Krejckikova won both their only previous meeting in qualifying at 2018 Australian Open

Paolini (27) and Krejckikova (23) are the players with the most break points converted at 2024 Wimbledon

Barbora Krejckikova:

Krejckikova has reached her second Grand Slam final after winning her first at Roland Garros in 2021 (d. Pavlyuchenkova in F)

In her fourth Wimbledon, Krejckikova's previous best result was R16 in 2021 (l. eventual champion, Barty)

Krejckikova is facing a Top 10 player for only the third time in 2024 (won her Wimbledon SF over No.4 Rybakina; defeated by No.2 Aryna Sabalenka in the quarterfinal at Australian Open)

Krejckikova is now 6-2 in Grand Slam main draws against former Major champions across surfaces (d. Jelena Ostapenko in 1r and Elena Rybakina in SF)

Krejckikova is the fifth player representing the Czech Republic to reach the Wimbledon final in the Open Era after Jana Novotna, Petra Kvitova, Karolina Pliskova and Marketa Vondrousova - only the United States of America (nine) and Australia (five) have more

Krejckikova has the most Grand Slam main draw appearances between her first two Major finals (13, Roland Garros 2021 and Wimbledon 2024) since Karolina Pliskova (18 between US Open 2016 and Wimbledon 2021)

Only three players in the Open Era have made 13+ women's singles Major appearances between their first two Major titles: Mary Pierce (20), Arantxa Sanchez Vicario (19) and Svetlana Kuznetsova (18); Krejckikova is bidding to become the fourth

Krejcikova has won a career total of 12 main draw matches at Wimbledon - she only has more at the Australian Open (13)

Krejcikova has won 6+ matches in a row for the first time since March 2023 (eight between Dubai and Indian Wells) and for the first time in her career on grass

Krejcikova reached a career-high ranking of No.2 in 2022; has also spent 19 weeks in her career at No.1 in the doubles ranking

This is the first Grand Slam final between two players aged 28 or more since the Wimbledon 2018 final between Angelique Kerber and Serena Williams

Two players aged 28 or more will face each other in their first Wimbledon Ladies Singles Final for the second time in the Open Era after Virginia Wade and Betty Stove in 1977

The winner of this match will become the sixth player in the Open Era to win their first Ladies' Singles title in Wimbledon after having turned 28, after Ann Jones (1969), Virginia Wade (1977), Jana Novotna (1998), Marion Bartoli (2013) and Angelique Kerber (2018)

Krejcikova is the second player representing the Czech Republic in the Open Era to make the Ladies' Singles finals at Wimbledon and Roland Garros after Marketa Vondrousova

Krejcikova could become the first player representing Czech Republic in the Open Era to secure Women's Singles titles at different Grand Slams

Krejcikova has made 31 double faults so far at 2024 Wimbledon, more than any other player

Only Donna Vekic (13 hours and 1 minute) has spent more time on court than Krejcikova at the Championships 2024 (11 hours and 42 minutes) - Paolini has spent 10 hours and 42 minutes

Jasmine Paolini:

Paolini is the first Italian woman to reach the Wimbledon final in the Open Era; Italian women had previously gone 0-4 in Wimbledon quarterfinals

Paolini is through to her second straight Grand Slam final this year (I. Swiatek in Roland Garros final); she had not made a Grand Slam QF before this year

Paolini is the first Italian player in the Open Era to reach the final at two different Grand Slam events (Roland Garros and Wimbledon)

Paolini is the fifth player since 1999 and first since Serena Williams in 2016 to reach the Women's Singles finals at Roland Garros and Wimbledon in the same year after Steffi Graf (1999), Serena Williams (2002, 2015, 2016), Venus Williams (2002) and Justine Henin (2006)

Since the WTA rankings were first published in 1975, Paolini is the first player ranked outside the Top 5 to reach the final at Roland Garros and Wimbledon in the same year

Paolini has won eight matches on grass this season but was winless at tour-level on the surface prior to 2024

Paolini defeated three Top 50 players at Wimbledon this fortnight: No.37 Donna Vekic, No.19 Emma Navarro and No.13 Madison Keys

Paolini is playing at a career-high No.7 after making maiden Grand Slam final at Roland Garros this season

By reaching the semifinal, Paolini will make her Top 5 debut in the PIF WTA Rankings after Wimbledon; the last Italian ranked in the Top 5 was Sara Errani the weeks of August 23, 2013

Since WTA rankings were published in 1975, the highest rank achieved by an Italian woman is No.4 by Francesca Schiavone

Paolini made her first grass semifinal last week at Eastbourne (l. eventual champion Kasatkina)

Paolini is the player with the most Grand Slam main draw wins in 2024 (15)

Only five players in the Open Era have lost both Roland Garros and Wimbledon final in the same year: Evonne Goolagong (1972), Chris Evert (1973 and 1984), Olga Morozova (1974), Arantxa Sanchez Vicario (1995 and 1996) and Venus Williams (2002)

Paolini is the first Italian player in the Open Era to reach WTA level finals on hard (Dubai), clay (Roland Garros) and grass (Wimbledon) courts in the same season

Paolini is the second player to make a WTA final on each surface this season, along with Daria Kasatkina

Paolini is the fourth player in the Open Era to reach her first two Grand Slam finals in the same year at Roland Garros and Wimbledon after Chris Evert (1973), Olga Morozova (1974) and Steffi Graf (1987)

Paolini is the second player in the Open Era to reach the Ladies' Singles final at Wimbledon without a single Wimbledon main draw match win entering the event after Justine Henin in 2001

