#### [7] Mirra Andreeva (#7) vs. [27] Magdalena Frech (#27)

**Andreeva leads 1-0** 

#### Andreeva:

- Making third appearance at Madrid, where her previous and best result was reaching QF in 2024 (I. Sabalenka)
- Won first career WTA 1000 titles this year at Dubai and Indian Wells
- Record against opponents outside Top 20 stands at 17-2 in 2025 season, with losses coming against No. 22 Alexandrova at Stuttgart and No.46 Sramkova at Doha
- Is currently ranked No.7 (made Top 10 debut on Feb 24, 2025); this time last year was ranked No.43
- Holds 3-0 record against Polish players in 2025 with a win against today's opponent at Australian Open and two
  wins against Iga Swiatek at Dubai and Indian Wells

#### Frech:

- Making third appearance at Madrid where she is into 3r for the first time
- Her best result at a WTA-1000 event was QF run at Wuhan 2024 (I. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- Owns one win in career over a Top 10 player defeating No.8 Emma Navarro at Wuhan 2024; lost only meeting with a Top 10 player this year falling to No.3 Jessica Pegula at Stuttgart
- Best career result on clay was Runner-Up run at Prague 2024
- Is currently ranked No.27 (peak rank at No.22 in Oct 2024); this time last year was ranked No.51

#### [31] Linda Noskova (CZE #31) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

Swiatek leads 4-1

#### Noskova:

- Making second appearance at Madrid, where she is into the 3r for the first time
- Career best result at a WTA 1000 event was QF run at Dubai 2025 (I. eventual R-Up Tauson)
- Owns eight wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.5 Jessica Pegula at Dubai 2025
- Playing Swiatek for a sixth time, with sole win coming at Australian Open 2024, for her career best win byranking defeating a then No.1 Swiatek
- Also owns another Top 2 win, defeating No.2 Jabeur at Adelaide #1 in 2023 (en route to final)

#### Swiatek:

- Owns ten clay court titles including here last year; has defended a title six times in career
- Since her debut on Tour in 2019, Iga Swiatek is the player with the most clay court wins (91) currently 28 more than the second-best (Aryna Sabalenka, 64)
- Record against opponents outside Top 20 stands at 18-3 in 2025 including a loss already on clay falling to No.24
   Jelena Ostapenko at Stuttgart
- Is 4-0 against Czech players this year including a win over today's opponent at Doha

- Making 11th appearance at Madrid, where her previous and best result was SF run in 2024 (I. eventual champion Swiatek)
- Best result at a WTA-1000 event was title run at Cincinnati 2019 (d. Kuznetsova in F)
- Owns two singles titles on clay at Strasbourg 2024 and Charleston 2019
- Holds 13-3 record against players outside the Top 20 this year
- Has won 21 matches so far in 2025; she is ranked No.5 on tour for match wins

#### Kalinskaya:

- Making third appearance at Madrid, where she has tied her best result by reaching 3r also doing so in 2023
- Best result at a WTA-1000 event was R-Up run at Dubai 2024 (I. Paolini in champion match)
- Has gone 1-1 against Top 10 players in 2025, defeating today's opponent No.5 Madison Keys at Charleston 2025
- Best career result on clay are QF runs at Charleston in 2025 and 2023

## Ann Li (USA #62) vs. [4] Coco Gauff (USA #4)

Gauff leads 2-0

#### Li:

- Making Madrid debut
- Seeking her second career win over a Top 10 opponent after defeating No.7 Anett Kontaveit at Miami 2022
- Looking to reach Round of 16 at a WTA 1000 tournament for first time in career
- Quarterfinal at Palermo last season was her best career result on clay (I. Begu)
- Strongest result of 2025 so far was reaching the final at Singapore (I. Mertens)
- Is 2-3 against players from the USA so far this year with both wins achieved against Sloane Stephens at Auckland and Hobart

#### Gauff:

- Making fifth main draw appearance at Madrid, looking to tie best result by reaching 4r; also in in 2024 (l. Keys) and 2022 (l. Halep)
- Defeated Yastremska in 2r, winning a match after losing the first set 0-6 for the second time in her career; also achieved against Elise Mertens at Eastbourne in 2021 (0-67-6(4)7-5)
- Since the start of 2024 season, has gone 34-2 against players outside the Top 50 with both losses coming this year; a loss today would be worst by ranking since falling to No.128 Sofia Kenin at 2023 Wimbledon
- Looking for her third career win over Li and second at Tour level after 2022 Berlin on grass
- One of three players from USA ranked in the PIF WTA Top 5 along with No.3 Pegula and No.5 Keys

#### Vekic:

- Making sixth appearance at Madrid, where her best result was reaching 4r in 2019
- Won both previous meetings against Navarro in straight sets at Indian Wells 2025 and Monterrey 2023
- Win against a then No.8 Navarro at Indian Wells was also her most recent victory against a Top 10 opponent. Her lone career win against a top 10 player on clay was in 2024 at the Paris Olympics (d. No.2 Gauff). Overall, has 16 career victories against Top 10 opponents.
- Best career result on clay was a run to the final in 2024 at the Paris Olympics (I. Qinwen Zheng)

#### Navarro:

- Second appearance at Madrid where she is into 3r for a second straight year
- Seeking first career WTA 1000 victory against a Top 50 opponent on clay
- Has won the first set in six of her seven matches on clay in 2025
- Best career result on clay were QF appearances at Charleston 2025, Palermo 2023 and Strasbourg 2023
- Is currently ranked No.10; this time last year was ranked No.23

