## MATCH NOTES – SUNDAY, FEB 9

### Maria Sakkari (GRE #29) vs. [Q] Elena-Gabriela Ruse (ROU #112) Sakkari:

- Two-time Doha semifinalist (2022 and 2023); making her 7th main-draw appearance at the event

- 13-1 vs. players ranked outside the Top 100 since the start of 2023 (the one loss in that stat was to Emma Raducanu at 2024 Wimbledon)

- Her 2023 Guadalajara title run is her career-best WTA 1000 result; she has also reached three additional WTA 1000 finals, all on hard court

- Contesting her milestone 50th WTA 1000 main draw this week

#### Ruse:

- As a qualifier, making 1st main-draw appearance at Doha; previously fell in qualifying in 2021 and 2023

- Has posted 12 wins in career over Top 50 players, most recently No.8 Barbora Krejcikova at 2024 US Open

- Seeking 2nd main-draw match-win of 2025; she went 1-1 in the Australian Open main draw as a qualifier, pushing eventual champion Madison Keys to 7-5 in the third set

## [Q] Katie Volynets (USA #68) vs. [12] Mirra Andreeva (#15)

#### Volynets:

- Owns 3 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.18 Marta Kostyuk at 2024 Beijing

- One of 10 players from the United States in this week's main draw; the best result by an American woman in Doha was Monica Seles's run to the title in 2002

- Best career tour-level result on hard court is a SF run at 2023 Austin

- This is her 12th WTA 1000 appearance; yet to advance to R16 at a WTA 1000

#### Andreeva:

- Andreeva has gone 18-4 against players ranked outside the Top 50 since her loss to Volynets at 2024 Indian Wells

- Currently ranked a career-high No.15; this time last year was ranked No.33

- Holds a 6-2 win-loss record so far in 2025, reaching Brisbane SF and Australian Open R16 (I. to World No.1 Aryna Sabalenka on both occasions)

- Contesting her 10th WTA 1000 main draw and has already made 3 WTA 1000 QFs (all last year at Madrid, Cincinnati and Beijing)

### [WC] Emma Raducanu (GBR #56) vs. Ekaterina Alexandrova (#25) Raducanu leads 1-0

#### Raducanu:

- Making 2nd appearance at Doha, where she fell 1r last year (I. Kalinina)

- Notched 2 Top 50 wins en route to the 3rd round of the 2025 Australian Open (d. Alexandrova and Amanda Anisimova, L to No 2 Iga Swintok)

I. to No.2 Iga Swiatek)

- Best career tour-level result on hard court is her run to the 2021 US Open title, when she became the first qualifier in the Open Era to win a Grand Slam title

- Winner of this match to face World No.1 Aryna Sabalenka in 2r; is 0-3 vs World No.1 opponents

### Alexandrova:

- Entering Doha on a 4-match winning streak after claiming Linz title last week (was previously a 2-time Linz runner-up)
- Contesting 38th WTA 1000 main draw; career-best WTA 1000 results are 2 semifinals (2022 Madrid and 2024 Miami)
- 3 of her 5 career titles have come on hard court (2020 Shenzhen, 2022 Seoul and 2025 Linz)

## Amanda Anisimova (USA #40) vs. Victoria Azarenka (#30)

Tied 1-1

### Anisimova:

- Making 3rd appearance at Doha; career-best tournament showing was R16 in 2020
- Playing in her 35th WTA 1000 main draw; career-best WTA 1000 result was reaching last year's Toronto final
- Owns 43 wins in career over Top 50 players, most recently No.11 Daria Kasatkina at 2024 Beijing

### Azarenka:

- Won back-to-back Doha titles in 2012 and 2013 and holds a 22-4 career win-loss record at the event (tied with Petra Kvitova for the most Doha main-draw match-wins)

- Contesting her 96th career WTA 1000 main draw; she is a 10-time WTA 1000 titlist, most recently 2020 Cincinnati (played at the USTA BJK National Tennis Center in NYC that year)

- Azarenka has won (205) and appeared in (281) the most WTA 1000 matches of any player, since the introduction of the format in 2009

## Yuan Yue (CHN #55) vs. [WC] Caroline Garcia (FRA #76) ... First meeting

### Yuan:

- Contesting 11th career WTA 1000 main draw; career-best WTA 1000 showing was reaching last year's Indian Wells quarterfinals

- Started 2025 season winning her first 2 matches (making Brisbane R16) but has gone 0-4 since then

- Owns 3-0 career tour-level record against players from France

### Garcia:

- Making 11th appearance at Doha; her career-best tournament result is making the quarterfinals in 2018 and 2023


- Seeking her first match-win of the season (I. Osaka at Australian Open; I. Sun at Abu Dhabi)

