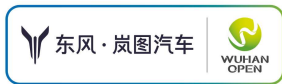

- Pegula leads the series 4-2 overall (3-1 on hard court), but Gauff won their most recent meeting, at last year's WTA Finals on hard court
- This is their first meeting in a final
- Today's winner will become the second American to claim the Wuhan title, joining Venus Williams in 2015
- Since the format's introduction in 2009, this will be the third all-American WTA 1000 final after Rome 2016 (Serena Williams d. Madison Keys) and Toronto 2024 (Jessica Pegula d. Amanda Anisimova)
- This is the fourth all-American singles final on tour this year (also Adelaide, Austin, Charleston – Pegula has been in all four of them); this is the most all-American WTA finals in a calendar year since 2003 (five)
- Gauff and Pegula won five WTA doubles titles together during 2022-2023, and they also made the 2022 Roland Garros doubles final as a team; they have both reached WTA Doubles World No.1

Pegula:

- Qualified for the 2025 WTA Finals after her victory in this week's quarterfinals
- Making 3rd appearance at Wuhan; her previous best tournament result was 3r in 2024 (l. Wang Xinyu)
- Seeking her 4th WTA 1000 title; she won WTA 1000 titles at 2022 Guadalajara (d. Sakkari in F), 2023 Montreal (d. Samsonova in F) and 2024 Toronto (d. Anisimova in F)
- Among American players, only Serena Williams (18) has reached more WTA 1000 finals than Jessica Pegula (7, surpassing Venus Williams) since the format's introduction in 2009
- Pegula's semifinal victory over World No.1 Aryna Sabalenka ended 3-time defending champion Sabalenka's perfect 20-0 winning run in Wuhan
- Has an 11-1 record against her fellow Americans in 2025 (the one loss was to Keys in the Adelaide final)
- Aiming for her 10th career WTA singles title; 6 of her 9 WTA titles have come on hard court, and her most recent hard-court title is 2025 Austin
- Has won 3 WTA singles titles this season at Austin (hard), Charleston (clay), and Bad Homburg (grass); victory in Wuhan would tie her with Sabalenka for the most titles this year (4)
- Has won 50 tour-level matches so far in 2025; she is ranked No.3 on tour for match-wins this year, trailing only Swiatek and Sabalenka
- Pegula's last 8 matches have gone to a deciding third set, and she has won 7 of those 8 matches (only loss in that stretch was to Noskova in last week's Beijing SF)



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Gauff:

- Had already qualified for the 2025 WTA Finals prior to this week; with her Wuhan results, she has moved up from No.4 to No.3 on the WTA Finals Leaderboard, overtaking Amanda Anisimova
- Making 2nd appearance at Wuhan; last year she reached the SF (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- She is a 2-time WTA 1000 champion, winning WTA 1000 titles at 2023 Cincinnati and 2024 Beijing (d. Muchova in both finals)
- Also made WTA 1000 finals this year in Madrid (l. Sabalenka) and Rome (l. Paolini); Gauff is the first American to reach three WTA 1000 finals in a calendar year since Serena Williams in 2014
- Holds an 8-5 record vs. Top 10 players in 2025, including a Top 10 win over Paolini in the semifinals
- Has won 46 tour-level matches so far in 2025; she is ranked No.4 on tour for match-wins this year, trailing only Swiatek, Sabalenka and Pegula
- Currently this year's tour leader in percentage of return games won (46.7%) and percentage of return points won (49.0%)
- Has lost only 16 games this week – this is the fewest games dropped by a player en route to a Wuhan final since the tournament's inception in 2014
- Gauff is the player with the highest winning percentage at WTA Tour-level events in China in the Open Era (21-3, 87.5% - minimum 10 matches, excluding team events)

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CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2024, won two singles titles - Toronto (WTA 1000) and Berlin - en route to year-end ranking of No.7, her third-straight year-end Top 10 finish; two-time runner-up at Cincinnati and US Open; joined Rosie Casals (1970), Evonne Goolagong Cawley (1973) and Serena Williams (2013) as the only women in the Open Era to make the final at the Canadian Open, Cincinnati Open and US Open in the same season
- Also qualified for the 2024 WTA Finals (withdrew during round-robin play due to left knee injury)
- Won two titles in 2023, her second WTA 1000 tournament at Montreal and also WTA 250 Seoul. Also finished R-Up at Doha, Tokyo and at the WTA Finals in Cancun.

In doubles ascended to No.1 ranking (co-ranked with Coco Gauff) after 2023 US Open.

