[3] Coco Gauff (USA #3) vs. Marta Kostyuk (UKR #21)

Gauff leads 3-1

Gauff:

- Gauff holds a 3-1 record head-to-head against Marta Kostyuk at WTA level, with Gauff winning all three of their previous meetings on hard court.
- Since the format's introduction in 2009, Coco Gauff (71) has recorded the most WTA-1000 match wins of any player before the age of 21.
- Gauff won eight of her 10 opening matches at WTA-1000 events in 2024, losing to Katerina Siniakova in Doha and Yulia Putintseva in Cincinnati.
- Making 4th appearance at Doha, where her best result was reaching QF in 2022 (l. Sakkari) and 2023 (l. Kudrmetova)
- Has won her past 17 matches against opponents ranked outside the WTA's top 20, with Gauff's last such loss coming to Yulia Putintseva in Cincinnati (R32).
- Making 37th WTA 1000 appearance highlighted by winning titles at 2023 Cincinnati and 2024 Beijing

Kostyuk:

- Making 3rd appearance at Doha, where her best result was reaching 2r in 2024 (l. Pavlyuchenkova)
- Owns 8 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.8 Maria Sakkari at Paris Olympics in 2024
- Holds a career win-loss record of 3-15 on hard court against opponents ranked in the Top 10, with her last win coming against Jessica Pegula in San Diego (SF) last year
- Best result by Ukraine at Doha was Semi-Finalist run by Elina Svitolina in 2019
- Making 30th appearance at WTA 1000 level; best result came at 2024 Indian Wells; also reached R16 four times at WTA 1000 level

[7] Qinwen Zheng (CHN #8) vs. Ons Jabeur (TUN #35)

Zheng leads 2-0

Zheng:

- Making 3rd appearance at Doha, where her best result was reaching 3r in 2024 (l. Fernandez)
- Faces No.35 Ons Jabeur in 2r today; with a win, would be the highest ranked opponent she defeated this year
- Zheng could reach an 11th WTA-1000 round of 16, matching Peng Shuai for the second-most among Chinese players since the format's introduction in 2009, trailing only Li Na (31).
- Since last year's Olympics, only three players have claimed more WTA-level match wins than Zheng (27) – Aryna Sabalenka (37), Coco Gauff and Paula Badosa (28 each).
- Since the start of the 2024 season, only three players have claimed more WTA match wins than Zheng (51) – Iga Swiatek, Aryna Sabalenka and Coco Gauff.

Jabeur:

- Making her landmark 10th Doha main draw appearance, the fifth player to take part at the event in 10+ different seasons, after Svetlana Kuznetsova, Angelique Kerber, Caroline Garcia and Jelena Jankovic
- The best result made by Ons Jabeur at the Qatar Open are the quarter-finals reached in 2020 (lost to Petra Kvitova) and in 2022 (lost to Anett Kontaveit).
- Owns one hard court title, at 2023 Ningbo
- With a win, Jabeur could claim her first WTA top 10 win on hard court since defeating Marketa Vondrousova at the WTA Finals (RR) in 2023.
- Jabeur holds a career win-loss record of 9-20 on hard court against opponents ranked in the WTA's top 10.

[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. Ekaterina Alexandrova

Sabalenka leads 4-3

Sabalenka:

- Former champion here in Doha, lifting the title in 2020
- Playing first tournament since R-Up finish at Australian Open
- Owns 16 hard court titles, most recently at Brisbane earlier this season
- Sabalenka holds a 4-2 record head-to-head against Ekaterina Alexandrova, with Sabalenka winning their last meeting from a set down at the US Open (R32) last year.
- Sabalenka (71.1%, 108-44) is one of four active players with a winning percentage of 70+% at WTA-1000 events, along with Iga Swiatek, Victoria Azarenka and Elena Rybakina.
- Has won her past 11 matches against opponents ranked outside the WTA's top 20, last losing to Karolina Muchova in Beijing (QF) last October.
- Only three currently active players have claimed more WTA-1000 match wins than Sabalenka (108) – Victoria Azarenka (205), Caroline Wozniacki (183) and Karolina Pliskova (132).

