[9] Paula Badosa (ESP#9) vs. Veronika Kudermetova (#52)

Kudermetova leads 4-2

Sabalenka leads 3-0

Badosa:

- Making 7th appearance at Madrid, where her best result was semifinal in 2021 (I. Barty); also made R16 run in 2023 (I. Sakkari)
- Her 2021 Madrid semifinal is the best result by a player from Spain here
- Contesting the 35th WTA 1000 main draw of her career; her career-best WTA 1000 result was claiming the Indian Wells title in 2021
- Opening 2025 clay season here in Madrid following withdrawal prior to R16 Miami match due to low back injury

Kudermetova:

- Making 5th appearance at Madrid, where her best result was semifinal in 2023 (I. Swiatek)
- Has won 4 out of the 6 meetings against Badosa, including 2021 Charleston on clay (won their 2022 Roland Garros match via Badosa's retirement in the second set)
- Has won one singles title on clay at Charleston in 2021
- Defeated younger sister Polina Kudermetova in the first round this week

[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. [Q] Anna Blinkova (#76)

Sabalenka:

- Two-time Madrid champion (2021 & 2023), also reached the final in 2024 (I. Swiatek)
- Is 3-3 in opening matches at Madrid, going on to reach the final after each of the three wins
- Defeated Blinkova once before on clay at 2020 Strasbourg
- Is undefeated against players ranked outside the Top 50 so far this season with most recent defeat against No.132 Anisimova at Toronto last year
- Since the start of the 2020 season, only Iga Swiatek (83) has claimed more match wins on clay than Sabalenka (59)
- Has won 25 matches so far in 2025, only Pegula has more (26)

Blinkova:

- Has reached her best Madrid result this year with 2r after falling in 1r in 2023 (I. Parrizas Diaz) and 2024 (I. Bejlek)
- Owns a 3-5 record against seeded players so far in 2025 with wins over No.2 seed Svitolina at Linz, No.6 seed Uchijima at Austin and No.13 seed Shnaider at Miami
- Is 1-2 against Top 10 opponents on clay with her one victory over No.5 Garcia at 2023 Roland Garros
- Has earned back-to-back wins only once before at a WTA 1000 clay court event which was at Rome 2020 where she reached R16

[10] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #11) vs. Bianca Andreescu (CAN #132)

Rybakina:

- Making her 5th appearance at Madrid, previously making semifinal in 2024 (I. eventual R-Up Sabalenka)
- Faces Andreescu in 2r today in their third meeting and first on clay
- Most recent loss to a player ranked outside the Top 100 was to No.157 Bencic at Abu Dhabi earlier this season
- Owns three clay court titles: Stuttgart in 2024, Rome in 2023 and Bucharest in 2019

Andreescu:

- Making 3rd appearance at Madrid, where her best result was reaching R16 in 2022 (I. Pegula)
- Competing in her second tournament of the 2025 season after playing 1r at Rouen last week (I. Lamens)
- Former Top 10 player reached her peak ranking of No.4 in October 2019 following her US Open title win
- Looking to win back-to-back matches for the first time this season

Anastasia Potapova (#39) vs. [8] Qinwen Zheng (CHN #8)

Potapova:

- Making 4th appearance at Madrid, with a best result of R32 in 2023 (I. V.Kudermetova)
- Has a 50% win rate at clay WTA 1000 events, compared with 44% on hard court at WTA 1000s
- Looking to register consecutive wins at Madrid for the first time in her career
- Owns six career wins over Top 10 players, but has lost her last eight matches against such opponents

Zheng:

- Making her 4th appearance at Madrid, reaching R32 in 2023 (I. Alexandrova)
- Owns three clay court titles: Paris 2024 Olympics and Palermo in 2024 and 2023
- All the previous matches against Potapova were on hard court
- Has made QF at four of the last five clay court events she appeared (Rome, Palermo and Paris Olympics last season and Charleston 2025) she lost in 3r at 2024 Roland Garros
- In 2024 only Iga Swiatek (26) and Danielle Collins (19) won more clay court matches than Zheng (17)
- Best result by China at Madrid was semifinal by Na Li in 2011

[3] Jessica Pegula (USA #3) vs. Eva Lys (GER #68)

Pegula:

- Making her fourth main draw appearance at Madrid, where her best result was reaching the final in 2022 (l. Jabeur)
- Winner today will face Jabeur or Uchijima in the third round
- Recently achieved her first clay court title at Charleston (d. Kenin)
- Looking for her 10th consecutive opening match at WTA 1000 events, with her last loss coming to Blinkova at Indian Wells last year
- At WTA 1000 events holds a career winning percentage of 68.4% on clay (13-6), compared to her 70.2% on hard court (73-31)
- Leads the Tour in 2025 for match wins with 26

Lys:

- Her first round win over Kostovic was her maiden main draw victory at Madrid after playing qualifying in 2023
- Playing at a career high ranking of No.68 achieved on Apr 07, 2025
- This is her fifth career meeting against a Top 10 player and is looking for her first win today
- Looking for consecutive WTA 1000 match wins for the first time in her career

Katie Boulter (GBR #40) vs. [6] Jasmine Paolini (ITA #6)

Boulter:

- Making 2nd appearance at Madrid, where her previous result was reaching 2r in 2024 (I. Montgomery)
- Defeated Katerina Siniakova so far this week to reach the second round at a WTA 1000 event for the first time in her career
- Today's match marks first meeting against a Top 10 player on clay, while she holds 3-14 record against Top 10 players overall
- Bidding to become the second player from the United Kingdom to defeat a Top 10 player at the Madrid Open, after Laura Robson defeated Agnieszka Radwanska in 2013
- Best result by player from the United Kingdom at Madrid was R16 by Emma Raducanu in 2022 and Laura Robson in 2013

Paolini:

- Making 4th appearance at Madrid, where her previous and best result was reaching 4r in 2024 (I. M.Andreeva)
- Owns 11-1 record against opponents ranked 40 and above this season, her only loss came against Sofia Kenin at 2025 Dubai
- Among the current Top 10, only Paolini (Stuttgart & Miami), Sabalenka and Pegula have made SF runs on both clay and hard court events this season
- Best result by an Italian player at Madrid was semifinal by Sara Errani in 2013

CAREER MILESTONES

- Voted 2024 WTA Comeback Player of the Year after finishing the year at No.12 (after finishing 2023 at No.66); won 4th career title at Washington DC and also reached SF at Cincinnati, Beijing and Ningbo; also advanced to QF at US Open
- 2023 was a difficult season for Badosa; while she made the SF at Adelaide #2, reached backto-back QF at Charleston and Stuttgart and an additional QF at Rome, she withdrew from Roland Garros with a back injury. Her last match of the year was at Wimbledon, where she fell in the R64. She ended her season afterwards due to continuing injury
- In 2022, Badosa rose to career-high ranking of No.2 (April 25), won one title, at Sydney and advanced to SF at Indian Wells, Stuttgart and San Jose
- Captured the first two WTA singles titles of her career in 2021 at Belgrade (d. Konjuh in F) and Indian Wells (d. Azarenka in F
- Qualified for AKRON WTA Finals Guadalajara, where she advanced to the SF stage
- Broke into the WTA Top 20 on October 18, 2021 after winning the Indian Wells title and reached the Top 10 on November 8, 2021
- Nominated for 2021 WTA Most Improved Player of the Year (won by Krejcikova), as voted on by members of the media
- In 2021 also advanced to SF at Madrid, Charleston and Lyon and QFs at Roland-Garros, Cincinnati and Olympics
- At 2020 Roland Garros, upset former finalist Stephens and 2017 champion Ostapenko en route to reaching R16 for the first time at a major. That year also reached SF at Istanbul (l. Bouchard)
- Campaign in 2019 highlighted by SF run at Palermo (l. Bertens) and QF showing at Seoul (l. Y.Wang); also fell 1r on Grand Slam main draw debut at Australian Open (as gualifier, l. Birrell)
- Finished 2018 inside Top 200 for the first time (at No.143); picked up three ITF titles at \$25k ITF/Glasgow-UK, ITF/\$25k Les Franqueses del Valles - FRA and ITF/\$60k Valencia-ESP
- Fell in qualifying at 2018 Wimbledon, Madrid and US Open
- Claimed third title on ITF Circuit in 2017 at ITF/\$25k El Espinar; Fell 1r at Miami and in qualifying at Madrid
- In 2016, fell 1r at Miami, Madrid and Mallorca and in qualifying at Rio de Janeiro
- As wildcard, made breakthrough on WTA Tour with 3r run at 2015 Miami Open (l. Ka.Pliskova)

