MATCH NOTES - DAY 3 - THURSDAY, APRIL 24

[7] Mirra Andreeva (#7) vs. Marie Bouzkova (CZE #58)

Andreeva leads 1-0

Andreeva:

- Making her third appearance at Madrid, with a best previous result of quarterfinal in 2024 (I. eventual R-Up Sabalenka)
- Earned back-to-back WTA 1000 titles this season at Dubai and Indian Wells, winning 13 consecutive matches in the process
- Is 6-0 against players ranked outside the Top 50 so far this year with her most recent loss to older sister No.70 Erika Andreeva at 2024 Wuhan
- Owns one clay court title at WTA 250 lasi in 2024

Bouzkova:

- Making 4th appearance at Madrid, her best result was as a qualifier in 2022 with 3r (I. Alexandrova)
- Owns 11 career wins over Top 10 players, most recently No.3 Sabalenka at 2024 Washington DC
- Looking for her first Top 10 win of 2025 after falling to No.1 Sabalenka at Brisbane
- Petra Kvitova achieved the best Madrid result by a player from Czech Republic, lifting the title in 2011, 2015 and 2018

[WC] Alexandra Eala (PHI #72) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

Eala leads 1-0

Eala:

- Last year, defeated Cirstea in Ir here to register the first WTA 1000 win of her career
- Is currently at a career high ranking of No.72 after a breakthrough run to WTA 1000 Miami semifinal (I. Pegula)
- On the way to the 2025 Miami semifinal, she defeated three Grand Slam champions: Ostapenko in 2r, Keys in 3r and Swiatek in QF
- US Open girls' singles champion in 2022 who also won two junior doubles Slams, including Roland Garros in 2021 (w/Selekhmeteva)

Swiatek:

- Last year's Madrid champion (d. Sabalenka in F, in third set tie-break) having finished R-Up to Sabalenka in 2023
- Has won 88.2% of her career main draw matches on clay (90-12 w/l record)
- In the coming weeks is defending points from an outstanding 2024 clay season that also brought titles at Rome and Roland Garros (emulating Serena Williams' three-title feat on clay in 2013)
- Looking for first title of season having reached three semifinals and three quarterfinals, as well as leading Poland to the finals of the United Cup
- Has lost two matches to the same opponent twice this year: M.Andreeva (Dubai, Indian Wells) and Ostapenko (Doha, Stuttgart)

Dayana Yastremska (UKR #46) vs. [4] Coco Gauff (USA #4)

Yastremska:

- Best result at Madrid were 3r appearances in 2022 (I. Bouzkova) and 2024 (I. Gauff)
- Seeking first Tour-level win against a Top 10 opponent on clay
- Last victory over a Top 10 opponent came in the 1r at 2024 Australian Open (defeated No.7 Vondrousova)
- Has one Tour-level clay court title Strasbourg 2019 (defeated Caroline Garcia in F 6-4 5-7 7-6(3))
- One of three Ukrainians ranked in WTA Top 50 along with No.17 Elina Svitolina and No.36 Marta Kostyuk

Gauff:

- Making fifth main draw appearance at Madrid, where best result was 4r in 2024 (I. Keys) and 2022 (I. Halep)
- Won both previous meetings against Yastremska in straight sets, 3r Roland Garros 2024 and 3r Madrid 2024
- Began Madrid with straight set victories in each of her last three appearances (2022, 2023 and 2024)
- Owns one clay court title at Parma 2019 (defeated Qiang Wang 6-1, 6-3)

Belinda Bencic (SUI #42) vs. [20] Clara Tauson (DEN #23)

Bencic:

- A semifinalist in Madrid in 2019 (I. Halep)
- Ir win against Sonmez was 10th main draw victory at Madrid, second clay tournament with 10+ wins (Charleston 18), fifth WTA 1000 event with 10+ wins (Indian Wells, Canada Open, Miami and Dubai)
- Has won one Tour-level clay tournament Charleston 2022 (defeated Ons Jabeur in F 6-1, 5-7, 6-4)
- Holds 6-5 record against Top 25 opponents in 2025, seeking first victory on clay against a top 25 opponent since SF Charleston 2023 (defeated Jessica Pegula 7-5, 7-6(5)). Lone top 25 win at Madrid came in 2019 QF (defeated Naomi Osaka 3-6, 6-2, 7-5)
- Owns two singles titles at WTA 1000 events (Toronto 2015 and Dubai 2019)

