[25] Leylah Fernandez (CAN #25) vs. [2] Coco Gauff (USA #3)

Gauff leads 2-0

Fernandez:

- In her second Beijing main-draw appearance, achieved her first tournament match-win this week, after falling in her opening match in 2024 (I. Stearns)
- Has earned 7 Top 10 wins at Hologic WTA Tour events in her career, most recently over No.4 Pegula en route to this summer's Washington D.C. title (d. Kalinskaya in final)
- All of her 4 career WTA singles titles have come on hard court: along with Washington this year, she
 has hoisted trophies at 2021 Monterrey, 2022 Monterrey and 2023 Hong Kong
- Only player from Canada to reach 3r this week after Mboko (2r) and Andreescu (1r) were defeated
- Aiming to become the first Canadian woman to reach the Beijing R16 since Bianca Andreescu in 2019

Gauff:

- Making 3rd appearance at Beijing, where she is defending champion (d. Muchova in last year's final)
- Also made Beijing SF in 2023 (I. eventual champion Swiatek); she holds an 11-1 record in Beijing overall
- Is 3-1 against players from Canada in 2025, with her only loss to Mboko at Montreal; she has defeated Fernandez twice this season at United Cup and Australian Open
- She is a 2-time WTA 1000 champion, winning the title at 2023 Cincinnati as well as here last year (d. Muchova in both finals)
- 8 of her 10 career WTA singles titles have come on hard court; her most recent hard-court title is the 2024 WTA Finals
- Since 2021, only Zheng Qinwen (16) and Katerina Siniakova (15) have registered more wins on Chinese soil than Coco Gauff (14) at Tour level
- Currently leads tour in percentage of return games won (46.0%) and return points won (48.8%)

[6] Jasmine Paolini (ITA #8) vs. [27] Sofia Kenin (USA #26)

Kenin leads 3-0

Paolini:

- Appearing at Beijing for a third time, having posted her best result in 2023 with R16 (I. Sabalenka)
- She is a 2-time WTA 1000 champion, winning titles at 2024 Dubai and 2025 Rome
- Only Iga Swiatek and Aryna Sabalenka (24 each prior to start of 2025 China Open) have registered more WTA 1000 match-wins than Paolini (21) in 2025
- Paolini is the first Italian to register 20+ wins at Tier 1/WTA 1000 events in a single season since the format introduction in 2009
- Last week, she defeated three Top 50 players to help Team Italy claim their second straight Billie Jean King Cup title (Paolini picked up wins over No.7 Pegula, No.34 Wang Xinyu and No.13 Svitolina)



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Kenin:

- Making 4th main-draw appearance at Bejing, where her best previous result is R16 in 2019 (I. Svitolina)
- Is 1-6 against Top 10 players so far this season, with her one win against No.4 Paolini at Dubai
- Has posted 13 Top 10 wins overall during her career, including a SF victory over then-World No.1 Ashleigh Barty en route to her Grand Slam title at the 2020 Australian Open (d. Muguruza in F)
- Owns four hard court titles: Lyon, Australian Open in 2020; Guangzhou, Hobart in 2019
- Has an 8-1 career record against players from Italy, with her only loss to Cocciaretto at 2023 Hobart
- Trying to claim consecutive main-draw wins for the first time since 2025 Roland Garros

[WC] Zhang Shuai (CHN #112) vs. [3] Amanda Anisimova (USA #4)

Anisimova leads 1-0

Zhang:

- Making her 14th main-draw appearance at Beijing; she has reached three QFs here in 2016, 2018 and last year (I. Badosa in 2024)
- Owns nine career wins over Top 10 players, most recently No.8 Emma Navarro here at Beijing last year
- Record against players from USA in 2025 stands at 1-1 in main-draw matches (d. Kessler at Australian Open, I. Gauff at United Cup)
- Her 2025 United Cup loss to No.3 Gauff is her only other Top 10 meeting of the season so far
- All of her 3 WTA singles titles have come on hard court: Lyon in 2022; Guangzhou in 2013 and 2017
- Seeking her 8th career R16 appearance at a WTA 1000 event; 5 of her previous 7 have come in her home country of China (Beijing 2009, 2016, 2018 and 2024; Wuhan 2018)

Anisimova:

