If both Swiatek and Sabalenka win their semifinal they will become:

- the first players to face each other in a WTA final for three consecutive years since Lindsay Davenport and Venus Williams in Stanford (1998-2000)
- the first players to face each other in a clay court final for three consecutive years since Steffi Graf and Arantxa Sanchez Vicario in Hamburg (1992-1994)
- the first players to face each other in a Tier I / WTA 1000 final for three consecutive years since the format's introduction in 1990
- the players with the most clay court meetings as WTA World No. 1 and World No. 2 in the last 40 years (5)

Swiatek leads 11-3

Gauff:

- In her fifth Madrid main draw, has reached the semifinals for the first time
- This is her ninth WTA 1000 SF and her third on clay after Rome in 2024 and 2021 – losing to eventual champion Swiatek on both occasions
- Enters her first singles semifinal of 2025 (won United Cup with USA team)
- Is 2-7 in WTA 1000 semifinals, defeating Swiatek at Cincinnati 2023 and Badosa at Beijing 2024
- Is looking to reach her third career clay court final, after Parma 2021 (title won vs. Qiang Wang in final) and Roland Garros 2022 (the only of her 10 career finals she lost so far in her career vs. Swiatek)
- Has won her last three matches against top 2 opponents; d. No.2 Swiatek at United Cup 2025 and d. No.1 Sabalenka and No.2 Swiatek at WTA Finals 2024

Swiatek:

- Last year's Madrid champion (d. Sabalenka in F) and finished R-Up to Sabalenka in 2023
- Playing in her 20th career WTA 1000 semifinal from 36 main draws – since the format's introduction in 2009, only Serena Williams (31) has reached 20 WTA 1000 semifinals from fewer main draws
- Gauff is the player against whom Swiatek has won the most WTA main draw matches (11)
- Only Simona Halep (nine), Serena Williams (eight) and Maria Sharapova (seven) have reached more WTA 1000 semifinals on clay than Iga Swiatek (six) since the format's introduction
- Has currently reached 12 finals in 22 clay court tournament appearances: she could become the player with the fewest to reach 13 finals on the surface since Monica Seles (after 14 events)
- Looking for first title of season having reached three semifinals and three quarterfinals, as well as leading Poland to the finals of the United Cup

Sabalenka leads 4-1

Sabalenka:

- The two-time Madrid champion (2021 & 2023) is through to her fourth Madrid semifinal
- Madrid Open is the fourth event at which she has reached the semifinals on four occasions after US Open, Stuttgart and Cincinnati
- Is the third player to reach semifinals at Indian Wells, Miami and Madrid during a single season after Maria Sharapova (2013) and Serena Williams (2015)
- Looking to become the fifth player to win seven consecutive WTA 1000 semifinals after Caroline Wozniacki, Serena Williams, Maria Sharapova and Victoria Azarenka
- Could equal Simona Halep for the most finals reached at Madrid (4) since the inception of the women's singles event in 2009
- Owns 16 WTA 1000 match wins so far in, equal to Swiatek and only Mirra Andrejeva has more (17)
- Is undefeated in semifinal matches this season with a record of 5-0
- Leads the Tour in number of match wins with 29

Svitolina:

- In her 10th Madrid Open main draw appearance, has reached her first semifinal
- Has reached two clay court semifinals in a single calendar year (Rouen and Madrid) for the third time in her career after 2015 (Bogota and Marrakech) and 2017 (Istanbul and Rome)
- This is her 12th career WTA 1000 semifinal with a match record of 4-7; each of her four SF wins went on to win the title
- Becomes the first woman from Ukraine to reach semifinal at Madrid
- Has the most clay court wins of any player so far in 2025 with 9
- Is 7-7 so far in her career against the World No. 1: since 2000, only Serena Williams (14), Venus Williams (nine) and Lindsay Davenport (eight) have won more such matches
- Could become the player with the most main draw appearances at the Madrid Open to reach her maiden final at the event (10) - currently the record is held by Svetlana Kuznetsova (seven)

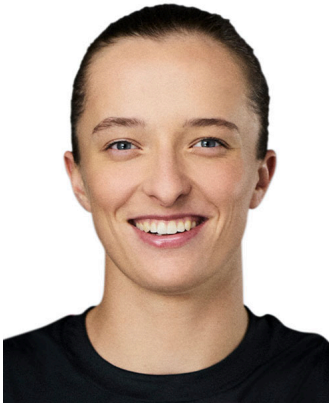

- Faces No.2 Iga Swiatek in SF today; owns 25 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.7 Mirra Andreeva previous round here
- Has five wins in career over Top 10 players on clay
- Has won her last three matches against top 2 opponents; d. No.2 Swiatek at United Cup 2025 and d. No.1 Sabalenka and No.2 Swiatek at WTA Finals 2024
- Seeking third straight win against Swiatek after defeating her in the final at United Cup 2025 and in round robin play at WTA Finals 2024
- Owns 7-12 career record against players from Poland, with record in 2025 standing at 1-1 (d. Swiatek in F at United Cup, l. Linette in 4r at Miami)
- Owns two WTA 1000 titles at Cincinnati 2023 and Beijing 2024
- Owns one clay court title: Parma in 2021