Tauson:

- Looking for first main draw win at Madrid after playing in the 2r in 2022 (I. Kostyuk)
- Has advanced to 3r at each of her last three WTA 1000 events; Miami 2025 3r (I. Badosa), Indian Wells 2025 3r (I. Andreeva), Dubai 2025 – F (I. Andreeva)
- Seeking first win on clay since 3r Roland Garros 2024 (defeated Sofia Kenin 6-2, 7-5)
- Won only previous Tour-level meeting against Bencic in 2r at Doha 2022 (6-4, 3-6, 6-3)
- Currently leads the Tour in aces (153); next most is Linda Noskova (122)
- Enters the week at No.9 on the PIF Race to WTA Finals Leaderboard in a 2025 so far highlighted by winning third career title at Auckland (WTA 250) and reaching the final at Dubai (WTA 1000)

Keys leads 2-0

Keys:


- Achieved best result at Madrid last year when she advanced to SF (I. eventual champion Swiatek)
- With 20 match wins for the 2025 season, including her maiden Grand Slam at the Australian Open, sits in third place behind Pegula (26) and Sabalenka (25)
- A two-time title winner on clay, including Strasbourg last year, she is also a Roland Garros semifinalist (2018)
- Currently the USA No.3, behind Pegula and Gauff

Bronzetti:

- Edged Naomi Osaka in 2h 21m this week to reach 2r for the second year in a row here (I. Rybakina at this stage in 2024)
- Win over Osaka was her third over a former No.1 this year also defeated Azarenka at Australian Open and Halep at Cluj-Napoca (went on to reach final)
- Owns one clay court title, collected at 2023 Rabat
- Best result by Italy at Madrid was Sara Errani's semifinal performance in 2013

- Faces No.58 Marie Bouzkova in 2r today
- Is 6-0 against opponents ranked outside the Top 50 so far this season; her most recent loss was to older sister Erika Andreeva at 2024 Wuhan
- Owns 10-3 career record against players from Czech Republic, with record in 2025 standing at 3-0 (including defeating Bouzkova in their only previous meeting in 1r at Australian Open)
- Owns one clay court title: Iasi 250 in 2024
- Made her Top 10 debut in February this year and is currently ranked No.7; this time last year was ranked No.43

CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached first two WTA finals of career in 2024 winning the title at Iasi and finishing runner-up at Ningbo
- Made first Grand Slam semifinal at 2024 Roland Garros beating World No.2 Aryna Sabalenka in the quarterfinals
- Made Top 20 debut on October 8, 2024 finishing the year at World No.16. Also won 2024 Paris Olympic silver medal in women s doubles with Diana Shnaider
- Opened 2023 season in April by winning 13 matches straight to claim back-to-back ITF titles in Switzerland; as WC, advanced to R16 at Madrid with wins over Fernandez, Haddad Maia and Linette (l. Sabalenka); subsequently made debut at Roland Garros (as qualifier, l. Gauff in 3r), Wimbledon (as qualifier, l. Keys in R16) and US Open (l. eventual champion Gauff in 2r)
- Also in 2023 reached R16 at Beijing (l. Rybakina), leading to Top 50 debut (started season just inside Top 300); voted WTA Newcomer of the Year
- In 2022, posted 39-9 win-loss record on ITF Circuit, winning first four titles at this level
- Fell 1r on WTA main-draw debut at 2022 Monastir (as WC, l. Potapova)
- Made professional debut at W15 ITF Circuit event at Sharm El-Sheikh in February 2022
 Owns six ITE Circuit singles titles
- Owns six ITF Circuit singles titles
- As a junior, finished R-Up at 2023 Australian Open (l. Korneeva)

