Jessica Bouzas Maneiro (ESP #42) vs. [WC] Taylor Townsend (USA #126) Bouzas Maneiro leads 1-0

Bouzas Maneiro:

- Making 2nd appearance at Cincinnati; she reached 2r last year as a lucky loser (l. Svitolina)
- Contesting her 9th career WTA 1000 main draw; she reached her first WTA 1000 QF at last week's event in Montreal (l. eventual champion Mboko)
- Has won 9 of her last 11 matches (during this stretch, also reached her first Grand Slam R16 at 2025 Wimbledon)
- Bouzas Maneiro is 9-1 this year vs. players ranked outside the Top 100

Townsend:

- Making 5th main-draw appearance at Cincinnati; her previous and career-best tournament result is reaching last year's R16 (l. eventual finalist Pegula)
- Contesting her 24th career WTA 1000 main draw; her career-best WTA 1000 performance is reaching the 2024 Toronto QF
- Has gone 4-1 during this year's North American summer hard court swing so far (6-1 when including her 2 qualifying wins in Washington)
- Recently climbed to the World No.1 ranking in doubles for the first time in her career

[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. [30] Emma Raducanu (GBR #39) Sabalenka leads 2-0

Sabalenka:

- Making 8th appearance at Cincinnati, she is the defending champion (d. Pegula in 2024 final) and has also reached SF on three occasions; in 2018 (l. Halep), 2022 (l. Garcia) and 2023 (l. Muchova)
- Contesting her 58th career WTA 1000 main draw this week; she is a 9-time WTA 1000 champion, with her most recent WTA 1000 title coming at 2025 Madrid
- 17 of her 20 career singles titles have come on hard courts
- Has the most Tour-level match-wins of any player so far in 2025 (48)
- Is 43-3 in 2025 at WTA level after winning the first set, with two of those three losses only coming in event finals (Indian Wells, Roland Garros)

Raducanu:

- Making 2nd appearance at Cincinnati, where her previous result was reaching 3r in 2022 (l. Pegula)
- Her career-best result at WTA 1000 event was QF run at Miami this year (l. eventual R-Up Pegula)
- Owns 3 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.10 Emma Navarro at Miami 2025
- Her only Tour-level career singles title has come on hard court: 2021 US Open (first qualifier to win a Grand Slam title in Open Era)
- Opened this year's North American hard court swing with first SF of the year in Washington (l. Kalinskaya)

Rybakina leads 5-1

Rybakina:

- Making 6th main-draw appearance at Cincinnati; her best tournament result is reaching the QF in 2022 (l. Keys)
- Contesting her 39th career WTA 1000 main draw; she is a 2-time WTA 1000 champion (2023 Indian Wells and 2023 Rome) and has reached 3 additional WTA 1000 finals
- Has gone 7-2 in this year's North American summer hard-court swing, losing only to the eventual champions in her 2 previous summer hard-court events (l. Fernandez in Washington SF; l. Mboko in Montreal SF)
- Owns 12-1 career Tour-level record against players from Belgium; her only Tour-level loss to a Belgian was to Mertens at 2021 Madrid (which is Mertens's only win over Rybakina in their 6 career meetings)

Mertens:

- Making 8th main-draw appearance at this tournament; her best tournament showing was reaching SF in 2020, when this event was held at the USTA Billie Jean King National Tennis Center in New York (l. Osaka)
- Contesting her 62nd career WTA 1000 main draw; her best WTA 1000 results are 2 SFs (2021 Dubai, and at this event in 2020)
- After 1r bye, defeated Clervie Ngounoue in 2r for her first win of this year's North American summer hard court swing (Mertens lost her first match in Montreal to Kalinskaya)
- Owns 12 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.4 Jessica Pegula at 2025 Rome

[28] Anna Kalinskaya (#34) vs. [5] Amanda Anisimova (USA #8)

Anisimova leads 1-0

Kalinskaya:

- Making 4th appearance at Cincinnati
- Owns 12 career wins over Top 10 players (2-2 in 2025), most recently d. No.3 Pegula at Strasbourg 2025
- Has won six of her last nine matches against players from the United States of America
- Her best result on hard court is Runner-Up twice: Washington DC 2025 (l. Fernandez); and Dubai 2024 (l. Paolini)

Anisimova:

