MATCH NOTES - QUARTERFINALS - SATURDAY, APRIL 19

Ekaterina Alexandrova (#22) vs. [3] Jessica Pegula (USA #3)

Tied 2-2

The pair are facing each other for the third time this season, with Alexandrova taking the win in Doha quarterfinals, and Pegula winning their most recent encounter in Charleston semifinals

Alexandrova:

- Making fifth main draw appearance where she is into QF for a second time also doing so in 2021
- Holds 4-2 record over Top 10 players this year; upset of No.7 Mirra Andreeva in 2r was 18th career Top 10 win
- Since start of 2024 season, has gone 8-1 in QF matches (3-0 this year)
- Has already reached SF on clay at Charleston this year; last year won only one match on the surface
- With a win, would tie best career result on clay with fourth SF appearance

Pegula:

- Making debut appearance in Stuttgart where she is into sixth QF of the year
- Won her 2r match in just under an hour; has now won 11 of her last 12 matches finishing R-Up in Miami and winning title in Charleston
- Has gone 4-1 in QF matches this year with sole loss coming to today's opponent at Doha
- Won both of their previous meetings on clay including a tight three-setter in the Charleston SFs earlier this year
- Leads the Tour with 26 matches won in 2025

Jelena Ostapenko (LAT #24) v. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

Ostapenko leads 5-0

Ostapenko:

- Her best result at WTA-500 events was title run at Linz 2024 (d. Alexandrova in F) and Eastbourne 2021 (d. Kontaveit in F)
- Has beaten Dayana Yastremska (via retirement) and Emma Navarro to reach her 2nd QF of 2025 season after Doha (en route to R-Up)
- Owns 22 wins in career over Top 10 players with 2 of them coming in 2025 defeating No.2 Iga Swiatek and No.4 Jasmine Paolini at Doha 2025 en route to final
- Best career result on clay was title run at 2017 Roland Garros, also reached the final at 2017 Charleston (l. Kasatkina)
- Has defeated today's opponent Swiatek in all their 5 previous meetings

Swiatek:

- The two-time champion in 2023 and 2022 has beaten Jana Fett to reach her 7th QF of 2025 season
- Owns 17-2 record against opponents outside Top 20 this season, with the only two losses coming against No. 140 Eala at Miami and No. 37 Ostapenko at Doha

- Looking to end her losing 0-5 streak to today's opponent Ostapenko in their first meeting on clay today

- Has won 22 matches so far in 2025, behind only Pegula (26) and Sabalenka (23)

Sabalenka leads 8-2

Gauff leads 2-0

Sabalenka:

- Making fifth appearance as a three-time finalist finishing R-Up in 2021, 2022 and 2023
- With a 1r bye, and a walkover against Potapova, she will be playing her first match at Stuttgart this week
- Has gone 11-2 against players outside the Top 20 this year with losses to No.26 Ekaterina Alexandrova at Doha and No.38 Clara Tauson at Dubai
- Won 11 of her last 12 matches reaching the final at both Indian Wells (I. Andreeva) and Miami (d. Pegula)
- Holds 4-0 record in QF matches this year and has gone on to reach the final each time she has reached the final eight
- Has won last seven matches against today's opponent, last loss came at 2018 Montreal

Mertens:

- Making third appearance at Stuttgart where she is into QF for the first time
- Is into third QF of the season; has also reached the final every time she has advanced to this stage so far this year
- Beat No.13 Diana Shnaider in 2r for first Top 20 win of the year
- Playing a World No.1 for the fourth time in career looking for her first win
- Most recent Top 10 win was over No.3 Jessica Pegula at 2023 Roland Garros

Gauff:


- Making fourth appearance at Stuttgart, reaching 3rd QF of 2025 season equalling her previous best result of QF run 2024 (I. Kostyuk) at Stuttgart
- Best result at a WTA-500 event was title run at Washington DC 2023 (d. Sakkari in F)
- Owns 24 wins in career over Top 10 players with record in 2025 at 1-0, having defeated No.2 Iga Swiatek in final at United Cup 2025
- Record in WTA QF matches stands at 24-17 and a 1-1 record in 2025
- Has won one title on clay at 2021 Parma; also finished R-Up at Roland Garros in 2022 (I. Swiatek)

