MATCH NOTES – WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 12

Jelena Ostapenko (LAT #37) vs. [4] Jasmine Paolini (ITA #4) Ostapenko:

- Making 9th appearance at Doha; her career-best tournament result was finishing runner-up in 2016 (I. Suarez Navarro) and she also made 2022 semifinals
- Contesting her 67th WTA 1000 main draw of career; she is a two-time WTA 1000 runner-up at 2016 Doha and 2018 Miami (I. Stephens)
- This week, notched back-to-back wins for first time this season
- Seeking her 22nd Top 10 win of career; her most recent Top 10 win came over Jessica Pegula at 2023 Beijing

Paolini:

- Defeated wild card Caroline Garcia in this week's 2nd round to earn her first Doha main-draw win of career
- Contesting her 28th career WTA 1000 main draw; owns 1 WTA 1000 title at 2024 Dubai
- Both of her 2 career WTA singles titles have come on hard court (2021 Portoroz and 2024 Dubai)
- Only player from Italy in this week's main draw

Linda Noskova (CZE #33) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

Noskova:

- Making 2nd appearance at Doha; reached Round of 16 in tournament debut last year
- Defeated No.19 Vekic and No.20 Putintseva this week -- first time she has beaten two Top 20 players at the same event since 2023 Cincinnati (also did that at 2023 Adelaide)
- Owns 7 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.10 Paula Badosa last week in Abu Dhabi
- Contesting her 12th career WTA 1000 main draw; this is her 3rd appearance in a WTA 1000 R16 and she is seeking her 1st WTA 1000 QF

Swiatek:

- Making 5th appearance at Doha, where she is the three-time defending champion and has won her last 13 matches
- Holds a 14-1 win-loss record overall at Doha; her only loss at this event was to Svetlana Kuznetsova in the 2020 2nd round
- Aiming to become only the 2nd player since the year 2000 to win the title at a WTA singles event for 4 straight years (she would join Caroline Wozniacki, 2008-2011 New Haven)
- Contesting her 32nd WTA 1000 main draw of career this week; she has won 10 WTA 1000 titles, most recently 2024 Rome

Ons Jabeur (TUN #35) vs. [WC] Sofia Kenin (USA #73)

Jabeur:

- Making 10th main-draw appearance at Doha, where her best result was reaching the quarterfinals in 2020 and 2022
- Has defeated McCartney Kessler and No.7 seed Zheng Qinwen so far this week; win over Zheng was her 18th career Top 10 victory
 - Contesting her 41st career WTA 1000 main draw; she has won 1 WTA 1000 title (2022 Madrid) and reached 1 other WTA 1000 final (2022 Rome), and those were consecutive events

Kenin:

- Has defeated fellow Americans Ashlyn Krueger and Alycia Parks so far this week, winning back-to-back main-draw matches for the 2nd time this season (also Hobart)
- Contesting her 38th WTA 1000 main draw of career; her career-best WTA 1000 results are 3 semifinals, most

- 1 of 3 Americans to reach this week's Round of 16 (also Pegula and Anisimova)

Amanda Anisimova (USA #41) vs. Leylah Fernandez (CAN #27) Anisimova:

- Making 2nd appearance at Doha, where her previous result was reaching QF in 2024 (I. eventual R-Up Rybakina)
- Making 35th WTA 1000 appearance; finished as R-Up at 2024 Toronto; also was a two-time quarterfinalist 2022 Rome, 2022 Madrid
- Holds a career win-loss record of 42-30 at WTA-1000 events

Fernandez:

- Making 2nd appearance at Doha, where her previous result was reaching QF in 2024 (I. eventual R-Up Rybakina)
- First time in her career reaching the Round of 16 at consecutive WTA-1000 events (2024 Wuhan)
- Owns 43 wins in career over Top 50 players, most recently No.9 Emma Navarro here this week
- Won both their previous meetings (2022 Indian Wells, 2022 Roland Garros)

[5] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #7) vs. Rebecca Sramkova (SVK #46) Rybakina:

- Making 5th appearance at Doha, where her previous and best result was reaching the Final in 2024 (I. Swiatek)
- Owns 100 wins in career over Top 50 players, most recently No.47 Peyton Stearns here this week
- Since the start of the 2020 season, Rybakina (65) has claimed the fifth-most WTA-1000 match wins behind Swiatek (95), Sabalenka (80), Pegula (76) and Gauff (70)
- Four of her eight titles have come on hard court: Abu Dhabi, Brisbane in 2024; Indian Wells in 2023; Hobart in 2020

Sramkova:

- Making tournament debut at Doha
- Defeated Anhelina Kalinina No.50 and No.15 Mirra Andreeva to claim her fourth career Top 20 win
- Seeking her first career win over Top 10 player against No.7 Elena Rybakina today
- Best career result on hard court was lifting the title at Hua Hin #2 in 2024 (d. Siegemund in F)
- Only player from Slovakia in the third round