- Making 3rd main-draw appearance at Beijing, where her best previous result was reaching 4r last year (I. Zheng Qinwen)
- Won the first WTA 1000 title of her career earlier this year at Doha (d. Ostapenko in final)
- Has won 38 Tour-level matches so far in 2025, with a record on hard court of 20-8; this is the first single season that she has earned 20 hard-court wins on tour
- Her 2r victory this week marked her 11th WTA 1000 match-win this year, surpassing the most she achieved in any previous season (10 in 2022)
- Seeking her 12th career R16 at a WTA 1000 event, and her fourth this year after Doha (won title), Miami (R16) and Montreal (R16)
- Currently playing at a career-high ranking of World No.4; this time last year was ranked No.43



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[8] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #10) vs. Eva Lys (GER #66)

Rybakina leads 1-0

Rybakina:

- Making 2nd appearance at Beijing, where her previous result was reaching SF in 2023 (I. Samsonova)
- She has won 2 WTA 1000 titles in her career, at 2023 Indian Wells and 2023 Rome
- 4 of her 9 career WTA singles titles have come on hard court (2020 Hobart, 2023 Indian Wells, 2024 Brisbane, and 2024 Abu Dhabi)
- This year's ace leader on tour (386); also leads tour in percentage of service games won (81.7%)
- Is 21-5 this year against players ranked outside the Top 50 at Hologic WTA Tour-level events
- Has won 43 Hologic WTA Tour-level matches so far in 2025, trailing only Iga Swiatek and Aryna Sabalenka in tour-level match-wins this year (tied with Jessica Pegula)

Lys:

- Making her 2nd appearance at Beijing; she previously contested 1r in 2023 as a qualifier (I. Ostapenko)
- Aiming to reach the R16 at a WTA 1000 event for the first time in her career
- Looking for her first career win over a Top 10 player (currently 0-8 vs. Top 10 players, with 7 of those matches having taken place this season)
- Only player from Germany to reach this week's 3r (Seidel lost 2r; Maria and Siegemund lost 1r)
- With a win, she would become the first German woman to reach Beijing R16 since Angelique Kerber and Julia Goerges in 2018

[13] Karolina Muchova (CZE #15) vs. [18] Paula Badosa (ESP #18)

Badosa leads 2-1

Muchova:

- Making her 3rd appearance at Beijing, where her previous and best result was reaching the final last year (I. Gauff)
- She is a 2-time finalist at WTA 1000 events, having also finished runner-up at 2023 Cincinnati (I. Gauff in that final as well)
- Looking for her 30th win in career over a Top 20 player with a victory over Badosa today
- Her one WTA singles title has come on hard court: 2019 Seoul
- One of 4 Czech women to reach this week's 3r (also Noskova, Bouzkova and Krejcikova)

Badosa:

- Making her 2nd main-draw appearance at Beijing, where her previous result was reaching last year's semifinal (I. eventual champion Gauff)
- Her career-best performance at a WTA 1000 event was her run to the title at 2021 Indian Wells (d. Azarenka in F)
- Owns 30 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.9 Emma Navarro at Berlin 2025
- 3 of her 4 career WTA singles titles have come on hard court: Washington DC in 2024; Sydney in 2022;
 Indian Wells in 2021
- Best result by a Spanish woman at Beijing was Garbiñe Muguruza's title win in 2015

- Has won 22 tour-level matches so far in 2025; since Wimbledon has gone 9-4 on hard courts

- Is 3-1 against players from Canada in 2025 with only loss against Mboko at Montreal; she has defeated Fernandez twice this season at United Cup & Australian Open

- During last year's Asian swing won titles at WTA Finals and Beijing, and reached SF at Wuhan
- She is a 2-time WTA 1000 champion, winning titles at 2023 Cincinnati and 2024 Beijing (d. Muchova in both finals)

