Ekaterina Alexandrova (#22) vs. Jelena Ostapenko (LAT #24)

Tied 5-5

For the first time since 2017, two players ranked outside the Top 20 have reached the SF at the tournament... This is their 11th meeting head-to-head... Ostapenko has won the last three meetings – 2023 San Diego (R32), 2024 Adelaide (SF) and 2024 Linz (Final)... For Alexandrova, this is the opponent she has faced the most, while Ostapenko has also faced Karolina Pliskova 11 times throughout her career... In their only previous clay-court meeting at the Tour-level, Alexandrova defeated Ostapenko in 1R at 2022 Madrid in 3-sets (they also met on clay at ITF level, also won by Alexandrova)

Alexandrova:

- Has equalled career-best clay-court result, having previously reach the SF stage on clay three other times 2022 and 2025 Charleston and 2022 Madrid
- Through to second clay-court SF this year (also SF at Charleston); last year won only one match on clay
- At 30 years, 157 days old, is oldest semifinalist at Stuttgart since Li Na (2013, Won at 31 years, 61 years old)
- Held the No.12 spot on PIF Race to WTA Finals Leaderboard entering this week; by reaching SF will move to No.8 or No.9 (depending on Paolini); could climb to No.6 in the Race with a win today

Ostapenko:

- Best results at WTA-500 events are four titles, most recently Linz 2024 (d. Alexandrova in F)
- Through to fifth career clay-court semifinal
- Best career result on clay was title run at 2017 Roland Garros, also reached final at 2017 Charleston
- Last round, defeated Iga Swiatek for the sixth time in her career (6-0), more wins than any other player against the former WTA World No.1
- Currently ranked a career-high in doubles at No.4, having won two doubles titles this year 2025 Charleston (w/Routliffe) and Abu Dhabi (w/Perez)

Sabalenka leads 4-2

Seventh meeting... Sabalenka has won the last three meetings, most recently at 2025 Miami (SF) 6-2 6-2... this is their first meeting on clay

Sabalenka:


- Since start of 2017, Sabalenka (13) is tied for most semifinals on clay (along with Swiatek); Sabalenka has ٠ reached eight clay-court finals, winning two titles - Madrid twice (2021, 2023)
- The No.1 seed has reached the SF in the last nine WTA 500 tournaments (not including United Cup)
- Making fifth appearance as a three-time finalist finishing R-Up in 2021, 2022 and 2023
- Started the week with a Ir bye and a walkover against Potapova
- Won 12 of her last 13 matches reaching the final at both Indian Wells (I. Andreeva) and Miami (d. Pegula)
- Held the PIF WTA World No.1 ranking since October 21, 2024 26 consecutive weeks (34 overall)

Paolini:

- Seeking first career win over the reigning PIF WTA World No.1 (previously 0-5) •
- The last time an Italian defeated the WTA World No.1 was at 2015 US Open (Roberta Vinci def. No.1 Serena Williams) and the last time an Italian defeated the World No.1 awas in 2006 in Billie Jean King Cup (Francesca Schiavone def. Amelie Mauresmo)
- The last time an Italian woman reached a WTA 500 final was at 2016 Dubai (Sara Errani)
- Making 2nd appearance at Stuttgart, where her previous result was reaching QF in 2024 (I. eventual • champion Rybakina) on tournament debut
- Through to fifth clay-court semifinal; best result on clay has been runner-up finishes at 2023 Palermo and 2024 Roland Garros

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2024, highlights included reaching the final at Linz (l. Ostapenko in Final) and semifinals at Adelaide (l. eventual champion Ostapenko), Miami (l. eventual champion Collins), 's-Hertogenbosch (l. eventual champion Samsonova) and Monterrey (l. Sun); also made quarterfinals at Wuhan (l. Xin. Wang) and her best Grand Slam result of the season came during a 3r run at US Open (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- In 2023, won fourth career singles title at 's-Hertogenbosch, successfully defending the title and defeating top seed, Kudermetova in the final. A run of successful results followed with SF at Berlin (l. eventual champion, Kvitova), 4r at Wimbledon (l. Sabalenka) - a career best result at any of the majors and runner-up at Cleveland (l. Sorribes Tormo).
- Reached a 2023 peak ranking of No. 16 on February 20, 2023 following a 3r finish at Australian Open (l. Linette), before posting two QF results at Miami (l. eventual champion Kvitova) and Charleston (l. Bencic). Another QF then came in the Asian Swing at Tokyo (l. Pavlyuchenkova).
- In 2022, won titles at
 S-Hertogenbosch (d. Sabalenka in F) and Seoul (d. Ostapenko in F). Also advanced to SF at Charleston, Madrid and Ostrava, making Top-20 debut on October 10, 2022
- Reached third WTA singles final in 2021, enjoying run to final at home tournament of Moscow (l. Kontaveit). Other key result was SF run at Gippsland Trophy (l. Kanepi)
- Posted two best wins-by-ranking of career in 2021, defeating No.2 Halep (Gippsland Trophy) and No.2 Sabalenka (Moscow)
- Reached 2r on Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020
- Opened 2020 season by lifting her maiden WTA singles title, at Shenzhen (d. Rybakina in F)
- Won both singles rubbers on Billie Jean King Cup debut in 3-2 win over Romania in February 2020
- Made Top-50 debut on June 17, 2019 after QF run at 's-Hertogenbosch
- Registered 30 Tour-level match wins during 2019, in which she reached SF at Budapest, Seoul and Linz and made QF at St. Petersburg, 's-Hertogenbosch, Eastbourne and Moscow. Also advanced to 3r at a major for the first time, at Roland Garros
- Won sole WTA doubles title at 2019 Budapest (w/Zvonareva)

