MATCH NOTES - MONDAY, FEB 10

[10] Daria Kasatkina (#11) vs. [LL] Polina Kudermetova (#59)

Kudermetova leads 1-0

Kasatkina:

- Making 8th appearance at Doha; her career-best tournament result is reaching 2017 quarterfinals
- Has won 10 of last 13 matches against players ranked outside the Top 50 -- but one of those 3 losses was to P. Kudermetova
- Contesting her 72nd WTA 1000 main draw of career; her best result at a WTA 1000 event was 2018 Indian Wells runner-up (I. Osaka)

P.Kudermetova:p

- Making her WTA 1000 main-draw debut today
- After final-round qualifying loss to Alycia Parks, entered main draw as lucky loser following withdrawal by Anastasia Potapova (change of schedule)
- Kudermetova's 1st and so far only Top 20 win came over No.9 Kasatkina in Brisbane 3rd round last month, en route to her first WTA final

Maria Sakkari (GRE #29) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

Tied 3-3

Sakkari:

- Two-time Doha semifinalist (2022 and 2023); making her 7th main-draw appearance at the event
- Has 3-9 win-loss record against players ranked inside the Top 2 at the time of their meeting; owns 27 career Top 10 wins overall
- Won 1st 3 matches of her head-to-head vs. Swiatek; Swiatek has won their last 3 meetings to level their rivalry
- Contesting her milestone 50th WTA 1000 main draw this week

Swiatek:

- Making 5th appearance at Doha, where she is the three-time defending champion and has won her last 12 matches
- Holds a 13-1 win-loss record overall at Doha; her only loss at this event to Svetlana Kuznetsova in the 2020 2nd round
- Aiming to become only the 2nd player since 2000 to win the title at a WTA singles event for 4 straight years (she would join Caroline Wozniacki, 2008-2011 New Haven)
- Contesting her 32nd WTA 1000 main draw of career this week; she has won 10 WTA 1000 titles, most recently 2024 Rome

[9] Paula Badosa (ESP #10) vs. Katerina Siniakova (CZE #54)

First meeting

Badosa:

- Making 4th appearance at Doha, where her career-best result is reaching the Round of 16 in 2022
- Has won 16 of her last 17 matches against players ranked outside the Top 50
- Season-best result is making her first Grand Slam semifinal at Australian Open; after that event, returned to Top 10 for first time since October of 2022
- Best result by Spain at Doha was Carla Suárez Navarro's run to the title in 2016

Siniakova:

- Making 6th main-draw appearance at Doha; reached the Round of 16 here for the first time last year (d. Gauff, I. Collins)
- Owns 10 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.8 Zheng Qinwen at 2024 Berlin
- After 0-3 singles start to the year (in main draws), won her first 3 main-draw matches of the season en route to last week's Cluj-Napoca SF
- Also the current WTA Doubles World No.1; she has won 10 Grand Slam doubles titles, including this year's Australian Open with Taylor Townsend
- This week is her 138th career week as doubles No.1, the fourth most all-time

[15] Donna Vekic (CRO #19) vs. Linda Noskova (CZE #39)

First meeting

Vekic:

- Making 5th main-draw appearance at Doha; reached 2nd round as a qualifier in 2016 but has gone 0-4 in last 4 Doha matches
- After 0-3 start to this season, picked up her first 3 wins of 2025 with Round of 16 run at Australian Open
- Contesting her 55th WTA 1000 main draw this week; has reached the Round of 16 at 6 WTA 1000 events but is still seeking her first WTA 1000 quarterfinal

Noskova:

- Making 2nd appearance at Doha; reached Round of 16 in tournament debut last year
- Owns 9 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.10 Paula Badosa last week in Abu Dhabi
- One of 3 players from Czech Republic in this week's main draw (also Marketa Vondrousova and Katerina Siniakova -- all are playing their first-round matches today)

McCartney Kessler (USA #57) vs. Ons Jabeur (TUN #33) Kessler:

First meeting

- This will be the third career main draw appearance for Kessler in a WTA-1000 event (she lost in the First Round in both previous, against to Nuria Parrizas Diaz in Indian Wells and Shuai Zhang in Beijing last year)
- This is the first appearance for Mccartney Kessler at the Qatar Open, including the qualifying draw.
- Owns eight win in career over Top 50 players, most recently No.49 Rebecca Sramkova en route to Hobart title
- Won her last four meetings against Top 50 opponents (all in Hobart this season en route to the title) as many such wins she previously had in her entire career (4-7 before this event)
- Is currently ranked No.57; this time last year was ranked No.154

Jabeur:

- Making her landmark 10th Doha main draw appearance, the fifth player to take part at the event in 10+ different seasons, after Svetlana Kuznetsova, Angelique Kerber, Caroline Garcia and Jelena Jankovic
- The best result made by Ons Jabeur at the Qatar Open are the quarter-finals reached in 2020 (lost to Petra Kvitova) and in 2022 (lost to Anett Kontaveit).
- Owns one hard court title, at 2023 Ningbo
- Has won eight matches this season, the seventh-most on Tour

