Emma Raducanu (GBR #46) vs. [WC] Naomi Osaka (JPN #51)

First meeting

Raducanu:

- Making 3rd main draw appearance at Washington D.C., where her best result was reaching QF in 2024 and 2022
- Has beaten No.27 Marta Kostyuk so far this week, good for her 11th win over a Top 50 opponent in 2025
- Owns one career hard court title: US Open in 2021
- With a win would be through to third QF of 2025 – also QF at Queens and Miami
- Is currently ranked No.46; this time last year was ranked No.93

Osaka:

- Making 2nd main draw appearance at Washington D.C., where her previous result was reaching 2r in 2018
- Seeking second QF appearance of 2025 (also at Auckland, R-Up)
- Defeated No.43 Yulia Putintseva so far this week, improving her record on hard court in 2025 to 10-4
- Looking to defeat multiple Top 50 opponents in same the tournament for the first time since winning three such matches at Rome in 2024
- Owns seven career hard court titles: Australian Open in 2021, US Open in 2020, Beijing, Osaka and Australian Open in 2019 and US Open and Indian Wells in 2018
- Is currently ranked No.51; this time last year was ranked No.102

[WC] Venus Williams (USA NR) vs. [5] Magdalena Frech (POL #24)

First meeting

V. Williams:

- Making 2nd main draw appearance at Washington D.C., where her previous result was reaching 1r in 2022
- Defeated Peyton Stearns in opening match, first appearance on the WTA Tour since 2024 at Miami.
- Became the oldest player to win a WTA Tour-level match since 2004 Wimbledon (Martina Navratilova, 47 years old)
- Seeking to become the oldest player to reach a quarterfinal at a WTA-level event since 1990, surpassing Kimiko Date (43 years 254 days, Birmingham 2014)
- Owns 49 career titles, with 32 of them coming on hard court (most recent coming at Kaohsiung 2016)
- Looking to win consecutive matches for the first time since advancing to the QF at Cincinnati in 2019

Frech:

- Making 2nd main draw appearance at Washington D.C., where her previous result was reaching 1r in 2023
- Has beaten Yuliia Starodubtseva so far this week, her fourth win against a Top 100 opponent on hard court in 2025
- Holds a 7-3 career record against wildcards (5-2 on hard court)
- Looking to advance to first QF since Wuhan in 2024
- Owns one career hard court title: Guadalajara in 2024

Kenin leads 4-2

Townsend:

- Making fifth appearance at Washington DC, where her best previous result was reaching 2r in 2024 (I. Bouzkova)
- Owns 19 wins in career over Top 50 players, most recently No.37 Tatjana Maria at Washington DC in 2025
- Best career result on hard court is quarterfinal which she has reached once: Toronto in 2024 (as LL, I. Navarro)
- A qualifier has reached the QF stage in Washington DC five times with the best result coming in 2019 when Anna Kalinskaya reached the SF (to note, Wang Xiyu reached SF as a lucky loser in 2024)
- In the last two editions – as a WTA 500 – Townsend would be the third lowest player to reach the QF here, behind only No.176 Amanda Anisimova (QF in 2024) and No.131 Robin Montgomery (QF in 2024)
- Townsend is one win away from moving to the top of the PIF WTA Doubles Rankings; currently the World No.2 ranked doubles player, she is playing this week as the No.2 seed with Zhang Shuai

Kenin:

- Making fourth appearance at Washington DC, where her best result was reaching 2r in 2019 (I. Davis)
- Bidding to reach fourth QF of 2025 season – also QF at Hobart, QF at Dubai and R-Up at Charleston
- Faces No.97 Taylor Townsend in 2r today, looking for her fifth career win against her
- Four-time hard court Champion: Lyon, Australian Open in 2020; Guangzhou, Hobart in 2019
- Is currently ranked No.26; this time last year was ranked No.56

[1] Jessica Pegula (USA #4) vs Leyla Fernandez (CAN #36)

Pegula leads 2-0

Pegula:

- Making sixth appearance at Washington DC, where her best result was winning in 2019 (d. Giorgi in Final)
- Owns 9-0 career record against players from Canada (2-0 against Leyla Fernandez)
- Six-time hard court Champion: Austin in 2025; Toronto in 2024; Seoul, Montreal in 2023; Guadalajara in 2022; Washington DC in 2019
- Is No.1 seed this week; has been top seed at 13 tournaments in her career
- Has won 34 matches so far in 2025; she is ranked No.3 on tour for match wins
- Could move to No.3 this week if she wins the title

Fernandez:

- Making 2nd appearance at Washington DC, where her previous result was reaching 2r in 2023 (as qualifier, I. Sakkari)
- Owns 6 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.9 Emma Navarro at Doha in 2025
- Searching for her first career win on hard court against Jessica Pegula
- One of 2 players from Canada to reach 2r (Victoria Mboko); Last time 2 players from Canada reached 2r at Washington DC was 2017
- The best result by a Canadian in DC has been QF, achieved four times previously – 2011 Stephanie Dubois, 2012 Eugenie Bouchard, 2017 Bianca Andreescu and 2022 Rebecca Marino
- Is currently ranked No.36; this time last year was ranked No.24

