and teamed up w/McNally to win doubles
- In 2021 also reached SF at Adelaide and Rome, while at the Slams made QF at Roland-Garros and R16 at Wimbledon
- Finished R-Up in doubles at 2021 US Open (w/McNally, l. Stosur/Zhang)
- First cracked the Top 50 on February 24, 2020 at No.49, following a R16 appearance at Australian Open to tie her career best Grand Slam result - during run, defeated V.Williams in 1r and her first Top-5 opponent in No.4 Osaka in 3r (l. eventual champion Kenin in 3s)
- Enjoyed breakout season in 2019, highlighted by maiden WTA singles title at Linz (as lucky loser, d. Ostapenko in F) - earned her first Top-10 win en route to title over No.8 Bertens in QF
- At 15y 214d, her title run in Linz made her youngest to win a WTA tour-level title since Vaidisova (15y 177d) won Tashkent in 2004
- Also claimed maiden WTA doubles titles at Washington, DC (w/McNally, d. Sanchez/Stollar in F) and Luxembourg (w/McNally, d. Christian/Guarachi in F)
- By winning the doubles title at Washington, DC at 15y 144d, became the youngest player to win a doubles title since May 1995 (Hingis won Hamburg at 14y 219d)
- Reached R16 at 2019 Wimbledon on Grand Slam main draw debut defeating V.Williams in 1r (l. eventual champion Halep) - followed with 3r showing at US Open (as WC, l. Osaka)
- Made WTA main draw debut as a wildcard at 2019 Miami where she earned her first WTA main draw win over good friend McNally (l. Kasatkina in 2r)
- Made professional debut in May 2018 as a qualifier into the \$25K ITF/Osprey, FL-USA
- In 2023 reached QF three times at Hua Hin (l. eventual champion Zhu), Bogota (l. Stearns) and Lausanne (l. Bondar). In WTA 125 series, she won the Bari title defeating No.1 seed Cornet (d. Sramkova in F) and reached SF at Iasi and Ljubljana, all on clay.
- Started the 2022 season strongly further improving the ranking from No.30 to No.22 with SF at Adelaide 2 (l. Riske Amritraj) and 3r run at Australian Open (l. Cornet)
- Fell short on clay in 2022, with 1r exit at Stuttgart (l. Siegemund) and Rome (l. Kasatkina) and unable to repeat last year's performance at Roland Garros, only making 3r (l. Pegula)
- After 1r exits at Wimbledon and US Open, salvaged the season with QF at Monastir (l. Cornet) and R-Up run at ITF W60 Monastir (l. Mladenovic)
- Dropped out of Top 100 at the end of 2022 for first time since 2018.