CAREER MILESTONES

- 2024 season highlights were reaching first final on grass finishing R-Up at Eastbourne (l. Kasatkina) and as part of title defence made SF at Hong Kong. Also reached final of Cincinnati in doubles w/ Putintseva
- In 2023, earned third career title at Hong Kong (d. Siniakova). Prevented from a consecutive title run by Siniakova who defeated her in Nanchang SF. Other notable results where quarterfinals at Guadalajara (l. Kenin), Cleveland (l. Maria) and Auckland (l. Bonaventure). Also defeated Paolini at Billie Jean King Cup Finals to lift title with Canada.
- Broke into the Top 20 in doubles in 2023, after reaching final at Roland Garros, Miami (both w/Townsend) and Auckland (w/Mattek-Sands) as well as QF at US Open (w/Townsend).
 - In 2022 won her second title at Monterrey (d. Osorio in F; saved 5MP), and reached the QF at Roland Garros (l. Trevisan); missed grass-court season due to grade three stress fracture in her right foot suffered during match vs. Trevisan in Paris
- Enjoyed a memorable 2021 campaign, lifting first career title in Monterrey and advancing to maiden Grand Slam final, at US Open (l. Raducanu)
- En route to the final at Flushing Meadows in 2021, upset defending champion and No. 3 Osaka in 3r, 2016 winner Kerber in R16, No.5 Svitolina in QF and No. 2 Sabalenka in SF, becoming the youngest woman to beat multiple Top-5 opponents at the same major since S. Williams at 1999 US Open
- Breakout year in 2020 saw her crack Top 100 for the first time on September 14 and finish campaign by reaching 3r at Roland Garros
- Earned first career Grand Slam win at 2020 US Open (d. Zvonareva, l. Kenin in 2r) and made Grand Slam debut at 2020 Australian Open as qualifier (l. Davis in 1r)
- Reached first career WTA final and notched first tour-level back-to-back wins at 2020 Acapulco as qualifier (l. Watson in F); at 17y, 177d, she was the youngest Canadian to reach a WTA singles final in 34 years (since Helen Kelesi at 1986 Tokyo [Japan Open] won at 16y, 338d)
- Also in 2020, earned first Top-100 win over No.5 Bencic in Billie Jean King Cup
- Owns one singles title and two doubles titles on ITF Circuit
- Won 2019 Roland Garros junior's title (d. Navarro) becoming first Canadian to win a junior

- Went three for three in finals in 2024, winning Auckland, Beijing and a historic first WTA Finals Riyadh title. Success in Saudi Arabia saw her win a record \$4.8m in prize money, the most ever awarded in women sprofessional sports, and defeat the World No.1 and No.2 at the same event. Posted a new career-high of No.2 in June
- Won debut Grand Slam singles crown in 2023
 lifting title on home soil at US Open (d.
 Sabalenka in F). Picked up another three titles
 in 2023, marking first WTA 1000 title at
 Cincinnati and debut WTA 500 title at
 Washington DC, in addition to WTA 250
 Auckland. In doubles was co-ranked No.1 with
 Pegula after US Open.
- In 2022, reached maiden Grand Slam final at Roland-Garros (l. Swiatek); was the youngest major finalist since Sharapova won 2004 Wimbledon
- Made Top-10 debut on September 12, 2022, following QF run at US Open (l. Garcia)
- Highlight of 2021 campaign was completing singles-doubles title sweep at Parma; defeated Q.Wang in singles final and teamed up w/McNally to win doubles
- In 2021 also reached SF at Adelaide and Rome, while at the Slams made QF at Roland-Garros and R16 at Wimbledon
- Finished R-Up in doubles at 2021 US Open (w/McNally, l. Stosur/Zhang)
- First cracked the Top 50 on February 24, 2020 at No.49, following a R16 appearance at Australian Open to tie her career best Grand Slam result during run, defeated V.Williams in 1r and her first Top-5 opponent in No.4 Osaka in 3r (l. eventual champion Kenin in 3s)
- Enjoyed breakout season in 2019, highlighted by maiden WTA singles title at Linz (as lucky loser, d. Ostapenko in F) - earned her first Top-10 win en route to title over No.8 Bertens in QF
- At 15y 214d, her title run in Linz made her youngest to win a WTA tour-level title since Vaidisova (15y 177d) won Tashkent in 2004
- Also claimed maiden WTA doubles titles at Washington, DC (w/McNally, d. Sanchez/Stollar in F) and Luxembourg (w/McNally, d. Christian/Guarachi in F)
- By winning the doubles title at Washington, DC at 15y 144d, became the youngest player to win a doubles title since May 1995 (Hingis won Hamburg at 14y 219d)
- Reached R16 at 2019 Wimbledon on Grand Slam main draw debut defeating V.Williams in 1r (l.

- Grand Slam since Bouchard in 2012
- Played first WTA main draw and earned first main draw win of career at 2018 Quebec City defeating countrywoman Dabrowski in 1r (l. Watson in 2r)
- Member of Canadian Billie Jean King Cup Team 2019, 2021-22
- Made professional debut on ITF Circuit in USA in 2016
- eventual champion Halep) followed with 3r showing at US Open (as WC, l. Osaka)
- Made WTA main draw debut as a wildcard at 2019 Miami where she earned her first WTA main draw win over good friend McNally (l. Kasatkina in 2r)
- Made professional debut in May 2018 as a qualifier into the \$25K ITF/Osprey, FL-USA
- Member of US Billie Jean King Cup team in 2022
- Former Junior World No.1 (July 2018); won 2018
 Roland-Garros girls' title (d. McNally in F) and
 2018 US Open doubles title (w/McNally), while
