#### **MATCH NOTES - DAY 8 - TUESDAY, APRIL 29**

#### [13] Diana Shnaider (#13) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

First meeting

#### Shnaider:

- Making her second appearance at Madrid; her current tournament run is her best to date after playing 1r in 2024 (I. Potapova)
- Owns a 1-6 win-loss record against Top 10 opponents (the one win was against No.2 Gauff at Toronto 2024)
- Could reach her second career WTA 1000 quarterfinal and first on clay, after losing to eventual champion Pegula in Toronto (SF) last year
- Is currently undefeated against former Grand Slam champions, winning each of her previous seven matches at WTA level only one of those matches has gone to a third set, against Petra Kvitova at Ningbo (QF) in 2023

#### Swiatek:

- Last year's Madrid champion (d. Sabalenka in F) and finished R-Up to Sabalenka in 2023
- Since the format's introduction in 2009, Swiatek (89.7%, 35-4) holds the best win rate of any player on clay at WTA 1000 events
- Could become the only player to reach the quarterfinal at all five WTA 1000 events so far in 2025 no other player
  has reached three so far this season
- Could reach a 23rd WTA 1000 quarterfinal from 36 main draws Swiatek (62.9%, 22/35) already holds the highest rate of quarterfinals reached of any player, since the format's introduction in 2009
- Looking for first title of season having reached three semifinals and three quarterfinals, as well as leading Poland to the finals of the United Cup

#### [1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. Peyton Stearns (USA #44)

Sabalenka leads 1-0

#### Sabalenka:

- Two-time Madrid champion (2021 & 2023), also reached the final in 2024 (I. Swiatek)
- Since the start of the 2020 season, only Iga Swiatek (85) has claimed more match-wins on clay than Sabalenka (61)
- Has won 27 Tour-level matches so far in 2025, tied with Jessica Pegula for the most on tour
- Sabalenka is 13-0 this season against players ranked outside the Top 40
- Making 56th main-draw appearance at a WTA 1000 event; has won eight WTA 1000 titles
- Bidding for her ninth straight match-win at WTA 1000 events, which would be her longest winning streak at WTA 1000-level
- Two of her 19 career WTA singles titles have come on clay, both at Madrid in 2021 and 2023

#### Stearns:

- Making second appearance at Madrid; fell 1r in tournament debut last year (I. Maria)
- This fortnight, has posted three consecutive wins for the first time this year
- This is her first career meeting vs. a reigning World No.1

- In lone previous meeting vs. Sabalenka (ranked No.2 at the time), Stearns held four match points before Sabalenka prevailed in third-set tiebreak at 2024 Indian Wells
- After 0-10 start vs. Top 10 players, notched her first Top 10 win at 2025 Dubai over No.8 Zheng Qinwen
- Her career-best WTA 1000 result is reaching last year's Toronto QF

#### [5] Madison Keys (USA #5) vs. [19] Donna Vekic (CRO #21)

Keys leads 3-1

#### Keys:

- Has won both her previous matchups against Vekic on clay (Roland Garros 2016, Rome 2018)
- Achieved best result in Madrid last year, where she reached the semifinals (I. eventual champion Swiatek)
- At 84.6% and a 22-4 record, she currently holds the best winning percentage of any player at WTA level so far in 2025
- Aiming to reach a 14th career WTA 1000 quarterfinal and a second at the Madrid Open
- With a win today could become the second American to achieve 25+ WTA 1000 match wins on clay, along with Serena Williams (44)

#### Vekic:

- Attempting to reach the guarterfinals of a tournament at any level for the first time in 2025
- Aiming to reach her maiden WTA 1000 quarterfinal, losing in each of her previous seven Round of 16 appearances at WTA 1000 events
- With a win today could become the first player to reach a maiden quarterfinal after 50+ WTA 1000 main draws Magda Linette (41) currently holds the most WTA 1000 main draws to reach their first quarterfinal
- Win against No.10 Emma Navarro in the previous round was her second-ever Top 10 win on clay
- Seeking to win against multiple Top 10 opponents at a WTA 1000 event for the first time in her career

#### [17] Elina Svitolina (UKR #17) vs. Maria Sakkari (GRE #82)

**Tied 2-2** 

#### Svitolina:

- Making 10th appearance at Madrid and this is her first R16; this is the most appearances taken to reach a first R16 at this event since its inception
- Currently on seven-match winning streak at WTA events, having won 18th career title in Rouen last week (winning streak is nine straight with BJK Cup Qualifiers included)
- Including BJK Cup Qualifiers, Svitolina is 9-0 on clay this year (18-0 in sets)
- Svitolina is 10-1 this year vs. players ranked outside the Top 50 (the 1 loss was to Blinkova at Linz)
- She is a four-time WTA 1000 champion (2017 Dubai, 2017 Toronto, 2017-2018 Rome) and is 4-0 in WTA 1000 finals
- One of three players from Ukraine to reach 4r (also No.24 seed Kostyuk and qualifier Starodubtseva)