- Making 4th appearance at Madrid, where her best result was capturing the title in 2024 (d. Sabalenka). Finished R-Up to Sabalenka in 2023
- After 1r bye, has beaten Alexandra Eala, Linda Noskova, Diana Shnaider and Madison Keys so far this week to reach SF
- Playing in her 20th career WTA 1000 semifinal from 36 main draws since the format's introduction in 2009, only Serena Williams (31) has reached 20 WTA 1000 semifinals from fewer main draws
- Faces No.4 Coco Gauff in SF today; owns 49 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.5 Madison Keys in previous round here in Madrid
- Overall, is 49-20 (71%) against top 10 opponents, trailing only Steffi Graf (75.0%) in win rate against WTA top 10 opponents since 1990 (minimum 10 matches)
- Is one of three active players to have 10+ WTA match wins over a single active opponent along with Keys (10-2 vs. Kasatkina) and Sabalenka (10-2 vs. Mertens)
- Has a 5-1 record against Gauff in Tour-level SF, winning the most recent at Roland Garros 2024
- Is 2-2 against players from United States so far in 2025
- Owns 10 clay court titles
- Owns the best result by Poland at the Madrid Open
- Is currently ranked No.2; this time last year was ranked No.1
- Has won 26 matches so far in 2025; she is ranked No.3 on Tour for match wins, behind Aryna Sabalenka (29) Jessica Pegula (27)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Went three for three in finals in 2024, winning Auckland, Beijing and a historic first WTA Finals Riyadh title. Success in Saudi Arabia saw her win a record \$4.8m in prize money, the most ever awarded in women's professional sports, and defeat the World No.1 and No.2 at the same event. Posted a new career-high of No.2 in June
- Won debut Grand Slam singles crown in 2023 lifting title on home soil at US Open (d. Sabalenka in F). Picked up another three titles in 2023, marking first WTA 1000 title at Cincinnati and debut WTA 500 title at Washington DC, in addition to WTA 250 Auckland. In doubles was co-ranked No.1 with Pegula after US Open.
- In 2022, reached maiden Grand Slam final at Roland-Garros (l. Swiatek); was the youngest major finalist since Sharapova won 2004 Wimbledon
- Made Top-10 debut on September 12, 2022, following QF run at US Open (l. Garcia)
- Highlight of 2021 campaign was completing singles-doubles title sweep at Parma; defeated Q.Wang in singles final and teamed up w/McNally to win doubles
- In 2021 also reached SF at Adelaide and Rome, while at the Slams made QF at Roland-Garros and R16 at Wimbledon
- Finished R-Up in doubles at 2021 US Open (w/McNally, l. Stosur/Zhang)
- First cracked the Top 50 on February 24, 2020 at No.49, following a R16 appearance at Australian Open to tie her career best Grand Slam result - during run, defeated V.Williams in 1r and her first Top-5 opponent in No.4 Osaka in 3r (l. eventual champion Kenin in 3s)
- Enjoyed breakout season in 2019, highlighted by maiden WTA singles title at Linz (as lucky loser, d. Ostapenko in F) - earned her first Top-10 win en route to title over No.8 Bertens in QF
- At 15y 214d, her title run in Linz made her youngest to win a WTA tour-level title since Vaidisova (15y 177d) won Tashkent in 2004
- Also claimed maiden WTA doubles titles at Washington, DC (w/McNally, d. Sanchez/Stollar in F) and Luxembourg (w/McNally, d. Christian/Guarachi in F)
- By winning the doubles title at Washington, DC at 15y 144d, became the youngest player to win a doubles title since May 1995 (Hingis won Hamburg at 14y 219d)
- Reached R16 at 2019 Wimbledon on Grand Slam main draw debut defeating V.Williams in 1r (l.
- Claimed five titles in 2024, making it a three-peat at Roland-Garros and also winning Doha, Indian Wells, Madrid and Rome. Crossed \$30m in prize money and qualified for her fourth WTA Finals
- Won six titles across 2023, including winning fourth Grand Slam title at Roland-Garros (d. Muchova in F) and going undefeated at the WTA Finals in Cancun (d. Pegula in F). Finished season as WTA World No.1 player for second consecutive year.
- In 2022, lifted second and third Grand Slam titles, at Roland-Garros (d. Gauff in F) and US Open (d. Jabeur in F)
- Triumph in Paris was the last of six straight titles during 37-match winning streak - joint-longest unbeaten run on Tour since 1990
- Won two titles in 2021, at Adelaide and Rome. Other highlights included QF at Roland-Garros and SF at Ostrava and qualifying for WTA Finals Guadalajara (fell in group stage)
- Also finished doubles R-Up at 2021 Roland-Garros (w/Mattek-Sands, l. Krejčíková/Siniakova)
- Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland-Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland - man or woman - to win a Grand Slam singles title and first from her country to reach a major final since A.Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon
- Ranked No.54, she became the lowest-ranked woman to win the Roland-Garros title in the Open Era and the lowest-ranked finalist since 1977 (No.56 Mihai). At 19y 132d, is the youngest champion in Paris since Monica Seles (18y 187d) in 1992
- Also became the first player to win her debut Tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Jelena Ostapenko at 2017 Roland-Garros
- Won WTA Most Improved Player of the Year for 2020, as voted on by members of the media. Also won the 2020 WTA Fan Favorite Award
- Ended 2019 season ranked No.61 after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Lugano (l. Hercog) and R16 run at Roland-Garros (l. Halep). That year also reached 3r at Toronto (l. Osaka) and made 2r five times (incl. Australian and US Open)
- Broke into Top 100 at No.88 after R-Up finish at 2019 Lugano
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2019 Auckland
- Ended 2018 season ranked No.175 (up from No.690 in 2017), after posting 42-6 record and winning four titles on ITF Circuit

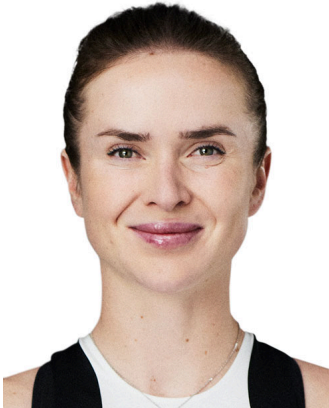