## **CAREER MILESTONES**

- Reached first two WTA finals of career in 2024 winning the title at Iasi and finishing runner-up at Ningbo
- Made first Grand Slam semifinal at 2024 Roland Garros beating World No.2 Aryna Sabalenka in the quarterfinals
- Made Top 20 debut on October 8, 2024 finishing the year at World No.16. Also won 2024 Paris Olympic silver medal in women s doubles with Diana Shnaider
- Opened 2023 season in April by winning 13
  matches straight to claim back-to-back ITF
  titles in Switzerland; as WC, advanced to R16 at
  Madrid with wins over Fernandez, Haddad Maia
  and Linette (l. Sabalenka); subsequently made
  debut at Roland Garros (as qualifier, l. Gauff in
  3r), Wimbledon (as qualifier, l. Keys in R16) and
  US Open (l. eventual champion Gauff in 2r)
- Also in 2023 reached R16 at Beijing (l. Rybakina), leading to Top 50 debut (started season just inside Top 300); voted WTA Newcomer of the Year
- In 2022, posted 39-9 win-loss record on ITF Circuit, winning first four titles at this level
- Fell 1r on WTA main-draw debut at 2022 Monastir (as WC, l. Potapova)
- Made professional debut at W15 ITF Circuit event at Sharm El-Sheikh in February 2022
- Owns six ITF Circuit singles titles
- As a junior, finished R-Up at 2023 Australian Open (l. Korneeva)

- In 2024 reached a career-high ranking of No.22 by reaching her career-first final at Prague (l. Linette in final) followed by her first-ever title win at Guadalajara (d. Gadecki in final); also made QF at Wuhan (l. eventual champion Sabalenka) and at Nottingham (l. eventual champion Boulter) and achieved her best result to date at a Grand Slam (R16 at the Australian Open; l. Gauff)
- In 2023 reached back-to-back QF on grass at Nottingham (l. Burrage) and Birmingham (l. eventual champion Ostapenko); advanced to 3r at Miami (l. Gracheva) and posted 2r efforts at Indian Wells, Madrid, Rome, Guadalajara and Hong Kong; at the Slams, best results were 2r at Roland Garros (l. Rakhimova) and US Open (l. Muchova); ended season on career-high ranking of No.63 after winning a 100k ITF event in Spain (d. Errani in F)
- Highlight of 2022 season was 3r run at Wimbledon - best career result at a major. Also made 2r on nine occasions
- Broke into Top 100 on October 18, 2021, following run through qualifying to 2r at Indian Wells
- Advanced to 2r three more times last season and won titles at WTA 125K Series event in Concord and W60 Prague ITF Circuit event
- Campaign in 2020 was highlighted by maiden WTA QF, at Prague (as LL, l. eventual champion Halep) - first back-to-back main draw wins at a WTA event
- Only other WTA main draw appearance in 2020 was 1r exit at Lyon (as qualifier, l. Tomova); also won her fourth career singles title on ITF Circuit, at \$25K Bendigo-AUS and contested qualifying at Australian Open, Dubai and Doha
- Appeared in six WTA main draws in 2019, falling 1r at Dubai (l. Kasatkina), Charleston (l.Buzarnescu), Lugano (l. Peterson), Nottingham (l. Mladenovic), US Open (l. Siegemund) and Guangzhou (l. Stojanovic)
- In 2018, made 2r at Roland Garros (as qualifier, l.Stephens), Rabat (l. Fett), Nottingham (l.Jakupovic) and San Jose (l.Tomljanovic). Also fell 1r at six other tour-level events, including qualifying for Grand Slam debut at Australian Open
- Achieved career high singles ranking of No.115 after 2018 Roland Garros run (July 2, 2018)
- Won two of her four ITF singles titles in 2017, at \$25k ITF/Leipzig-GER and \$25k ITF/Braunschweig-GER - both on clay

 Played first WTA qualifying event at home tournament in Katowice in 2013, falling to Raluca. Made WTA main draw debut at Katowice the following year (as wildcard, l. Meusburger in 1r)

## **CAREER MILESTONES**

- In 2024, achieved best Grand Slam result reaching SF at Wimbledon (l. Paolini). Won Silver Medal at Paris Olympics (l. Zheng in F), the first Olympic medal in women's singles for Croatia. Finished runner-up at Bad Homburg (l. Shnaider in F), reached SF at Linz (l. Alexandrova). Reached her career best ranking at No.18 on Oct 7 2024
- In 2023, posted best Australian Open result with QF (l. eventual champion Sabalenka), equalling best Grand Slam result (QF finish at 2019 US Open). Claimed fourth career title at Monterrey (d. Garcia) and runner-up at Berlin (l. Kvitova). Results brought ranking back into Top 20 for first time since 2019 and qualification for Zhuhai Elite Trophy.
- 2022's highlight was R-Up finish at San Diego (as qualifier, l. Swiatek). Elsewhere, made QF at Birmingham and Tallinn
- Lifted third WTA title of her career at Courmayeur in October 2021 (d. Tauson in F)
- Underwent knee surgery at start of 2021, but experienced some setbacks since her return to Tour last summer, tearing plantar fascia and suffering from knee and foot injuries in spring 2022
- Contested the first match of the WTA Tour's resumption following the hiatus, defeating Rus in the 1r at 2020 Palermo
- Ended 2019 ranked No.19 for career-best yearend finish (up from No.34 in 2018), having cracked the Top 20 for the first time on October 21, 2019