CAREER MILESTONES

- Finished the 2024 season ranked No.9 (2nd career Top 10 finish) in a season highlighted by winning titles at Ningbo and Eastbourne, while also finishing as runner-up at Seoul, Adelaide, Abu Dhabi and Charleston; won a Tour-best 26 matches at the WTA 500 level (next most was 15 (Rybakina); as an alternate at WTA Finals, lost one match in group play (l. Swiatek)
- Finished R-Up at two tournaments in 2023 at Adeliade 2 (l. Bencic) and Eastbourne (l. Keys); reached SFs at Charleston, Zhengzhou, and WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai
- In 2022, reached maiden Grand Slam SF at Roland Garros (l. eventual champion Swiatek) and won titles at San Jose (d. Rogers in F) and Granby (d. Saville in F); returned to Top 10 on August 8, after San Jose run
- Qualified for WTA Finals for the first time at Fort Worth in 2022 going 1-2 in group play
- Broke back into Top 50 in early 2021, after lifting first titles since 2018, at the Phillip Island Trophy in Melbourne (d. Bouzkova in F) and then St. Petersburg (d. Gasparyan in F)
- Reached two additional finals in 2021, at Birmingham (l. Jabeur) and San Jose (l. Collins)
- Highlight of truncated 2020 season was SF showing at Lyon (l. Friedsam) - her first run to the last four at a WTA event since lifting title at 2018 Moscow [500]
- Won consecutive matches only twice in difficult 2019 campaign, with best result a QF run at Beijing (l. Wozniacki) and St. Petersburg (l. Zvonareva)
- Ended 2018 season by lifting her second WTA singles title at Moscow [500] (d. Jabeur in F); broke into Top 10 following the tournament, on October 22, 2018
- Also finished R-Up at 2018 Dubai (l. Svitolina) and 2018 Indian Wells (l. Osaka); Indian Wells was biggest final of career having upset No.2 Caroline Wozniacki, No.10 Angelique Kerber and No.8 Venus Williams en route
- Made Top 20 debut on February 26, 2018, following R-Up finish at Dubai (d. No.3 Muguruza, l. Svitolina)
- Made first Grand Slam QFs at 2018 Roland Garros (l. Stephens) and 2018 Wimbledon (l. Kerber) and qualified for WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai going 1-1 in group play
- Upset No.1 Caroline Wozniacki during SF run at 2018 St. Petersburg
- Captured maiden WTA singles title in debut final at 2017 Charleston, defeating fellow teenager

- Finished 2024 season ranked No.106, her highest finish in the WTA year-end Rankings to date; in three Tour-level main draw appearances, reached the QF stage twice - Seoul (QF) and Merida (SF); also reached the QF four times at the WTA 125 level
- 2023 saw her compete in first Tour-level main draw reaching 1r at Australian Open (as qualifier, l. Gadecki) – also her Grand Slam debut. Strongest result was quarterfinal achieved at Seoul (l. Wickmayer) and also made 2r at s'Hertogenbosch (l. Samsonova).
- Began competing in \$25K \$80K ITF tournaments in 2022, reaching the final at San Bartolome \$60K (l. Rus) and breaking into Top 200.
- Continued on ITF circuit in 2020 and 2021 claiming two further titles at Antalya \$15K and Kazan \$15K.
- In 2019, played first WTA Tour matches in qualifying at Moscow (l. Gracheva in Q2). Won her first ITF title that year at Antalya \$15K.
- Made ITF circuit debut in 2018, reaching QF at Kazan \$15K.

- Jelena Ostapenko in the final the first allteenage final on tour since 2009 Linz (Wickmayer d. Kvitova)
- Also in 2017 reached final at Moscow (l. Goerges) and QF at Sydney, Doha and Beijing
- Ended 2016 as the highest-ranked teenager on tour, at No.27, after a campaign in which she reached SF, at St. Petersburg and QF at Indian Wells, Charleston, Montreal, Rio Olympics and Moscow. Made Top 50 debut on February 15, 2016 following St. Petersburg run
- Upset No.7 Venus Williams in opening match of 2016 season at Auckland to register first Top 10 win of career
- Reached first WTA SF at 2015 Moscow (as qualifier, l. Pavlyuchenkova) recorded first Top-20 win over No.14 Suárez Navarro in QF; following the tournament made Top-100 debut at No.73 (October 26, 2015)
- Reached 3r at 2015 US Open (as LL, l. Mladenovic) on Grand Slam debut (main draw and qualifying). reached QF at Bad Gastein (as qualifier, l. Errani)
- Also in 2015, won maiden WTA doubles title at 2015 Moscow (w/Vesnina), lifted fi ve singles titles on ITF Circuit and was nominated for WTA Newcomer of the Year in 2015
- Fell 1r on WTA main draw debut at 2014 Moscow (as WC, l. Riske)
- Made professional debut at in qualifying debut at 2013 Moscow
- · Owns seven titles on ITF circuit

