Gauff leads 5-4

Sabalenka:

- The two-time Madrid champion (2021 & 2023) is through to her fourth Madrid final, equalling Simona Halep for most Madrid Open finals
- Looking to equal Petra Kvitova with the most Madrid Open titles (3)
- Is the first player to reach the final at the Madrid Open for three consecutive years
- Could become the second player to win the title at Miami and Madrid during the same season after Serena Williams in 2013
- Has become the second player to reach the finals at Indian Wells, Miami and Madrid during a single season after Maria Sharapova in 2013
- Equals Mirra Andrejeva with the most WTA 1000 match wins of the 2025 season with 17
- Is undefeated against Top 10 players so far in 2025 (5-0); she is only the second player to win all her first five matches of the season against Top 10 players in straight sets after Serena Williams in 2014 (completed matches only)
- Leads the Tour in number of match wins with 30
- Leads the PIF Race to the WTA Finals leaderboard and her Madrid result will put her over 1000 points ahead of the nearest challenger, Madison Keys

Gauff:

- In her fifth Madrid main draw, has reached the final for the first time; also her first singles final of 2025 (won United Cup with USA team)
- At 21 years old, is the second youngest player to reach the Madrid Open final, older only than Caroline Wozniacki in 2009 (18 years old)
- Leads the head-to-heads with Sabalenka including winning their only previous meeting on clay at Rome 2021
- Won both her two previous WTA 1000 finals at 2023 Cincinnati and Beijing 2024
- Won both those finals without dropping a set: she could become the second player since the format's introduction in 2009 to win her first three WTA 1000 finals in straight sets after Swiatek
- Has a career record of 10-1 in WTA final matches (lost only at 2022 Roland Garros)
- Is the fourth player from USA to reach a WTA 1000 final on clay since the format introduction in 2009, after Serena Williams (Madrid 2012, 2013, Rome 2013), Madison Keys (Rome 2016) and Jessica Pegula (Madrid 2022)
- Serena Williams is the only player from USA to have claimed the Madrid title (2012 and 2013)
- Currently sits at No.12 on the PIF Race to the WTA Finals leaderboard; her Madrid result is projected to move her to the No.6 position

- Making 7th appearance at Madrid; she is two-time champion in 2021 (d. Barty) and 2023 (d. Swiatek) and also finished R-Up in 2024 (l. Swiatek)
- Looking to equal Petra Kvitova in the most career Madrid Open titles (3)
- After 1r bye, has beaten Anna Blinkova, Elise Mertens, Peyton Stearns, Marta Kostyuk and Elina Svitolina so far this week to reach the final
- This is her 13th WTA 1000 final with a current record of 8-4
- Faces No.4 Coco Gauff in the final; owns 45 wins in career over Top 10 players; is 5-0 against such players this season most recently defeating No.6 Paolini at Stuttgart
- Has a 6-1 record against players from USA so far in 2025 (only loss to Madison Keys in Australian Open final)
- Record against seeded players so far in 2025 standing at 15-2
- This is her sixth final of the 2025 season with a record of 2-3 (won titles at Brisbane and Miami)
- Both her career clay titles were achieved at Madrid: 2023 and 2021
- Is No. 1 seed this week; has been top seed at 28 tournaments in her career
- Is currently ranked No.1; this time last year was ranked No.2. Sabalenka is spending her 35th and 36th weeks ranked World No.1 during Madrid
- Has won 30 matches so far in 2025; she is ranked No.1 on tour for match wins

- Making 5th appearance at Madrid, where she has reached the final for the first time after making R16 in 2022 and 2024
- After 1r bye, has beaten Dayana Yastremska, Ann Li, Belinda Bencic, Mirra Andreeva and Iga Swiatek so far this week to reach her first singles final of the season
- At 21 yrs old, is the second-youngest player to reach the final at the Madrid Open, older only than Caroline Wozniacki in 2009 (18 yrs old)
- This is her third WTA 1000 final with a record of 2-0 (won Cincinnati 2023 and Beijing 2024)
- Faces No.1 Aryna Sabalenka in F today; owns 26 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.2 Iga Swiatek in previous round here
- Defeated Sabalenka in their only previous meeting on clay at Rome 2021
- Record against seeded player so far in 2025 stands at 10-2
- Record in WTA final matches stands at 10-1 (including United Cup)
- Owns one clay court title: Parma in 2021
- Best result by United States of America at Madrid was Serena Williams in lifting the title in 2012 and 2013
- Last time a player from United States of America reached final at Madrid was Jessica Pegula in 2022
- Is currently ranked No.4; this time last year was ranked No.3