- Won seventh and eighth titles of career in 2024 at Adelaide and Linz. In doubles won first Grand Slam title at 2024 Australian Open and qualified for 2024 WTA Finals Riyadh (both with Lyudmyla Kichenok)
- Won sixth career title at 2023 Birmingham (d. Krejcikova in F) and reached SF at Rome; in doubles achieved R-Up at Doha (w/L.Kichenok)
- At 2022 Dubai, lifted fifth career singles title (d. Kudermetova in F); finished R-Up at Eastbourne (l. Kvitova) and Seoul (l. Alexandrova) as well as SF at St. Petersburg and Doha
- Won two doubles titles in 2022 at Birmingham and Cincinnati (both w/L.Kichenok); qualified for WTA Finals reaching SF Lifted first grass court title at 2021 Eastbourne (as WC, d. Kontaveit in F)
- In 2021, also finished R-Up at Luxembourg (l. Tauson), made SF at Indian Wells (l. Azarenka), reached QF at Rome and represented Latvia at the Tokyo Olympics (l. Vesnina in 1r)
- Won doubles title at 2021 Moscow (w/Siniakova)
 Highlights of 2020 season included three Top 10 wins and reaching QF at Strasbourg
- Finished R-Up in doubles w/Dabrowski at 2020 Doha (l. Hsieh/Strycova)
- 2019 season saw her capture third career title at Luxembourg (d. Goerges in F) right after finishing R-Up at Linz (l. Gauff)
- Also R-Up in mixed doubles at 2019 Wimbledon w/Lindstedt
- 2018 campaign highlighted by finishing R-Up at Miami (l. Stephens); beat No.9 Petra Kvitova and No.4 Elina Svitolina to register multiple Top 10 wins in the same tournament for the first time
- Reached SF at 2018 Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Kerber) to become first Latvian woman to reach final four at All England Club
- Achieved career-high ranking of No.5 on March 19, 2018
- In doubles won title at 2018 Doha (w/Dabrowski)
- Enjoyed career-best season in 2017, finishing the year in the Top 10 for the first time (at No.7); was No.44 at end of 2016 (first Top 50 finish) and No.79 at end of 2015 (first Top 100 finish)
- Champion at 2017 Roland Garros (d. Halep in F) becoming first woman to win first tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Barbara Jordan at 1979 Australian Open. Also became the first unseeded player to lift the trophy in the Open Era and the first Latvian player to reach the championship match at a Grand Slam

- Came through qualifying to make maiden WTA final appearance at 2018 Linz (l. Giorgi)
- Advanced to first WTA QF at 2018 Seoul, scoring maiden Top 10 win of her career en route, over No.10 Ostapenko
- Made Top-100 debut at No.93 on March 20, 2017 after winning title at \$60K ITF/Shenzhen-CHN
- At 2016 Wimbledon, ranked No.223, won her way through qualifying on her maiden Slam appearance, going on to reach 2r (upset No.23 seed Ivanovic in 1r)
- Won WTA 125K Series title at Limoges in 2016, 2018-19
- Reached 2r on WTA main draw debut at 2016 Katowice (as qualifier, l. eventual R-Up Giorgi)
- Contested qualifying for the first time at a WTAlevel tournament at 2014 Bad Gastein
- Played first professional events of career on ITF Circuit in Europe in 2011

- Followed up title run with QF appearance at 2017 Wimbledon; also won title at Seoul (d. Haddad Maia in F) and reached final at Charleston (l. Kasatkina)
- Qualified for debut WTA Finals in 2017 went 1-2 in group stage
- Made Top 10 debut at No.10 on September 11, 2017
- In doubles, won first and second career titles in 2017, at St. Petersburg (w/Rosolska) and Stuttgart (w/Atawo) Breakthrough result of 2016 season was reaching final at Doha launching her into Top 50 at No.40 (l. Suárez Navarro); also in 2016 reached SF at Katowice and QF at Birmingham and Florianopolis ending year at No.44
- Ended 2015 at No.79 for first Top 100 finish (up from No.308 in 2014). Having leapt 229 spots, was second highest year-end rankings jump, after Kasatkina who went from No.370 to No.72 (298 spots)
- Highlights of 2014 were reaching first career WTA final at Quebec City (l. Beck) and 2r at Wimbledon and US Open
- Scored first Top 10 win over No.9 Carla Suárez Navarro in 1r at 2015 Wimbledon
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2014 Tashkent as WC advancing to 2r (l. Pervak)
- Played qualifying at Moscow in 2012
- Member of Latvian Billie Jean King Cup team in 2013-2022
- Began professional career playing ITF in 2012 winning first career title at \$10k/ITF Stockholm, SWE; owns seven career ITF titles


