[3] Iga Swiatek (POL #3) vs. Anastasia Potapova (#45)

Swiatek leads 1-0

Swiatek:

- Making 7th appearance at Cincinnati, where she has reached SF twice in 2024 (l. eventual champion Sabalenka) and 2023 (l. eventual champion Gauff)
- Cincinnati is one of the two WTA 1000 events Swiatek has appeared without ever reaching the final, along with the Canadian Open
- Has won 63 consecutive opening matches at WTA events (including United Cup and WTA Finals), with her last opening loss coming to Maria Sakkari at the 2021 WTA Finals
- With a win today would reach 64 consecutive opening matches at WTA events (including United Cup and WTA Finals) and would become the first player since Monica Seles to do so (64 between Washington 1990 and Oakland 1996)
- Owns 12 singles titles on hard court, most recently Indian Wells and Doha in 2024
- Is the player with the joint-most hard court WTA level wins in 2025 (23, equalling Sabalenka)

Potapova:

- Making 4th appearance at Cincinnati, where her previous result was reaching 2r in 2024 (l. Paolini)
- Owns 7 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.8 Qinwen Zheng at Madrid 2025
- Owns 0-3 career record against players from Poland
- Has 2 career singles titles on hard court at Cluj-Napoca in 2025; Linz 2023
- Winner of today's match will face Tatjana Maria or No.25 seed Marta Kostyuk in the 3r

[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. Marketa Vondrousova (CZE #59)

Tied 4-4

Sabalenka:

- Making 8th appearance at Cincinnati, she is the defending champion (d. Pegula in 2024 final) and has also reached SF on three occasions; in 2018 (I. Halep), 2022 (I. Garcia) and 2023 (I. Muchova)
- Contesting her 58th career WTA 1000 main draw this week; she is an 8-time WTA 1000 champion, with her most recent WTA 1000 title coming at 2025 Miami
- Has lost just one of her last 14 opening matches in WTA 1000 events; against Ekaterina Alexandrova at Doha 2025
- 17 of her 20 career singles titles have come on hard courts
- Has the most match wins of any player so far in 2025 with 47, she also has the most WTA 1000 main draw wins with 21

Vondrousova:

- Making 5th appearance at Cincinnati, where her previous and best result was reaching QF in 2023 (I. Swiatek)
- Has won 4 of their 8 career meetings including their most recent meeting in SF at 2025 Berlin (grass) and QF at 2024 Stuttgart (clay)
- Won her two most recent matches against Top 10 players (No.1 Sabalenka and No.6 Keys both at Berlin 2025); her last Top 10 win on hard court was over No.4 Jabeur at 2023 Indian Wells
- One of her 3 career singles titles has come on hard court at 2017 Biel (d. Kontaveit in F)

Eva Lys (GER #62) vs. [6] Madison Keys (USA #6)

First meeting

Lys:

- Making Cincinnati debut
- Looking for her first career Top 10 win with a current record of 0-7
- Her best career hard court result is semifinal which she reached at Monastir in 2024 and Cluj-Napoca in 2023
- Hit a career high ranking in June this year with No.55
- Has won 11 Tour-level matches so far in 2025 including posting her best career Grand Slam result with 4r at Australian Open (I. Swiatek)

Keys:

- This is her 11th Cincinnati appearance, the most of any player from United States of America in the Open Era
- She claimed the Cincinnati title in 2019 (d. Kuznetsova in F)
- Is 1-2 against players from Germany so far this season (d. Siegemund at Montreal; I. Siegemund in 3r at Wimbledon, I. eventual champion Maria in SF at Queen's, London)
- Owns five hard court titles including two this year: Australian Open and Adelaide
- Competing at a ranking of No.6 this week close to her career high of No.5 achieved for the first time in February this year

[9] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #10) vs. Renata Zarazua (MEX #70)

First meeting

Rybakina:

