- Two Ukrainians in WTA 1000 quarterfinal for the third time, after 2018 Cincinnati and 2019 Wuhan
- First time since Miami, Madrid & Rome in 2014 that World No 1 & 2 reached 3 WTA 1000 QF's in a row
- Fifth year in a row there is a first-time WTA 1000 quarterfinalist in a Madrid QF (2021 - Badosa, Muchova; 2022- Alexandrova, Anisimova, Kalinina; 2023 – Sherif; 2024 – Andreeva; 2025 – Uchijima)
- The 2025 Madrid Open quarterfinals feature 5 of the Top 7 seeds. This is the fifth time that a WTA 1000 on clay has featured 5 of the Top 7 seeds and first time since 2018 Rome. Also at 2014 Madrid, 2011 Rome and 2009 Rome
- This is the third time the Madrid QF has featured two Americans in the QF - also 2012 and 2022

Swiatek leads 4-2

Keys:

- Achieved best result in Madrid last year, where she reached the semifinals (l. eventual champion Swiatek)
- In the previous six tournaments where Keys and Swiatek faced each other, the winner of the match secured the title (Rome 2021, Indian Wells 2022, Madrid 2024, Rome 2024 and Australian Open 2025) - the only exception was Cincinnati 2022
- Aiming to reach her 8th career WTA 1000 semifinal and second at the Madrid Open
- Has become the second player from USA to achieve 25+ WTA 1000 match wins on clay, along with Serena Williams (44)
- Has won 23 matches in so far in 2025: she had 24 in the entire 2024 season

Swiatek:

- Last year's Madrid champion (d. Sabalenka in F) and finished R-Up to Sabalenka in 2023
- Has reached her 17th consecutive QF on clay - last player to do so was Martina Hingis (19, Hilton Head 1997 to Hamburg 2002)
- Following her R16 win over Diana Shnaider, Swiatek (32) trails only Azarenka (33) for 6-0 sets claimed at WTA 1000 events since the format's introduction
- Only three players have claimed more WTA top 20 wins on clay at WTA 1000 events than Swiatek (14) - Simona Halep (20), Maria Sharapova (17) and Victoria Azarenka (15)
- Is undefeated against Keys on clay (3-0)
- Is 98-1 at WTA 1000 events after winning the first set, with her sole loss coming via retirement to Elena Rybakina in Rome (QF) in 2023
- Looking for first title of season having reached three semifinals and three quarterfinals, as well as leading Poland to the finals of the United Cup

Sabalenka leads 2-0

Sabalenka:

- By reaching QF, the two-time Madrid champion (2021 & 2023) now has a 20-4 match record at the tournament - Madrid is the third event at which she has registered 20 wins in her career after US Open and Australian Open (28 each)
- Record against opponents outside Top 20 stands at 18-3, with the 3 losses coming against No. 24 Ostapenko at Stuttgart (in F), No. 38 Tauson at Dubai and No. 26 Alexandrova at Doha
- With a win today, would equal Petra Kvitová and Simona Halep for the most SF appearances at Madrid (4 times); also, would advance to her 6th SF of 2025 season - already the player with the most semi-finals appearances (five: Brisbane, Australian Open, Indian Wells, Miami and Stuttgart)
- Record in WTA QF matches stands at 5-0 in 2025 (50-23 in career)
- Has won 28 matches so far in 2025; she is ranked No.1 on tour for match wins

Kostyuk:

- Has reached her first Madrid quarterfinal in her sixth appearance
- Best result at a WTA 1000 event was SF at Indian Wells 2024 (l. eventual champion Swiatek)
- Has yet to defeat a current world No.1, having lost both of her previous attempts; best win by ranking was defeating No.3 Gauff at Stuttgart 2024 and Doha 2025
- Best career result on clay is Runner-Up at Stuttgart in 2024
- First time 2 players from Ukraine reached QF at Madrid -Marta Kostyuk or Elina Svitolina could become the first player from Ukraine to reach SF at Madrid

[7] Mirra Andrejeva (#7) vs. [4] Coco Gauff (USA #4)

Gauff leads 2-0

Andrejeva:

- Playing in her second consecutive Madrid quarterfinal (l. eventual R-Up Sabalenka in 2024)
- This is the sixth WTA 1000 QF of her career and third of 2025 after claiming her maiden WTA 1000 titles at Dubai and Indian Wells
- Celebrated her 18th birthday yesterday (April 29)
- Has won her past five matches against Top 10 players and could become the fifth-youngest player to claim 6+ consecutive WTA top 10 wins after Monica Seles, Martina Hingis, Steffi Graf and Serena Williams in the past four decades
- Is 5-2 against Top 10 players so far in 2025 with both losses to No. Sabalenka at Brisbane and Australian Open
- With a win would become the youngest player to reach WTA 1000 semifinals on both clay and hard court since the format's inception in 2009
- Could become the youngest player to claim 7+ consecutive match wins over former Grand Slam champions since Serena Williams (1999)

Gauff:

