**Diana Shnaider (#12) vs. Marketa Vondrousova (CZE #164)**

**Shnaider leads 1-0**

***Shnaider:***

- Making her debut appearance at Berlin
- Faces No.164 Marketa Vondrousova in 2r today in their first meeting on grass
- Has beaten Donna Vekic so far this week
- Best career result on grass is her title run at Bad Homburg in 2024

***Vondrousova:***

- Making her fourth appearance at Berlin, where her best result was reaching the QF in 2023 (l. Sakkari)
- Defeated Madison Keys this week for her first Top 10 win since Stuttgart 2024 (d. Sabalenka)
- Best career result on grass is Champion which she has reached once: Wimbledon in 2023

**[Q] Katerina Siniakova (CZE #74) vs. Elena Rybakina (KAZ #11)**

**Rybakina leads 4-3**

***Siniakova:***

- Making her fourth appearance at Berlin, where her previous and best result was reaching the QF in 2024
- Looking for her 25th win in career over a Top 20 player (most recently No.20 Yulia Putintseva at Indian Wells 2025)
- Defeated Viktoriya Tomova in the opening round, Siniakova's first main draw win since 2025 Miami
- Best career result on grass is Champion which she has reached once: Bad Homburg in 2023
- Has held the WTA Doubles World No.1 ranking for 156 weeks (4th most all-time)

***Rybakina:***

- Making her fourth appearance at Berlin, where her previous and best result was reaching QF in 2024
- Has beaten Ashlyn Krueger so far this week
- Faces No.74 Katerina Siniakova in 2r today in their first meeting on grass
- Best career result on grass is her champion run at Wimbledon 2022

**[Q] Xinyu Wang (CHN #49) vs [2] Coco Gauff (USA #2)**

**Gauff leads 1-0**

*Wang:*

- Making fourth appearance at Berlin, where her best previous result was reaching 2r in 2022 (as qualifier, l. Gauff)
- Faces No.2 Coco Gauff in 2r today; owns 2 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.3 Jessica Pegula at Wuhan in 2024; owns one Top 10 win on grass courts def. No.5 Jessica Pegula (2024 Wimbledon)
- This is third meeting vs. against Top 2 ranked opponents, 0-2 with losses to No.1 Iga Swiatek (2023 Roland Garros) and No.2 Aryna Sabalenka (2022 Australian Open)
- Owns 10-14 career record against players from the United States, with a record in 2025 standing at 0-2
- Owns 16-42 career record against seeded players, including a 1-4 in 2025 (d. Ostapenko, at Indian Wells)
- No.2 ranked Chinese player on Tour, behind only No.4 Qinwen Zheng

*Gauff:*

- Making fourth appearance at Berlin, where her best previous result was reaching semifinal in 2024 (l. Pegula)
- Faces No.49 Xinyu Wang in 2r today; is 19-6 this year vs. Top 50 opponents
- Is 7-8 on grass vs. Top 50 ranked opponents
- Owns 13-1 career record against players from China, with a record in 2025 standing at 2-0
- Owns 39-4 career record against qualifiers, with a record in 2025 standing at 2-0
- Has won 25 matches so far in 2025; she is ranked No.7 on tour for match wins

**Magdalena Frech (POL #25) vs Amanda Anisimova (USA #13)**

**First meeting**

- Making second appearance at Berlin, where her best result was reaching 1r in 2021 (as qualifier, l. Keys)
- Owns 7 wins in career over Top 20 players, including her win over No.7 Mirra Andrejeva in the first round
- Owns 9-17 career record against players from the United States, with record in 2025 standing at 0-1
- Is currently ranked No.25; this time last year was ranked No.52

*Anisimova:*

- Making second appearance at Berlin, where her best result was reaching 1r in 2021 (l. Cornet)
- Faces No.25 Magdalena Frech in 2r today; owns 56 wins in career over Top 50 players, most recently No.5 Qinwen Zheng at Queens in 2025