Paolini could become the first player in the Open Era to secure the Ladies' Singles title at Wimbledon without a previous Wimbledon main draw win

Paolini could become the fourth player this century to win a Grand Slam title without a main draw win coming into that year's event after Jelena Ostapenko at the French Open in 2017, Bianca Andreescu at the US Open 2019 and Emma Raducanu at the US Open 2021

Paolini is looking to become the sixth player in the Open Era to win her first Ladies' Singles title at Wimbledon after having turned 28, after Ann Jones (1969), Virginia Wade (1977), Jana Novotna (1998), Marion Bartoli (2013) and Angelique Kerber (2018)

Only Sara Errani in 2012 (17) won more Grand Slam main draw matches in a single year than Jasmine Paolini in 2024 (15) amongst Italian players in the Open Era

Paolini's semifinal against Donna Vekic was the longest Wimbledon Ladies semifinal match in the Open Era at 2 hrs 51 mins

- Playing first Grand Slam singles final since winning her maiden major title at Roland Garros 2021 (d. Pavlyuchenkova)
- Two-time Wimbledon doubles champion; 2018 and 2021 w/Siniakova
- Faces No.7 Jasmine Paolini in their 1st tour-level main-draw meeting today; won their only previous match at 2018 Australian Open qualifying
- Owns 12 career wins over Top 10 players, most recently No.4 Elena Rybakina in SF; win over Rybakina ended a four-match losing streak vs. Top 10 opposition and 1st since Dubai 2023 when she defeated 4 (Kasatkina, Sabalenka, Pegula, Swiatek) en route to the title
- Record in WTA singles finals stands at 7-5
- Best career result on grass before this week was R-Up at Birmingham 2023 (l. Ostapenko)
- Bidding to become the 3rd Czech Republic player to win Wimbledon in last decade after Petra Kvitova (2014) and Marketa Vondrousova (2023)
- Is currently ranked No.32 on the PIF WTA Rankings; this time last year was ranked No.11; began the season ranked No.10
- By making the final, will return to the Top 20 at No.14 and can go as high as No.10 by winning the title
- Came into Wimbledon ranked No.52 on the PIF Race to the WTA Finals; will rise to No.12 by making the final and into the Top 8 at No.7 with the title
- Sidelined by back injury and illness after Abu Dhabi -- missed 4 consecutive WTA 1000s in Doha, Dubai, Indian Wells and Miami -- and returned at Stuttgart; went 0-4 through European clay swing

- Bidding to win 3rd career title and 2nd of the season (Dubai)
- Has beaten Sara Sorribes Tormo, Greet Minnen, Bianca Andreescu, No.13 Madison Keys, No.17 Emma Navarro and No.37 Donna Vekic this fortnight to reach her second consecutive Grand Slam final, having made her 1st at Roland Garros last month (l. Swiatek)
- First woman since Serena Williams in 2016 to make the finals at Roland Garros and Wimbledon in the same year
- First Italian in the Open Era to reach the women's singles finals at multiple Grand Slams
- First Italian woman in the Open Era to reach tour-level finals on grass (Wimbledon), clay (Roland Garros) and hard court (Dubai) in a single season
- Faces No.32 Barbora Krejckikova today in 1st tour-level main-draw meeting between the two; sole prior meeting came in qualifying at 2018 Australian Open
- Owns 0-8 career record against players from Czech Republic
- Came into this year's grass season having yet to tally a tour level main-draw victory on grass courts
- Record in WTA finals stands at 2-4; won biggest title of her career in February at WTA 1000 Dubai
- Currently ranked No.7 on the PIF WTA Rankings; this time last year was ranked No.44
- Will rise to a new career-high No.5 regardless of the final result
- Currently ranked No.5 on the PIF Race to the WTA Finals; will rise to No.3 behind No.1 Swiatek and No.2 Rybakina with the final, or No.2 with the title

CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached four finals across 2023, winning first WTA 1000 title at Dubai (d. No.1 Swiatek in F) in addition to San Diego (d. Kenin in F), and finishing R-Up at Birmingham (l. Ostapenko) and Zhengzhou (l. Zheng Qinwen).
- Ended 2022 season in fine form, lifting back-to-back titles at Tallinn (d. Kontaveit) and Ostrava (d. Swiatek). Also completed career doubles Slam by winning US Open w/Siniakova.
- Made strong start to 2022, finishing R-Up at Sydney (l. Badosa) and reaching QF at Australian Open (l. Keys) before missing several months w/arm injury.
- Lifted maiden WTA title at 2021 Strasbourg, followed by sweep of singles and doubles titles at Roland-Garros. Roland Garros was just her fifth Slam main draw in singles; only two women have won a major with fewer main draw appearances to their name.
- Also won Prague title (d. Martincova in F), reached final at Dubai (l. Muguruza) and qualified for WTA Finals in singles for the first time. Recorded best results at US Open (QF) and Wimbledon (R16) last year
- Posted another record-breaking year in doubles across 2021 - in addition to singles title at Roland Garros, won doubles title too in Paris, along with Madrid, Gippssland Trophy, WTA Finals and the gold medal at Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games (all w/Siniakova)
- Enjoyed breakout year in singles in 2020, posting career-high ranking of No.65 (November 16) and making R16 at Roland Garros and reaching second WTA SF at Linz
- Also reached two doubles finals last year, finishing R-Up at Dubai (w/Zheng) and winning Shenzhen (w/Siniakova)