Paolini:

- Making 2nd appearance at Stuttgart, where her previous result was reaching QF in 2024 (I. eventual champion Rybakina) on tournament debut
- Has beaten Eva Lys and Jule Niemeier to reach her third QF of 2025 season, after Miami (en route to SF) and United Cup (I. Muchova)
- Looking to her first Top-10 win of 2025 season, having failed in her previous meeting with such opponents in 2025 (I. No. 1 Sabalenka at Miami)
- Record in WTA QF matches stands at 13-12 (1-1 in 2025)

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2024, highlights included reaching the final at Linz (l. Ostapenko in Final) and semifinals at Adelaide (l. eventual champion Ostapenko), Miami (l. eventual champion Collins), 's-Hertogenbosch (l. eventual champion Samsonova) and Monterrey (l. Sun); also made quarterfinals at Wuhan (l. Xin. Wang) and her best Grand Slam result of the season came during a 3r run at US Open (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- In 2023, won fourth career singles title at 's-Hertogenbosch, successfully defending the title and defeating top seed, Kudermetova in the final. A run of successful results followed with SF at Berlin (l. eventual champion, Kvitova), 4r at Wimbledon (l. Sabalenka) - a career best result at any of the majors and runner-up at Cleveland (l. Sorribes Tormo).
- Reached a 2023 peak ranking of No. 16 on February 20, 2023 following a 3r finish at Australian Open (l. Linette), before posting two QF results at Miami (l. eventual champion Kvitova) and Charleston (l. Bencic). Another QF then came in the Asian Swing at Tokyo (l. Pavlyuchenkova).
- In 2022, won titles at
 S-Hertogenbosch (d. Sabalenka in F) and Seoul (d. Ostapenko in F). Also advanced to SF at Charleston, Madrid and Ostrava, making Top-20 debut on October 10, 2022
- Reached third WTA singles final in 2021, enjoying run to final at home tournament of Moscow (l. Kontaveit). Other key result was SF run at Gippsland Trophy (l. Kanepi)
- Posted two best wins-by-ranking of career in 2021, defeating No.2 Halep (Gippsland Trophy) and No.2 Sabalenka (Moscow)
- Reached 2r on Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020
- Opened 2020 season by lifting her maiden WTA singles title, at Shenzhen (d. Rybakina in F)
- Won both singles rubbers on Billie Jean King Cup debut in 3-2 win over Romania in February 2020
- Made Top-50 debut on June 17, 2019 after QF run at 's-Hertogenbosch
- Registered 30 Tour-level match wins during 2019, in which she reached SF at Budapest, Seoul and Linz and made QF at St. Petersburg, 's-Hertogenbosch, Eastbourne and Moscow. Also advanced to 3r at a major for the first time, at Roland Garros
- Won sole WTA doubles title at 2019 Budapest (w/Zvonareva)

- In 2024, won two singles titles Toronto (WTA 1000) and Berlin - en route to year-end ranking of No.7, her third-straight year-end Top 10 finish; two-time runner-up at Cincinnati and US Open; joined Rosie Casals (1970), Evonne Goolagong Cawley (1973) and Serena Williams (2013) as the only women in the Open Era to make the final at the Canadian Open, Cincinnati Open and US Open in the same season
- Also qualified for the 2024 WTA Finals (withdrew during round-robin play due to left knee injury)
- Won two titles in 2023, her second WTA 1000 tournament at Montreal and also WTA 250 Seoul. Also finished R-Up at Doha, Tokyo and at the WTA Finals in Cancun.

In doubles ascended to No.1 ranking (co-ranked with Coco Gauff) after 2023 US Open.

