MATCH NOTES – FRIDAY – JUNE 20

[LL] Ons Jabeur (TUN #61) vs. Marketa Vondrousova (CZE #164)

Tied 4-4

Jabeur:

- Making her 4th appearance at Berlin, where her previous result was reaching QF in 2024
- The last time the Jabeur faced Vondrousova faced each other on grass was the Wimbledon 2023 final where Vondrousova claimed the title
- Best career result on Grass is Champion which she has reached 2 times: Berlin in 2022; Birmingham in 2021. She is also a two-time Wimbledon finalist in 2022 and 2023 (l. Rybakina in 2022, l. Vondrousova in 2023)
- Looking for her first win over Vondrousova on grass since Eastbourne 2021

Vondrousova:

- Making her 4th appearance at Berlin, where her best result is her current run to the QF; also made QF in 2023 (l. Sakkari)
- Has beaten No.6 Madison Keys and No.12 Diana Shnaider so far this week to reach her first QF since second QF of the season after Abu Dhabi
- The last time the two faced on grass was her title run at Wimbledon (d. Jabeur 64 64); also her best career result on grass

[8] Paula Badosa (ESP #10) vs. [Q] Xinyu Wang (CHN #49)

Badosa leads 1-0

Badosa:

- Making her debut appearance at Berlin
- Faces No.49 Xinyu Wang in QF today in their second meeting and first on grass
- Best career result on grass is Quarter-Finalist which she has reached once: Bad Homburg in 2024
- Has equaled Spain's best result at Berlin by reaching the QFs (previously Muguruza in 2021)

Wang:

- Making her 4th appearance at Berlin, where her best result is her current run at the tournament
- Through to her 11th QF of her career and second at a WTA 500 level or higher -also at 2024 Wuhan (SF) in 2024; Berlin in 2022
- Looking for her 4th win in career over a Top 10 player (most recently No.2 Coco Gauff in the previous round at Berlin 2025)
- Best career result on grass is R16 which she has reached twice: Wimbledon in 2024; Berlin in 2022

[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. Elena Rybakina (KAZ #11)

Sabalenka leads 6-4

Sabalenka:

- After 1r bye, has beaten Rebeka Masarova to reach her 9th QF of 2025 season, owning 7-1 record in QF matches, with the only loss to Zheng at Rome
- With a win today would be through to her first SF at Berlin
- Record against opponents outside Top 10 is 33-5 in 2025, with the most recent loss coming against No. 24 Ostapenko at Stuttgart 2025
- Is No. 1 seed this week; has been top seed at 31 tournaments in her career
- Has won 42 matches so far in 2025; she is ranked No.1 on tour for match wins

Rybakina:

- Has beaten Ashlyn Krueger and Katerina Siniakova to reach back-to-back QFs at Berlin, after doing so last week at London (l. eventual champion Maria)
- With a win today would be through to her first SF at Berlin
- Can return to the Top 10 by winning the title this week
- Record against world No.1 stands at 6-4 (0-0 in 2025), playing today's opponent Sabalenka for the first time in 2025
- Best career result on grass is her Wimbledon 2022 title

Amanda Anisimova (USA #13) vs. Liudmila Samsonova (#20)

Anisimova leads 2-1

Anisimova:

- Has beaten Bianca Andreescu and Magdalena Frech to reach 5th QF of 2025 season
- Owns 5-1 record against Top 20 opponents in 2025, with the only loss to No. 1 Sabalenka at Roland Garros
- Best career result on grass court is R-Up which she has reached once: Queens in 2025 (l. champion Maria in F)
- Best result by United States of America at Berlin was Champion run by Jessica Pegula in 2024
- Is currently ranked at a career-high No.13 (just achieved on June 16); this time last year was ranked No.189

Samsonova:

- Has beaten Naomi Osaka and Jessica Pegula so far this week to reach her 4th QF of 2025 season (Strasbourg, Indian Wells, Adelaide)
- Owns 26 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.3 Jessica Pegula here at Berlin 2025
- Has won two grass court titles: 's-Hertogenbosch in 2024; Berlin in 2021
- Is currently ranked No.20 (peak rank at No.12 in 2023); this time last year was ranked No.15

CAREER MILESTONES

- 2024 season highlights included five quarterfinals at Roland Garros, Madrid, Berlin, Abu Dhabi and Nottingham. Ended season after Toronto in August through shoulder injury
- Reached third Grand Slam final and second Wimbledon final in 2023 (l. Vondrousova). Also qualified for WTA Finals for second consecutive year to close out the season.
- In 2022, created history by becoming first African and Arab woman in Open Era to reach a Grand Slam final, finishing R-Up at first Wimbledon (l. Rybakina) and then US Open (l. Swiatek)
- Lifted biggest career title at WTA 1000 Madrid during 2022 clay-court season (d. Pegula in F)
- Broke into Top 10 on October 18, 2021, following SF run at Indian Wells (l. eventual champion Badosa)
- At 2021 Birmingham, became first Arab woman to win a WTA title (d. Kasatkina in F). Followed this with QF at Wimbledon (l. Sabalenka)
- In 2021, also finished R-Up at Charleston [250] (l. Sharma) and Chicago [500] (l. Muguruza)
- Reached maiden Grand Slam QF at 2020 Australian Open to become the first Arab woman to reach that stage at a major (l. eventual champion Kenin); made Top 50 debut at No.45 after breakthrough performance in Melbourne
- Made further QFs in 2020 at Doha (d. No.3 Ka.Pliskova, l. Kvitova), Lexington (l. Gauff), Western & Southern Open (l. eventual champion Azarenka) and Ostrava (l. Sakkari); posted career-high ranking of No.31 on August 31, 2020
- Season highlights in 2019 were 3r run at US Open and SF appearances at Eastbourne (l. eventual R-Up Kerber) and Tianjin (l. eventual champion Peterson)
- In 2018, defeated No.3 seed Stephens, No.8 seed Kontaveit and No.5 seed Sevastova en route to her first WTA final at 2018 Moscow, where she fell in three sets to No.6 seed Kasatkina. Was first Tunisian woman to advance beyond QF at a WTA tournament (Sfar was the only other Tunisian to reach a QF at this level)
- Scored first Top-10 win over No.7 Cibulkova at 2017 Roland Garros
- Reached maiden WTA QF at 2013 Baku. Also advanced to that stage at 2017 Taipei City and 2018 Bucharest
- Three-time member of Tunisian Olympic Team, first doing so at London games in 2012
- Contested first two WTA main draws in 2012, at Doha (as WC) and Olympics
- In 2024 reached QF at Roland Garros (l. eventual champion Swiatek); further highlights included semifinal at Stuttgart and quarterfinals at Strasbourg and Dubai. Ended her season after Wimbledon through shoulder injury
- Following injury issues in second half of 2022, bounced back in 2023 for best-ever season, winning debut Slam title at Wimbledon (d. Jabeur in F - becoming the first unseeded player in the open era to claim the Wimbledon title), making Top 10 debut and qualifying for first WTA Finals.
- Best result of 2022 season was SF run at Dubai (withdrew prior to match vs. w/right adductor injury). Missed most of second half of the season due to left wrist injury, returning in October to play a few ITF Circuit events and Billie Jean King Cup Finals
- Finished 2021 with SF runs at Luxembourg, Chicago [500] and Moscow
- Won silver medal in singles at Olympics in Tokyo (l. Bencic)
- Opened 2021 campaign with SF at Yarra Valley Classic before R16 showing at Australian Open
- Highlights of 2020 include defeating No.6 Svitolina to reach SFs at Rome (l. Ka.Pliskova) as well as a QF run to kick off the season at Adelaide (l. No.1 Barty)
- Enjoyed break-out season in 2019, reaching three finals across the year and posting career-high ranking of No.14 on July 1, 2019
- Finished R-Up at Budapest (l. Van Uytvanck) and Istanbul (l. Martic) before reaching championship match at Roland Garros (l. Barty); did not drop a set en route to final in Paris
- Ranked No.38, was joint-third lowest-ranked woman to reach Roland Garros final, and aged 19, was first teenager to reach title match there since Ivanovic in 2007
- Posted first win of career over a Top 2 player in 2019, defeating No.2 Halep at Indian Wells and then Rome
- Forced to end 2019 season down early due to left wrist injury - did not play again following 1r exit at Wimbledon
- In doubles, has reached SF at 2019 Australian Open (w/Strycova) and QF at 2017 Wimbledon (w/Bellis)
- At 2018 US Open, became the first teenager to reach the last 16 at Flushing Meadows since 2016 (Konjuh, QF - 18) and the youngest Czech player to advance to this stage in New York since 2005 (Vaidisova, R16 - 16)