CAREER MILESTONES

- Returned to the courts in 2024 winning opening round matches at Auckland, Australian Open and Abu Dhabi. Went on to reach semifinals at Nottingham, as well as quarterfinals at Stuttgart, Eastbourne, Washington and Seoul. Achieved her first career Top 10 wins over No.5 Jessica Pegula at Eastbourne and No.9 Maria Sakkari at Wimbledon
- In 2023 made fourth round of Indian Wells (l. Swiatek) before falling in opening rounds at Miami and Stuttgart. Ended her season after Stuttgart and took time away to undergo minor surgery on both hands and ankle in May 2023.
- Struggled with injuries and form throughout 2022 dropping as low as No.83 after 1r exit at US Open
- Best performance came late in the year with SF run in Seoul (l. Ostapenko via ret. w/left glute injury). Also made QF at Stuttgart (l. eventual champion Swiatek) and Washington DC (l. eventual champion Samsonova) with best win-by-ranking coming over No.22 Azarenka during 3r run at Cincinnati
- Earned a career best year in 2021 jumping over 300 ranking spots and finishing the season inside the Top 20 at a career high of No.19 earning her the 2021 WTA Newcomer of the Year Award
- Reached QF at Cluj-Napoca 2 (l. Kostyuk) and made appearances at Indian Wells and Linz
- Won the US Open in only her fourth Tour-level appearance (d. fellow teenager Fernandez in F); did not drop a set and upset No.12 Bencic and No.18 Sakkari along the way to become the first qualifier to lift a Grand Slam title
- Fell 1r at San Jose (as WC, l. Zhang) and finished R-Up at WTA 125K Series event in Chicago (l. Tauson)
- At Wimbledon, became the youngest British woman in the Open Era to reach R16 (l. Tomljanovic via ret.); upset Top-50 players Vondrousova and Cirstea en route
- Made debut WTA main draw appearance at 2021 Nottingham (as WC, l. Dart in 1r)
- Ended 2020 by finishing R-Up at \$25k ITF/Sunderland-GBR
- Won title at \$25k ITF/Pune-IND in 2019
- Lifted first two ITF Circuit titles in 2018, at \$15k ITF/Antalya-TUR and \$15k ITF/Tiberias-GRE
- Owns three singles titles on ITF Circuit
- In Juniors she reached back-to-back quarter finals of Wimbledon and US Open in 2018

- Returned to play in 2024 following maternity leave and reached the QF at Doha and 's-Hertogenbosch, as well as R16 at Rome and Beijing
- Played 2022 Tokyo in September before taking a 15 month break to give birth to daughter Shai in early July 2023

In 2022 had success at Miami, where she fell to Swiatek in the final, her first final since the 2021 Australian Open. Also reached the semifinals at Melbourne 250 #1 (withdrew before semifinal with Kudermetova w/abdominal injury)

- Won 2021 Australian Open (d. Brady in F) to become first woman since Seles in the early 1990s to win each of her first four Grand Slam finals - is the 16th woman to win four or more majors in the Open Era
- At 2020 US Open, came from a set and a break down to Azarenka and win third Grand Slam title of career
- Also last season was R-Up at Western & Southern Open - withdrew w/left hamstring injury before final against Azarenka
- Won second Grand Slam at Australian Open (d. Kvitova in F); became first Japanese player to reach World No.1 ranking following the tournament
- In addition, won back-to-back titles for first time in her career at Osaka (d. Pavlyuchenkova in F) and Beijing (d. Barty in F); defeated No.1 Barty in Beijing final for second career victory over world No.1 (also beat Halep at 2018 Indian Wells)
- Enjoyed break-out season in 2018, posting a 40-20 record resulting in a No.5 (first Top 10 season), up from No.68 in 2017
- Won the first two titles of her career in 2018, at Indian Wells (d. Kasatkina in F) and debut Grand Slam crown at US Open (d. S.Williams in F)
- En route to the Indian Wells title, defeated five-time major champion Sharapova, and A.Radwanska, Ka.Pliskova and Halep. Only set dropped all fortnight was against Sakkari in R16
- Reached one further final in 2018, at Tokyo [PPO] (l. Ka.Pliskova)
- In reaching R16 at 2018 Australian Open, became youngest Japanese player to reach R16 at a Slam since Sugiyama at 1995 Roland Garros (19y, 342d) and the youngest player from Japan to reach R16 in Melbourne since Date in 1990 (19y, 122d)

- Book-ended 2017 season with QF showings at Auckland and Hong Kong; other highlights included 3r runs at Wimbledon and US Open
- Scored first Top 5 win of career when she defeated No.5 V.Williams at 2017 Hong Kong. Upset win over defending champion and No.6-ranked Kerber at 2017 US Open marked first career Top 10 win
- Voted 2016 WTA Newcomer of the Year; highlight was career-first WTA final at Tokyo [PPO] (l. Wozniacki). Also reached QF on three occasions and 3r at Australian Open, Roland Garros and US Open
- Ranked No.406, made WTA main draw debut at 2014 Stanford. As an alternate, won through qualifying (achieving first WTA qualifying wins), and came from match point down to shock No.19 Stosur in 1r of main draw, before losing to No.18 Petkovic in 2r
- Made WTA qualifying debut at Quebec City in 2013 (l. Dabrowski)

- Only child, parents are Ian (Romanian) and Renee (Chinese). Born in Toronto and moved to Bromley, south of London, at the age of two
- Favorite shot is forehand and favorite surface is hard
- Started playing tennis aged five
- In the summer of 2021, completed her A-level exams in maths and English
- Has a wide variety of interests in sports such as go-karting, horse riding, tap dancing, golf, skiing and basketball

- Currently working with Patrick Mouratoglou
- Father is from Haiti, mother is from Japan; older sister is Mari (also played tennis)
- Was born in Osaka, Japan, and moved to USA when she was three years old
- Hobbies include fashion, gaming and photography

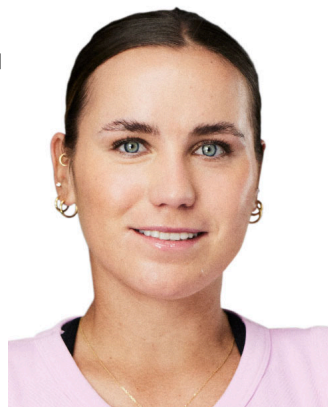