- Achieved career-high No. 3 in October 2022 after defeating four Grand Slam champions at Guadalajara, en route to ending three-year wait for second WTA title (d. Sakkari in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Fort Worth in both singles and doubles (w/Gauff), thus becoming the first Americans to debut in singles and doubles at the season-ending showpiece since Davenport in 1994
- Reached QF at three of the four majors in 2022, breaking into Top 10 after doing so at Roland Garros (June 6, 2022)
- One of seven players to win 40 or more matches in 2022, alongside Swiatek, Jabeur, Garcia, Sakkari, Kasatkina and Bencic
- In 2021, reached the QF or better on seven occasions, including at the Australian Open
- Broke into Top 20 on November 1, 2021
- Began 2020 with runner-up finish at Auckland (l. S.Williams), other standout results were a QF at Western & Southern Open (as qualifier, l. Mertens) and a 3r showing at US Open (l. Kvitova)
- On the doubles court in 2020, reached QFs of Roland-Garros (w/Muhammad) and Cincinnati (w/Rogers)
- Won her first WTA title at 2019 Washington DC (d. Giorgi in F)
- Also in 2019, fell 1r on main draw debut at Roland-Garros (l. eventual champion Barty) and Wimbledon (l. Buzarnescu) and Miami (as a qualifier, l. Konta)
- Broke into Top 100 for the first time on February 4, 2019 following back-to-back R-Up finishes at

- Came through qualifying to make maiden WTA final appearance at 2018 Linz (l. Giorgi)
- Advanced to first WTA QF at 2018 Seoul, scoring maiden Top 10 win of her career en route, over No.10 Ostapenko
- Made Top-100 debut at No.93 on March 20, 2017 after winning title at \$60K ITF/Shenzhen-CHN
- At 2016 Wimbledon, ranked No.223, won her way through qualifying on her maiden Slam appearance, going on to reach 2r (upset No.23 seed Ivanovic in 1r)
- Won WTA 125K Series title at Limoges in 2016, 2018-19
- Reached 2r on WTA main draw debut at 2016 Katowice (as qualifier, l. eventual R-Up Giorgi)
- Contested qualifying for the first time at a WTAlevel tournament at 2014 Bad Gastein
- Played first professional events of career on ITF Circuit in Europe in 2011

WTA 125K Series event at Newport Beach and W100 ITF Circuit tournament in Midland-MI, USA

- Highlights of 2018 included finishing R-up as a qualifier at Quebec City (l. Parmentier in F), recording SF finish at Houston WTA 125K Series tournament (l. S.Peng) and reaching QF or better at 10 ITF events
- Did not play between January and August 2017 after undergoing hip surgery. Primarily played at ITF Circuit events for the rest of the year, winning two doubles titles with Townsend
- Played a mixture of WTA and ITF Circuit events in 2016 with highlight coming at Washington DC, where she defeated No.14 Stosur for first Top-20 win of career on her way to a SF finish (l. Davis)
- Reached 2r on Grand Slam main draw debut at 2015 US Open (as qualifier, d. Van Uytvanck, l. Cibulkova)
- Sidelined from tennis for a year and a half between 2013 and 2015 due to a right knee injury
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2009 Ponte Vedra Beach and WTA main draw debut at 2012 Indian Wells





CAREER MILESTONES

- Went three for three in finals in 2024, winning Auckland, Beijing and a historic first WTA Finals Riyadh title. Success in Saudi Arabia saw her win a record \$4.8m in prize money, the most ever awarded in women s professional sports, and defeat the World No.1 and No.2 at the same event. Posted a new career-high of No.2 in June
- Won debut Grand Slam singles crown in 2023 lifting title on home soil at US Open (d. Sabalenka in F). Picked up another three titles in 2023, marking first WTA 1000 title at Cincinnati and debut WTA 500 title at Washington DC, in addition to WTA 250 Auckland. In doubles was co-ranked No.1 with Pegula after US Open.
- In 2022, reached maiden Grand Slam final at Roland-Garros (l. Swiatek); was the youngest major finalist since Sharapova won 2004 Wimbledon
- Made Top-10 debut on September 12, 2022, following QF run at US Open (l. Garcia)
- Highlight of 2021 campaign was completing singles-doubles title sweep at Parma; defeated Q.Wang in singles final and teamed up w/McNally to win doubles
- In 2021 also reached SF at Adelaide and Rome, while at the Slams made QF at Roland-Garros and R16 at Wimbledon
- Finished R-Up in doubles at 2021 US Open (w/McNally, l. Stosur/Zhang)
- First cracked the Top 50 on February 24, 2020 at No.49, following a R16 appearance at Australian Open to tie her career best Grand Slam result during run, defeated V.Williams in 1r and her first Top-5 opponent in No.4 Osaka in 3r (l. eventual champion Kenin in 3s)
- Enjoyed breakout season in 2019, highlighted by maiden WTA singles title at Linz (as lucky loser, d. Ostapenko in F) - earned her first Top-10 win en route to title over No.8 Bertens in QF
- At 15y 214d, her title run in Linz made her youngest to win a WTA tour-level title since Vaidisova (15y 177d) won Tashkent in 2004
- Also claimed maiden WTA doubles titles at Washington, DC (w/McNally, d. Sanchez/Stollar in F) and Luxembourg (w/McNally, d. Christian/Guarachi in F)
- By winning the doubles title at Washington, DC at 15y 144d, became the youngest player to win a doubles title since May 1995 (Hingis won Hamburg at 14y 219d)
- Reached R16 at 2019 Wimbledon on Grand Slam main draw debut defeating V.Williams in 1r (l.

