[9] Ekaterina Alexandrova (#11) vs. [6] Jessica Pegula (USA #6)

Alexandrova leads 3-2

Alexandrova:

- Making 3rd appearance at Wuhan; her career-best tournament showing is last year's QF (I. Wang Xinyu)
- Contesting her 46th career WTA 1000 main draw; her career-best WTA 1000 finishes are 3 SFs (2022 Madrid, 2024 Miami and 2025 Doha)
- Bidding to win her 20th match over a Top 10 player; her most recent Top 10 win came over today's opponent Pegula at Stuttgart 2025
- Earlier in this year's Asian swing, made Seoul final (I. Swiatek), then lost opening match in Beijing (after Ir bye, I. Krejcikova)
- Currently No.10 on the WTA Finals Leaderboard, and is a career-high No.11 in the PIF WTA Singles Rankings

Pegula:

- Making 3rd appearance at Wuhan; she also reached the 3r last year (I. Wang Xinyu)
- She is a 3-time WTA 1000 champion, winning titles at 2022 Guadalajara, 2023 Montreal and 2024 Toronto
- Owns 43 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.17 Emma Navarro at Beijing 2025
- Has won 47 tour-level matches so far in 2025; she is ranked No.3 on tour for match-wins, behind only Iga Swiatek and Aryna Sabalenka
- Has won 3 WTA singles titles this season at Austin (hard), Charleston (clay), and Bad Homburg (grass)
- Currently No.5 on the WTA Finals Leaderboard; she could qualify outright for the WTA Finals if she wins
 the title this week


Sabalenka leads 3-2

Sabalenka:

- Making 4th appearance at Wuhan, where she is the 3-time defending champion
- Her Wuhan career record currently stands at 18-0 the highest tally of consecutive wins in a single city hosting a WTA 1000 event since Serena Williams in Rome (21, between 2012 and 2019)
- Looking to reach her 30th quarterfinal at WTA 1000 events, equaling Serena Williams for the sixth-most since the format was introduced in 2009
- She is a 9-time WTA 1000 champion, including two WTA 1000 titles this year (Miami and Madrid)
- Has qualified for the WTA Finals and remains in contention for year-end No.1 Ranking

Samsonova:

- Making 2nd appearance at Wuhan, where her previous result was falling 1r in 2024 (I. Linette)
- Looking to reach her sixth quarterfinal at a WTA 1000 event, and her first since Indian Wells earlier this year
- She is a 2-time WTA 1000 runner-up, at 2023 Montreal (I. Pegula in final) and 2023 Beijing (I. Swiatek in final)
- Owns 10 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.3 Jessica Pegula at Berlin 2025
- Has lost all of her four career meetings against a reigning World No.1 (Stuttgart 2022, Dubai 2023, and US
 Open 2024 vs. Iga Swiatek, and Indian Wells 2025 vs. Aryna Sabalenka)

[7] Jasmine Paolini (ITA #8) vs. [10] Clara Tauson (DEN #12)

Paolini leads 1-0

Paolini:

- Making 2nd appearance at Wuhan; she reached QF last year (I. eventual finalist Zheng Qinwen)
- Owns 19 Top 20 wins in career at WTA Tour events, most recently No.2 Coco Gauff at 2025 Cincinnati
 (Paolini also notched two Top 20 wins in Team Italy's run to the 2025 Billie Jean King Cup title last month)
- 2-time WTA 1000 champion, winning titles at 2024 Dubai (d. Kalinskaya in F) and 2025 Rome (d. Gauff in F)
- Seeking her 8th career WTA 1000 QF, and 5th of this year
- Only Iga Swiatek (27) and Aryna Sabalenka (25) have won more WTA 1000 matches in 2025 than Paolini (24)
- After her opening win this week, currently sits at No.8 on the WTA Finals Leaderboard

Tauson:

- Making her 1st main-draw appearance at Wuhan; previously fell in qualifying in 2019 (I. Diyas)
- Owns 5 wins in career over Top 10 players at tour-level events, most recently No.8 Madison Keys at 2025 Montreal (4-4 record vs. Top 10 players this year)
- Career-best WTA 1000 result was reaching this year's Dubai final (I. M. Andreeva in final)
- Seeking her 3rd career WTA 1000 QF (also made SF at 2025 Montreal)
- Has already won 36 tour-level matches in 2025, 17 more tour-level wins than she managed in her previous best season (19 in 2021)
- Currently No.11 on the WTA Finals Leaderboard; also a career-high No.12 in the PIF WTA Singles Rankings