# **CAREER MILESTONES**

- Key result of 2024 was reaching Indian Wells final for the second time, losing to Swiatek who also defeated her in 2022 final. Other standout return came with SF run at Charleston. Did not play after US Open
- Won first WTA 1000 title in 2023 at Guadalajara (d. Dolehide in F). Also finished R-Up at Washington (l. Gauff). Contested WTA Finals for third consecutive season (was first alternate and went 0-3 in Group Stage following Muchova withdrawal).
- Finished 2022 ranked No.6 for the second consecutive year; a four-time finalist in 2022 including runs to the final at two WTA 1000 tournaments – Indian Wells and Guadalajara [1000]; returned to the WTA Finals advancing to the semifinals, falling to eventual champion Caroline Garcia.
- Climbed as high as No.3 in the rankings (March 21, 2022), the highest ranking every achieved by a Greek woman.
- Historic 2021 season was highlighted by her becoming first Greek woman to break into the Top 10 (at No.10, September 27) as well as the first from her country to qualify for the WTA Finals.
- In 2021, also reached third WTA final at Ostrava (l. Kontaveit), while advanced to SF at Roland-Garros, US Open - defeating three Top-20 ranked opponents at both events - and WTA Finals in Guadalajara
- Posted a Tour-leading nine Top-10 wins in 2021, including two over the World No.2 (Osaka at Miami and No.2 Sabalenka at WTA Finals)
- Broke into Top 20 on February 24, 2020 for first time, at No.20
- Scored third and fourth Top-5 wins of her career in 2020, over No.5 Svitolina at Ostrava and No.5 Bencic at St. Petersburg. Previous wins came over No.5 Ka.Pliskova (2018 Rome) and No.5 Kvitova (2019 Rome, via ret.)
- Upset No.10 seed Keys to reach the R16 for the first time at one of the four Slams, at 2020 Australian Open (l. Kvitova)
- Qualified for WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai in 2019 for first time in career (fell in RR stage). That season won maiden WTA title at Rabat, recovering from a set and break down to defeat Konta in final
- Highlights of 2018 were reaching her first tourlevel final at San Jose (l. Buzarnescu) and scoring maiden Top-5 win over No.5 Ka.Pliskova in 2r at Rome

- Highlight of 2024 season was reaching first career Grand Slam third round at US Open earning second Top 10 win of career by beating No.8 Barbora Krejcikova in the second round; also reached quarterfinals at Rouen and semifinals at WTA 125 Paris and WTA 125 Hamburg
- 2023 highlight was reaching third WTA singles final of career, on home soil at Cluj-Napoca (l. Korpatsch)
- In 2022, reached 2r on nine occasions, including Australian Open (l. Kudermetova) and US Open (l. Gauff)
- During 2021 season, captured maiden WTA title at Hamburg (d. Petkovic in F) and finished R-Up at Palermo (l. Collins) - entered both tournaments as a qualifier
- Made Top 100 debut at No.99 on September 20, 2021
- Ended 2020 with her deepest ITF Circuit run of the season, at \$100k Dubai-UAE. Also reached two QFs at this level and fell in final round of qualifying at both Australian Open and Roland Garros
- Advanced to maiden WTA QF at 2019 Nottingham (as qualifier, l. Garcia)
- Fell 1r on Grand Slam main draw debut at 2018 Wimbledon (as qualifier, l. A.Radwanska in 3s)
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2016 Bucharest and scored first Tour-level win of career at 2017 Bucharest (d. Shinikova, l. Suarez Navarro)
- WTA qualifying debut came at 2015 Bucharest
- Owner of six singles and 10 doubles titles on ITF Circuit
- Played first professional events of career in Romania on ITF circuit in 2012

- Notched first Top-10 victory of career over No.6 Wozniacki en route to first WTA SF of career at 2017 Wuhan
- Broke into Top 50 for first time at No.49 on October 9, 2017
- At 2016 Australian Open, by reaching 2r (d. Y.Wang, l. Suárez Navarro) became the first woman from Greece to win a main draw match at a Slam since Daniilidou d. Ka.Pliskova at 2013 Australian Open
- Reached first career WTA QF at 2016 Istanbul (as qualifier, l. Kovinic)
- Fell 1r on WTA main draw debut at 2015 US Open (as qualifier, l. Q.Wang)
- WTA qualifying debut came at 2012 Palermo
- Made debut on ITF Circuit in 2010; owns seven ITF Circuit singles titles and five in doubles







