[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. Jessica Bouzas Maneiro (ESP #42)

Sabalenka leads 1-0

Sabalenka:

- Making 8th appearance at Cincinnati, she is the defending champion (d. Pegula in 2024 final) and has also reached SF on three occasions; in 2018 (l. Halep), 2022 (l. Garcia) and 2023 (l. Muchova)
- Only Jelena Jankovic (24), Serena Williams and Simona Halep (23 each) have won more main-draw matches at the Cincinnati Open than Aryna Sabalenka (20) in the Open Era
- Trying to make her 4th straight Cincinnati QF, which would make her the 4th woman in the Open Era with 4+ QFs in a row at the event, joining Linda Tuero (1969-72), Serena Williams (2012-15) and Simona Halep (2013-18)
- Contesting her 58th career WTA 1000 main draw this week (9-time WTA 1000 champion); she is aiming to reach the 29th WTA 1000 QF of her career
- Has the most tour-level match-wins of any player so far in 2025 (49)
- Sabalenka is 21-1 this year vs. players ranked outside the Top 40 (the 1 loss was to Vondrousova in Berlin SF)

Bouzas Maneiro:

- Making 2nd appearance at Cincinnati; she reached 2r last year as a lucky loser (l. Svitolina)
- Contesting her 9th career WTA 1000 main draw; she reached her first WTA 1000 QF at last week's event in Montreal (l. eventual champion Mboko)
- Has won 10 of her last 12 matches (during this stretch, also made her first Grand Slam R16 at 2025 Wimbledon)
- Owns 2 wins in career over Top 10 players, defeating No.6 Marketa Vondrousova at 2024 Wimbledon and No.9 Emma Navarro at 2025 Roland Garros
- Lost her only previous meeting vs. a current World No.1 (l. Sabalenka at 2025 Australian Open)

[12] Ekaterina Alexandrova (#16) vs. [28] Anna Kalinskaya (#34)

Alexandrova leads 6-0

Alexandrova:

- Making 7th main-draw appearance at Cincinnati and is into 4r for the first time
- Contesting her 44th WTA 1000 main draw of career; her career-best WTA 1000 results are 3 SFs (2022 Madrid, 2024 Miami and 2025 Doha)
- Seeking her 6th career WTA 1000 QF, and 2nd of this year (l. eventual champion Anisimova in 2025 Doha SF)
- 3 of her 5 WTA singles titles have come on hard court: Shenzhen 2020 (d. Rybakina in F); Seoul 2022 (d. Ostapenko in F); and Linz 2025 (d. Yastremska in F)
- Is currently ranked No.16, one spot shy of her career-high ranking of No.15 (achieved in April 2024)

Kalinskaya:

- Making 4th appearance at Cincinnati and is into 4r for the first time
- Contesting her 29th career WTA 1000 main draw; her career-best WTA 1000 result is making the 2024 Dubai final (l. Paolini)
- Owns 21 wins in career over Top 20 players (4-3 in 2025), most recently d. No.8 Anisimova in 3r here
- So far during this year's North American summer hard-court swing, made Washington F (l. Fernandez) and Montreal 3r (l. Svitolina)

[3] Iga Swiatek (POL #3) vs. Sorana Cirstea (ROU #138)

Swiatek leads 4-0

Swiatek:

- Making 7th appearance at Cincinnati, where she has reached SF twice in 2024 (l. eventual champion Sabalenka) and 2023 (l. eventual champion Gauff)
- Cincinnati is one of the two WTA 1000 events Swiatek has appeared without ever reaching the final, along with Canada
- Aiming to reach the 24th WTA 1000 QF of her career, and her 6th of this year
- Has won 10 WTA 1000 titles in her career; her most recent WTA 1000 title came at 2024 Rome
- Owns 15-1 record in 2025 vs. players outside Top 50 (the one loss was to No.140 Eala at Miami)
- Swiatek could become the youngest woman to reach the quarterfinals at the Cincinnati Open for three consecutive years since Simona Halep (2013-2015)

Cirstea:

