[4] Mirra Andreeva (#5) vs. [WC] Zhu Lin (CHN #253)

First meeting

Andreeva:

- Making 3rd appearance at Beijing, where her previous and tournament-best result was reaching QF in 2024 (I. Zheng Qinwen); also made 2023 R16 as a qualifier (I. Rybakina)
- Won her first two WTA 1000 titles earlier this season at Dubai and Indian Wells at Dubai, she became
 the youngest player to win a WTA 1000 title since the format introduction in 2009
- Has won 38 tour-level matches so far this season but is 0-2 this year vs. players ranked outside the Top 100 (I. Boisson in Roland Garros QF; I. Townsend in US Open 3r)
- Currently ranked at a career-high World No.5; this time last year was ranked No.22

Zhu:

- Making 4th main-draw appearance at Beijing; she reached the R32 in her 2014 tournament debut (I. No.2 seed Halep)
- Posted her career-best showing at a WTA 1000 event earlier this year, making the Montreal R16 in July
- Her Ir win over Uchijima this week was her first tour-level victory since her Montreal run
- Holds a 2-10 career record vs. Top 10 players; her Top 10 wins were over No.7 Caroline Garcia at Cleveland 2023 and No.6 Maria Sakkari at Australian Open 2023

[1] Iga Swiatek (POL #2) vs. [WC] Yuan Yue (CHN #110)

First meeting

Swiatek:

- Making her 2nd Beijing appearance after claiming the title here in 2023 (d. Samsonova in F); currently holds a 6-0 career win-loss record at the China Open
- This will be her 150th WTA 1000 match since 2009, only Serena Williams (131) has claimed more wins than Swiatek (121) from that opening span of matches
- Looking to win 30 consecutive opening matches at WTA 1000 events
- Victory today would be her 25th WTA 1000 match-win of 2025, surpassing Sabalenka (24) for the most of any player this season
- Owns 11 WTA 1000 titles, most recently Cincinnati last month (d. Paolini in F)
- Has won 57 matches so far this season and now ranks No.1 on Tour for match-wins in 2025, overtaking Sabalenka (56)





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Yuan:

- Making her 3rd main-draw appearance at Beijing
- One of four wild cards to reach 2r along with Zhu Lin, Wang Xiyu and Zhang Shuai
- Has a 1-9 career record vs. Top 10 players; her Top 10 win came over No.8 Zheng Qinwen en route to the 2024 Indian Wells QF – which is also her career-best result at a WTA 1000 event
- Looking to become the second Chinese player to defeat the top seed at the China Open after Zhang Shuai defeated Dinara Safina in 2009
- Career-best result on hard court is winning the WTA 250 Austin title last year

[LL] Emiliana Arango (COL #50) vs. [7] Zheng Qinwen (CHN #9)

Zheng leads 2-0

Arango:

- Making her China Open debut
- Looking for her first Top 10 win of career; is currently 0-5 against Top 10 opponents
- Since 2009, could become the third lucky loser to defeat a Top 10 opponent at a WTA 1000 event after Madison Keys (Madrid 2013, d. Li Na) and Beatriz Haddad Maia (Indian Wells 2021, d. Ka. Pliskova)
- Since 2000, could become the third Colombian to claim a Top 10 win after Fabiola Zuluaga and Camila Osorio
- Competing at a career-high ranking of No.50, having reached two WTA 500 finals this year at Guadalajara (I. Jovic in F) and Merida (I. Navarro in F)
- Career-best WTA 1000 result is QF at 2023 Guadalajara (I. eventual champion Sakkari), which was also her first WTA 1000 main-draw appearance

Zheng:

- Making her 3rd appearance at Beijing, where her best result was semifinal in 2024 (I. Muchova)
- Playing in her first tournament since Wimbledon 2025 after undergoing right elbow surgery
- Owns 40 WTA 1000 match wins; among Chinese players, she has the fifth-most wins in Tier 1/WTA 1000 events since 1990, after Li Na (108), Peng Shuai (78), Zheng Jie (48) and Zhang Shuai (45)
- Has won 19 matches so far in 2025, with a hard court record of 7-5; her last hard-court match-win was at Miami in March
- Is one of the five players from China to have made the semifinals in Beijing, along with Wang Qiang, Li
 Na, Zheng Jie and Peng Shuai
- Her career-best WTA 1000 result is finishing runner-up at 2024 Wuhan (I. Sabalenka in F)





