## **MATCH NOTES - FRIDAY, FEB 14**

#### Jelena Ostapenko (LAT #37) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

Ostapenko leads 4-0

#### Ostapenko:

- Only active player to face Swiatek at least twice and retain an undefeated record. Bidding to become the first
  player to notch five wins over the Pole.
- In her last three semifinal appearances, Ostapenko has gone on to win the title: Birmingham 2023, Adelaide 2024 and Linz 2024.
- Playing in her eighth WTA 1000 semifinal and first since 2023 Rome; bidding to make her third WTA 1000 final, after 2016 Doha (I. Suarez Navarro) and 2018 Miami (I. Stephens)
- After defeating No.4 Jasmine Paolini in the Round of 16, a win today would give Ostapenko two Top 5 wins at a single tournament for the first time in her career

#### Swiatek:

- Three-time defending champion has won her last 15 matches in Doha, the longest streak of any man or woman since the inception of the men's tournament in 1993 and the women's tournament in 2001.
- Bidding to become the 1st player to reach the final at a WTA event in four consecutive years since Petra Kvitova at New Haven (2012-15).
- Trying to become only the 2nd player since 2000 to win the title at a WTA singles event for 4 straight years (she would join Caroline Wozniacki, 2008-2011 New Haven).
- Playing her 18th WTA 1000 semifinal today. Among active players, trails only Victoria Azarenka (24) and Caroline Wozniacki (21) for the most since the format's introduction in 2009.
- Her 94.1% win percentage (16-1) is the highest at the Qatar Open since its inception. Doha trails only Roland Garros (94.6%, 35-2) for Swiatek's highest win rate at a single WTA event (minimum 10 matches).

#### Ekaterina Alexandrova (#26) vs Amanda Anisimova (USA #41)

Tied at 1-1

#### Alexandrova:

- Undefeated since losing to Emma Raducanu in the first round of the Australian Open. Won Linz earlier this month and extended her win streak to a career-best eight matches with her progress in Doha.
- Has defeated two Top 5 players this week, defeating World No.1 Aryna Sabalenka (2R) No.5 Jessica Pegula (QF), both in three sets.



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- Alexandrova vs. Anisimova will be the first unseeded semifinal in Doha since Caroline Wozniacki faced Monica
   Puig in 2017 and the first at any WTA 1000 event since Jasmine Paolini faced Sorana Cirstea in Dubai last year.
- Alexandrova could reach her first WTA 1000 final after 38 main draw appearances the most since Alison Riske-Amritraj (39) at 2019 Wuhan. She could also become the third player aged 30+ in the past decade to reach a maiden WTA 1000 final after Elena Vesnina (2017 Indian Wells) and Danielle Collins (2024 Miami).


#### Anisimova:

- Sole win over Alexandrova came in her tournament debut in Doha in 2020
- Made her first WTA 1000 final last summer at Toronto, where she finished runner-up to Jessica Pegula.
- With wins over Victoria Azarenka, Paula Badosa, Leylah Fernandez, and Marta Kostyuk this week, became the first player to reach the Doha semifinals via four Top 30 wins.
- Playing her 75th WTA 1000 match today and bidding to notch her 45th WTA 1000 win.
- Currently No.41 on the PIF WTA Rankings and closing in on a return to the Top 30. This time last year she was ranked No.213.

- 2017 Roland Garros champion, making 9th appearance at Doha; her career-best tournament result was finishing runner-up in 2016 (l. Suarez Navarro); also made 2022 SF
- Has beaten Aoi Ito, Liudmila Samsonova, Jasmine Paolini and Ons Jabeur so far this week to reach her first SF since winning at Linz 2024
- Owns 4-0 record against No.2 Iga Swiatek; one of two players to play Swiatek more than once and remain undefeated along with retired Ashleigh Barty (2-0)
- Owns 21 career wins over Top 10 players, most recently over No.4 Jasmine Paolini earlier this week
- Bidding to defeat two Top 5 players at a single event for the first time in her career
- Owns 7-3 career record against players from Poland, with record in 2025 standing at 1-0
- Undefeated against seeded opposition this season (2-0)
- Record in WTA SF matches stands at 16-10
- Five of her eight WTA titles were won on hard court, most recently at 2024 Linz
- Currently No.37 on PIF WTA Rankings; this time last year was ranked No.11; reached career-high No.5 in 2018
- After notching just one win in her first four tournaments this year, has won four matches so far this week