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CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan. Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid.
- Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- Rose to career-high No.2 in rankings on August 23, 2021
- In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F)
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10
- Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitová in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the 'Sunshine Double' by winning back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F) and Miami (d. Stosur/ Zhang in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Shenzhen in doubles (w/Mertens), going 1-2 in the round-robin stage
- Enjoyed breakthrough season in 2018, lifting two titles, at New Haven (d. Suarez Navarro in F) and Wuhan (d. Kontaveit in F), winning 46 matches and finishing at No.11 in the rankings
- Went three for three in finals in 2024, winning Auckland, Beijing and a historic first WTA Finals Riyadh title. Success in Saudi Arabia saw her win a record \$4.8m in prize money, the most ever awarded in women's professional sports, and defeat the World No.1 and No.2 at the same event. Posted a new career-high of No.2 in June
- Won debut Grand Slam singles crown in 2023 lifting title on home soil at US Open (d. Sabalenka in F). Picked up another three titles in 2023, marking first WTA 1000 title at Cincinnati and debut WTA 500 title at Washington DC, in addition to WTA 250 Auckland. In doubles was co-ranked No.1 with Pegula after US Open.
- In 2022, reached maiden Grand Slam final at Roland-Garros (l. Swiatek); was the youngest major finalist since Sharapova won 2004 Wimbledon
- Made Top-10 debut on September 12, 2022, following QF run at US Open (l. Garcia)
- Highlight of 2021 campaign was completing singles-doubles title sweep at Parma; defeated Q.Wang in singles final and teamed up w/McNally to win doubles
- In 2021 also reached SF at Adelaide and Rome, while at the Slams made QF at Roland-Garros and R16 at Wimbledon
- Finished R-Up in doubles at 2021 US Open (w/McNally, l. Stosur/Zhang)
- First cracked the Top 50 on February 24, 2020 at No.49, following a R16 appearance at Australian Open to tie her career best Grand Slam result - during run, defeated V.Williams in 1r and her first Top-5 opponent in No.4 Osaka in 3r (l. eventual champion Kenin in 3s)
- Enjoyed breakout season in 2019, highlighted by maiden WTA singles title at Linz (as lucky loser, d. Ostapenko in F) - earned her first Top-10 win en route to title over No.8 Bertens in QF
- At 15y 214d, her title run in Linz made her youngest to win a WTA tour-level title since Vaidisova (15y 177d) won Tashkent in 2004
- Also claimed maiden WTA doubles titles at Washington, DC (w/McNally, d. Sanchez/Stollar in F) and Luxembourg (w/McNally, d. Christian/Guarachi in F)
- By winning the doubles title at Washington, DC at 15y 144d, became the youngest player to win a doubles title since May 1995 (Hingis won Hamburg at 14y 219d)
- Reached R16 at 2019 Wimbledon on Grand Slam main draw debut defeating V.Williams in 1r (l.

- Also in 2018, was R-Up at Lugano (l. Mertens) and Eastbourne (l. Wozniacki), made SF at Cincinnati, reached five QFs and produced a career-best Grand Slam run to R16 at US Open
- Entered Top 50 on April 16, 2018, after Lugano run, and Top 20 on August 27 of the same year, following New Haven title
- Broke into Top 100 at No.76 on October 16, 2017 after reaching first Tour-level final at Tianjin (l. Sharapova). Also in 2017 made SF at Tashkent (l. Babos) and lifting WTA 125k Series title at Mumbai (d. Jakupovic)
- Made Grand Slam main draw debut 2017 Wimbledon, falling in 2r (as qualifier, d. Khromacheva, l. Witthoeft)
- Fell 1r on main draw debut at 2017 Dubai (as qualifier, l. Ka.Bondarenko)
- Member of Belarus Billie Jean King Cup team that lost to USA in 2017 final - scored first Top-20 win of career with defeat of No.13 Stephens during final in Minsk
- WTA qualifying debut came at 2016 Rabat
- Lifted first three ITF Circuit titles in 2015, including a 13-match win streak towards the year's end, bringing back-to-back trophies in Antalya, Turkey
- Made debut on ITF Circuit in Minsk in 2012

- eventual champion Halep) - followed with 3r showing at US Open (as WC, l. Osaka)
- Made WTA main draw debut as a wildcard at 2019 Miami where she earned her first WTA main draw win over good friend McNally (l. Kasatkina in 2r)
- Made professional debut in May 2018 as a qualifier into the \$25K ITF/Osprey, FL-USA
- Member of US Billie Jean King Cup team in 2022
- Former Junior World No.1 (July 2018); won 2018 Roland-Garros girls' title (d. McNally in F) and 2018 US Open doubles title (w/McNally), while finished R-Up at 2017 US Open girls' event (l. Anisimova) becoming the youngest girls' singles finalist in tournament history at 13-years-old

- Has a tiger tattoo on her left arm, which earned her the nickname "The Tiger"