- Best results of 2024 came at Seoul with semifinal (l. Haddad Maia) and quarterfinal at Charleston (l. Sakkari). Also claimed her eighth career doubles title at Stuttgart w/Hao-Ching Chan
- Also in 2023, reached SF at Adelaide 2, Doha, Madrid and Rome; qualified for WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai going 1-1 in group play
- In doubles, won titles in 2023 at Dubai with Liudmila Samsonova and Zhuhai with Beatriz Haddad Maia
- Made Top 10 debut in singles on October 24, 2022, following QF run at Guadalajara 1000 and Top 10 debut in doubles on January 31, 2022 ending the year at No.2
- Singles highlights in 2022 were R-Up finishes at Melbourne Summer Set 1 (l. Halep), Dubai (l. Ostapenko) and Istanbul (l. Potapova), and reached maiden Grand Slam QF at Roland Garros (l. Kasatkina)
- Won doubles title at 2022 WTA Finals in Fort Worth with partner Elise Mertens; also won title at Dubai and D s-Hertogenbosch with Mertens as well as Rome with Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova
- Appeared in maiden WTA final at Abu Dhabi in opening event of 2021 (l. Sabalenka) before securing first title at Charleston (d. Kovinic)
- In doubles won title at Istanbul with Elise Mertens and made final at Wimbledon (w/Vesnina) and Indian Wells (w/Rybakina) Scored first win over a Top-3 ranked opponent by upsetting No.3 Karolina Pliskova at 2020 Cincinnati. Other highlights in 2020 included SF run at Hobart and closing out season with backto-back QFs at Ostrava and Linz
- Won 27 main-draw matches during 2019 [] had previously won six across entire career - to rise over 60 places in the WTA rankings, making Top-100 debut on February 4 and Top-50 debut on September 9
- Singles highlights in 2019 included reaching SF at 's-Hertogenbosch, Hiroshima and Tianjin and 3r at Roland Garros where she defeated No.13 Caroline Wozniacki in 1r - her maiden Grand Slam main draw win and first over a Top-20 opponent)
- Also in 2019, won WTA 125K Series title at Guadalajara (d. Bouzkova in F) and entered Top 50 on Sept 9, 2019

- Came through qualifying at 2015 Madrid, fell 1r to Errani via ret. w/left leg injury
- Continued at ITF Circuit level during 2013-2014 before playing second WTA qualifying draw at 2015 Antwerp, where she advanced to 2r (l. Bodarenko)
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2013 Palermo, winning one match via retirement before falling in 2r (l.Gatto-Monticone) Won first title on ITF Circuit at \$10k ITF/Sant Jordi-ESP in 2012; now owns seven singles titles at this level
- Played first professional tournament of career at \$10k ITF/Gexto-ESP in 2012 (l. in 1r)
- Won girls' singles title at 2015 Roland Garros (d. Kalinskaya in F) and reached QF at Roland Garros and Wimbledon in 2014; finished 2015 as No.8 in ITF World Junior rankings

- Posted first two Top 10 wins of career in final weeks of 2019, over No.10 Belinda Bencic at Wuhan and No.4 Elina Svitolina at Moscow
- Fell 1r on Grand Slam main draw debut at 2019 Australian Open (as qualifier, l. Kenin)
- Won career first WTA doubles title at 2019 Wuhan with Yingying Duan (d. Mertens/Sabalenka in F); also in 2019 was R-Up at Charleston (w/Khromacheva) and Lugano (w/Voskoboeva)
- Posted maiden career WTA QF runs in 2018, first at 's-Hertogenbosch (l. eventual champion Krunic) and then Gstaad (l. Bouchard)
- Reached 2r on WTA main draw debut at 2018 Stuttgart as qualifier (d. No.25 Suarez Navarro, l. eventual champion Ka.Pliskova)
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2014 Moscow
- Made professional debut on ITF circuit in 2011; on ITF Circuit, owns four singles titles


OTHER INFORMATION