- On ITF Circuit, has 11 singles and one doubles title
- Played first event of career at 2008 ITF/El Menzah-TUN
- Became first North African woman to win a junior Slam at 2011 Roland Garros (d. Puig in F), having also reached the final in 2010 (l. Svitolina in F)

- Was the biggest ranking mover on tour in 2017, moving from No.376 to No.67 (309 places)
- Made WTA breakthrough by winning International-level title at 2017 Biel/Bienne (d. Kontaveit in F), in just her second WTA main draw. At No.233, was the lowest-ranked title winner in 2017 and aged 17 years, 293 days was the youngest since Konjuh (17 years, 169 days) at 2015 Nottingham
- Advanced to 2r on tour-level debut at 2016 Prague - as wildcard
- Made professional debut at 2014 \$100k ITF/Prague-CZE (d. Suk, l. Brengle in 2r); on ITF Circuit, winner of seven singles and four doubles titles
- In juniors won doubles at Australian Open and Roland Garros in 2015 (both w/Kolodziejova). In singles, was semifinalist at both Roland Garros and Wimbledon and rose to No.1 on ITF junior rankings in 2015

OTHER INFORMATION

- Currently coached by Issam Jellali; fitness trainer is Karim Kammoun
- Mother's name is Samira; father's name is Ridha; has two brothers (Hatem and Marwen) and one sister (Yasmine)
- Started playing tennis at age 3; mother loved playing tennis and would take her with her to tennis club
- Favorite shots are forehand and volleys , likes slice and drop shots; likes all surfaces
- Speaks Arabic, English and French; learning Russian because husband is half-Russian
- Best tennis memory is winning Roland Garros juniors in 2011 (had operation on left wrist in November 2010 and missed five months, and was only her third or fourth event back)
- Favorite tournament is Roland Garros
- Player most admired is Andy Roddick for his serve and humor
- Supports Real Madrid and Juventus

- Coached by Jan Hernych
- Lives and trains in Prague; moved to the city on her own to train at 15 years old
- Began playing tennis at 4 years old with her father, David Voudrouš, and by 10-years-old she was practicing in Prague. Mother, Jindriska Anderlova played volleyball in the top Czech league
- Married partner Stepan Simek in the summer of 2022
- Favorite surface is clay because she grew up on it, but believes her game is more suited for hard courts
- Chose tennis over soccer because she prefers the individual nature of the sport
- Tennis idol is Roger Federer
- Has a Sphinx cat named Frankie
- Describes herself as "quiet" and "calm"

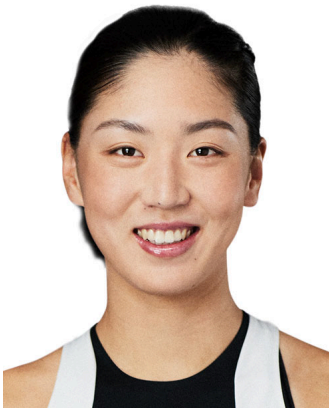
