MATCH NOTES – DAY 2 – WEDNESDAY, APRIL 23

Katie Volynets (USA #70) vs. Petra Kvitova (CZE #946)

First meeting

First meeting

Volynets:

- Looking to win her first main draw match here having fallen in qualifying last year and 1r in 2023
- Coming off a 2r effort on the green clay of Charleston (I. Krueger)
- Clay court results last year included winning a WTA 125 title at Makarska in Croatia and reached 2r at both Rome and Roland Garros as a qualifier
- Posted best year-end ranking in 2024, finishing at No.62 having risen as high as No.56

Kvitova:

- Three-time Madrid champion returning to event for first time since becoming a mother in July 2024
- Former World No.2 owns more titles and match wins (32) here than any other player
- Only Serena Williams (13) and Azarenka (10) have won more WTA 1000 titles than Kvitova's career haul of nine
- Looking for her first win since returning to competitive play at Austin in February; Madrid is the fourth tournament of her comeback

Suzan Lamens (NED #73) vs. Emma Raducanu (GBR #49)

Lamens:

- Making her Madrid debut
- Owns four career wins against Top 50 players with three of those achieved this season; No.33 Noskova at Rouen, No.50 Bouzkova at Indian Wells and No.25 Frech at Brisbane
- Best career result on clay was achieved last week with semifinal at Rouen (I. Danilovic); also her best result so far this year
- First time facing a player from United Kingdom in a main draw Tour level match

Raducanu:

- Making her third Madrid appearance and posted her best result in 2022 with 3r (I. Kalinina)
- Made her best clay court results at Stuttgart by reaching quarterfinal in 2022 and 2024
- Her 2022 R16 run at Madrid was the best result by a player from the United Kingdom shared with Laura Robson who made R16 in 2013
- Has a 1-2 match record against players ranked outside the Top 50 so far in 2025 with the one win against No.188 Ishii at Miami
- First time facing a player from the Netherlands in a main draw Tour level match



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Belinda Bencic (SUI #42) vs. [Q] Zeynep Sonmez (TUR #77)

First meeting

Bencic:

- Best result at Madrid came during a 2019 semifinal run
- Has won one tournament on clay Charleston 2022, where she defeated Ons Jabeur in the final
- Has not lost to a qualifier since falling to Aliaksandra Sasnovich at San Diego 2023
- Owns two singles titles at WTA 1000 events (Toronto 2015 and Dubai 2019)
- Seeking first win on clay in over two years (defeated Jessica Pegula in the SF at Charleston 2023)

Sonmez:

- Making main draw debut in singles
- Is seeking first Tour-level main draw win on clay courts; previously fell in R32 at Prague 2024 and Hamburg 2023
- Owns three wins in her career over Top 50 players: No.30 Maria Sakkari at Merida 2025, No.24 Magdalena Frech at Tokyo 2024, and No.27 Dayana Yastremska at Berlin 2024
- Defeated Lepchenko and Romero Gormaz both in straight sets to advance through qualifying

Victoria Azarenka (#48) vs. Olga Danilovic (SRB #34)

Azarenka:

- Making 14th appearance at Madrid, where she was a two-time finalist in 2011 (I. Kvitova) and 2012 (I. S. Williams)
- Owns 9 singles titles at WTA 1000 events, most recently the sunshine double at Indian Wells and Miami in 2016
- Is looking for her first Top 50 win of the season, having failed in all her previous five meetings against such opponents in 2025
- Record in opening round matches at Madrid stands at 10-2, with the only two losses coming in 2023 and 2010
- Owns one singles title on clay at Marbella 2011

Danilovic:

- Making second main-draw appearance at Madrid (5th overall), where her previous result was reaching 2r in 2024 (as qualifier, I. Collins), which is also her best result at a WTA 1000 event
- Finishing as R-Up at Rouen (I. Svitolina in F) and including her Antalya 125 (#2) win, Danilovic now has 9-1 record on clay so far this season
- Begins Madrid at a career high ranking of No.34 achieved on April 21, 2025
- Owns two wins against Top 50 opponents in 2025, defeating No.21 Liudmila Samsonova and No.6 Jessica Pegula at the Australian Open
- Owns one singles title on clay at Moscow International 2018