- Making 6th appearance at Cincinnati, where her best previous result was QF run in 2022 (l. Keys), which is also Kazakhstan's best result at Cincinnati
- Best WTA 1000 result was title runs at Indian Wells 2023 (d. Sabalenka in F) and Rome 2023 (d. Kalinina in F)
- Record against opponents outside Top 50 is 19-4 in 2025, most recently last week in Montreal, l. eventual champion No.85 Mboko
- Owns four singles titles on hard court: Abu Dhabi, Brisbane in 2024; Indian Wells in 2023; Hobart in 2020

Zarazua:

- Making tournament debut
- Defeated Yulia Putintseva in opening match and becomes the first player from Mexico to reach 2r at Cincinnati
- With a win today would be through to 3r at WTA 1000 events for the first time in her career
- Looking to her first win over a Top 10 opponent, after losing all her previous five such meetings
- Best career result on hard court is SF run at Acapulco 2020

[Q] Leolia Jeanjean (FRA #95) vs. [5] Amanda Anisimova (USA #8)

First meeting

Jeanjean:


- Making tournament debut
- Is playing her second WTA 1000 event, having made her debut at Montreal prior to Cincinnati (as qualifier, l. Lys)
- As a qualifier, has beaten Yuliia Starodubtseva in 1r to score her first WTA 1000 main draw win
- Owns one win in career over Top 10 players, defeating No.8 Karolina Pliskova at Roland Garros 2022
- Best result by a qualifier at Cincinnati was by Caroline Garcia who won the title in 2022

Anisimova:

- Making 4th appearance at Cincinnati, where her previous best result was R16 run in 2018 (l. Svitolina)
- Best WTA 1000 result is title run at Doha 2025 (d. Ostapenko in F), also made final at Toronto 2024 (l. Pegula in F)
- Besides Doha 2025, owns a second title on hard court at Melbourne 250 in 2022
- First time this century that three of the top five seeded players are from United States of America (along with No.2 Gauff and No.4 Pegula)
- Made her Top 10 debut in July after her runner-up performance at Wimbledon; this time last year was ranked No.176
- Has won 31 matches so far in 2025