Alexandrova:

- Defeated Emma Raducanu in 1r, having lost to her in opening match at Australian Open
- Owns a 1-1 record against WTA No.1s, defeating Swiatek at 2024 Miami and falling to her at 2024 Doha
- After claiming tournament victory in Linz and opening round this week, bidding for her sixth consecutive WTA match win
- Bidding for first WTA top 10 win since defeating Iga Swiatek (R16) and Jessica Pegula (QF) in Miami last year.
- Last season, Ekaterina Alexandrova held a record of 3-3 against opponents ranked in the WTA's top five

[9] Paula Badosa (ESP #10) vs. Amanda Anisimova (USA #41)

Anisimova leads 1-0

Badosa:

- Bidding to reach her 13th career round of 16 at a WTA-1000 event, and a second in Doha after 2022.
- Since last year's Olympics, only Aryna Sabalenka (37) has claimed more WTA-level match wins than Paula Badosa (28)
- Badosa (50) is one of three Spanish players to secure 50+ WTA 1000 match wins along with Garbine Muguruza and Carla Suarez Navarro.
- In 2025, Badosa is 5-3 in 2025 against opponents ranked outside the Top 20, following her opening win in Doha over Renata Zarazua.
- Making 4th appearance at Doha, where her career-best result is reaching the Round of 16 in 2022
- Best result by Spain at Doha was Carla Suárez Navarro's run to the title in 2016

Anisimova:

- Anisimova won their only previous meeting on hard court at the Australian Open (R32) last year.
- Including her win over Victoria Azarenka in the opening round, Anisimova holds a career win-loss record of 41-30 at WTA-1000 events
- Anisimova could defeat multiple WTA-1000 winners at a single WTA-1000 event for only the second time in her career (also at 2022 Madrid defeating Sabalenka and Azarenka)
- Bidding to reach a ninth WTA 1000 round of 16 a
- Bidding for first WTA Top 10 win since defeating Aryna Sabalenka at WTA 1000 level in Toronto (QF) last year.

[WC] Caroline Garcia (FRA #76) vs. [4] Jasmine Paolini (ITA #4)

Garcia leads 5-2

Garcia:

- Garcia holds a 5-3 record head-to-head against Jasmine Paolini at WTA level, with Garcia winning their last meeting on hard court at the United Cup (RR) last year.
- This is Garcia's first match against a Top 10 opponent since defeating Coco Gauff in Miami (R16) last year.
- Caroline Garcia could claim consecutive WTA top 10 wins for the first time since winning the WTA Finals in 2022

Paolini:

- This will be Jasmine Paolini's third main draw at the Qatar Open, losing in the opening round on her previous two occasions to Elise Mertens (2022) and Emma Navarro (2024).
- Among the top 10 seeds at this year's Qatar Open, only Emma Navarro (15) has claimed fewer WTA-1000 match wins than Jasmine Paolini (27)
- Paolini claimed 14 WTA-1000 match wins in 2024 – the second-most by an Italian player in a single season since 2009, behind Sara Errani's 19 in 2013