[13] Belinda Bencic (SUI #15) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

Swiatek leads 4-1

Bencic:

- In her fifth Wuhan appearance, has made 3r for the first time this year
- Owns two WTA 1000 titles: 2015 Toronto (d. Halep in final) & 2019 Dubai (d. Kvitova in final)
- Has a 3-7 record against Top 10 players this season, with wins over No.5 Rybakina at Abu Dhabi, No.3 Gauff at Indian Wells and No.7 M. Andreeva at Wimbledon
- Seven of her nine career titles are on hard court, most recently Abu Dhabi this year (d. Krueger in final)
- Aiming to become the second Swiss player to reach the Wuhan QF after Timea Bacsinszky in 2014
- Currently No.14 on the WTA Finals Leaderboard

Swiatek:

- Making her Wuhan tournament debut
- Facing Bencic for the sixth time; Swiatek won their most recent meeting in this year's Wimbledon SF en route to lifting the trophy her 6th career Grand Slam title
- Owns 11 career WTA 1000 titles; her best WTA 1000 result this year is her Cincinnati title run (d. Paolini in F)
- With a win today, she would reach the 25th WTA 1000 quarterfinal of her career
- Is the first player to achieve four consecutive 60-win seasons at tour-level since Martina Hingis (1997-2001) and Lindsay Davenport (1998-2001)
- By defeating Marie Bouzkova on Tuesday, Swiatek won her 31st consecutive opening match at a WTA 1000 event

[WC] Zhang Shuai (CHN #142) vs. [3] Coco Gauff (USA #3)

Gauff leads 3-0

Zhang:

- In her 6th Wuhan main draw appearance, she has equaled her best previous result by reaching R16 (also made R16 in 2018, I. eventual finalist Kontaveit)
- Career-best WTA 1000 result is QF which she has reached five times; Beijing 2024, 2018 & 2016, Cincinnati 2022, Rome 2014
- Owns 9 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.8 Emma Navarro at Beijing 2024
- Becomes the fourth wild card to reach R16 at Wuhan since the tournament's inception in 2014, after Kirsten Flipkens in 2014 (R16), Wang Qiang in 2018 (SF) and Elena Rybakina in 2019 (QF)
- Lowest-ranked player (No.142) to reach Wuhan R16 since 2014, surpassing Hailey Baptiste (No.102) last year
- Is the current player with the most Tour-level main-draw matches won on Chinese soil (52)

Gauff:

- Making 2nd appearance at Wuhan, where her previous result was SF in 2024 (I. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- 2-time WTA 1000 champion, winning titles at 2023 Cincinnati and 2024 Beijing (d. Muchova in both finals)
- Best WTA 1000 result this season is reaching the final at Madrid (I. Sabalenka) and Rome (I. Paolini)
- Undefeated this season against players ranked outside the Top 100 (7-0); her last such defeat was to No.128 Kenin at Wimbledon in 2023
- Following her 2r win over Uchijima, Gauff has become the youngest player to claim 25+ hard court wins for three consecutive seasons (2023-2025) since Caroline Wozniacki (2008-2011)
- Currently leads the tour this year in percentage of return points won (48.5%)

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2024, highlights included reaching the final at Linz (l. Ostapenko in Final) and semifinals at Adelaide (l. eventual champion Ostapenko), Miami (l. eventual champion Collins), 's-Hertogenbosch (l. eventual champion Samsonova) and Monterrey (l. Sun); also made quarterfinals at Wuhan (l. Xin. Wang) and her best Grand Slam result of the season came during a 3r run at US Open (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- In 2023, won fourth career singles title at 's-Hertogenbosch, successfully defending the title and defeating top seed, Kudermetova in the final. A run of successful results followed with SF at Berlin (l. eventual champion, Kvitova), 4r at Wimbledon (l. Sabalenka) a career best result at any of the majors and runner-up at Cleveland (l. Sorribes Tormo).
- Reached a 2023 peak ranking of No. 16 on February 20, 2023 following a 3r finish at Australian Open (l. Linette), before posting two QF results at Miami (l. eventual champion Kvitova) and Charleston (l. Bencic). Another QF then came in the Asian Swing at Tokyo (l. Pavlyuchenkova).
- In 2022, won titles at □ s-Hertogenbosch (d. Sabalenka in F) and Seoul (d. Ostapenko in F). Also advanced to SF at Charleston, Madrid and Ostrava, making Top-20 debut on October 10, 2022
- Reached third WTA singles final in 2021, enjoying run to final at home tournament of Moscow (l. Kontaveit). Other key result was SF run at Gippsland Trophy (l. Kanepi)
- Posted two best wins-by-ranking of career in 2021, defeating No.2 Halep (Gippsland Trophy) and No.2 Sabalenka (Moscow)
- Reached 2r on Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020
- Opened 2020 season by lifting her maiden WTA singles title, at Shenzhen (d. Rybakina in F)