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Ajla Tomljanovic (AUS #94) vs. [5] Jessica Pegula (USA #7)

Pegula leads 3-2

Tomljanovic:

- Making 3rd main-draw appearance at Beijing, where her previous best result was reaching R32 in 2019
 (I. Riske-Amritraj)
- Career-best WTA 1000 performance is reaching the 2022 Cincinnati QF (I. eventual finalist Kvitova)
- Owns 6 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently over No.4 Paula Badosa at Cincinnati 2022; has gone 0-9 vs. Top 10 players since then (0-4 in 2025)
- One of 4 Australians in the 2r (also Joint, Kasatkina and Hon) last time 4 players from Australia reached 2r at Beijing was 2017

Pegula:

- Making 4th appearance at Beijing, where she has reached R16 twice, in 2024 (I. Badosa) and in 2023 (I. Ostapenko)
- After losing their first two meetings (both prior to 2012), Pegula has won her last 3 matches vs.
 Tomljanovic (all in the last two seasons, most recently at 2025 Charleston)
- Has won 3 singles titles in 2025, at Austin (hard court), Charleston (clay), and Bad Homburg (grass)
- She is a 3-time WTA 1000 champion, winning those titles at 2022 Guadalajara, 2023 Montreal and 2024
 Toronto
- Her best WTA 1000 result this season is a runner-up finish at Miami (I. Sabalenka in F)

[12] Naomi Osaka (JPN #14) vs. [Q] Aliaksandra Sasnovich (#130)

Osaka leads 4-0

Osaka:

- Making 5th main-draw appearance at Beijing, where her best result was her championship run in 2019
 (d. top seed Ashleigh Barty in F)
- Reached 4r in Beijing last year, where she retired due to injury against eventual champion Coco Gauff
- Holds a 4-0 career Tour-level record in meetings against Aliaksandra Sasnovich (3-0 on hard court),
 with her most recent victory coming at Cincinnati in 2019
- Owns seven career Tour-level titles (all on hard court), including two at the WTA 1000 level (Beijing in 2019 and Indian Wells in 2018)
- Has won 27 Tour-level matches so far in 2025 (her most in a calendar year since winning 40 in 2019)

Sasnovich:

- Making 3rd main-draw appearance at Beijing; she also reached 2r in 2018 (I. Ka. Pliskova)
- Has beaten Janice Tjen so far this week, her first win at a WTA 1000 event since her 3r run at Rome in 2024
- Owns 22 wins in her career over Top 20 players and is seeking her first such victory since defeating No.18 Ekaterina Alexandrova at Rome in 2024
- Looking to win consecutive Tour-level matches for the second time this year, after winning three straight to advance to the SF at Cluj-Napoca (I. eventual champion Anastasia Potapova)
- Five of her six Tour-level wins in 2025 have come on hard court





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[30] Emma Raducanu (GBR #32) vs. [Q] Cristina Bucsa (ESP #67)

Tied 1-1

Raducanu:

- Making her Beijing tournament debut
- Holds a 13-3 record this year vs. players ranked outside the Top 50
- Her best showing at a WTA 1000 event is making the 2025 Miami QF (I. eventual finalist Pegula)
- Career-best result on hard court is her run to the 2021 US Open title, where she became the first qualifier in the Open Era to win a Grand Slam title (d. Fernandez in F)
- Her best 2025 finish thus far also came on hard court, reaching the Washington D.C. semifinals
- So far in this year's Asian swing, made Seoul 2r last week (d. Cristian; l. Krejcikova after holding 3 match points)

Bucsa:

- Making 2nd main-draw appearance at Beijing; she reached the R16 last year (l. eventual finalist Muchova)
- R16 finish here last year also is her career-best result at a WTA 1000 event
- After qualifying, Bucsa defeated Donna Vekic in 1r, which was her first main-draw win since she reached her first career Grand Slam R16 at 2025 US Open (I. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- One of 3 players from Spain in this week's main draw, and they all advanced to the 2r (also Bouzas Maneiro and Badosa)
- Best result by Spain at Beijing was Garbiñe Muguruza's run to the title in 2015

