MATCH NOTES - DAY 6 - SUNDAY, APRIL 27

[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. Elise Mertens (BEL #26)

Sabalenka leads 9-2

Sabalenka:

- Owns more wins over Mertens (9) than any other opponent; has won last 8 meetings vs Mertens
- Two-time Madrid champion (2021 & 2023), also reached the final in 2024 (I. Swiatek)
- Since start of the 2020 season, only Iga Swiatek (84) has claimed more match wins on clay than Sabalenka (60)
- Has won 26 matches so far in 2025, only Pegula has more (27)
- Making 56th appearance at a WTA 1000 event; has won 8 titles at WTA 1000s
- Five of her six doubles titles came with Mertens
- Sabalenka (72.0%, 121-47) only trails Iga Swiatek (81.5%) and Mirra Andreeva (74.3%) among active players with the best win percentage at WTA 1000 (min of 10 matches)
- Bidding for 8th straight win at WTA 1000 level (would equal her career-best at the WTA 1000 level)
- Since the introduction of Madrid in 2009, the WTA World No.1 has not been eliminated prior to the R16 at the tournament

Mertens:

- Mertens only wins over Sabalenka came in 2018 at Lugano (F) and at Montreal (R16)
- Making 59th appearance at WTA 1000; best WTA 1000 result has been semifinals at 2020 Cincinnati (NYC) and 2021 Dubai
- Facing a PIF WTA World No.1 for fifth time in career (previously 0-4 all four matches on clay); yet to take a set vs. a reigning World No.1
- Has lost her last 13 matches vs. Top 10 ranked opponents
- Making 6th appearance at Madrid, where her previous best result was QF run in 2021 (I. eventual champion Sabalenka), which is also Belgium's best result at Madrid

[10] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #11) vs. [17] Elina Svitolina (UKR #17)

Rybakina leads 3-2

Rybakina:

- Making her 5th appearance at Madrid, previously making semifinal in 2024 (I. eventual R-Up Sabalenka)
- Owns three clay court titles: Stuttgart in 2024, Rome in 2023 and Bucharest in 2019
- Making 36th WTA 1000 appearance having won two titles 2023 Indian Wells and 2023 Rome

Svitolina:

- Making 82nd appearance at a WTA 1000 event; has won four WTA 1000 titles, including two on clay both at Rome (2017, 2018)
- Making 10th appearance at Madrid; seeking first R16 appearance at the tournament; previous best result in Madrid has been R32 (2015, 2016, 2018)

Maria Sakkari (GRE #82) vs. [6] Jasmine Paolini (ITA #6)

Tied 1-1

Sakkari:

- Won only previous meeting on clay 2021 Roland Garros (R64)
- Lost her last eight matches against opponents ranked in the WTA Top 10, with her last victory coming against Coco Gauff in Indian Wells (SF) last year
- Owns 5-6 record against Top 10 opponents on clay; last win coming at 2021 Roland Garros (QF, d. Swiatek)
- Contesting her 54th WTA 1000 main draw of career; she has won 1 WTA 1000 title (2023 Guadalajara) and reached 3 other WTA 1000 finals

Paolini:

- Making 4th appearance at Madrid, where her previous and best result was reaching 4r in 2024 (l. M.Andreeva)
- 1 of 3 players to reach R16 at each of the previous four WTA 1000 events in 2025 (along with Swiatek, Pegula)
- Best result by an Italian player at Madrid was semifinal by Sara Errani in 2013
- Is 26-2 at WTA 1000 events after claiming the first set (in complete matches)
- Is 11-1 in 2025 against opponents ranked outside Top 50

[3] Jessica Pegula (USA #3) vs. Moyuka Uchijima (JPN #56)

First meeting

Pegula:

- Making fourth main draw appearance at Madrid, where her best result was reaching the final in 2022 (I. Jabeur)
- Recently achieved her first clay court title at Charleston (d. Kenin)
- Leads the Tour in 2025 for match wins with 27
- Along with Gauff, has a chance to move to No.2 after the tournament, depending on Swiatek's results
- With 10 wins in Madrid, among Americans only Serena Williams (20) and Sloane Stephens (13) have won more here
- Record against opponents outside Top 50 stands at 13-1 in 2025, with the only loss coming against No.55 Danilovic at Australian Open

Uchijima:

- Seeking first career Top 10 win (previously 0-6)
- Could become the first Japanese woman to win a match against a Top 10 opponent at Madrid
- With a win, would become the third Japanese woman to reach the R16 at Madrid along with Misaki Doi and Naomi Osaka
- Owns 1-18 career record against seeded opponents

[21] Ekaterina Alexandrova (#22) vs. [14] Daria Kasatkina (AUS #14)

Kasatkina leads 3-2

Alexandrova:

- Making 5th main-draw appearance at Madrid; her career-best tournament result was making the 2022 SF as a qualifier (I. eventual champion Jabeur)
- Has already won 7 clay-court matches this year after going 1-7 on the surface last year (her only 2024 clay-court win was over Bucsa in Strasbourg 1r)
- Contesting her 42nd career WTA 1000 main draw; her career-best WTA 1000 showings are 3 SFs (2022 Madrid, 2024 Miami and 2025 Doha)

Kasatkina:

- Won most recent match-up at 2024 Cincinnati in straight sets
- Making 9th appearance at Madrid; career-best tournament result was 2018 QF (I. eventual champion Kvitova)
- Has lost her last three matches against Top 25 ranked opponents
- Contesting her 76th WTA 1000 main draw; her career-best WTA 1000 showing is reaching the final at 2018 Indian Wells (I. Osaka)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan.
 Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid.