CAREER MILESTONES

- Claimed five titles in 2024, making it a three-peat at Roland-Garros and also winning Doha, Indian Wells, Madrid and Rome. Crossed \$30m in prize money and qualified for her fourth WTA Finals
- Won six titles across 2023, including winning fourth Grand Slam title at Roland-Garros (d. Muchova in F) and going undefeated at the WTA Finals in Cancun (d. Pegula in F). Finished season as WTA World No.1 player for second consecutive year.
- In 2022, lifted second and third Grand Slam titles, at Roland-Garros (d. Gauff in F) and US Open (d. Jabeur in F)
- Triumph in Paris was the last of six straight titles during 37-match winning streak - joint-longest unbeaten run on Tour since 1990
- Won two titles in 2021, at Adelaide and Rome. Other highlights included QF at Roland-Garros and SF at Ostrava and qualifying for WTA Finals Guadalajara (fell in group stage)
- Also finished doubles R-Up at 2021 Roland-Garros (w/Mattek-Sands, l. Krejčíková/Siniakova)
- Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland-Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland - man or woman - to win a Grand Slam singles title and first from her country to reach a major final since A.Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon
- Ranked No.54, she became the lowest-ranked woman to win the Roland-Garros title in the Open Era and the lowest-ranked finalist since 1977 (No.56 Mihai). At 19y 132d, is the youngest champion in Paris since Monica Seles (18y 187d) in 1992
- Also became the first player to win her debut Tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Jelena Ostapenko at 2017 Roland-Garros
- Won WTA Most Improved Player of the Year for 2020, as voted on by members of the media. Also won the 2020 WTA Fan Favorite Award
- Ended 2019 season ranked No.61 after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Lugano (l. Hercog) and R16 run at Roland-Garros (l. Halep). That year also reached 3r at Toronto (l. Osaka) and made 2r five times (incl. Australian and US Open)
- Broke into Top 100 at No.88 after R-Up finish at 2019 Lugano
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2019 Auckland
- Ended 2018 season ranked No.175 (up from No.690 in 2017), after posting 42-6 record and winning four titles on ITF Circuit
- Posted best Grand Slam result in 2024 by reaching R16 at Roland-Garros. Also made SF of Birmingham and Cleveland and her first WTA 1000 QF at Indian Wells
- A successful 2023 season saw her lift her second career title in Linz (d. Martić), she also reached semifinals at Stuttgart (l. Sabalenka) and Birmingham (l. eventual champion Ostapenko) and quarterfinals at Lyon (l. Zanevska), Miami (l. Pegula) and San Diego (l. Kenin). Equalled her best Grand Slam result with 3r at Roland Garros (also 3r at Australian Open in 2021) and moved up ranking to peak at No. 21 on Jun 19, 2023. Had a breakthrough year in 2022, where she won her first title at Istanbul (d. Kudrmetova) and finished R-Up at Prague (l. Bouzková); broke into Top 50 following Prague (August 1, 2022)
- In 2021 reached QFs at Dubai (l. Krejčíková), Birmingham (l. Jabeur) and Nur-Sultan (l. Peterson)
- Posted three straight QFs in 2020, at Acapulco, St. Petersburg and Monterrey; did not play after the tour's resumption in August
- Finished 2019 season ranked No.93 after a season highlighted by SF at Budapest (l. Vondroušová) and Jurmala (l. Sevastova)
- Scored first Top-10 win over No.5 Kerber in 1r at 2019 Roland Garros
- In doubles, won titles at 2018 Moscow [River Cup] (w/Zvonareva) and 2019 Lausanne (w/Sizikova)
- Highlights of 2018 season were R-Up finishes at Tashkent (as qualifier, l. Gasparyan) and at Moscow [River Cup] (l. Danilovic)
- Made Billie Jean King Cup debut during 2018's defeat to Slovakia in February (l. Kuzmova)
- Reached 2r at St. Petersburg in February 2018 (l. Wozniacki). Win over Maria in 1r was first at tour level
- On ITF Circuit owns one singles and two doubles titles
- Fell 1r on Grand Slam main draw debut at 2017 Wimbledon (as qualifier, l. Maria); at 16 years and three months, became youngest player to successfully navigate Slam qualifying since Ana Konjuh, who had just turned 16 when she did it at 2014 Australian Open
- Captured 2016 Wimbledon girls junior title, having to win final point three separate times after two challenge overrules - title lifted her to Junior World No.1. In junior doubles, posted two runner-up finishes at 2015 US Open and 2016 Roland Garros


- Member of Poland's Billie Jean King Cup team, 2018-20, 2021-22
- On professional debut, came through qualifying to win title at \$10k ITF/Stockholm-SWE in 2016; owns seven singles titles at this level
- Enjoyed stellar junior career, including winning girls' singles at 2018 Wimbledon (d. Kung in F) and leading Poland to Junior Fed Cup in 2016

- Previously worked with Tomasz Wiktorowski and Piotr Sierzputowski
- Father is former Olympic rower Tomasz Swiatek, who competed in the men's quadruple sculls event at the 1988 Summer Olympics in Seoul
- In summer 2022 organised 'Iga Swiatek and friends for Ukraine' event in Krakow, which featured a mixed doubles match between Agnieszka Radwanska, Sergiy Stakhovsky, Polish junior Martyn Pawelski and herself, and was attended by Poland's First Lady, Agata Kornhauser-Duda, Elina Svitolina and Andriy Shevchenko. The occasion was watched by almost 15,000 people live and a further one million on television, raising more than half a million Euros for Ukrainian children and teenagers affected by the war
- Started playing tennis because her older sister was playing and wanted to beat her
- Enjoys rock music, including AC/DC and Pink Floyd
- Includes PZU, On, Tecnifibre, Rolex and Xiaomi in her endorsement portfolio
- Trains at Alexander Ostrovsky Academy in Khimki
- Grandmother, and former Russian national team coach, inspired her to start playing tennis
- Enjoys playing basketball

- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan. Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid.
