Ekaterina Alexandrova (#26) vs [6] Jessica Pegula (USA #5)

Tied at 1-1

Alexandrova:

- Making 6th appearance at Doha, where her best result was reaching 3r in 2024 (I. eventual champion Swiatek)
- Faces No.5 Jessica Pegula in QF today; owns 15 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.1 Aryna Sabalenka in 2r at Doha 2025
- Owns 105 career wins against seeded players, with a record in 2025 standing at 3-1

Pegula:

- Making 4th appearance at Doha, where her best result was R-Up finish in 2023 (I. champion Swiatek in F)
- Faces No.26 Ekaterina Alexandrova in QF today; owns 106 wins in career over Top 50 players, most recently No.12 Daria Kasatkina in 3r at Doha 2025
- One of 2 players from the United States to reach QF (Amanda Anisimova)

[5] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #7) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

Rybakina leads 4-3

Rybakina:

- Making 5th appearance at Doha, where she finished as runner-up last year (I. Swiatek); today's meeting is a rematch of last year's Doha final
- Owns 20 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.1 Aryna Sabalenka at 2024 WTA Finals
- Has a 9-7 win-loss record against players ranked inside the Top 2 at the time of their meeting
- Contesting her 32nd WTA 1000 main draw of career; she is a 2-time WTA 1000 champion (2023 Indian Wells and 2023 Rome)

Swiatek:

- Making 5th appearance at Doha, where she is the three-time defending champion and has won her last 14 matches
- Holds a 15-1 win-loss record overall at Doha; her only loss at this event was to Svetlana Kuznetsova in the 2020 2nd round
- Aiming to become only the 2nd player since the year 2000 to win the title at a WTA singles event for 4 straight years (she would join Caroline Wozniacki, 2008-2011 New Haven)

Ons Jabeur (TUN #35) vs. Jelena Ostapenko (LAT #37)

Jabeur leads 4-2

Jabeur:

- Making 10th main-draw appearance at Doha, where she has matched her best tournament result by making the quarterfinals (also reached QF in 2020 and 2022)
- Seeking 1st WTA semifinal since her title run at 2023 Ningbo over one year ago (0-7 record in quarterfinals since then)
- Has won her last 3 meetings vs. Ostapenko, including last week in the 1st round of Abu Dhabi
- Contesting her 41st career WTA 1000 main draw; she has won 1 WTA 1000 title (2022 Madrid) and reached 1 other WTA 1000 final (2022 Rome), and those were consecutive events

Ostapenko:

- Making 9th appearance at Doha; her career-best tournament result was finishing runner-up in 2016 (I. Suarez Navarro) and she also made the 2022 semifinals
- Contesting her 67th WTA 1000 main draw of career; she is a two-time WTA 1000 runner-up at 2016 Doha and 2018 Miami (I. Stephens)
- Defeated No.4 seed Paolini in yesterday's Round of 16 to notch her first Top 10 win since 2023, and reach her first WTA quarterfinal since 2024 Wimbledon
- Seeking her first WTA singles semifinal since her title run at 2024 Linz one year ago

Marta Kostyuk (UKR #21) vs Amanda Anisimova (USA #41)

Kostyuk leads 2-0

Kostyuk:

- Making 3rd appearance at Doha, where her best result was reaching 2r in 2024 (I. Pavlyuchenkova)
- Faces No.41 Amanda Anisimova in QF today; owns 45 career wins over Top 50 players, most recently No.36 Magda Linette in 3r at Doha 2025
- Only player from Ukraine to reach QF

Anisimova:

- Making 3rd appearance at Doha, where her best result was reaching 3r in 2020 (I. Kuznetsova)

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2024, highlights included reaching the final at Linz (l. Ostapenko in Final) and semifinals at Adelaide (l. eventual champion Ostapenko), Miami (l. eventual champion Collins), 's-Hertogenbosch (l. eventual champion Samsonova) and Monterrey (l. Sun); also made quarterfinals at Wuhan (l. Xin. Wang) and her best Grand Slam result of the season came during a 3r run at US Open (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- In 2023, won fourth career singles title at 's-Hertogenbosch, successfully defending the title and defeating top seed, Kudermetova in the final. A run of successful results followed with SF at Berlin (l. eventual champion, Kvitova), 4r at Wimbledon (l. Sabalenka) - a career best result at any of the majors and runner-up at Cleveland (l. Sorribes Tormo).
- Reached a 2023 peak ranking of No. 16 on February 20, 2023 following a 3r finish at Australian Open (l. Linette), before posting two QF results at Miami (l. eventual champion Kvitova) and Charleston (l. Bencic). Another QF then came in the Asian Swing at Tokyo (l. Pavlyuchenkova).
- In 2022, won titles at 's-Hertogenbosch (d. Sabalenka in F) and Seoul (d. Ostapenko in F). Also advanced to SF at Charleston, Madrid and Ostrava, making Top-20 debut on October 10, 2022
- Reached third WTA singles final in 2021, enjoying run to final at home tournament of Moscow (l. Kontaveit). Other key result was SF run at Gippsland Trophy (l. Kanepi)
- · Posted two best wins-by-ranking of career in 2021, defeating No.2 Halep (Gippsland Trophy) and No.2 Sabalenka (Moscow)
- Reached 2r on Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020
- Opened 2020 season by lifting her maiden WTA singles title, at Shenzhen (d. Rybakina in F)
- Won both singles rubbers on Billie Jean King Cup debut in 3-2 win over Romania in February
- Made Top-50 debut on June 17, 2019 after QF run at 's-Hertogenbosch
- Registered 30 Tour-level match wins during 2019, in which she reached SF at Budapest, Seoul and Linz and made QF at St. Petersburg, 's-Hertogenbosch, Eastbourne and Moscow. Also advanced to 3r at a major for the first time, at **Roland Garros**
- Won sole WTA doubles title at 2019 Budapest (w/Zvonareva)