#### Sakkari:

- Making seventh main-draw appearance at Madrid; her career-best result at the event is the 2023 SF (I. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- Upset No.6 seed Paolini in previous round; before that win, Sakkari had lost her last eight matches vs. Top 10 players
- This fortnight, has won three straight matches for the first time since 2024 Charleston just over a year ago
- Contesting her 54th WTA 1000 main draw of career; has won one WTA 1000 title (2023 Guadalajara) and reached three other WTA 1000 finals
- One of her two career WTA titles has come on clay: 2019 Rabat

#### [24] Marta Kostyuk (UKR #36) vs. Anastasia Potapova (#39)

Potapova leads 2-1

#### Kostyuk:

- Making her sixth appearance at Madrid, where her best result is her current tournament run in the Round of 16
- Has beaten Emma Raducanu and Veronika Kudermetova so far this week to reach her first Round of 16 since Miami 2025
- With a win today could become the second player from Ukraine to reach the quarterfinals of both clay and hard-court WTA 1000 events since the format introduction in 2009 after Elina Svitolina
- Her best result on clay is her finalist run at Stuttgart in 2024 (I. Rybakina in final)
- Only Jessica Pegula (136) and Aryna Sabalenka (128) has saved more break points during the 2025 season at WTA level than Marta Kostyuk (121)
- Seeking second quarterfinal appearance of 2025 (also Doha, where she lost to eventual champion Anisimova in the quarterfinal)

#### Potapova:

- Making her fourth appearance at Madrid, where her best result is her current tournament run in the Round of 16
- Has beaten Ashlyn Krueger, Qinwen Zheng and Sofia Kenin so far this week
- Could reach her fourth quarterfinal in WTA 1000 events and her first on clay court in her career with a win today
- Owns a 13-4 record against opponents ranked 30+ during the 2025 season at WTA level, her last such loss came against Kimberly Birrell at Miami
- Best career result on clay is her title run at Istanbul in 2022

#### Moyuka Uchijima (JPN #56) vs. [21] Ekaterina Alexandrova (#22)

First meeting

#### Uchijima:

- Making her Madrid main draw debut; she previously lost in the 1r of qualifying in 2023
- This is the first time she has won three straight matches in WTA main draws
- Picked up her first career Top 25 win by upsetting No.3 Pegula in the third round (previously 0-9 vs. Top 25 players)
- With the win over Pegula, became the 2nd Japanese player to defeat a Top 10 player at a WTA 1000 event since the tier began in 2009 (joining Naomi Osaka)
- Contesting her 8th career WTA 1000 main draw; this is the first time she has advanced beyond the 2r at a WTA 1000

#### Alexandrova:

- Making fifth main-draw appearance at Madrid; her career best tournament result was reaching the 2022 semifinal as a qualifier (I. eventual champion Jabeur)
- Has already won eight clay court matches this year after going 1-7 on the surface last year (her only 2024 clay court win was over Bucsa in Strasbourg 1r)
- Contesting her 42nd career WTA 1000 main draw; her career best WTA 1000 showings are three semifinals (2022 Madrid, 2024 Miami and 2025 Doha)
- Has won 17 tour level matches this year

- Faces No.2 Iga Swiatek in 4r today; owns a 1-6 win-loss record against WTA top 10 opponents (the 1 win was against No.2 Coco Gauff at Toronto 2024)
- Shnaider could reach her second career quarterfinal at a WTA 1000 event and a first on clay, after losing to eventual champion Jessica Pegula in Toronto (SF) last year
- Has yet to defeat a seeded player so far in 2025 with a record of 0-2 (l. No.18 seed Vekic at Australian Open and No.9 Alexandrova at Charleston)
- · Owns one clay court title: Budapest in 2024
- Shnaider is undefeated against former Grand Slam champions, winning each of her previous seven matches at the WTA level - only one of those matches has gone to a third set, against Petra Kvitova in Ningbo (QF) in 2023
- Since 2009, Diana Shnaider (21 years and 19 days) could become the youngest left-hander to reach the women's singles quarterfinal at the Madrid Open, surpassing Petra Kvitova (21 years and 55 days, 2011)
- Is currently ranked No.13; this time last year was ranked No.61
- Winner today will face No.5 seed Keys or No. 19 seed Vekic in QF

- Since the format's introduction in 2009, Iga Swiatek (89.7%, 35-4) holds the best win rate of any player on clay at WTA 1000 events
- Owns 11-4 record in 2025 against seeded players
- Owns ten clay court titles: Roland Garros, Rome, Madrid in 2024; Roland Garros, Stuttgart in 2023; Roland Garros, Rome, Stuttgart in 2022; Rome in 2021; Roland Garros in 2020
- Could become the only player to reach the quarterfinal at all five WTA 1000 events so far in 2025 - no other player has reached three so far this season
- Best result by Poland at Madrid was Champion run by Iga Swiatek in 2024
- Could reach a 23rd WTA 1000 quarterfinal from 36 main draws - Swiatek (62.9%, 22/35) already holds the highest rate of quarterfinals reached of any player, since the format's introduction in 2009
- During last year's European clay swing captured the title at Roland Garros, Rome, and Madrid, and reached the semfinal at Stuttgart