- Reached first two WTA finals of career in 2024 winning the title at Iasi and finishing runner-up at Ningbo
- Made first Grand Slam semifinal at 2024 Roland Garros beating World No.2 Aryna Sabalenka in the quarterfinals
- Made Top 20 debut on October 8, 2024 finishing the year at World No.16. Also won 2024 Paris Olympic silver medal in women s doubles with Diana Shnaider
- Opened 2023 season in April by winning 13
 matches straight to claim back-to-back ITF
 titles in Switzerland; as WC, advanced to R16 at
 Madrid with wins over Fernandez, Haddad Maia
 and Linette (l. Sabalenka); subsequently made
 debut at Roland Garros (as qualifier, l. Gauff in
 3r), Wimbledon (as qualifier, l. Keys in R16) and
 US Open (l. eventual champion Gauff in 2r)
- Also in 2023 reached R16 at Beijing (l. Rybakina), leading to Top 50 debut (started season just inside Top 300); voted WTA Newcomer of the Year
- In 2022, posted 39-9 win-loss record on ITF Circuit, winning first four titles at this level
- Fell 1r on WTA main-draw debut at 2022 Monastir (as WC, l. Potapova)
- Made professional debut at W15 ITF Circuit event at Sharm El-Sheikh in February 2022
- Owns six ITF Circuit singles titles
- As a junior, finished R-Up at 2023 Australian Open (l. Korneeva)

- In 2024 reached Hua Hin final for a second consecutive year (l. Shnaider in final) and posted her best Wimbledon result with 3r (l. Sun) before ending her season in July
- Earned maiden singles title in Hua Hin (d.
 Tsurenko), the same day achieving runner-up in
 doubles (w/Wang Xinyu). A strong 2023 season,
 also achieving runner-up at Osaka (l. Krueger) as
 well as semifinals at Monterrey (l. Vekic),
 Birmingham (l. Krejcikova), Cleveland (l.
 Alexandrova) and Zhuhai Elite Trophy as a wild
 card (l. Zheng).
 - In 2022, reached QF at Seoul (l. Maria) and 2r at four other WTA tournaments. Also won 13th, 14th and 15th career titles on ITF Circuit, including at W100 event in Landisville, PA
- Won biggest career title at end of 2021, at WTA 125K Series event at Seoul. Also in 2021 reached 2r at Australian Open and Wimbledon (l. Mertens at both tournaments)
- Ended 2020 ranked at No.91 for her second successive Top 100 finish, recording career-high ranking of No.69 on February 17. Season highlight was QF run at Acapulco
- Played primarily on the ITF Circuit in 2019, winning three titles and finishing runner-up at three further tournaments. First broke into Top 100 on February 25 and finished the season at No.83
- Won first Grand Slam main draw match of career at 2019 US Open, defeating compatriot Wang Xinyu in 1r before falling to Keys
- Lifted first WTA doubles title at 2019 Nanchang (w/Wang Xinyu)
- Highlight of 2018 season was second career WTA SF at Nanchang (l. Zheng). At tour level, also made 2r at Hiroshima (l. Tomljanovic) and fell 1r on four occasions (including Australian Open)
- Won two ITF Circuit titles in 2018, at \$60k Luan-CHN and \$60k Jinan-CHN
- Prior to 2018, best results on tour were SF at Kuala Lumpur in 2016 (l. Svitolina) and QF runs at Taipei City, Nanchang and Tianjin in 2017
- Notched first Top-20 win of career over No.17 Kvitova at 2017 Tianjin
- Won doubles title at WTA 125K Series event at Zhengzhou in 2017 (w/Han)
- Member of Chinese Bille Jean King Cup Team, 2017-18, 2022
- Was selected to participate in the 2015 WTA Rising Stars Invitational in Singapore
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2014 Hong Kong as qualifier, l. Cepelova in 2r

- Winner of 15 singles and six doubles titles on ITF Circuit
- Played first events of career on ITF Circuit in China in 2009