- Making her 8th main-draw appearance at Cincinnati
- Contesting her 87th career WTA 1000 main draw; her career-best WTA 1000 result is making the final at 2013 Toronto (l. S. Williams in final)
- Seeking her 9th career WTA 1000 QF, and second of the year (made QF at 2025 Dubai as a wild card, l. Muchova)
- Owns 8 career wins over Top 5 players at tour-level events, most recently No.4 Rybakina at 2023 US Open
- Cirstea could become the second woman in the Open Era to make the quarterfinals in Cincinnati after having turned 35, after Venus Williams in 2019

[9] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #10) vs. [6] Madison Keys (USA #6)

Keys leads 3-2

Rybakina:


- Making 6th main-draw appearance at Cincinnati; her best tournament result is reaching the QF in 2022 (l. today's opponent Keys)
- Contesting her 39th career WTA 1000 main draw; she is a 2-time WTA 1000 champion (2023 Indian Wells and 2023 Rome) and has reached 3 additional WTA 1000 finals
- Aiming to reach her 16th career WTA 1000 QF, and 4th of this year
- Owns 21 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.10 Paula Badosa at Dubai 2025
- Has gone 8-2 in this year's North American summer hard-court swing, losing only to the eventual champions in her 2 previous summer hard-court events (l. Fernandez in Washington SF; l. Mboko in Montreal SF)

Keys:

- This is her 11th Cincinnati appearance, the most by any woman from the United States in the Open Era
- She claimed the Cincinnati title in 2019 (d. Kuznetsova in F) – her first and only WTA 1000 title thus far
- Owns five hard-court titles including two this year: Australian Open (her first Grand Slam title) and Adelaide
- Is 5-3 vs. Top 10 players this year; 3 of those Top 10 wins came during her championship run at the Australian Open
- Competing at a ranking of No.6 this week, close to her career high of No.5 achieved for the first time in February of this year

CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan. Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid.
- Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- Rose to career-high No.2 in rankings on August 23, 2021
- In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F)
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10
- Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitová in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3rd run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the 'Sunshine Double' by winning back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F) and Miami (d. Stosur/ Zhang in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Shenzhen in doubles (w/Mertens), going 1-2 in the round-robin stage
- Enjoyed breakthrough season in 2018, lifting two titles, at New Haven (d. Suarez Navarro in F) and Wuhan (d. Kontaveit in F), winning 46 matches and finishing at No.11 in the rankings
- In 2024 posted best career Grand Slam results with R32 at Wimbledon and US Open (at Wimbledon, she beat the defending champion Marketa Vondroušová in the opening round, before falling to the eventual 2024 champion Barbora Krejčíková in R32)
- In 2024, also claimed first WTA 125 title at Antalya.
- In 2023, won one ITF W60 in Rome. Earned a spot at Grand Slam qualifying for the first time at 2023 US Open (l. Babos) and 2023 Roland Garros (l. Ferro).
- Earned first ITF title at Madrid \$15K in 2020 on clay.
- Made professional debut in January 2018 at \$15K ITF/Hammamet 2, Tunisia.

- Also in 2018, was R-Up at Lugano (l. Mertens) and Eastbourne (l. Wozniacki), made SF at Cincinnati, reached five QFs and produced a career-best Grand Slam run to R16 at US Open
- Entered Top 50 on April 16, 2018, after Lugano run, and Top 20 on August 27 of the same year, following New Haven title
- Broke into Top 100 at No.76 on October 16, 2017 after reaching first Tour-level final at Tianjin (l. Sharapova). Also in 2017 made SF at Tashkent (l. Babos) and lifting WTA 125k Series title at Mumbai (d. Jakupovic)
- Made Grand Slam main draw debut 2017 Wimbledon, falling in 2r (as qualifier, d. Khromacheva, l. Witthoeft)
- Fell 1r on main draw debut at 2017 Dubai (as qualifier, l. Ka.Bondarenko)
- WTA qualifying debut came at 2016 Rabat
- Lifted first three ITF Circuit titles in 2015, including a 13-match win streak towards the year's end, bringing back-to-back trophies in Antalya, Turkey
- Made debut on ITF Circuit in Minsk in 2012

