[4] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #4) vs. [21] Elina Svitolina (UKR #21)

Tied 2-2

Rybakina and Svitolina are facing each other for a fifth time, with Rybakina winning their most recent meeting in 4r at Roland Garros this year; Rybakina also won their only previous meeting on grass at 2021 Eastbourne... After Rybakina's first 20 main draw matches in a single Grand Slam event in the Open Era, only Monica Seles (20 at the AO and 19 at RG), Margaret Court (19 at the AO, RG and US Open) and Chris Evert (19 at RG) have had more wins than Rybakina at Wimbledon (18)... Rybakina is the only female or male player to represent Kazakhstan and reach a Grand Slam SF in the Open Era (Wimbledon 2022- WON, Australian Open 2023 – R-Up)... Rybakina is the only player remaining in the draw to have reached a Wimbledon final... Rybakina is the player with the most WTA-level quarterfinals made in 2024 (11)... Rybakina is looking to become the player with the joint-most WTA-level semifinals reached in 2024 (currently six), equaling Iga Swiatek (seven, excluding the United Cup)... Rybakina is the player with the most aces served at the Championships 2024 in Ladies' Singles (24, level with Jelena Ostapenko)...

Only Ann Jones and Steffi Graf have a higher winning percentage than Rybakina at Wimbledon in the Ladies' Singles in the Open Era...

In the last 10 years, only Serena Williams (16) and Simona Halep (13) have made more Grand Slam quarterfinals than Elina Svitolina (11)... Svitolina could equal her best career Slam result (semifinals at Wimbledon 2019 and 2023, and at the US Open 2019); also the best result achieved by a woman from Ukraine... Having won her first two QFs at the Championships (in 2019 vs. Karolina Muchova and in 2023 vs. Iga... Swiatek), Svitolina could become the first player to win her first three Ladies' Singles quarterfinals at Wimbledon since Maria Sharapova (2004, 2005 and 2006)... After defeating No.10 Ons Jabeur in 3r, Svitolina could win multiple matches against Top 10 opponents in a single event for the first time since the WTA Finals in Shenzhen in 2019 and for the first time in her career at a grass court event.... Overall this is her 42nd Grand Slam main draw appearance, having advanced to the semifinal three times: twice at Wimbledon and also 2019 US Open... Svitolina is seeded for the 7th time at The Championships; she has now brought her Grand Slam win tally to 96 after reaching QF here

[13] Jelena Ostapenko (LAT #14) vs. [31] Barbora Krejcikova (CZE #32) Ostapenko leads 5-2 Ostapenko won their three most recent meetings including winning the title match at Birmingham last season; also their only previous match on grass... Krejcikova won their only previous meeting at a Grand Slam in 3r of 2022 Australian Open... A win today for Ostapenko would be her second Wimbledon semifinal after 2018... In the last eight years at Wimbledon, Ostapenko, Elena Rybakina, Elina Svitolina and Ons Jabeur have the joint most QF appearances with three each... Ostapenko and Rybakina have served the most aces Wimbledon so far this year (24)... Ostapenko is one of the seven current players with 50+ grass court wins in WTA main draws, along with Venus Williams, Angelique Kerber, Petra Kvitova, Caroline Wozniacki, Victoria Azarenka and Karolina Pliskova... Ostapenko is the player with the fewest games dropped en route to make the QFs at Wimbledon (15) since 2012 (Victoria Azarenka, 14)... Since she made her first grass court win in 2015, Jelena Ostapenko is one of the two players to win 50+ WTA main draw grass court matches (50), along with Angelique Kerber (52)... Ostapenko has won 20 matches at Wimbledon, becoming the first tournament where she secured 20+ main draw wins in her career... In the last 10 years, only Serena Williams (26), Angelique Kerber (26), Simona Halep (22) and Madison Keys (21) have won more Ladies' Singles main draw matches at the Championships than Ostapenko (20)... Ostapenko owns two career singles titles on grass – at 2021 Eastbourne and 2023 Birmingham... Overall this is Ostapenko's 33rd Grand Slam main draw appearance and she owns one major title, winning 2017 Roland Garros...