CAREER MILESTONES

- Went three for three in finals in 2024, winning Auckland, Beijing and a historic first WTA Finals Riyadh title. Success in Saudi Arabia saw her win a record \$4.8m in prize money, the most ever awarded in women's professional sports, and defeat the World No.1 and No.2 at the same event. Posted a new career-high of No.2 in June
 - Won debut Grand Slam singles crown in 2023 lifting title on home soil at US Open (d. Sabalenka in F). Picked up another three titles in 2023, marking first WTA 1000 title at Cincinnati and debut WTA 500 title at Washington DC, in addition to WTA 250 Auckland. In doubles was co-ranked No.1 with Pegula after US Open.
 - In 2022, reached maiden Grand Slam final at Roland-Garros (l. Swiatek); was the youngest major finalist since Sharapova won 2004 Wimbledon
 - Made Top-10 debut on September 12, 2022, following QF run at US Open (l. Garcia)
 - Highlight of 2021 campaign was completing singles-doubles title sweep at Parma; defeated Q.Wang in singles final and teamed up w/McNally to win doubles
 - In 2021 also reached SF at Adelaide and Rome, while at the Slams made QF at Roland-Garros and R16 at Wimbledon
 - Finished R-Up in doubles at 2021 US Open (w/McNally, l. Stosur/Zhang)
 - First cracked the Top 50 on February 24, 2020 at No.49, following a R16 appearance at Australian Open to tie her career best Grand Slam result - during run, defeated V.Williams in 1r and her first Top-5 opponent in No.4 Osaka in 3r (l. eventual champion Kenin in 3s)
 - Enjoyed breakout season in 2019, highlighted by maiden WTA singles title at Linz (as lucky loser, d. Ostapenko in F) - earned her first Top-10 win en route to title over No.8 Bertens in QF
 - At 15y 214d, her title run in Linz made her youngest to win a WTA tour-level title since Vaidisova (15y 177d) won Tashkent in 2004
 - Also claimed maiden WTA doubles titles at Washington, DC (w/McNally, d. Sanchez/Stollar in F) and Luxembourg (w/McNally, d. Christian/Guarachi in F)
 - By winning the doubles title at Washington, DC at 15y 144d, became the youngest player to win a doubles title since May 1995 (Hingis won Hamburg at 14y 219d)
 - Reached R16 at 2019 Wimbledon on Grand Slam main draw debut defeating V.Williams in 1r (l. Reached two WTA 500 finals in 2024 at San Diego and Stuttgart finishing runner-up at both. Also made first Grand Slam quarterfinal at Australian Open and first WTA 1000 semifinal at Indian Wells.
 - Earned five Top 10 wins in 2024, entered the year with only three in career and made Top 20 debut on May 6, 2024 finishing the year at No.18
 - In 2023, won maiden singles title at Austin (d. Gracheva) and doubles title at Birmingham (w/Krejčíková).
- Reached QF at two WTA 500 events; Adelaide 1 (l. Jabeur) and Washington (l. Samsonova). Achieved a peak singles ranking of No. 32 on August 7, 2023 and No. 27 in doubles on May 8, 2023
- Best result of 2022 was SF showing at Granby (l. Saville). Also made 3r at Australian Open and Eastbourne
 - Highlights of second half of 2021 were QF at Chicago [250] (l. Gracheva) and SF at Cluj-Napoca (l. Halep); broke into Top 50 on November 1, 2021, after Cluj-Napoca
 - On clay, enjoyed career-best R16 run at Roland Garros (l. Swiatek) and advanced to SF at Istanbul (l. eventual champion Cirstea)
 - Opened 2021 by reaching first career WTA SF, at Abu Dhabi (l. Kudrmetova)
 - Broke into Top 100 at No.97 on November 2, 2020, after reaching back-to-back finals on ITF Circuit in US
 - Made 3r at 2020 US Open (l. eventual champion Osaka in 3s)
 - In February 2020, picked up third ITF singles title of career, at a \$60k event in Cairo
 - Season highlight in 2019 was reaching first WTA QF, at Strasbourg (l. Garcia)
 - Made Grand Slam main draw debut at 2018 Australian Open and reached 3r, having received a WC into the qualifying event by virtue of winning the junior title there in 2017 (d. Masarova in F). Was first player born in 2002 to play in a Grand Slam main draw. Was also youngest player to reach the 3r at a major since 1997 US Open when Mirjana Lucic-Baroni (15 years, 182 days) reached this stage
 - Scored two Top 50 wins in 2018, over No.27 Peng (Australian Open), No.26 Gavrilova (Fed Cup)
 - Won first ITF Circuit title of career at \$25k ITF/Dunakeszi-HUN in 2017 (d. Pera in F)
 - Played first WTA qualifying at 2017 Mallorca (l. Kalinskaya in 1r)

- eventual champion Halep) - followed with 3r showing at US Open (as WC, l. Osaka)
- Made WTA main draw debut as a wildcard at 2019 Miami where she earned her first WTA main draw win over good friend McNally (l. Kasatkina in 2r)
 - Made professional debut in May 2018 as a qualifier into the \$25K ITF/Osprey, FL-USA
 - Member of US Billie Jean King Cup team in 2022
 - Former Junior World No.1 (July 2018); won 2018 Roland-Garros girls' title (d. McNally in F) and 2018 US Open doubles title (w/McNally), while finished R-Up at 2017 US Open girls' event (l. Anisimova) becoming the youngest girls' singles finalist in tournament history at 13-years-old

- Ukrainian Fed Cup Team 2018-20
- Won 2017 Australian Open girls' singles title (d. Masarova in F) and ITF Junior Masters event in Chengdu, China in October 2017; rose as high as No.3 in junior rankings in June 2017
- Played first professional event at \$10k ITF/Kharkhiv-UKR in August 2016 (fell in 1r)

- Father, Corey, played basketball at Georgia State; mother, Candi, excelled in gymnastics before competing in a track and field at Florida State University
- Previously worked with Diego Moyano
- Started playing tennis at six
- Favorite surface is hard, describes her playing style as aggressive as possible with a big serve; depends on her quickness and athleticism to keep her in any point - describes herself as a "fighter"
- Tennis idols growing up were the Williams sisters whose tenacity and fearlessness made her want to become a professional tennis player
- Enjoys hanging out with her brother and family, watching superhero movies and making TikTok videos
- Does not have any pets but has been trying to convince her mom to get a dog
- Favorite city is Paris because of the history, food and architecture. Favorite celebrity is Beyonce because she is an incredible performer