- Coached by Anton Dubrov
- Previously coached by Dmitry Tursunov and Didi Kindlmann
- Started playing tennis when she was 6 by an accident when her father Sergey drove by the tennis courts and decided to give it a try
- Has a sweet tooth and considers something sweet as a perfect present; loves her grandmother's cooking, and looks forward to her pancakes when she is away from home
- Has a tiger tattoo on her left arm, which earned her the nickname "The Tiger"
- She spends her time off with family, catching up with friends, or reading; her favorite book is "The Count of Monte Cristo"





- Claimed five titles in 2024, making it a three-peat at Roland-Garros and also winning Doha, Indian Wells, Madrid and Rome. Crossed \$30m in prize money and qualified for her fourth WTA Finals
- Won six titles across 2023, including winning fourth Grand Slam title at Roland-Garros (d. Muchova in F) and going undefeated at the WTA Finals in Cancun (d. Pegula in F). Finished season as WTA World No.1 player for second consecutive year.

CAREER MILESTONES

- Won three titles from five finals in 2024, tasting success at Brisbane, Abu Dhabi and Stuttgart and finishing R-Up at Doha and Miami. Qualified for her second WTA Finals and defeated WTA World No.1 Sabalenka in the group stage
- Reached second Grand Slam final at 2023 Australian Open (l. Sabalenka in 3s); made Top-10 debut following tournament (January 30, 2023). Also in 2023 won first two WTA 1000 title at Indian Wells and Rome and finished R-Up at Miami. Qualified for first WTA Finals, going 1-2 in group stage.
- Lifted maiden major at 2022 Wimbledon (d. Jabeur in F)
- In 2022 also finished R-Up at Adelaide (l. Barty) and Portoroz (l. Siniakova)
- Best result of 2021 were SFs at Eastbourne, Olympics and Chicago [500], and QFs at Abu Dhabi, Roland Garros, San Jose and Ostrava
- Opened 2020 season by reaching the championship match at four of her first five tournaments, including a title run at Hobart (d. Zhang in F)
- Made first final appearance at a Premier-level tournament with R-Up finish at St. Petersburg (l. Bertens); was rewarded with Top 20 debut at No.19 following run in Russia (February 17, 2020)
- First win over a Top-5 ranked opponent came over No.3 Ka.Pliskova during R-Up finish at 2020 Dubai
- Won back-to-back Slam matches for the first time during 3r showing at 2020 Australian Open (l. Barty)
- Won maiden WTA singles title at 2019 Bucharest (d. Tig in F), breaking into Top 100 for the first time in the following week's rankings at No.65 (July 22, 2019)
- Also in 2019, went on to make Top 50 debut on September 16, 2019, after reaching second career final at Nanchang (l. Peterson), produced SF appearances at Luxembourg and 's-Hertogenbosch, and made Grand Slam main draw debut at 2019 Roland Garros, falling 1r (as qualifier, l. Siniakova)
- Finished 2019 campaign with 57-21 win-loss record (across all levels) to end season at No.37, up from 2018's final ranking of No.191. On the ITF Circuit in 2019, lifted silverware on three occasions: back-to-back at \$25k Moscow-RUS and \$25k Kazan-RUS, and at \$60k ITF/Launceston-AUS
- Highlights of 2018 included reaching maiden WTA QF at St. Petersburg (l. Goerges) and clinching title at \$15k ITF/Kazan-RUS
- In 2024, won eighth career title at Strasbourg (d. Collins in F dropping only three games). Reached SF at Madrid (l. eventual champion Swiatek) and Eastbourne (l. Fernandez), and another QF at Rome (l. eventual champion Swiatek). At Grand Slams, reached 4r at Wimbledon (l. Paolini, retired in 3r set due to left thigh injury), made 3r at Roland Garros (l. Navarro) and US Open (l. Mertens).
- In 2023, won seventh career title at Eastbourne (d. Kasatkina in F), reached SF at US Open and reached four QFs including Wimbledon; also qualified for WTA Elite Trophy in Zhuhai (0-2 in group play)
- At 2022 Adelaide, won first title in over two years (d. Riske in F), followed by SF run at Australian Open - best Slam showing since 2018
- Other highlights in 2022 were SF at Cincinnati and two further QF runs, including at Indian Wells
- In Grand Slam play, 2021 season was highlighted by R16 run at Wimbledon (l. Golubic). Finished campaign inside Top 100 for ninth successive year, but outside Top 20 for first time since 2014
- Ended 2020 ranked No.16, with best result being R-Up finish at Brisbane (l. Ka. Pliskova)
- Lifted biggest title of career during 2019 season at WTA 1000 Cincinnati (d. Kuznetsova in F); afterwards returned to Top 10 for first time since week of June 25, 2018
- Also won title at Charleston (d. Wozniacki) and reached QF at 2019 Roland Garros (l. Barty), one of three Americans to make last eight (also Anisimova and Stephens) - the first time since 2004 (Capriati, S.Williams and V.Williams) Reached three SFs in 2018 at Charleston, Roland Garros and US Open
- Reached first Grand Slam final in 2017 at US Open, losing to Sloane Stephens in 10th all-American final in the Open Era. At 22, became the youngest Flushing Meadows finalist since 19-year-old Caroline Wozniacki lost to Kim Clijsters in 2009 Also in 2017, won third WTA title at Stanford (d. Vandeweghe)
- Enjoyed first Top-10 year-end finish in 2016 (at No.8), was youngest player in Top 20; won second title at Birmingham (d. Strycova) and reached final at Rome (l. S.Williams) and Montreal (l. Halep)
- Broke into Top 10 on June 20 as first American to make Top-10 debut since S.Williams in 1999
- Made WTA Finals debut at Singapore in 2016, going 1-2 in round-robin play