CAREER MILESTONES

- Won seventh and eighth titles of career in 2024 at Adelaide and Linz. In doubles won first Grand Slam title at 2024 Australian Open and qualified for 2024 WTA Finals Riyadh (both with Lyudmyla Kichenok)
- Won sixth career title at 2023 Birmingham (d. Krejcikova in F) and reached SF at Rome; in doubles achieved R-Up at Doha (w/L.Kichenok)
- At 2022 Dubai, lifted fifth career singles title (d. Kudermetova in F); finished R-Up at Eastbourne (l. Kvitova) and Seoul (l. Alexandrova) as well as SF at St. Petersburg and Doha
- Won two doubles titles in 2022 at Birmingham and Cincinnati (both w/L.Kichenok); qualified for WTA Finals reaching SF Lifted first grass court title at 2021 Eastbourne (as WC, d. Kontaveit in F)
- In 2021, also finished R-Up at Luxembourg (l. Tauson), made SF at Indian Wells (l. Azarenka), reached QF at Rome and represented Latvia at the Tokyo Olympics (l. Vesnina in 1r)
- Won doubles title at 2021 Moscow (w/Siniakova)
- Highlights of 2020 season included three Top 10 wins and reaching QF at Strasbourg
- Finished R-Up in doubles w/Dabrowski at 2020 Doha (l. Hsieh/Strycova)
- 2019 season saw her capture third career title at Luxembourg (d. Goerges in F) right after finishing R-Up at Linz (l. Gauff)
- Also R-Up in mixed doubles at 2019 Wimbledon w/Lindstedt
- 2018 campaign highlighted by finishing R-Up at Miami (l. Stephens); beat No.9 Petra Kvitova and No.4 Elina Svitolina to register multiple Top 10 wins in the same tournament for the first time
- Reached SF at 2018 Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Kerber) to become first Latvian woman to reach final four at All England Club
- Achieved career-high ranking of No.5 on March 19, 2018
- In doubles won title at 2018 Doha (w/Dabrowski)
- Enjoyed career-best season in 2017, finishing the year in the Top 10 for the first time (at No.7); was No.44 at end of 2016 (first Top 50 finish) and No.79 at end of 2015 (first Top 100 finish)
- Champion at 2017 Roland Garros (d. Halep in F) becoming first woman to win first tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Barbara Jordan at 1979 Australian Open. Also became the first unseeded player to lift the trophy in the Open Era and the first Latvian player to reach the championship match at a Grand Slam

- Breakout 2024 season saw her win the biggest title of her career at WTA 1000 Dubai and also reach her first Grand Slam finals, finishing R-Up at Roland-Garros and Wimbledon. Qualified for her first WTA Finals in singles and doubles, broke into the Top 10 for the first time in her career and finished the season as the World No.4
- Finished 2023 by breaking into Top 30 for first time, achieving No. 29 on Oct 23, 2023 after becoming runner-up at Monastir (l. Mertens). Also achieved runner-up at Palermo and SF at Zhengzhou (l. Zheng both times) as well as QFs at Lyon (l. Garcia) and Cincinnati as a qualifier (l. eventual champion Gauff). Enjoyed two Top 10 wins (No.10 Garcia and No.4 Rybakina).
- In 2022, finished R-Up at Cluj-Napoca (l. Blinkova), while made back-to-back SF at Palermo (l. Bronzetti) and Warsaw (l. eventual champion Garcia)
- Also reached QF at Lyon (l. Yastremska), Portoroz (l. eventual champion Siniakova) and Parma (l. Kovinic)
- Broke into Top 50 on January 31, 2021
- Posted near-Top 50 season finish in 2021 after capturing first WTA singles title of career at Portoroz (d. Riske in F)
- Strong season finish also brought SF run at Courmayeur(l. eventual champion Vekic) and QF effort at Linz (l. Halep); posted best win of season over No.18 Mertens en route to 3r at Indian Wells (l. Pegula)
- Also in 2021 won the WTA 125K event in Bol, Croatia (d. Rus in F) and was R-Up at the same level in Saint Malo (l. Golubic) Captured first WTA doubles title in 2021, at Hamburg(w/Teichmann)
- In 2021, for first time in career, contested the full suite of all four Grand Slam events; reached 2r at Roland Garros and US Open, equalling best previous Slam result
- In 2020, reached 2r four times at WTA tournaments, including Roland Garros (l. Kvitova)
- Highlights of 2019 included QF showings at Guangzhou and Palermo, a SF run at the WTA 125K Series event at Karlsruhe, lifting seventh, eighth and ninth ITF Circuit titles of her career, at \$60KBrescia-ITA, \$25K ITF/Curtiba-BRA and \$100K ITF/Tokyo-JPN, and qualifying for maiden Grand Slam main draw at Roland Garros (l. Kasatkina in 1r)