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2024 broke a streak of 24 losses to reach quarterfinal at Beijing. In doubles won her 14th career title at Guangzhou, paired with Katerina Siniakova for the first time
- Reached R16 at 2023 Australian Open (l. Pliskova) taking her ranking to a high of No. 22.
 Zhang failed to win a singles match after Lyon in January and ended her season early after Montreal (l. Blinkova).
- In doubles, won the 2023 title at Abu Dhabi (w/Stefani) and reached semifinals at Doha (w/Olmos) and Wimbledon (w/Dolehide).
 - Won third career singles title at Lyon (d. Yastremska in F) and 12th doubles title in Nottingham (w/Haddad Maia) in 2022
- Finished the season at No. 24, very close to previous best career ranking of No. 23 (Nov 14, 2016); in doubles climbed as high as No. 2 on July 11, 2022
- Reached fourth singles final of career in 2021, finishing R-Up at Nottingham (l. Konta). Also advanced to SF at Palermo and QF at San Jose
- Enjoyed strong campaign in doubles in 2021 winning three tiles, at Cincinnati and US Open (w/Stosur) and Ostrava (w/Mirza). Qualified for WTA Finals for first time (w/Stosur) however failed to progress from group stage
- Season highlight in 2020 was reaching third career WTA singles final (l. Rybakina in F) and finished R-Up in doubles at Hobart (w/Peng), which marks the first time she made it through to the championship match in both singles and doubles at the same tour-level event
- Also in 2020, made R16 at Roland Garros for the first time; now has advanced to second week in three Grand Slams across hard, grass and clay

- Registered first Top 10 doubles season in 2019finished at No.10 while posted career-high ranking at No.9 on May 20
- Won first Grand Slam title in doubles at 2019
 Australian Open (w/Stosur; d. Babos/Mladenovic
 in F); also reached final at Miami w/Stosur (l.
 Mertens/Sabalenka). Team qualified for WTA
 Finals in Shenzhen (Zhang's debut at the season

- Went three for three in finals in 2024, winning Auckland, Beijing and a historic first WTA Finals Riyadh title. Success in Saudi Arabia saw her win a record \$4.8m in prize money, the most ever awarded in women sprofessional sports, and defeat the World No.1 and No.2 at the same event. Posted a new career-high of No.2 in June
- Won debut Grand Slam singles crown in 2023 lifting title on home soil at US Open (d. Sabalenka in F). Picked up another three titles in 2023, marking first WTA 1000 title at Cincinnati and debut WTA 500 title at Washington DC, in addition to WTA 250 Auckland. In doubles was co-ranked No.1 with Pegula after US Open.
- In 2022, reached maiden Grand Slam final at Roland-Garros (l. Swiatek); was the youngest major finalist since Sharapova won 2004 Wimbledon

 Guangzhou (d. King in F) and 2017 Guangzhou (d. Krunic in F); also won WTA 125K Series events at Nanjing in 2013 and Honolulu in 2017
- Scored first Top 10 win over then top ranked Safina in 1r at 2009 Beijing; at No.226, was the lowest-ranked player ever to beat a World No.1
- First broke into Top 100 on August 9, 2010 and Top 50 on February 3, 2014
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2006 Beijing;
 made WTA main draw debut at 2006 Guangzhou
- Winner of 21 singles titles and eight doubles titles on ITF Circuit
- Member of Chinese Fed Cup team in 2007, 2009-10, 2012, 2014-15, 2019-20. Chinese Olympic Team, 2012, 2016
- In mixed doubles, reached SF at 2018 US Open (w/Peers)