- Making 4th appearance at Cincinnati, where her best result is R16 run in 2018 (l. Svitolina)
- Best WTA 1000 result is title run at Doha 2025 (d. Ostapenko in F), also made final at Toronto 2024 (l. Pegula in F)
- Bidding for her 11th win at WTA 1000-level in 2025; this would be her most wins in a single season at this level
- Made her Top 10 debut in July after her runner-up performance at Wimbledon; this time last year was ranked No.176

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2024 posted best career Grand Slam results with R32 at Wimbledon and US Open (at Wimbledon, she beat the defending champion Marketa Vondrousova in the opening round, before falling to the eventual 2024 champion Barbora Krejckikova in R32)
- In 2024, also claimed first WTA 125 title at Antalya.
- In 2023, won one ITF W60 in Rome. Earned a spot at Grand Slam qualifying for the first time at 2023 US Open (l. Babos) and 2023 Roland Garros (l. Ferro).
- Earned first ITF title at Madrid \$15K in 2020 on clay.
- Made professional debut in January 2018 at \$15K ITF/Hammamet 2, Tunisia.

- Standout singles result of 2024 was reaching QF at WTA 1000 Toronto as a lucky loser (l. Navarro). In doubles earned titles at WTA 500 Adelaide w/Haddad Maia, Wimbledon w/Siniakova, WTA 500 Washington DC w/Muhammad, as well as achieving runner-up at the WTA Finals Riyadh w/Siniakova
- Reached third round at 2023 US Open for the second time in her career and first since becoming a mother (l. Muchova). Also in 2023 advanced to R16 at Guadalajara (l. Arango in 3r).
- Finished R-Up in doubles at 2022 US Open (w/McNally, l. Krejckikova/Siniakova)
- Last season in singles, made 2r at San Jose (as qualifier, l. eventual champion Kasatkina) and fell 1r at Roland Garros, Cincinnati and US Open. Won 11th and 12th ITF Circuit titles of her career in 2022, at W100 Charleston and W80 Tyler
- Returned from maternity leave in April 2022 with QF runs at ITF Circuit clay-court tournaments in Palm Harbor and Charlottesville
- Enjoyed doubles success in 2020, advancing to SF at US Open and winning titles at both Auckland and WTA 125K Series event in Indian Wells (all w/Muhammad)
- In 2019, produced best singles performance at a major by reaching R16 at US Open (as qualifier, l. Andreescu); in 2r saved 1MP to upset No.4 seed Halep
- Posted best year-end finish at No.74 in 2018, up from No.105 in 2017; reached career-high No.61 ranking on July 16, 2018
- First broke into the Top 100 the week of January 19, 2015 at No.99
- Highlights of 2018 were winning her ninth ITF singles title at \$25k ITF/Sumter, SC-USA (d. Lim in F)
- Advanced to 3r to 2017 Miami after coming through qualifying. Upset No.30 Vinci in 2r before losing to No.7 Kuznetsova
- Reached 3r at 2014 Roland Garros (l. Suárez Navarro); at 18 years, one month was the youngest woman to reach 3r in Paris since 2009 (Pavlyuchenkova)
- Made WTA main draw debut as wildcard at 2013 Indian Wells; in first match posted career first Top-100 win over No.57 Hradecka
- Advanced to first WTA doubles final at 2013 Washington DC (w/Bouchard)
- Won the junior singles and doubles titles at 2012 Australian Open; became first American to hold year-end No.1 junior world ranking since Gretchen Rush in 1982
- Turned professional at end of 2012 season

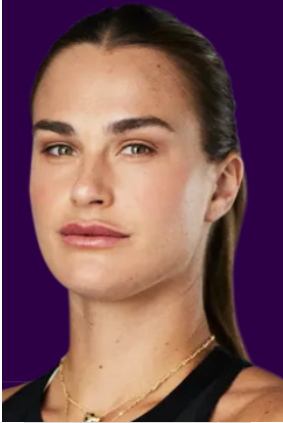

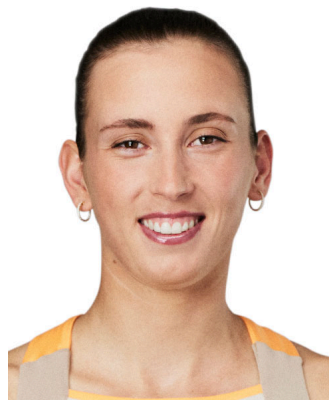