- Followed up title run with QF appearance at 2017 Wimbledon; also won title at Seoul (d. Haddad Maia in F) and reached final at Charleston (l. Kasatkina)
- Qualified for debut WTA Finals in 2017 went 1-2 in group stage
- Made Top 10 debut at No.10 on September 11, 2017
- In doubles, won first and second career titles in 2017, at St. Petersburg (w/Rosolska) and Stuttgart (w/Atawo) Breakthrough result of 2016 season was reaching final at Doha launching her into Top 50 at No.40 (l. Suárez Navarro); also in 2016 reached SF at Katowice and QF at Birmingham and Florianopolis ending year at No.44
- Ended 2015 at No.79 for first Top 100 finish (up from No.308 in 2014). Having leapt 229 spots, was second highest year-end rankings jump, after Kasatkina who went from No.370 to No.72 (298 spots)
- Highlights of 2014 were reaching first career WTA final at Quebec City (l. Beck) and 2r at Wimbledon and US Open
- Scored first Top 10 win over No.9 Carla Suárez Navarro in 1r at 2015 Wimbledon
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2014 Tashkent as WC advancing to 2r (l. Pervak)
- Played qualifying at Moscow in 2012
- Member of Latvian Billie Jean King Cup team in 2013-2022
- Began professional career playing ITF in 2012 winning first career title at \$10k/ITF Stockholm, SWE; owns seven career ITF titles

- Ended 2018 ranked No.180, with season highlight a maiden WTA singles QF at Prague (d. No.15 Kasatkina, l. Zhang)
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2017 Bastad (l. Suarez Navarro in 1r) and also fell 1r at Guangzhou and in qualifying a further three times
- Part of Italy's Billie Jean King Cup team 2017-19
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2015 Rome
- Made professional debut on ITF Circuit in Italy in 2011







CAREER MILESTONES

- Won three titles from five finals in 2024, tasting success at Brisbane, Abu Dhabi and Stuttgart and finishing R-Up at Doha and Miami. Qualified for her second WTA Finals and defeated WTA World No.1 Sabalenka in the group stage
- Reached second Grand Slam final at 2023 Australian Open (l. Sabalenka in 3s); made Top-10 debut following tournament (January 30, 2023). Also in 2023 won first two WTA 1000 title at Indian Wells and Rome and finished R-Up at Miami. Qualified for first WTA Finals, going 1-2 in group stage.
- Lifted maiden major at 2022 Wimbledon (d. Jabeur in F)
- In 2022 also finished R-Up at Adelaide (l. Barty) and Portoroz (l. Siniakova)
- Best result of 2021 were SFs at Eastbourne, Olympics and Chicago [500], and QFs at Abu Dhabi, Roland Garros, San Jose and Ostrava
- Opened 2020 season by reaching the championship match at four of her first five tournaments, including a title run at Hobart (d. Zhang in F)
- Made first final appearance at a Premier-level tournament with R-Up finish at St. Petersburg (l. Bertens); was rewarded with Top 20 debut at No.19 following run in Russia (February 17, 2020)
- First win over a Top-5 ranked opponent came over No.3 Ka.Pliskova during R-Up finish at 2020 Dubai
- Won back-to-back Slam matches for the first time during 3r showing at 2020 Australian Open (l. Barty)
- Won maiden WTA singles title at 2019 Bucharest (d. Tig in F), breaking into Top 100 for the first time in the following week's rankings at No.65 (July 22, 2019)
- Also in 2019, went on to make Top 50 debut on September 16, 2019, after reaching second career final at Nanchang (l. Peterson), produced SF appearances at Luxembourg and 's-Hertogenbosch, and made Grand Slam main draw debut at 2019 Roland Garros, falling 1r (as qualifier, l. Siniakova)
- Finished 2019 campaign with 57-21 win-loss record (across all levels) to end season at No.37, up from 2018's final ranking of No.191. On the ITF Circuit in 2019, lifted silverware on three occasions: back-to-back at \$25k Moscow-RUS and \$25k Kazan-RUS, and at \$60k ITF/Launceston-AUS
- Highlights of 2018 included reaching maiden WTA QF at St. Petersburg (l. Goerges) and

- Reached first three WTA finals of career in 2024, at Monastir, Hua Hin (defeated Siegemund for maiden title) and Jiujiang; finished season by guiding Slovakia to Billie Jean King Cup finals for first time since 2002; ended year in Top 50 for first time.
- Standout performance of 2023 was reaching QF at Warsaw (l. Maria). Also achieved R-Up at WTA 125 Bari on clay (l. Zidansek).
- Best result in 2022 was making 1r as a qualifier at Roland Garros (as LL, l. Kasatkina).
- Continued on ITF circuit from 2019 2021, also making 2r at Tour level at Prague 2020 (l. Jones) and again at Prague 2021 (as qualifier, l. Kuzmova).
- Reached Grand Slam main draw in 2017 at Australian Open (as qualifier, l. Duan) and won first WTA main draw match at Gstaad over Nina Stojanovic.
- Broke into Top 200 for first time in 2016 following title run at ITF Rome \$25K and also made Grand Slam debut at US Open that season (l. Karatantcheva in Q1).
- Played first WTA match in qualifying at Nottingham in 2015 (l. Zhu).
- Won first ITF title in 2013 on clay at Vrnjacka Banja \$10K.
- Began on professional circuit in 2012 at Velenje \$10K at the age of 15.