- Key result of 2024 was reaching Indian Wells final for the second time, losing to Swiatek who also defeated her in 2022 final. Other standout return came with SF run at Charleston. Did not play after US Open
- Won first WTA 1000 title in 2023 at Guadalajara (d. Dolehide in F). Also finished R-Up at Washington (l. Gauff). Contested WTA Finals for third consecutive season (was first alternate and went 0-3 in Group Stage following Muchova withdrawal).
- Finished 2022 ranked No.6 for the second consecutive year; a four-time finalist in 2022 including runs to the final at two WTA 1000 tournaments – Indian Wells and Guadalajara [1000]; returned to the WTA Finals advancing to the semifinals, falling to eventual champion Caroline Garcia.

- Upset No.10 seed Keys to reach the R16 for the first time at one of the four Slams, at 2020 Australian Open (l. Kvitova)
- Qualified for WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai in 2019 for first time in career (fell in RR stage). That season won maiden WTA title at Rabat, recovering from a set and break down to defeat Konta in final

CAREER MILESTONES

- 2024 saw a breakthrough year, making her Tourlevel main draw debut at Auckland (as a qualifier, l. Lulu Sun), winning her first Tourlevel main draw match at the Australian Open and claiming her maiden title at Cleveland. She also claimed her first WTA 125 title at Puerto Vallarta and entered the Top 100 for the first time, peaking at No.63 on August 26, 2024.
- Reached WTA 125 series QF at Angers in 2023 (l. Yastremska)
- · Lifted first ITF title in 2023 at Rome \$60K
- Played first Tour level matches as a wild card at 2023 US Open, where she won two qualifying matches before falling in the third and failed to make the main draw
- Reached first ITF final in 2021 at Lubbock \$15K
- Made ITF debut in 2016 at Charleston \$10K at the age of 17

- 2024 season highlights included five quarterfinals at Roland Garros, Madrid, Berlin, Abu Dhabi and Nottingham. Ended season after Toronto in August through shoulder injury
- Reached third Grand Slam final and second Wimbledon final in 2023 (l. Vondrousova). Also qualified for WTA Finals for second consecutive year to close out the season.
- In 2022, created history by becoming first African and Arab woman in Open Era to reach a Grand Slam final, finishing R-Up at first Wimbledon (l. Rybakina) and then US Open (l. Swiatek)
- Lifted biggest career title at WTA 1000 Madrid during 2022 clay-court season (d. Pegula in F)
- Broke into Top 10 on October 18, 2021, following SF run at Indian Wells (l. eventual champion Badosa)
- At 2021 Birmingham, became first Arab woman to win a WTA title (d. Kasatkina in F). Followed this with QF at Wimbledon (l. Sabalenka)
- In 2021, also finished R-Up at Charleston [250] (l. Sharma) and Chicago [500] (l. Muguruza)
- Reached maiden Grand Slam QF at 2020
 Australian Open to become the first Arab woman to reach that stage at a major (l. eventual champion Kenin); made Top 50 debut at No.45 after breakthrough performance in Melbourne
- Made further QFs in 2020 at Doha (d. No.3 Ka.Pliskova, l. Kvitova), Lexington (l. Gauff), Western & Southern Open (l. eventual champion Azarenka) and Ostrava (l. Sakkari); posted career-high ranking of No.31 on August 31, 2020
- Season highlights in 2019 were 3r run at US Open and SF appearances at Eastbourne (l. eventual R-Up Kerber) and Tianjin (l. eventual champion Peterson)
- In 2018, defeated No.3 seed Stephens, No.8 seed Kontaveit and No.5 seed Sevastova en route to her first WTA final at 2018 Moscow, where she fell in three sets to No.6 seed Kasatkina. Was first Tunisian woman to advance beyond QF at a WTA tournament (Sfar was the only other Tunisian to reach a QF at this level)
- Scored first Top-10 win over No.7 Cibulkova at 2017 Roland Garros
- Reached maiden WTA QF at 2013 Baku. Also advanced to that stage at 2017 Taipei City and 2018 Bucharest
- Three-time member of Tunisian Olympic Team, first doing so at London games in 2012

- Contested first two WTA main draws in 2012, at Doha (as WC) and Olympics
- On ITF Circuit, has 11 singles and one doubles title
- Played first event of career at 2008 ITF/El Menzah-TUN
- Became first North African woman to win a junior Slam at 2011 Roland Garros (d. Puig in F), having also reached the final in 2010 (l. Svitolina in F)