- Achieved career-high No. 3 in October 2022 after defeating four Grand Slam champions at Guadalajara, en route to ending three-year wait for second WTA title (d. Sakkari in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Fort Worth in both singles and doubles (w/Gauff), thus becoming the first Americans to debut in singles and doubles at the season-ending showpiece since Davenport in 1994
- Reached QF at three of the four majors in 2022, breaking into Top 10 after doing so at Roland Garros (June 6, 2022)
- One of seven players to win 40 or more matches in 2022, alongside Swiatek, Jabeur, Garcia, Sakkari, Kasatkina and Bencic
- In 2021, reached the QF or better on seven occasions, including at the Australian Open
- Broke into Top 20 on November 1, 2021
- Began 2020 with runner-up finish at Auckland (l. S.Williams), other standout results were a QF at Western & Southern Open (as qualifier, l. Mertens) and a 3r showing at US Open (l. Kvitova)
- On the doubles court in 2020, reached QFs of Roland-Garros (w/Muhammad) and Cincinnati (w/Rogers)
- Won her first WTA title at 2019 Washington DC (d. Giorgi in F)
- Also in 2019, fell 1r on main draw debut at Roland-Garros (l. eventual champion Barty) and Wimbledon (l. Buzarnescu) and Miami (as a qualifier, l. Konta)
- Broke into Top 100 for the first time on February 4, 2019 following back-to-back R-Up finishes at

- Went three for three in finals in 2024, winning Auckland, Beijing and a historic first WTA Finals Riyadh title. Success in Saudi Arabia saw her win a record \$4.8m in prize money, the most ever awarded in women's professional sports, and defeat the World No.1 and No.2 at the same event. Posted a new career-high of No.2 in June
- Won debut Grand Slam singles crown in 2023 lifting title on home soil at US Open (d. Sabalenka in F). Picked up another three titles in 2023, marking first WTA 1000 title at Cincinnati and debut WTA 500 title at Washington DC, in addition to WTA 250 Auckland. In doubles was co-ranked No.1 with Pegula after US Open.
- In 2022, reached maiden Grand Slam final at Roland-Garros (l. Swiatek); was the youngest major finalist since Sharapova won 2004 Wimbledon
- Made Top-10 debut on September 12, 2022, following QF run at US Open (l. Garcia)
- Highlight of 2021 campaign was completing singles-doubles title sweep at Parma; defeated Q.Wang in singles final and teamed up w/McNally to win doubles
- In 2021 also reached SF at Adelaide and Rome, while at the Slams made QF at Roland-Garros and R16 at Wimbledon
- Finished R-Up in doubles at 2021 US Open (w/McNally, l. Stosur/Zhang)
- First cracked the Top 50 on February 24, 2020 at No.49, following a R16 appearance at Australian Open to tie her career best Grand Slam result - during run, defeated V.Williams in 1r and her first Top-5 opponent in No.4 Osaka in 3r (l. eventual champion Kenin in 3s)
- Enjoyed breakout season in 2019, highlighted by maiden WTA singles title at Linz (as lucky loser, d. Ostapenko in F) - earned her first Top-10 win en route to title over No.8 Bertens in QF
- At 15y 214d, her title run in Linz made her youngest to win a WTA tour-level title since Vaidisova (15y 177d) won Tashkent in 2004
- Also claimed maiden WTA doubles titles at Washington, DC (w/McNally, d. Sanchez/Stollar in F) and Luxembourg (w/McNally, d. Christian/Guarachi in F)
- By winning the doubles title at Washington, DC at 15y 144d, became the youngest player to win a doubles title since May 1995 (Hingis won Hamburg at 14y 219d)
- Reached R16 at 2019 Wimbledon on Grand Slam main draw debut defeating V.Williams in 1r (l.

- WTA 125K Series event at Newport Beach and W100 ITF Circuit tournament in Midland-MI, USA
- Highlights of 2018 included finishing R-up as a qualifier at Quebec City (l. Parmentier in F), recording SF finish at Houston WTA 125K Series tournament (l. S.Peng) and reaching QF or better at 10 ITF events
- Did not play between January and August 2017 after undergoing hip surgery. Primarily played at ITF Circuit events for the rest of the year, winning two doubles titles with Townsend
- Played a mixture of WTA and ITF Circuit events in 2016 with highlight coming at Washington DC, where she defeated No.14 Stosur for first Top-20 win of career on her way to a SF finish (l. Davis)
- Reached 2r on Grand Slam main draw debut at 2015 US Open (as qualifier, d. Van Uytvanck, l. Cibulkova)
- Sidelined from tennis for a year and a half between 2013 and 2015 due to a right knee injury
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2009 Ponte Vedra Beach and WTA main draw debut at 2012 Indian Wells

- eventual champion Halep) - followed with 3r showing at US Open (as WC, l. Osaka)
- Made WTA main draw debut as a wildcard at 2019 Miami where she earned her first WTA main draw win over good friend McNally (l. Kasatkina in 2r)
- Made professional debut in May 2018 as a qualifier into the \$25K ITF/Osprey, FL-USA
- Member of US Billie Jean King Cup team in 2022
- Former Junior World No.1 (July 2018); won 2018 Roland-Garros girls' title (d. McNally in F) and 2018 US Open doubles title (w/McNally), while finished R-Up at 2017 US Open girls' event (l. Anisimova) becoming the youngest girls' singles finalist in tournament history at 13-years-old