Krejcikova is bidding for her second Grand Slam semifinal after winning Roland Garros in 2021 (d. Pavlyuchenkova in F)... Krejcikova is competing in her second Grand Slam quarterfinal of the year after Australian Open... Krejcikova could become the sixth Czech player to reach the women's singles semifinal at Wimbledon and Roland Garros during the Open Era after Marketa Vondrousova, Lucie Safarova, Petra Kvitova, Jana Novotna and Karolina Pliskova... Krejcikova could win five consecutive matches on grass for the first time in her career; and five consecutive matches in WTA level events on any surface for the first since March 2023 (during Dubai title run)... Krejcikova (28 yrs old) is the oldest player competing for Czech Republic in the Open Era to make the quarterfinals at the Australian Open and Wimbledon in the same season... Krejcikova reached a career-high ranking of No.2 in 2022; has also spent 19 weeks in her career at No.1 in the doubles ranking... Krejcikova is aiming for second Top 20 win of the season after defeating No.11 Danielle Collins in 4r Wimbledon match... Krejcikova is making her fourth main draw appearance at Wimbledon, where her best result was reaching R16 in 2021 (I. eventual champion Barty)



- Making fourth appearance at Wimbledon, where she won the title in 2022 (d. Jabeur in final), which is her sole title across all Slams; also reached QF here last year (l. Jabeur) and 4r in 2021 (l. Sabalenka)
- Has beaten Elena-Gabriela Ruse, Laura Siegemund, Caroline Wozniacki and Anna Kalinskaya so far this week
- Making 20th Grand Slam main draw appearance having reached two finals; in addition to title here, was runner-up at 2023 Australian Open
- Faces No.21 Elina Svitolina in QF today; owns a 2-3 record in QF at the Slams
- Owns 6-5 career record against players from Ukraine, with record in 2024 standing at 2-0
- Record in WTA QF matches stands at 27-15
- Only grass-court title came at 2022 Wimbledon
- A woman representing Kazakhstan has reached the QF at Wimbledon four times; this is Rybakina's third time - also QF in 2023 and title in 2022; along with Yaroslava Shvedova in 2016 (QF)
- Is currently ranked No.4; this time last year was ranked No.3; can move to No.3 by winning the title at Wimbledon
- Has won 39 matches so far in 2024
- Has been involved in 17 three-set matches in 2024

- Making 10th appearance at Wimbledon, where she has reached the SF twice (2019, 2023) - the best result by a Ukrainian woman at the tournament; this is her 7th time being seeded at The Championships
- Overall this is her 42nd Grand Slam main draw appearance, having advanced to the SF three times: in addition to twice at Wimbledon, also did so at the 2019 US Open
- Has beaten Magda Linette, Jule Niemeier, Ons Jabeur and Xinyu Wang to reach QF; with a win today, Svitolina would reach the quarterfinals of Wimbledon for the third time in her career, it will be second Grand Slam event where she would have quarterfinal appearances in consecutive years after Australian Open 2018-19
- Through to the quarterfinals of Wimbledon for the third time in her career, and second Grand Slam event where she would have quarterfinal appearances in consecutive years after Australian Open 2018-19
- Faces No.4 Elena Rybakina in QF today; seeking first Top 5 win of 2024 season (0-4 previously); owns 19 career Top 5 wins
- Owns 12-4 career record against players from Kazakhstan, with record in 2024 standing at 0-1
- Record in WTA QF matches stands at 41-32
- A two-time semifinalist at Wimbeldon 2019, 2023 her best result on grass
- Is currently ranked No.21; this time last year was ranked No.76; will need to return to SF to have a chance at retaining her current ranking (No.21)
- Has won 21 matches so far in 2024
- Winner today will face Ostapenko or Krejcikova in SF

CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached second Grand Slam final at 2023 Australian Open (l. Sabalenka in 3s); made Top-10 debut following tournament (January 30, 2023). Also in 2023 won first two WTA 1000 title at Indian Wells and Rome and finished R-Up at Miami. Qualified for first WTA Finals, going 1-2 in Group Stage.
- Lifted maiden major at 2022 Wimbledon (d. Jabeur in F)
- In 2022 also finished R-Up at Adelaide (l. Barty) and Portoroz (l. Siniakova)
- Best result of 2021 were SFs at Eastbourne, Olympics and Chicago [500], and QFs at Abu Dhabi, Roland Garros, San Jose and Ostrava
- Opened 2020 season by reaching the championship match at four of her first five tournaments, including a title run at Hobart (d. Zhang in F)
- Made first final appearance at a Premier-level tournament with R-Up finish at St. Petersburg (l. Bertens); was rewarded with Top 20 debut at No.19 following run in Russia (February 17, 2020)
- First win over a Top-5 ranked opponent came over No.3 Ka.Pliskova during R-Up finish at 2020 Dubai
- Won back-to-back Slam matches for the first time during 3r showing at 2020 Australian Open (l. Barty)
- Won maiden WTA singles title at 2019 Bucharest (d. Tig in F), breaking into Top 100 for the first time in the following week's rankings at No.65 (July 22, 2019)
- Also in 2019, went on to make Top 50 debut on September 16, 2019, after reaching second career final at Nanchang (l. Peterson), produced SF appearances at Luxembourg and 's-Hertogenbosch, and made Grand Slam main draw debut at 2019 Roland Garros, falling 1r (as qualifier, l. Siniakova)