- In 2024 made first WTA 1000 final of career at Toronto, finishing R-Up to Pegula (defeated No.3 Sabalenka en route). Also enjoyed run to R16 at Australian Open, her third time reaching that stage in Melbourne
- Played a small number of tournaments in 2023 before taking a break away from the sport after Madrid in April
- Lifted second career title at Melbourne Summer Set 2 (d. Sasnovich in F) in January 2022
- In 2022, also made SF at Charleston (l. Jabeur) and five further QFs, including at Wimbledon (l. Halep)
- Ended 2021 season with 3r run at Indian Wells to secure her fourth consecutive Top-100 finish. Best results were QF runs at Parma and Bad Homburg
- Opened 2020 with SF showing at Auckland, going on to reach 3r at US Open, Roland Garros and Doha; during Doha run, earned third career Top 10 win over No.7 Svitolina (l. Kuznetsova in 3r due to walkover)
- Finished 2019 ranked No.24 the youngest of three teenagers in the Top 50 (also Andreescu and Yastremska)
- Posted career best Grand Slam result with SF run at 2019 Roland Garros - first player (man or woman) born in 2000s to advance to this stage of a major. Scored maiden win over a Top 5 player during 2019 Roland Garros, upsetting No.3 and defending champion Halep in QF
- Result boosted her into Top 50 for first time at No.26 on June 10, 2019
- Won maiden title at 2019 Bogotá (d. Sharma in F); at 17y 222d was the youngest American to win a title since S.Williams at 1999 Indian Wells (17y 169d)
- Made Top 100 debut at No.95 on September 17, 2018, after reaching first WTA final at Hiroshima (as qualifier, l. Hsieh)
- Also in 2018, upset No.9 Kvitova to become the joint-youngest player to reach R16 at Indian Wells, along with Majoli, who made SF in 1994 (both aged 16 years, 199 days)
- Played only two ITF tournaments before making WTA main draw debut at 2017 Miami (l. Townsend in 3s), with Grand Slam bow coming at 2017 Roland Garros (l. Nara in 1r)
- Owns six Top 20 wins: No.9 Kvitova (2018 Indian Wells), No.11 Sabalenka (2019 Australian Open), No.11 Sabalenka (2019 Roland Garros), No.3 Halep (2019 Roland Garros), No.7 Svitolina (2020)

- Best results in 2024 were reaching SF at Brisbane (l. Sabalenka), Miami (l. Rybakina) and Berlin (l. Kalinskaya). Made 4r at Australian Open (l. Yastremska). In addition, reached QF another four times at Doha (l. eventual champion Swiatek), Rome (l. Collins), Charleston (l. Pegula) and Washington DC (l. Sabalenka).
- Opened 2023, with QF at Adelaide 1 (l. Noskova) before reaching semifinal at Australian Open (l. Rybakina). Made 4r at Wimbledon (l. Svitolina) and 2r at US Open before earning a QF finish at Guadalajara (l. Garcia)

- Made WTA main draw debut at 2005 Kolkata
- ITF Junior World Champion for 2005 reached first tour-level semifinal at Guangzhou the same year



- Enjoyed best season of career in 2024, capturing her first Hologic WTA Tour title at Austin and made her first WTA 1000 QF at Indian Wells. Achieved a new career-high ranking of No.36 in May
- In the 2023 season reached her first Hologic WTA Tour final at Seoul (l. Pegula)
- Debuted in the main draw of Australian Open in 2023 without having to play qualification rounds for the first time, however fell in 1r (l. Sakkari)
- In 2023 season lifted an ITF \$100k Takasaki title
- Ended her 2023 singles season ranked at No. 87
- Jumped more than 100 spots in ranking during 2022, breaking Top 100 in October after winning ITF W60 Las Vegas NV
- Started off the year with a title win at W60+H Traralgon; also made F at W60 Liepaja (l. Navarro) and W60 Berkeley CA (l. Brengle)
- Qualified for the main draw at Miami and Wimbledon and made 3r at US Open (l. Pegula)

Her strongest WTA 1000 result of 2023 came with SF at Guadalajara (l. eventual winner Sakkari), and qualified for year ending Zhuhai Elite Trophy for a third time (also in 2016 & 2018), defeated by eventual champion Haddad Maia in group stage.

- Served highest number of aces of all players in 2023, with a total of 462 (nearest challenger was Rybakina with 455).
- Returned to form in second half of 2022, winning four tournaments, including a run through qualifying to Cincinnati title (d. Kvitova in F) and victory at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (d. Sabalenka in F)
- Only player to win titles on all three surfaces in 2022, having also triumphed on grass at Bad Homburg (d. Andreescu in F) and on clay at Warsaw (d. Bogdan in F). Summer form saw her return to Top 10 on September 12, following US Open SF
- Best win of her career came over No.1 Swiatek in QF at 2022 Warsaw
- At 2022 Roland-Garros, won first doubles title in almost six years (w/Mladenovic, d. Gauff/Pegula in F)
- Highlights in 2021 came on clay, with SF at Lausanne and QF at Parma
- Best results in 2020 were at Slams, reaching R16 at Roland-Garros (l. Svitolina) and 3r at US Open (l. Brady); defeated No.3 Ka.Pliskova in 2r at Flushing Meadows to record her first Top-10 win since late 2018