- In her fifth Madrid main draw, has reached the quarterfinals for the first time
- Owns two career wins over M.Andreeva including one on clay at 2023 Roland Garros
- Following her R16 win over Bencic, became the youngest player to achieve 20 WTA 1000 match wins on clay since the format's introduction in 2009
- Only four players have achieved 20 WTA 1000 wins on clay in fewer matches than Gauff (29) – Iga Swiatek, Maria Sharapova, Serena Williams (24 each) and Kiki Bertens (27)
- Has now reached quarterfinal at all but one current WTA 1000 event; Miami
- Looking for her first singles semifinal of 2025 after falling in the quarterfinal at Australian Open and Stuttgart
- Could reach her 9th WTA 1000 SF and third on clay after Rome in 2021 and 2024 (l. eventual champion Swiatek on both occasions)

Moyuka Uchijima (JPN #56) vs. [17] Elina Svitolina (UKR #17)

Svitolina leads 1-0

Uchijima:

- Has beaten Robin Montgomery, Ons Jabeur, Jessica Pegula and Ekaterina Alexandrova to reach back-to-back quarterfinals after Rouen - prior to Rouen and Madrid, she had only reached QF once in Monastir 2022
- Reaching QF at Madrid is her career best result at WTA 1000 events – looking for her first career SF today
- Owns one career win over Top 20 players - defeating No.3 Pegula here at Madrid 2025
- Could become the second Japanese player since 1990 to reach SF at WTA 1000 events on clay court, after Ai Sugiyama in Rome 2003
- Has equalled the best result achieved by a Japanese player at the Madrid Open by reaching the quarterfinals (also Naomi Osaka in 2019)

Svitolina:

- In her 10th Madrid Open main draw appearance, has reached her first quarterfinal
- Is the player with the most main draw appearances needed at the Madrid Open to reach her maiden QF at the event (10, level with Madison Keys in 2024)
- Has made her 22nd WTA 1000 quarterfinal, the 5th on clay - she lost six of the last seven, winning only at Miami 2021 in that span (vs. Anastasija Sevastova)
- Could reach two clay court semifinals in a single calendar year (Rouen and Madrid) for the third time in her career after 2015 (Bogota and Marrakech) and 2017 (Istanbul and Rome)
- Svitolina (also Kostyuk) is looking to become the first woman from Ukraine to reach semifinal at Madrid

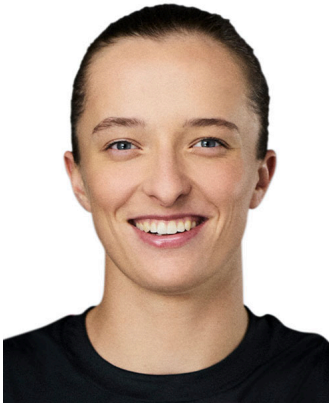

- Making her 11th appearance at Madrid, where her previous and best result was reaching SF in 2024 (l. eventual champion Swiatek)
- Has defeated Lucia Bronzetti, Anna Kalinskaya and Donna Vekic so far this week to reach 14th career QF at a WTA 1000
- Since the tournament's inauguration in 2009, Madison Keys (2024-2025) is the second-oldest player to reach back-to-back QFs at Madrid Open, only younger only Serena Williams (2012-2015)
- Faces No.2 Iga Swiatek in QF today
- Owns 10-9 career record against players from Poland, with record in 2025 standing at 1-0
- Has won two clay court titles: Strasbourg in 2024; Charleston in 2019
- Only American woman to win Madrid was Serena Williams in 2012 and 2013
- Is currently ranked No.5; this time last year was ranked No.20
- During last year's European clay swing she won Strasbourg and reached SF at Madrid, QF at Rome, and 3r at Roland Garros
- Has won 23 matches so far in 2025 (had 24 wins in the entire 2024 season)
- Is the player with the most matches won against Top 30 opponents in 2025 - she is 14-1 against such players this season, only losing to Aryna Sabalenka at Indian Wells

- Making 4th appearance at Madrid, where her best tournament result was capturing the title in 2024 (d. Sabalenka in F)
- After 1r bye, has defeated Alexandra Eala, Linda Noskova and Diana Shnaider so far this week
- Has become the first player to reach 17 consecutive QFs at WTA main draws on clay since Martina Hingis (19, Hilton Head 1997 - Hamburg 2002)
- Holds a 90% win rate, Swiatek (36-4) is the only player to hold a 90+% win rate on either surface at WTA 1000 events, since the format's introduction in 2009
- By reaching a 23rd WTA 1000 QF from 36 main draws, Swiatek (63.8%) holds the highest rate of WTA 1000 QFs reached of any player since 2009 - minimum five main draws
- Faces No.5 Madison Keys in QF today; holds 4-2 record and has won each of their three meetings on clay - Rome 2021, Madrid 2024, Rome 2024
- Owns 51-12 career record against players from United States of America, with record in 2025 standing at 1-2
- Owns ten clay court titles: Roland Garros, Rome, Madrid in 2024; Roland Garros, Stuttgart in 2023; Roland Garros, Rome, Stuttgart in 2022; Rome in 2021; Roland Garros in 2020
- Best result by Polish player at Madrid was title run run by Iga Swiatek in 2024
- Is currently ranked No.2; this time last year was ranked No.1
- During last year's European clay swing captured the title at Roland Garros, Rome and Madrid and reach the SF at Stuttgart