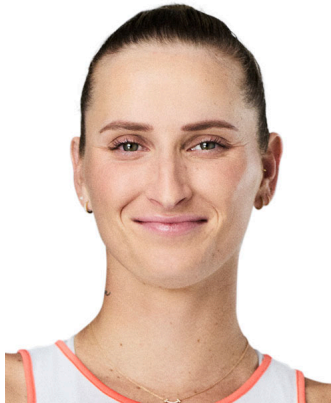

## CAREER MILESTONES

- Won first four titles of career in 2024 across all three surfaces; WTA 500 Bad Homburg and WTA 250s Hua Hin, Budapest and Hong Kong. Reached her first Grand Slam 3r at 2024 Wimbledon and advanced to R16 at 2024 US Open
- Cracked into the Top 20 on August 12, 2024, where she stayed for the rest of the year finishing the season at World No.13
- Also in 2024, won the Paris Olympic silver medal in women's doubles with Mirra Andrejeva
- Reached 2r on Grand Slam debut at 2023 Australian Open (as qualifier, l. Sakkari in 3s) and Roland Garros 2023 (l. Haddad Maia)
- Won WTA 125K Series title in Montevideo, Uruguay last November to end 2022 just outside Top 100
- Overall win-loss record in 2022 was 56-17; reached four ITF Circuit finals, highlighted by a 15-match, three tournament winning streak, culminating with a W60 title in Istanbul
- Last season only Tour-level outing was qualifying exit at St. Petersburg
- Won first ITF Circuit tournament at W15 event in Antalya in late 2021
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2021 Moscow
- Owns four titles in singles and three in doubles on ITF Circuit
- Played first senior matches on ITF Circuit towards end of 2020
- As junior, made SF at Roland Garros in 2021 and US Open in 2022. Also won girls' doubles at three of the four majors and reached No.2 in the ITF rankings
- In 2024 reached QF at Roland Garros (l. eventual champion Swiatek); further highlights included semifinal at Stuttgart and quarterfinals at Strasbourg and Dubai. Ended her season after Wimbledon through shoulder injury
- Following injury issues in second half of 2022, bounced back in 2023 for best-ever season, winning debut Slam title at Wimbledon (d. Jabeur in F - becoming the first unseeded player in the open era to claim the Wimbledon title), making Top 10 debut and qualifying for first WTA Finals.
- Best result of 2022 season was SF run at Dubai (withdrew prior to match vs. w/right adductor injury). Missed most of second half of the season due to left wrist injury, returning in October to play a few ITF Circuit events and Billie Jean King Cup Finals
- Finished 2021 with SF runs at Luxembourg, Chicago [500] and Moscow
- Won silver medal in singles at Olympics in Tokyo (l. Bencic)
- Opened 2021 campaign with SF at Yarra Valley Classic before R16 showing at Australian Open
- Highlights of 2020 include defeating No.6 Svitolina to reach SFs at Rome (l. Ka.Pliskova) as well as a QF run to kick off the season at Adelaide (l. No.1 Barty)
- Enjoyed break-out season in 2019, reaching three finals across the year and posting career-high ranking of No.14 on July 1, 2019
- Finished R-Up at Budapest (l. Van Uytvanck) and Istanbul (l. Martic) before reaching championship match at Roland Garros (l. Barty); did not drop a set en route to final in Paris
- Ranked No.38, was joint-third lowest-ranked woman to reach Roland Garros final, and aged 19, was first teenager to reach title match there since Ivanovic in 2007
- Posted first win of career over a Top 2 player in 2019, defeating No.2 Halep at Indian Wells and then Rome
- Forced to end 2019 season down early due to left wrist injury - did not play again following 1r exit at Wimbledon
- In doubles, has reached SF at 2019 Australian Open (w/Strycova) and QF at 2017 Wimbledon (w/Bellis)
- At 2018 US Open, became the first teenager to reach the last 16 at Flushing Meadows since 2016 (Konjuh, QF - 18) and the youngest Czech player to advance to this stage in New York since 2005 (Vaidisova, R16 - 16)

- Was the biggest ranking mover on tour in 2017, moving from No.376 to No.67 (309 places)
- Made WTA breakthrough by winning International-level title at 2017 Biel/Bienne (d. Kontaveit in F), in just her second WTA main draw. At No.233, was the lowest-ranked title winner in 2017 and aged 17 years, 293 days was the youngest since Konjuh (17 years, 169 days) at 2015 Nottingham
- Advanced to 2r on tour-level debut at 2016 Prague - as wildcard
- Made professional debut at 2014 \$100k ITF/Prague-CZE (d. Suk, L. Brengle in 2r); on ITF Circuit, winner of seven singles and four doubles titles
- In juniors won doubles at Australian Open and Roland Garros in 2015 (both w/Kolodziejova). In singles, was semifinalist at both Roland Garros and Wimbledon and rose to No.1 on ITF junior rankings in 2015

## OTHER INFORMATION

- Started playing tennis in Tolyatti (Kasatkina's hometown), 40 kilometres from her home in Zhigulevsk and parents
- Moved to Moscow aged nine and is now studying at North Carolina State where she is majoring in exploratory studies
- Favorite movie is Never Back Down and favorite food is Asian

- Coached by Jan Hernych
- Lives and trains in Prague; moved to the city on her own to train at 15 years old
- Began playing tennis at 4 years old with her father, David Vondrouš, and by 10-years-old she was practicing in Prague. Mother, Jindřiska Anderlova played volleyball in the top Czech league
- Married partner Stepan Simek in the summer of 2022
- Favorite surface is clay because she grew up on it, but believes her game is more suited for hard courts
- Chose tennis over soccer because she prefers the individual nature of the sport
- Tennis idol is Roger Federer
- Has a Sphynx cat named Frankie
- Describes herself as "quiet" and "calm"

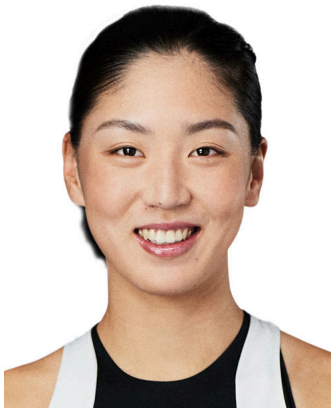