- In 2024, won two singles titles Toronto (WTA 1000) and Berlin - en route to year-end ranking of No.7, her third-straight year-end Top 10 finish; two-time runner-up at Cincinnati and US Open; joined Rosie Casals (1970), Evonne Goolagong Cawley (1973) and Serena Williams (2013) as the only women in the Open Era to make the final at the Canadian Open, Cincinnati Open and US Open in the same season
- Also qualified for the 2024 WTA Finals (withdrew during round-robin play due to left knee injury)
- Won two titles in 2023, her second WTA 1000 tournament at Montreal and also WTA 250 Seoul. Also finished R-Up at Doha, Tokyo and at the WTA Finals in Cancun.
 - In doubles ascended to No.1 ranking (co-ranked with Coco Gauff) after 2023 US Open.
- Achieved career-high No. 3 in October 2022 after defeating four Grand Slam champions at Guadalajara, en route to ending three-year wait for second WTA title (d. Sakkari in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Fort Worth in both singles and doubles (w/Gauff), thus becoming the first Americans to debut in singles and doubles at the season-ending showpiece since Davenport in 1994
- Reached QF at three of the four majors in 2022, breaking into Top 10 after doing so at Roland Garros (June 6, 2022)
- One of seven players to win 40 or more matches in 2022, alongside Swiatek, Jabeur, Garcia, Sakkari, Kasatkina and Bencic
- In 2021, reached the QF or better on seven occasions, including at the Australian Open
- Broke into Top 20 on November 1, 2021
- Began 2020 with runner-up finish at Auckland (l. S.Williams), other standout results were a QF at Western & Southern Open (as qualifier, l. Mertens) and a 3r showing at US Open (l. Kvitova)
- On the doubles court in 2020, reached QFs of Roland-Garros (w/Muhammad) and Cincinnati (w/Rogers)
- Won her first WTA title at 2019 Washington DC (d. Giorgi in F)
- Also in 2019, fell 1r on main draw debut at Roland-Garros (l. eventual champion Barty) and Wimbledon (l. Buzarnescu) and Miami (as a qualifier, l. Konta)
- Broke into Top 100 for the first time on February 4, 2019 following back-to-back R-Up finishes at

- Came through qualifying to make maiden WTA final appearance at 2018 Linz (l. Giorgi)
- Advanced to first WTA QF at 2018 Seoul, scoring maiden Top 10 win of her career en route, over No.10 Ostapenko
- Made Top-100 debut at No.93 on March 20, 2017 after winning title at \$60K ITF/Shenzhen-CHN
- At 2016 Wimbledon, ranked No.223, won her way through qualifying on her maiden Slam appearance, going on to reach 2r (upset No.23 seed Ivanovic in 1r)
- Won WTA 125K Series title at Limoges in 2016, 2018-19
- Reached 2r on WTA main draw debut at 2016
 Katowice (as qualifier, l. eventual R-Up Giorgi)
- Contested qualifying for the first time at a WTAlevel tournament at 2014 Bad Gastein
- Played first professional events of career on ITF Circuit in Europe in 2011

- WTA 125K Series event at Newport Beach and W100 ITF Circuit tournament in Midland-MI, USA
- Highlights of 2018 included finishing R-up as a qualifier at Quebec City (l. Parmentier in F), recording SF finish at Houston WTA 125K Series tournament (l. S.Peng) and reaching QF or better at 10 ITF events
- Did not play between January and August 2017 after undergoing hip surgery. Primarily played at ITF Circuit events for the rest of the year, winning two doubles titles with Townsend
- Played a mixture of WTA and ITF Circuit events in 2016 with highlight coming at Washington DC, where she defeated No.14 Stosur for first Top-20 win of career on her way to a SF finish (l. Davis)
- Reached 2r on Grand Slam main draw debut at 2015 US Open (as qualifier, d. Van Uytvanck, l. Cibulkova)
- Sidelined from tennis for a year and a half between 2013 and 2015 due to a right knee injury
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2009 Ponte Vedra Beach and WTA main draw debut at 2012 Indian Wells