- First Top 10 win came over No.7 Garcia at 2018 St. Petersburg
- Made WTA qualifying and main draw debut at 2017 Moscow (as qualifier, l. Begu in 1r)
- Professional debut came at \$10k ITF/Antalya-TUR in 2014

- Represented USA at 2016 Rio Olympics, reaching SF (l. Bronze medal match to Petra Kvitova)
- Qualified for WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai in 2015, 2018-19; went 1-1 in round-robin stage on all three appearances, with best result SF run in 2018 (withdrew before match vs. Muguruza w/left knee injury)
- Advanced to maiden major SF at 2015 Australian Open (l. eventual champion S.Williams); broke into Top 20 following conclusion of tournament, on February 2
- Also in 2015, reached second career title at Charleston (l. Kerber) and reached QF at Wimbledon
- Won first career title at 2014 Eastbourne (d. No.9 Kerber in F); was second-youngest player to win a WTA title in 2014, (after Vekic at Kuala Lumpur); also, youngest American to win a title since Vania King in October 2006 (17y 254d at Bangkok)
- Broke into Top 100 at beginning of 2013 season and finished the year No.39; highlights were SF at Osaka, QFs at Sydney, Charleston and Birmingham and 3r at Australian Open and Wimbledon
- Earned first Top 20 win over No.17 Lucie Safarova while ranked No.135 at 2013 Sydney; then earned first Top 10 win over No.5 Na Li as LL at Madrid
- In 2012, reached 2r at Miami and played main draw at Australian Open, Memphis and Cincinnati; also won two titles on ITF circuit
- Earned first Grand Slam win at 2011 US Open (d. Craybas, l. Safarova in 2r), also played main draw at Miami and contested qualifying at Indian Wells
- Won first title on ITF circuit at 2010 \$10k/ITF Cleveland, OH, USA; also contested qualifying at US Open in 2010 Member of USA's Billie Jean King Cup team in 2014, 2016, 2018-19, 2022
- Made professional debut in 2009 and Tour-level debut at 2009 Ponte Vedra Beach (as WC, d. Kudryavtseva, l. No.10 Nadia Petrova); was seventh youngest player to win a WTA main draw match at 14y 48d and youngest since Hingis in 1994