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2024, highlights included reaching the final at Linz (l. Ostapenko in Final) and semifinals at Adelaide (l. eventual champion Ostapenko), Miami (l. eventual champion Collins), 's-Hertogenbosch (l. eventual champion Samsonova) and Monterrey (l. Sun); also made quarterfinals at Wuhan (l. Xin. Wang) and her best Grand Slam result of the season came during a 3r run at US Open (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- In 2023, won fourth career singles title at 's-Hertogenbosch, successfully defending the title and defeating top seed, Kudermetova in the final. A run of successful results followed with SF at Berlin (l. eventual champion, Kvitova), 4r at Wimbledon (l. Sabalenka) a career best result at any of the majors and runner-up at Cleveland (l. Sorribes Tormo).
- Reached a 2023 peak ranking of No. 16 on February 20, 2023 following a 3r finish at Australian Open (l. Linette), before posting two QF results at Miami (l. eventual champion Kvitova) and Charleston (l. Bencic). Another QF then came in the Asian Swing at Tokyo (l. Pavlyuchenkova).
- In 2022, won titles at ☐ s-Hertogenbosch (d. Sabalenka in F) and Seoul (d. Ostapenko in F). Also advanced to SF at Charleston, Madrid and Ostrava, making Top-20 debut on October 10, 2022
- Reached third WTA singles final in 2021, enjoying run to final at home tournament of Moscow (l. Kontaveit). Other key result was SF run at Gippsland Trophy (l. Kanepi)
- Posted two best wins-by-ranking of career in 2021, defeating No.2 Halep (Gippsland Trophy) and No.2 Sabalenka (Moscow)
- Reached 2r on Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020
- Opened 2020 season by lifting her maiden WTA singles title, at Shenzhen (d. Rybakina in F)
- Won both singles rubbers on Billie Jean King Cup debut in 3-2 win over Romania in February 2020
- Made Top-50 debut on June 17, 2019 after QF run at 's-Hertogenbosch
- Registered 30 Tour-level match wins during 2019, in which she reached SF at Budapest, Seoul and Linz and made QF at St. Petersburg, 's-Hertogenbosch, Eastbourne and Moscow. Also advanced to 3r at a major for the first time, at Roland Garros
- Won sole WTA doubles title at 2019 Budapest (w/Zvonareva)

- Finished the 2024 season ranked No.9 (2nd career Top 10 finish) in a season highlighted by winning titles at Ningbo and Eastbourne, while also finishing as runner-up at Seoul, Adelaide, Abu Dhabi and Charleston; won a Tour-best 26 matches at the WTA 500 level (next most was 15 (Rybakina); as an alternate at WTA Finals, lost one match in group play (l. Swiatek)
- Finished R-Up at two tournaments in 2023 at Adeliade 2 (l. Bencic) and Eastbourne (l. Keys); reached SFs at Charleston, Zhengzhou, and WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai
- In 2022, reached maiden Grand Slam SF at Roland Garros (l. eventual champion Swiatek) and won titles at San Jose (d. Rogers in F) and Granby (d. Saville in F); returned to Top 10 on August 8, after San Jose run
- Qualified for WTA Finals for the first time at Fort Worth in 2022 going 1-2 in group play
- Broke back into Top 50 in early 2021, after lifting first titles since 2018, at the Phillip Island Trophy in Melbourne (d. Bouzkova in F) and then St. Petersburg (d. Gasparyan in F)
- Reached two additional finals in 2021, at Birmingham (l. Jabeur) and San Jose (l. Collins)
- Highlight of truncated 2020 season was SF showing at Lyon (l. Friedsam) - her first run to the last four at a WTA event since lifting title at 2018 Moscow [500]
- Won consecutive matches only twice in difficult 2019 campaign, with best result a QF run at Beijing (l. Wozniacki) and St. Petersburg (l. Zvonareva)
- Ended 2018 season by lifting her second WTA singles title at Moscow [500] (d. Jabeur in F); broke into Top 10 following the tournament, on October 22, 2018
- Also finished R-Up at 2018 Dubai (l. Svitolina) and 2018 Indian Wells (l. Osaka); Indian Wells was biggest final of career having upset No.2 Caroline Wozniacki, No.10 Angelique Kerber and No.8 Venus Williams en route
- Made Top 20 debut on February 26, 2018, following R-Up finish at Dubai (d. No.3 Muguruza, l. Svitolina)
- Made first Grand Slam QFs at 2018 Roland Garros (l. Stephens) and 2018 Wimbledon (l. Kerber) and qualified for WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai going 1-1 in group play
- Upset No.1 Caroline Wozniacki during SF run at 2018 St. Petersburg
- Captured maiden WTA singles title in debut final at 2017 Charleston, defeating fellow teenager Jelena Ostapenko in the final - the first all-

- Upset No.7 Venus Williams in opening match of 2016 season at Auckland to register first Top 10 win of career
- Reached first WTA SF at 2015 Moscow (as qualifier, l. Pavlyuchenkova) recorded first Top-20 win over No.14 Suarez Navarro in QF; following the tournament made Top-100 debut at No.73 (October 26, 2015)