#### **PLAYER NOTES**

- Making 5th appearance at Doha, where she is the three-time defending champion and has won her last 15 matches
- Owns a 16-1 record at Doha; sole loss came to Svetlana Kuznetsova in 2020 when she was ranked No.50
- By winning her 3rd straight title here last year, she became the 1st player to win the title at a WTA singles event for 3 straight years since Serena Williams (2013-2015 Miami); Swiatek went on to duplicate that feat at 2024 Roland Garros
- Aiming to become only the 2nd player since 2000 to win the title at a WTA singles event for 4 straight years (would join Caroline Wozniacki, 2008-2011 New Haven)
- Contesting her 32nd WTA 1000 main draw of career this week; she has won 10 WTA 1000 titles, most recently 2024 Rome
- Playing her 18th WTA 1000 SF; among active players trails only Victoria Azarenka (24) and Caroline Wozniacki (21)
- Seeded No.2 and has beaten Maria Sakkari, Linda Noskova and Elena Rybakina to reach second straight SF (not including team events); reached the same stage at Australian Open (l. Kevs)
- Bidding for her first career win over No.37 Jelena Ostapenko today (0-4); has not lost to a player ranked outside the Top 30 since 2024 Wimbledon (l. Putintseva)
- Owns 0-5 career record against players from Latvia
- Record in WTA SF matches stands at 26-11
- Twelve of 22 WTA titles were won on hard court, most recently at 2024 Indian Wells
- Is currently No.2 on PIF WTA Rankings; this time last year was ranked No.1
- Winner will play either Ekaterina Alexandrova or Amanda Anisimova for the title on Saturday

## **CAREER MILESTONES**

- Won seventh and eighth titles of career in 2024 at Adelaide and Linz. In doubles won first Grand Slam title at 2024 Australian Open and qualified for 2024 WTA Finals Riyadh (both with Lyudmyla Kichenok)
- Won sixth career title at 2023 Birmingham (d. Krejcikova in F) and reached SF at Rome; in doubles achieved R-Up at Doha (w/L.Kichenok)
- At 2022 Dubai, lifted fifth career singles title (d. Kudermetova in F); finished R-Up at Eastbourne (l. Kvitova) and Seoul (l. Alexandrova) as well as SF at St. Petersburg and Doha
- Won two doubles titles in 2022 at Birmingham and Cincinnati (both w/L.Kichenok); qualified for WTA Finals reaching SF Lifted first grass court title at 2021 Eastbourne (as WC, d. Kontaveit in F)
- In 2021, also finished R-Up at Luxembourg (l. Tauson), made SF at Indian Wells (l. Azarenka), reached QF at Rome and represented Latvia at the Tokyo Olympics (l. Vesnina in 1r)
- Won doubles title at 2021 Moscow (w/Siniakova)
- Highlights of 2020 season included three Top 10 wins and reaching QF at Strasbourg
- Finished R-Up in doubles w/Dabrowski at 2020 Doha (l. Hsieh/Strycova)
- 2019 season saw her capture third career title at Luxembourg (d. Goerges in F) right after finishing R-Up at Linz (l. Gauff)
- Also R-Up in mixed doubles at 2019 Wimbledon w/Lindstedt
- 2018 campaign highlighted by finishing R-Up at Miami (l. Stephens); beat No.9 Petra Kvitova and No.4 Elina Svitolina to register multiple Top 10 wins in the same tournament for the first time
- Reached SF at 2018 Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Kerber) to become first Latvian woman to reach final four at All England Club
- Achieved career-high ranking of No.5 on March 19, 2018
- In doubles won title at 2018 Doha (w/Dabrowski)
- Enjoyed career-best season in 2017, finishing the year in the Top 10 for the first time (at No.7); was No.44 at end of 2016 (first Top 50 finish) and No.79 at end of 2015 (first Top 100 finish)
- Champion at 2017 Roland Garros (d. Halep in F) becoming first woman to win first tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Barbara Jordan at 1979 Australian Open. Also became the first unseeded player to lift the trophy in the Open Era and the first Latvian player to reach the championship match at a Grand Slam

