WTA FINALS LEADERBOARD WATCH FROM WUHAN

With her quarterfinal match win, coupled with Elena Rybakina's loss in the quarterfinals, Jessica Pegula secured qualification for the WTA Finals.

That leaves three players vying for the final two spots – Jasmine Paolini, Mirra Andreeva and Elena Rybakina.

Paolini can secure her spot in the WTA Finals by winning the title this week in Wuhan.

Players that remain in contention for the other alternate position: Ekaterina Alexandrova, Clara Tauson and Belinda Bencic

By reaching the semifinals, Coco Gauff moves up to No.3 on the Leaderboard, overtaking Amanda Anisimova.

Should Paolini advance to the final, she will overtake Mirra Andreeva at No.7

The Top 8 will remain unchanged after Wuhan, although Mihalikova/Nicholls (with final) and Danilina/Krunic (with title) can move into the No.9 spot.



Sabalenka leads 8-2

Sabalenka:

- Making 4th appearance at Wuhan, where she is the 3-time defending champion
- Her Wuhan career record of 20-0 is the highest tally of consecutive wins in a single city hosting a WTA 1000 event since Serena Williams in Rome (21, between 2012 and 2019)
- Is the fourth player to win their first 20 main draw matches in a single WTA level event since 1990 after Monica Seles at Australian Open (33-0), Steffi Graf at Leipzig (25-0) and Caroline Wozniacki at New Haven (20-0)
- Has defeated only Elise Mertens (13) on more occasions than Pegula (8) also defeated Rybakina 8 times
- With her QF win over No.9 Rybakina she has equalled the most Top 10 wins she achieved in a single season with 11 (also 11 in 2024); she is the player with the most Top 10 wins this season
- This is 19th WTA 1000 semifinal, among active players only Victoria Azarenka (24) and Iga Swiatek (21) have more
- Has reached her 11th semifinal of 2025, the most of any player; becomes the first player since Serena Williams in 2013 (11) to reach 11 semifinals as World No.1 in a single season
- She is a 9-time WTA 1000 champion, including two WTA 1000 titles this year (Miami and Madrid)
- Has qualified for the WTA Finals and remains in contention for year-end No.1 Ranking

Pegula:

- Making 3rd appearance at Wuhan; has reached semifinal for first time after a 3r finish last year (I. Wang Xinyu)
- She is a 3-time WTA 1000 champion, winning titles at 2022 Guadalajara, 2023 Montreal and 2024 Toronto
- A win today would be her sixth final of the season after Adelaide (R-Up), Austin (WON), Miami (R-Up, I. Sabalenka), Charleston (WON) and Bad Homburg (WON)
- Has a 2-2 record against Top 10 players in Tour matches so far this season with both losses to Sabalenka (US
 Open & Miami)
- Has defeated the current World No.1 on four occasions: Swiatek at 2023 United Cup, 2023 Montreal and 2024 US Open; Sabalenka at 2023 WTA Finals
- Has won 49 matches so far in 2025; she is ranked No.3 on Tour, behind only Swiatek and Sabalenka
- Has won 3 WTA singles titles this season at Austin (hard), Charleston (clay), and Bad Homburg (grass)
- Has qualified for the WTA Finals Riyadh following her quarterfinal win over Siniakova

Paolini leads 3-2

Gauff:

- In her second Wuhan appearance, she has equalled her 2024 semifinal performance (I. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- Two-time WTA 1000 champion, winning titles at 2023 Cincinnati and 2024 Beijing (d. Muchova in both finals)
- Only Martina Hingis (33) and Maria Sharapova (15) have reached more Tier I/WTA 1000 semifinals before turning 22 years old than Gauff (12)
- Is the first player to reach semifinals in five consecutive WTA 1000 events held in China (Beijing 2023-2025 and Wuhan 2024-2025) since the format's introduction in 2009
- Since 2009, only Petra Kvitova (six) has made more WTA 1000 SFs in events held in China (Beijing and Wuhan) than Gauff (five)
- Looking to reach her fifth WTA 1000 final, the third in 2025 (after Madrid and Rome) and the third on hard court (after Cincinnati 2023 and Beijing 2024)
- Is 1-3 against players from Italy so far this season with all 3 losses to Paolini (d. Bronzetti at Cincinnati)

Paolini:

- In contention to qualify for the WTA Finals; can secure qualification this week by winning the title
- Making 2nd appearance at Wuhan; she reached QF last year (I. eventual finalist Zheng Qinwen)
- Has defeated Gauff in all three of their meetings this year (Stuttgart, Rome, Cincinnati) and achieved a further Tour Top 10 win over No.2 Swiatek in the Wuhan quarterfinal this week
- Two time WTA 1000 champion, winning titles at 2024 Dubai (d. Kalinskaya in F) and 2025 Rome (d. Gauff in F)
- Has become the Italian player with the most Tier I/WTA 1000 semifinals reached since 1990 (five, surpassing Flavia Pennetta and Sara Errani both with four)
- Has equalled the best result achieved by an Italian at Wuhan since the tournament's inception in 2014 (semifinal by Roberta Vinci in 2015)
- Has claimed 41 WTA main draw wins in 2025 surpassing her best career season (40 in 2024)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan.
 Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid.
- Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- Rose to career-high No.2 in rankings on August 23, 2021
