WTA FINALS LEADERBOARD WATCH FROM WUHAN

Final Three Spots in Singles are down to four players - Jessica Pegula, Mirra Andreeva, Jasmine Paolini and Elena Rybakina.

Pegula can secure qualification on Friday if both Paolini and Rybakina lose their QF match.

Both Paolini and Rybakina would move ahead of Andreeva this week if they reach the final. With a title, either Paolini or Rybakina would move to No. 6, ahead of Keys. NOTE: If the Wuhan final is Paolini vs Rybakina, Andreeva will fall to No. 9.

Players that remain in contention for the other alternate position: Ekaterina Alexandrova, Clara Tauson, Emma Navarro and Belinda Bencic

The Top 8 will remain unchanged after Wuhan, although Mihalikova/Nicholls (with final) and Danilina/Krunic (with title) can move into the No.9 spot.



[Q] Katerina Siniakova (CZE #62) vs. [6] Jessica Pegula (USA #6)

Pegula leads 4-1

Siniakova:

- Making 6th appearance at Wuhan, where her best previous result was reaching QF in 2018 as a qualifier (I. eventual finalist Kontaveit)
- Both her career best WTA 1000 results were achieved in 2018 in China: back-to-back QFs at Wuhan and Beijing (as a qualifier both times)
- This is her fourth meeting against a Top 10 player this year and looking for her second win today after defeating Zheng Qinwen at Wimbledon
- Best results by the Czech Republic at Wuhan were by Petra Kvitova, who claimed the title in 2014 and 2016
- Is currently No.1 in the PIF WTA World Ranking in doubles; this week marks her 164th week at No.1, the third most weeks of all time after Martina Navratilova (237 wks) and Liezel Huber (199 wks); needs to reach the doubles semifinal this week to stay at No.1

Pegula:

- Making 3rd appearance at Wuhan and has reached quarterfinal for the first time after a 3r finish last year
 (I. Wang Xinyu)
- She is a 3-time WTA 1000 champion, winning titles at 2022 Guadalajara, 2023 Montreal and 2024 Toronto
- A win today would be her third semifinal in a row after Beijing (I. Noskova) and US Open (I. Sabalenka)
- Her last loss to a player ranked outside the Top 50 was to No.386 Anastasija Sevastova at Montreal
- Has won 48 matches so far in 2025; she is ranked No.3 on Tour, behind only Swiatek and Sabalenka
- Has won 3 WTA singles titles this season at Austin (hard), Charleston (clay), and Bad Homburg (grass)
- Currently No.5 on the WTA Finals Leaderboard; she could qualify outright for the WTA Finals if she wins
 the title this week or if both Paolini and Rybakina lose today

[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. [8] Elena Rybakina (#9)

Sabalenka leads 7-5

Sabalenka:

- Making 4th appearance at Wuhan, where she is the 3-time defending champion
- Her Wuhan career record currently stands at 19-0 the highest tally of consecutive wins in a single city hosting a WTA 1000 event since Serena Williams in Rome (21, between 2012 and 2019)
- Looking to reach her 19th WTA 1000 semifinal
- This is her 13th career meeting against Rybakina equalling the most times she has faced any player (has also played Swiatek and Mertens 13 times)
- She is a 9-time WTA 1000 champion, including two WTA 1000 titles this year (Miami and Madrid)
- Has qualified for the WTA Finals and remains in contention for year-end No.1 Ranking
- Has held the WTA World No.1 ranking for 59 total weeks (51-consecutive)

Rybakina:

- Remains in contention to qualify for WTA Finals; enters the tournament at No.8; currently sits at No.9 on the Leaderboard
- Through to the quarterfinal for a second time in her second Wuhan appearance after 2019 (I. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- Two time WTA 1000 champion, winning titles at 2023 Indian Wells (d. Sabalenka in final) and 2023 Rome (d. Kalinina in final)
- Has a 5-4 record against Sabalenka on hard court, winning their three most recent hard court meetings at Cincinnati 2025 (QF), WTA Finals 2024 and Brisbane 2024 (final)
- Is 7-6 in career matches against the current World No.1
- Four of 9 career WTA singles titles have come on hard court; most recent hard court title is 2024 Abu Dhabi

[7] Jasmine Paolini (ITA #8) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

Swiatek leads 6-0

Paolini:

- Making 2nd appearance at Wuhan; she reached QF last year in her tournament debut (I. eventual finalist Zheng Qinwen)
- Two-time WTA 1000 champion, winning titles at 2024 Dubai (d. Kalinskaya in final) and 2025 Rome (d. Gauff in final)
- This marks 8th career WTA 1000 QF and 5th of this year; she is the second Italian to reach 5+ WTA 1000 quarterfinals in a single season (Miami, Rome, Cincinnati, Beijing and Wuhan) after Sara Errani in 2013 (6)
- Could equal the best result achieved by an Italian at Wuhan since the tournament's inception in 2014 (Roberta Vinci reached semifinal in 2015)
- Owns 9 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.2 Coco Gauff at Cincinnati 2025
- Has won 40 matches during the 2025 season equaling her best season (40 in 2024)

Swiatek:

- Best WTA 1000 result this season is her title run in Cincinnati (d. Paolini in F); she has won 11 WTA 1000 titles in her career
- Has reached her 25th career WTA 1000 quarterfinal and 7th of 2025 the most of any player this season
- Owns 51 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.10 Elena Rybakina at Cincinnati 2025
- Iga Swiatek (28) and Jasmine Paolini (25) are two of the three players with the most WTA 1000 match wins in 2025, with Aryna Sabalenka claiming the second-most (26)
- Has equaled the best result by a Polish player in Wuhan quarterfinal run made by Magdalena Frech in 2024, Magda Linette in 2024, Agnieszka Radwanska in 2016
- Has won 61 tour-level matches so far in 2025; she leads the tour in match wins this year

Laura Siegemund (GER #57) vs. [3] Coco Gauff (USA #3)

Tied1-1

Siegemund:

- Making 2nd main-draw appearance at Wuhan; her previous main-draw result was reaching 2r in 2016 (I. Cibulkova)
- Today marks her first career WTA 1000 quarterfinal; previous career-best finish at a WTA 1000 event was making R16 at 2016 Madrid, as a qualifier
- Holds a 6-14 career record vs. Top 5 players, with her most recent Top 5 win coming over No.5 Mirra Andreeva at Wuhan this week
- Has become the fourth oldest player (37 years and 216 days) to reach a WTA 1000 quarterfinal since the format's
 introduction in 1990 younger only than Martina Navratilova and the Williams' sisters
- Could equal the best result achieved by a German player at Wuhan since the tournament's inception in 2014 (Angelique Kerber reached the semifinal in 2015)
- Is the player with the most receiving games won (18) at Wuhan 2025

Gauff:

- Has qualified for the WTA Finals
- Making 2nd appearance at Wuhan; previously reached SF in 2024 (I. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- Two-time WTA 1000 champion, winning titles at 2023 Cincinnati and 2024 Beijing (d. Muchova in both finals)
- She is undefeated in WTA 1000 quarterfinals held in China (4-0), only Petra Kvitova (6) and Agnieszka Radwanska (5) have made more semifinals in those events
- She is the first player to reach the quarterfinals in five consecutive WTA 1000 events held in China (Beijing 2023-2025 and Wuhan 2024-2025) since the format's introduction in 2009
- Is 19-3 against opponents ranked 50+ during the 2025 season with her only losses coming against Victoria Mboko at Montreal, Belinda Bencic at Indian Wells, and McCartney Kessler at Dubai
- Is the player with the most wins on Chinese soil in the last two years (15)