- Claimed five titles in 2024, making it a threepeat at Roland-Garros and also winning Doha, Indian Wells, Madrid and Rome. Crossed \$30m in prize money and qualified for her fourth WTA Finals
- Won six titles across 2023, including winning fourth Grand Slam title at Roland-Garros (d. Muchova in F) and going undefeated at the WTA Finals in Cancun (d. Pegula in F). Finished season as WTA World No.1 player for second consecutive year.
- In 2022, lifted second and third Grand Slam titles, at Roland-Garros (d. Gauff in F) and US Open (d. Jabeur in F)
- Triumph in Paris was the last of six straight titles during 37-match winning streak - jointlongest unbeaten run on Tour since 1990
- Won two titles in 2021, at Adelaide and Rome.
   Other highlights included QF at Roland-Garros and SF at Ostrava and qualifying for WTA Finals Guadalajara (fell in group stage)
- Also finished doubles R-Up at 2021 Roland-Garros (w/Mattek-Sands, l. Krejcikova/Siniakova)
- Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland-Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland man or woman to win a Grand Slam singles title and first from her country to reach a major final since A.Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon
- Ranked No.54, she became the lowest-ranked woman to win the Roland-Garros title in the Open Era and the lowest-ranked finalist since 1977 (No.56 Mihai). At 19y 132d, is the youngest champion in Paris since Monica Seles (18y 187d) in 1992
- Also became the first player to win her debut Tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Jelena Ostapenko at 2017 Roland-Garros
- Won WTA Most Improved Player of the Year for 2020, as voted on by members of the media.
   Also won the 2020 WTA Fan Favorite Award
- Ended 2019 season ranked No.61 after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Lugano (l. Hercog) and R16 run at Roland-Garros (l. Halep). That year also reached 3r at Toronto (l. Osaka) and made 2r five times (incl. Australian and US Open)
- Broke into Top 100 at No.88 after R-Up finish at 2019 Lugano
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2019 Auckland
- Ended 2018 season ranked No.175 (up from No.690 in 2017), after posting 42-6 record and winning four titles on ITF Circuit

- Followed up title run with QF appearance at 2017 Wimbledon; also won title at Seoul (d. Haddad Maia in F) and reached final at Charleston (l. Kasatkina)
- Qualified for debut WTA Finals in 2017 went 1-2 in group stage
- Made Top 10 debut at No.10 on September 11, 2017
- In doubles, won first and second career titles in 2017, at St. Petersburg (w/Rosolska) and Stuttgart (w/Atawo) Breakthrough result of 2016 season was reaching final at Doha launching her into Top 50 at No.40 (l. Suárez Navarro); also in 2016 reached SF at Katowice and QF at Birmingham and Florianopolis ending year at No.44
- Ended 2015 at No.79 for first Top 100 finish (up from No.308 in 2014). Having leapt 229 spots, was second highest year-end rankings jump, after Kasatkina who went from No.370 to No.72 (298 spots)
- Highlights of 2014 were reaching first career WTA final at Quebec City (l. Beck) and 2r at Wimbledon and US Open
- Scored first Top 10 win over No.9 Carla Suárez Navarro in 1r at 2015 Wimbledon
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2014 Tashkent as WC advancing to 2r (l. Pervak)
- Played qualifying at Moscow in 2012
- Member of Latvian Billie Jean King Cup team in 2013-2022
- Began professional career playing ITF in 2012 winning first career title at \$10k/ITF Stockholm, SWE; owns seven career ITF titles

- Member of Poland's Billie Jean King Cup team, 2018-20, 2021-22
- On professional debut, came through qualifying to win title at \$10k ITF/Stockholm-SWE in 2016; owns seven singles titles at this level
- Enjoyed stellar junior career, including winning girls' singles at 2018 Wimbledon (d. Küng in F) and leading Poland to Junior Fed Cup in 2016

- Introduced to tennis at age 5 by mother (who was also her first coach)
- Favorite shots are serve and backhand; favorite surfaces are grass and hard; favorite tournament is Wimbledon