McCartney Kessler (USA #43) vs. Bianca Andreescu (CAN #132)

Kessler:

- Making her debut appearance at Madrid
- Currently ranked No.43, one spot off her career-high of No.42
- Holds a 17-9 record in 2025; looking for her 18th win of the season
- Is seeking first career win on clay; her best result on the surface is a Round of 32 exit at Rouen 2025 (fell to F. Ferro)



Andreescu:

- Making her third appearance at Madrid, where her best result was reaching r16 in 2022 (I. Pegula)

- Best career result on clay is Quarterfinalist which she has reached twice: Rome in 2022 and Strasbourg in 2021
- Best result by a Canadian player at Madrid was the Quarterfinalist run by Eugenie Bouchard in 2017
- Looking for her first win of the 2025 season

PLAYER NOTES

- Making second appearance at Madrid, where her previous result was a 1r exit in 2023
- Heading into today's match against Kvitova, owns 0-4 career record against players from Czech Republic
- At Tour level, best career result on clay is reaching 2r at Charleston in 2024 and 2025
- One of 14 players from the USA in the starting line-up this week (not including qualifiers)
- Serena Williams remains the only American to win the Madrid title, in 2012 and 2013
- Is currently ranked No.70; this time last year was ranked No.105
- During last year's European clay swing, on the main Tour fell in qualifying here at Madrid and reached 2r at Rome (as qualifier, l. Sabalenka) and Roland Garros (as qualifier, l. Vondrousova)
- Also in 2024, enjoyed good clay results at WTA 125 level - notably reaching QF at St Malo, France and winning title at Makarksa, Croatia (d. Sherif in F)
- Has been involved in seven three-set matches in 2025

PLAYER NOTES

- Making 14th appearance at Madrid, where she is a three-time champion (2011, 2015, 2018)
- Has entered 2025 event using special ranking of No.14, after giving birth to son, Petr, in July 2024
- Owns more match wins than any other player at Madrid (32-10 record) and is still the youngest champion here (was 21y 58 days old when she won in 2011)
- Including her three Madrid titles has won nine events at WTA 1000 level, most recently at 2023 Miami - only S.Williams (13) and Azarenka (10) have won more since the category was introduced in 2009
- Playing event for first time since 2023 (l. Niemeier in 2r)
- On return from maternity leave, looking for first match win of 2025 against No.70 Volynets today
- Owns 58-32 career record against players from United States of America, with record in 2025 standing at 0-1 (l. Kenin in 1r at Miami)
- Has won five titles on clay overall, lifting trophies at 2018 Prague and 2019 Stuttgart, in addition to her three Madrid crowns
- One of five players from Czech Republic with direct entry into the Madrid main draw this year
- Is currently ranked No.946; this time last year was ranked No.59
- Longest winning streak of her career was 13 matches in 2018, which included her title run at Madrid
- Has been involved in two three-set matches in 2025, falling to Burrage on her comeback at Austin and Gracheva at Indian Wells

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2024 claimed her first WTA 125 title at Makarska (d. Sherif in F). Also made QF at WTA 250 Hua Hin (l. Wang Yafan), 3r at WTA 1000 Beijing (l. Osaka) and achieved a career high ranking of No.56 in July
- Opened 2023 with two breakthrough performances, posting her best Grand Slam result with 3r at Australian Open (as qualifier, l. Zhang) and maiden WTA SF at Austin (l. Gracheva). Results took her ranking into Top 100 for first time
- Performed well on clay in 2022, lifting a title at W100 event in Palm Harbor, Florida and compiling 11-3 win-loss record at a series of ITF Circuit events before making 2r at Roland Garros (l. Rybakina)
- Won first ITF Circuit title in 2021, at W100 Bonita Springs, FL, USA
- Fell 1r on Grand Slam debut at 2019 US Open (l. eventual champion Andreescu)
- Ended 2018 ranked No.743 after posting 21-5 record from five tour outings
- Best results in 2018 came in October and November when she came through qualifying to reach SFs at \$25k ITF/Florence-SC, USA and \$25k ITF/Norman-OK, USA
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2019 San Jose
- As a junior, contested three of the four majors and reached No.21 in the rankings