#### **CAREER MILESTONES**

- Won first four titles of career in 2024 across all three surfaces; WTA 500 Bad Homburg and WTA 250s Hua Hin, Budapest and Hong Kong. Reached her first Grand Slam 3r at 2024 Wimbledon and advanced to R16 at 2024 US Open
- Cracked into the Top 20 on August 12, 2024, where she stayed for the rest of the year finishing the season at World No.13
- Also in 2024, won the Paris Olympic silver medal in women
   s doubles with Mirra Andreeva
- Reached 2r on Grand Slam debut at 2023
   Australian Open (as qualifier, l. Sakkari in 3s)
   and Roland Garros 2023 (l. Haddad Maia)
- Won WTA 125K Series title in Montevideo, Uruguay last November to end 2022 just outside Top 100
- Overall win-loss record in 2022 was 56-17; reached four ITF Circuit finals, highlighted by a 15-match, three tournament winning streak, culminating with a W60 title in Istanbul
- Last season only Tour-level outing was qualifying exit at St. Petersburg
- Won first ITF Circuit tournament at W15 event in Antalya in late 2021
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2021 Moscow
- Owns four titles in singles and three in doubles on ITF Circuit
- Played first senior matches on ITF Circuit towards end of 2020
- As junior, made SF at Roland Garros in 2021 and US Open in 2022. Also won girls' doubles at three of the four majors and reached No.2 in the ITF rankings

- Claimed five titles in 2024, making it a threepeat at Roland-Garros and also winning Doha, Indian Wells, Madrid and Rome. Crossed \$30m in prize money and qualified for her fourth WTA Finals
- Won six titles across 2023, including winning fourth Grand Slam title at Roland-Garros (d. Muchova in F) and going undefeated at the WTA Finals in Cancun (d. Pegula in F). Finished season as WTA World No.1 player for second consecutive year.
- In 2022, lifted second and third Grand Slam titles, at Roland-Garros (d. Gauff in F) and US Open (d. Jabeur in F)
- Triumph in Paris was the last of six straight titles during 37-match winning streak - jointlongest unbeaten run on Tour since 1990
- Won two titles in 2021, at Adelaide and Rome.
   Other highlights included QF at Roland-Garros and SF at Ostrava and qualifying for WTA Finals Guadalajara (fell in group stage)
- Also finished doubles R-Up at 2021 Roland-Garros (w/Mattek-Sands, l. Krejcikova/Siniakova)
- Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland-Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland man or woman to win a Grand Slam singles title and first from her country to reach a major final since A.Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon
- Ranked No.54, she became the lowest-ranked woman to win the Roland-Garros title in the Open Era and the lowest-ranked finalist since 1977 (No.56 Mihai). At 19y 132d, is the youngest champion in Paris since Monica Seles (18y 187d) in 1992
- Also became the first player to win her debut Tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Jelena Ostapenko at 2017 Roland-Garros
- Won WTA Most Improved Player of the Year for 2020, as voted on by members of the media.
   Also won the 2020 WTA Fan Favorite Award
- Ended 2019 season ranked No.61 after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Lugano (l. Hercog) and R16 run at Roland-Garros (l. Halep). That year also reached 3r at Toronto (l. Osaka) and made 2r five times (incl. Australian and US Open)
- Broke into Top 100 at No.88 after R-Up finish at 2019 Lugano
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2019 Auckland
- Ended 2018 season ranked No.175 (up from No.690 in 2017), after posting 42-6 record and winning four titles on ITF Circuit

- Member of Poland's Billie Jean King Cup team, 2018-20, 2021-22
- On professional debut, came through qualifying to win title at \$10k ITF/Stockholm-SWE in 2016; owns seven singles titles at this level
- Enjoyed stellar junior career, including winning girls' singles at 2018 Wimbledon (d. Kung in F) and leading Poland to Junior Fed Cup in 2016

- · Coached by Dinara Safina
- Started playing tennis in Tolyatti (Kasatkina's hometown), 40 kilometres from her home in Zhigulevsk and parents
- Moved to Moscow aged nine and is now studying at North Carolina State where she is majoring in exploratory studies
- Favorite move is Never Back Down and favorite food is Asian
- · Coached by Wim Fissette
- Previously worked with Tomasz Wiktorowski and Piotr Sierzputowski
- Father is former Olympic rower Tomasz Swiatek, who competed in the men's quadruple sculls event at the 1988 Summer Olympics in Seoul
- In summer 2022 organised 'Iga Swiatek and friends for Ukraine' event in Krakow, which featured a mixed doubles match between Agnieszka Radwanska, Sergiy Stakhovsky, Polish junior Martyn Pawelski and herself, and was attended by Poland's First Lady, Agata Kornhauser-Duda, Elina Svitolina and Andriy Shevchenko. The occasion was watched by almost 15,000 people live and a further one million on television, raising more than half a million Euros for Ukrainian children and teenagers affected by the war
- Started playing tennis because her older sister was playing and wanted to beat her
- Enjoys rock music, including AC/DC and Pink Floyd
- Includes PZU, On, Tecnifibre, Rolex and Xiaomi in her endorsement portfolio