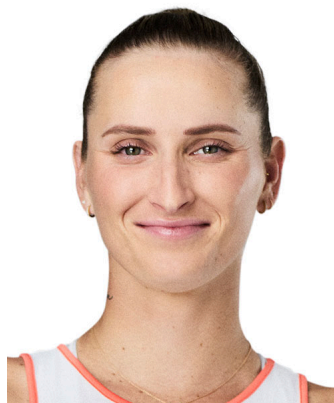

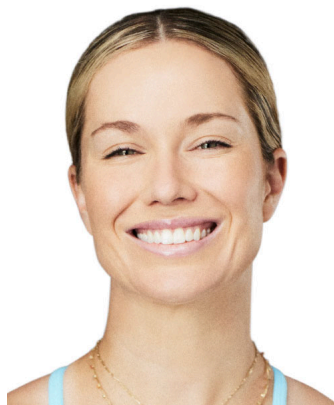

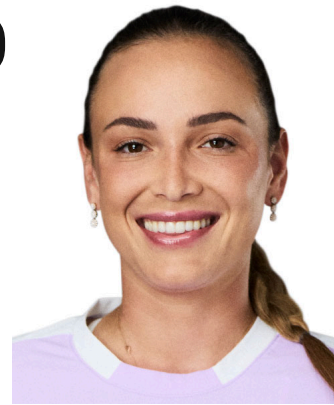

CAREER MILESTONES

- Strongest result of 2023 was runner-up at San Diego (l. Krejčíková). Also reached SF at Hobart (l. Cocchiaretto) and Guadalajara (l. Dolehide). As a qualifier, posted her best Wimbledon result with 3r (l. Svitolina). Moved 202 positions up the ranking from her 2022 year-end position (from No. 235 to No.33).
 - Best results of 2022 were QF at Adelaide (l. eventual champion Barty) and Cleveland (l. Pera). Missed clay and grass swings w/right ankle injury
 - Missed second half of 2021 season due to ongoing foot injury and then testing positive for COVID-19
 - In opening half of the 2021 campaign, standout results were QFs at Abu Dhabi and Yarra Valley Classic, and a R16 showing at Roland Garros
 - Ended 2020 at career high of No.4 which she first hit on March 9, 2020 and came away with the 2020 WTA Player of the Year Award
 - In last tournament of the season, finished R-Up at Roland Garros (l. Swiatek) for her first final appearance on clay
 - Reached R16 at US Open and was one of only two players (also Kvitová) to reach second week of all three Slams in 2020
 - Lifted fifth WTA singles title at Lyon (d. Friedsam in F) becoming the first player in 2020 to win a second title
 - Won maiden major at 2020 Australian Open (d. Muguruza in F) to become the youngest champion (21y, 80d) in Melbourne since Sharapova (20y, 283d) in 2008. Defeated No.1 Barty and home favorite in SF for third career win over a reigning World No.1
 - Australian Open run helped her break into the Top 10 for the first time at No.7 on February 3, 2020
 - Won 2019 WTA Most Improved Player of the Year award after winning three WTA titles at Hobart (d. Schmiedlova in F), Mallorca (d. Bencic in F) and Guangzhou (d. Stosur in F)
 - Finished 2019 at No.14 as US No.2 (behind No.9 S.Williams) and leader in hard court wins (38-tied w/Barty)
 - Registered back-to-back SF runs at Toronto (l. eventual champion Andreescu) and Cincinnati (l. eventual champion Keys), subsequently leading to Top 20 debut at No.20 on August 19, 2019
 - During this run, defeated No.1 Barty (Toronto) and No.1 Osaka (Cincinnati) to become first player since October 2001 to defeat World No.1s in consecutive weeks (Davenport); also became
 - Opened 2023 well with two R-Up performances on hard court at Lyon (l. Parks) and Monterrey (l. Vekic), as well as QFs at Adelaide and Doha. Went on to reach a further seven QFs throughout the season across all three surfaces, bringing a total of nine QFs (Stuttgart, Berlin, Eastbourne, Cleveland, San Diego, Tokyo and Beijing).
- Her strongest WTA 1000 result of 2023 came with SF at Guadalajara (l. eventual winner Sakkari), and qualified for year ending Zhuhai Elite Trophy for a third time (also in 2016 & 2018), defeated by eventual champion Haddad Maia in group stage.
- Served highest number of aces of all players in 2023, with a total of 462 (nearest challenger was Rybakina with 455).
 - Returned to form in second half of 2022, winning four tournaments, including a run through qualifying to Cincinnati title (d. Kvitová in F) and victory at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (d. Sabalenka in F)
 - Only player to win titles on all three surfaces in 2022, having also triumphed on grass at Bad Homburg (d. Andreescu in F) and on clay at Warsaw (d. Bogdan in F). Summer form saw her return to Top 10 on September 12, following US Open SF
 - Best win of her career came over No.1 Swiatek in QF at 2022 Warsaw
 - At 2022 Roland-Garros, won first doubles title in almost six years (w/Mladenovic, d. Gauff/Pegula in F)
 - Highlights in 2021 came on clay, with SF at Lausanne and QF at Parma
 - Best results in 2020 were at Slams, reaching R16 at Roland-Garros (l. Svitolina) and 3r at US Open (l. Brady); defeated No.3 Ka.Pliskova in 2r at Flushing Meadows to record her first Top-10 win since late 2018
 - Highlights of 2019 campaign include capturing her seventh career WTA singles title at Nottingham (d. Vekic in F) and finishing R-Up at Strasbourg (l. Yastremska)
 - Member of French Billie Jean King Cup team that won the 2019 competition final vs. Australia, teaming up with Mladenovic to win the decisive doubles runner against Barty/Stosur. Also took part in the team that advanced to final vs. Czech Republic in 2016
 - Fell out of the Top 20 on March 18, 2019 after holding her position there since August 14, 2017

- Advanced to R16 at 2019 Roland Garros (d. S.Williams, l. eventual champion Barty) - became first American to defeat Serena at the majors since Stephens at 2013 Australian Open QF
- Also won maiden doubles titles in 2019 at Auckland (w/Bouchard) and Beijing (w/Mattek-Sands)
- Broke into the Top 100 on March 19, 2018 and Top 50 on October 8, 2018
- Member of US Billie Jean King Cup team from 2018-20
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2015 US Open as a wildcard (l. Duque-Mariño in 1r)
- Owns four ITF singles titles and two doubles titles
- Played first matches of career on ITF Circuit in 2013, climbing to No.2 in ITF World Junior Rankings
- Represented the USA at the 2014 Youth Olympic Games and competed at the 2016 ITF Junior Masters, both held in China

- In 2018, won sixth career title at Tianjin; also made SF at Stuttgart and Madrid
- Broke into the Top 5 on August 13, 2018 and reached a career-high of No.4 on September 10, 2018
- Became first player to win Wuhan and Beijing back-to-back in 2017. As a result, qualified for WTA Finals. Was ranked No.30 on the Race to Singapore leaderboard in May 2017
- Made Top-10 debut on October 9, 2017, following completion of Wuhan-Beijing title double
- Won a career-best 48 main draw matches in 2017 (48-22 record, two titles), including reaching maiden major QF at Roland-Garros (l. Ka.Pliskova)
- Qualifying for WTA Finals in 2017, became the first Frenchwoman to compete at WTA Finals in singles since Mauresmo in 2006 (l. Henin in F)
- At 2016 Roland Garros w/Mladenovic, won first major doubles title. They were the first French pair to win in Paris since 1971, when Gail Chanfreau and Francoise Durr triumphed
- Represented France at 2016 Rio Olympics in singles and doubles
- Played 2015 WTA Finals Rising Stars Invitational in Singapore (l. Osaka in F)
- Made professional debut at 13 on ITF Circuit in France in 2007
- In juniors, singles runner-up at 2011 US Open (l. Min) and reached SF at the other three Slams

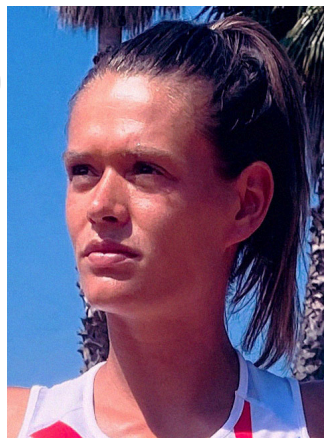