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2024, won eighth career title at Strasbourg (d. Collins in F dropping only three games). Reached SF at Madrid (l. eventual champion Swiatek) and Eastbourne (l. Fernandez), and another QF at Rome (l. eventual champion Swiatek). At Grand Slams, reached 4r at Wimbledon (l. Paolini, retired in 3r set due to left thigh injury), made 3r at Roland Garros (l. Navarro) and US Open (l. Mertens).
- In 2023, won seventh career title at Eastbourne (d. Kasatkina in F), reached SF at US Open and reached four QFs including Wimbledon; also qualified for WTA Elite Trophy in Zhuhai (0-2 in group play)
- At 2022 Adelaide, won first title in over two years (d. Riske in F), followed by SF run at Australian Open - best Slam showing since 2018
- Other highlights in 2022 were SF at Cincinnati and two further QF runs, including at Indian Wells
- In Grand Slam play, 2021 season was highlighted by R16 run at Wimbledon (l. Golubic). Finished campaign inside Top 100 for ninth successive year, but outside Top 20 for first time since 2014
- Ended 2020 ranked No.16, with best result being R-Up finish at Brisbane (l. Ka. Pliskova)

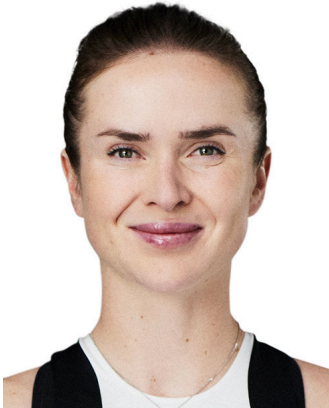

- In 2024 won first main draw Grand Slam matches of her career at Roland Garros (as a qualifier l. Sabalenka in 2r) and US Open (l. Niemeier in 2r), breaking into the Top 100 for the first time and reaching a career high of No.55 in October. In doubles claimed first career title at Jiujiang with Guo Hanyu and also reached final at Hua Hin 2 with Eudice Chong
- Best result of 2023 was R16 at Guangzhou (l. Bronzetti). Also entered directly into main draw at Australian Open (l. Pera), Hua Hin (l. Yastremska), Osaka (l. Zhu Lin) and Tokyo (l. Day).
- Enjoyed breakthrough year in 2022, playing first WTA 250 main draw match at Chennai (l. Linette). Entered first Grand Slam s, reaching Q3 at both Roland Garros (l. Niemeier) and US Open (l. Avanesyan).
- Beat first Top 50 player at Monastir (No. 41, Martic) reaching Tour-level QF for first time (l. Mertens). Began 2022 ranked No. 499 and ended at No. 105.
- Won first ITF tournament at Hua Hin W15 in 2019, also winning first ITF doubles title at Kyoto W60 (w/Hozumi).
- Played first professional tournaments in 2017, entering Tokyo (Japan Open, WTA 250) qualifying (l. Sema in Q1) and Tokyo (Toray Pan Pacific Open, WTA 500) qualifying (l. Linette in Q2).
- Achieved runner-up in her opening tournament of 2024 at Auckland (l. Gauff in F) before finishing R16 at Australian Open (l. Noskova, retired due to low back injury). Reached QF at Wimbledon (l. Rybakina), 4r at Roland Garros (l. Rybakina) and 3r at US Open (l. Gauff). Ended season after US Open
- Returned to the Tour in April 2023, following birth of daughter Skai. Won Strasbourg (d. Blinkova) for a second time (also in 2020) before achieving Grand Slam results of QF at Roland Garros (l. Sabalenka) and SF at Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Vondrousova)
- 2022 season reached 3r at Australian Open (l. Azarenka) and QF at Monterrey (l. Osorio), before going on maternity leave in spring
- Highlight of 2021 was lifting 16th career title at Chicago [250]. Also made SF at Miami, Stuttgart and the Olympics (won bronze medal)
- Won her 14th and 15th titles in 2020, firstly at Monterrey (d. Bouzkova in F) and then Strasbourg (d. Rybakina in F)
- Contested her 30th consecutive major at 2020 Australian Open (streak broke by skipping 2020 US Open). - In 2018, won 13th - and most prestigious - career title at 2018 WTA Finals (d. Stephens in F), after going 3-0 during round robin stage. Ended year ranked No.4. Also won titles at Rome (as defending champion, d. No.1 Halep in F), Dubai (as defending champion, d. Kasatkina in F) and Brisbane (d. Sasnovich in F)
- Enjoyed standout 2017, finishing year at No.6, winning a tour-leading five titles and posting second-most wins (53, behind Wozniacki with 60).