- Breakout 2024 season saw her win the biggest title of her career at WTA 1000 Dubai and also reach her first Grand Slam finals, finishing R-Up at Roland-Garros and Wimbledon. Qualified for her first WTA Finals in singles and doubles, broke into the Top 10 for the first time in her career and finished the season as the World No.4
- Finished 2023 by breaking into Top 30 for first time, achieving No. 29 on Oct 23, 2023 after becoming runner-up at Monastir (l. Mertens). Also achieved runner-up at Palermo and SF at Zhengzhou (l. Zheng both times) as well as QFs at Lyon (l. Garcia) and Cincinnati as a qualifier (l. eventual champion Gauff). Enjoyed two Top 10 wins (No.10 Garcia and No.4 Rybakina).
- In 2022, finished R-Up at Cluj-Napoca (l. Blinkova), while made back-to-back SF at Palermo (l. Bronzetti) and Warsaw (l. eventual champion Garcia)
- Also reached QF at Lyon (l. Yastremska), Portoroz (l. eventual champion Siniakova) and Parma (l. Kovinic)
- Broke into Top 50 on January 31, 2021
- Posted near-Top 50 season finish in 2021 after capturing first WTA singles title of career at Portoroz (d. Riske in F)
- Strong season finish also brought SF run at Courmayeur(l. eventual champion Vekic) and QF effort at Linz (l. Halep); posted best win of season over No.18 Mertens en route to 3r at Indian Wells (l. Pegula)
- Also in 2021 won the WTA 125K event in Bol, Croatia (d. Rus in F) and was R-Up at the same level in Saint Malo (l. Golubic) Captured first WTA doubles title in 2021, at Hamburg(w/Teichmann)
- In 2021, for first time in career, contested the full suite of all four Grand Slam events; reached 2r at Roland Garros and US Open, equalling best previous Slam result
- In 2020, reached 2r four times at WTA tournaments, including Roland Garros (l. Kvitova)
- Highlights of 2019 included QF showings at Guangzhou and Palermo, a SF run at the WTA 125K Series event at Karlsruhe, lifting seventh, eighth and ninth ITF Circuit titles of her career, at \$60KBrescia-ITA, \$25K ITF/Curtiba-BRA and \$100K ITF/Tokyo-JPN, and qualifying for maiden Grand Slam main draw at Roland Garros (l. Kasatkina in 1r)

 Former Junior World No.1 (July 2018); won 2018 Roland-Garros girls' title (d. McNally in F) and 2018 US Open doubles title (w/McNally), while finished R-Up at 2017 US Open girls' event (l. Anisimova) becoming the youngest girls' singles

finalist in tournament history at 13-years-old

- Ended 2018 ranked No.180, with season highlight a maiden WTA singles QF at Prague (d. No.15 Kasatkina, l. Zhang)
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2017 Bastad (l. Suarez Navarro in 1r) and also fell 1r at Guangzhou and in qualifying a further three times
- Part of Italy's Billie Jean King Cup team 2017-19
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2015 Rome
- Made professional debut on ITF Circuit in Italy in 2011