- Reached two WTA singles finals in 2024, at Bogotá (l. Osorio) and Washington, DC (l. Badosa); finished season with SF run at Jiujiang (l. Golubic). In Grand Slam play, achieved best result at Roland Garros to date, advancing to 3r (l. Swiatek).
- Enjoyed better success in second half of 2023 season with 4r at Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Vondrousova) and 3r at US Open (l. Jabeur); also achieved QF at Cincinnati (retired during match against Muchova with right thigh injury), QF at Seoul (l. Yuan Yue) and R-Up at Nanchang (l. Siniakova).
- Lifted two more doubles trophies in 2023 at Beijing (w/Sorribes Tormo) and Seoul (w/Mattek Sands).
- Finished 2022 season on career-high ranking of No.25, having started it only just inside Top 100
- Lifted career maiden singles champion trophy at Prague (d. Potapova in F). Also won third doubles title at Istanbul 2022 (w/Sorribes Tormo)
- Other notable results from 2022 season included R-Up at WTA 250 event in Guadalajara (l. Stephens in F) and SF run later in the year at WTA 1000 event in the same city (l. Sakkari)
- Reached QF at 2022 Wimbledon (l. Jabeur) her best career Slam result
- Scored two Top-10 wins over No. 8 Collins at Wimbledon and No. 7 Ka.Pliskova at Madrid in 2022
- Advanced to second WTA final in 2021 at the Phillip Island Trophy in Melbourne defeating No.8 Andreescu in SF (l. Kasatkina in F), followed it up with SF in Guadalajara(l. Sorribes Tormo)
- Also reached QFs in Birmingham (l. Vandeweghe) and Luxembourg (l. Tauson)
- In doubles in 2022, won first titles of career both w/Hradecka at Birmingham (d.Jabeur/Perez in F) and Prague (d. Stojanovic/Kuzmova in F) and reached an additional final at Charleston w/Hradecka (l. Melichar/Schuurs); also reached QFs at Wimbledon and US Open
- Before tour's hiatus in March 2020, advanced to first career WTA final at Monterrey where she finished R-Up to Svitolina - broke into Top 50 at career-high ranking of No.47 following the tournament (March 9, 2020)
- Other highlight of 2020 came at Lexington, where she made the fourth tour-level QF of her career (l. eventual champion Brady) and reached maiden WTA doubles final (w/Teichmann, l. Carter/Stefani)

- Standout performance of 2019 season was a SF run in her first Premier 5 appearance at Toronto (as qualifier, l. S.Williams in 3s); upset No.4 Halep and No.8 Stephens en route - her first career wins over players inside Top 20
- Also in 2019, made QF at Guangzhou and was R-Up at WTA 125K Series event at Guadalajara. Lifted 12th and biggest title of career on ITF Circuit, at \$80K Nur-Sultan-KAZ (d. Kostic in F); broke into the Top 100 for the first time at No.92 following the tournament (on July 22)
- Won first Slam main draw match during 2r showing at 2019 Wimbledon (as LL, d. Barthel, l. Sakkari)
- Highlights of 2018 season were winning maiden tour-level match during 2r showing at Québec City (as qualifier, l. Lepchenko) and qualifying for first Grand Slam at US Open, where she fell in 1r (l. Bogdan)
- Fell 1r on WTA main draw debut at 2015 Acapulco (as wildcard, l. Karatantcheva)
- Professional debut was opening round loss in qualifying at 2013 Katowice
- Girls' singles champion at 2014 US Open (d. Kalinina in F)



- Reached back-to-back WTA QFs in summer of 2021, first at Lausanne (as qualifier, l. eventual champion Zidansek) and then Palermo (l. Ruse). Also made QF at Portoroz (as qualifier, l. Putintseva)
- First contested Grand Slam qualifying at 2021 US Open, falling at first hurdle
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2021 Rome
- Owns five singles and two doubles titles on ITF Circuit
- Won maiden ITF Circuit title at W10 Sion, Switzerland in 2016
- Made professional debut on ITF Circuit in 2013

- Represented USA at 2016 Rio Olympics, reaching SF (l. Bronze medal match to Petra Kvitova)

- Earned first Top 20 win over No.17 Lucie Safarova while ranked No.135 at 2013 Sydney; then earned first Top 10 win over No.5 Na Li as LL at Madrid
- In 2012, reached 2r at Miami and played main draw at Australian Open, Memphis and Cincinnati; also won two titles on ITF circuit
- Earned first Grand Slam win at 2011 US Open (d. Craybas, l. Safarova in 2r), also played main draw at Miami and contested qualifying at Indian Wells
- Won first title on ITF circuit at 2010 \$10k/ITF Cleveland, OH, USA; also contested qualifying at US Open in 2010 Member of USA s Billie Jean King Cup team in 2014, 2016, 2018-19, 2022
- Made professional debut in 2009 and Tour-level debut at 2009 Ponte Vedra Beach (as WC, d. Kudryavtseva, l. No.10 Nadia Petrova); was seventh youngest player to win a WTA main draw match at 14y 48d and youngest since Hingis in 1994