- After 2023 Beijing took 17 months maternity leave giving birth to son, Petr, in July 2024. Returned to the courts at 2025 Austin
- In 2023, won 30th and 31st titles at Miami (d. Rybakina in F) and Berlin (d. Vekic in F) and reached QF at Adelaide 2, Indian Wells and Ningbo
- Won title at 2022 Eastbourne (d. Ostapenko in F) and finished R-Up later that summer at Cincinnati (l. Garcia)
- Best result in 2021 was title run at Doha (d. Muguruza in F). Also made SFs at Bad Homburg and Ostrava, and QFs at Stuttgart, Madrid and Cincinnati
- Reached one final in 2020 at Doha (l. Sabalenka)
- Reached title match at 2019 Australian Open for third career Grand Slam final appearance result moved her to World No.2, matching her career high ranking. Had she beaten Osaka in final, would have claimed World No.1 ranking
- Also in 2019, won title at Sydney and Stuttgart and qualified for WTA Finals in Shenzhen for seventh time (went 0-3 in group play)
- Won a WTA-leading five titles in 2018, at St. Petersburg (d. Mladenovic in F), Doha (d. Muguruza in F), Prague (d. Buzarnescu in F), Madrid (d. Bertens in F) and Birmingham (d. Rybarikova in F); qualified for WTA Finals going 0-3 in group play
- Titles in 2018 came on all three surfaces first player to win a title on three difference surfaces in a season since S.Williams in 2015
- Began 2017 season in May at Roland Garros (2r, l. Mattek-Sands) after a knife attack in her home in Czech Republic on December 20, 2016; required extensive surgery to left hand. Won title at 2017 Birmingham only a month later
- Contested Rio Olympics in August 2016, winning the singles bronze medal (l. Puig in SF, d. Keys in bronze medal play-off); also won titles at Wuhan and WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai
- Won three titles in 2015 at Sydney, Madrid and New Haven
- Runner-up at 2015 WTA Finals in Singapore (l. A.Radwanska in 3s). Former champion at the season finale, which she won on her event debut in 2011 (d. Azarenka in F)
- Earned second Grand Slam title at 2014 Wimbledon (d. Bouchard in F); also won title at New Haven and Wuhan and qualified for WTA Finals going 1-2 in group play
- Won two titles in 2012 at Montreal and New Haven and qualified for WTA Finals going 0-1 in group play; also won two titles in 2013 at Dubai

and Tokyo then reached SF at WTA Finals after going 2-1 in group play

- At 2012 Sydney was two wins from becoming No.1 (had won Wimbledon and WTA Finals in previous six months)
- Won maiden Grand Slam title at 2011 Wimbledon (d. Sharapova in F); also won titles in 2011 at Brisbane, Paris [Indoor], Madrid and Linz
- Was first player born in 1990s to win a Grand Slam title at 2011 Wimbledon
- Entered Top 10 on May 16, 2011; qualified for and won WTA Finals in 2011 (d. Azarenka in F) Reached SF at 2010 Wimbledon
- Won first career title at 2009 Hobart (d. Benesova in F) and reached final at Linz (l. Wickmayer)
- Earned first WTA main draw win at 2008 Paris [Indoor] defeating No.30 Anabel Medina Garrigues and reached first QFs at Budapest and Zurich propelling her into Top 50 for the first time ending year at No.44
- Earned first Top 10 win of career over No.8 Venus Williams while ranked No.143 at 2008 February
- Made WTA debut at 2007 Prague qualifying and main draw debut at 2007 Stockholm; also played US Open qualifying that year Member of Czech Republic's Billie Jean King Cup winning team in 2011-12, 2014-16 and 2018
- Made professional debut on ITF Circuit in Czech Republic in 2006; owns seven ITF titles


