**Leylah Fernandez (CAN #29) vs. [2] Jasmine Paolini (ITA #4)**

**Fernandez leads 3-1**

*Fernandez:*

- Making 2nd appearance at Bad Homburg, where her previous result was reaching the 2r in 2023
- Has beaten Tatjana Maria so far this week to reach the 2r for the second consecutive tournament after advancing to the QF at Nottingham
- Holds a 3-1 career record against Paolini (incl. Billie Jean King Cup). All previous meetings have come on hard court
- Owns 6 Tour-level wins (all on hardcourt) in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.9 Emma Navarro at Doha 2025

*Paolini:*

- Making tournament debut at Bad Homburg
- Owns 51 wins in career over Top 50 players, most recently No.3 Coco Gauff in the Final at Rome 2025. Has five such victories on grass, with most recent coming against No.37 Donna Vekic in the SF at Wimbledon 2024
- Best career result on grass was a Runner-Up finish at Wimbledon in 2024
- Winner of today's match will face the winner of Lucky Loser Ashlyn Krueger OR Beatriz Haddad Maia vs. No.14 Elina Svitolina

**[1] Jessica Pegula (USA #3) vs. [Q] Katerina Siniakova (CZE #78)**

**Pegula leads 3-1**

*Pegula:*

- Making 2nd appearance at Bad Homburg, where her previous result was reaching the 2r in 2021
- Holds a 3-1 career record against Siniakova, with the lone defeat coming in the 2r at Bad Homburg in 2021
- Owns 29-7 career Tour-level record against Qualifiers, with a record in 2025 standing at 4-0
- Has been the top seed at 13 Tour-level tournaments in her career
- Best career result on grass is a Champion run at Berlin in 2024

*Siniakova:*

- Making 5th appearance at Bad Homburg, where her best result was a Champion run in 2023 (d. Lucia Bronzetti in Final)
- Has beaten Veronika Kudermetova so far this week to advance to the 2r for the second consecutive tournament after reaching the 2r in Berlin
- Owns nine wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.8 Qinwen Zheng at Berlin 2024 (lone such win on grass)
- Winner of today will face the winner of Naomi Osaka vs. No. 10 Emma Navarro

## [Q] Victoria Azarenka (#105) vs. [4] Iga Swiatek (POL #8)

**Swiatek leads 4-1**

### *Azarenka:*

- Making her 2nd appearance at Bad Homburg; previously reached QF in 2021
- Owns 80 wins in career over Top 10 players (0-2 vs. Top 10 in 2025)
- Career-best tour-level result on grass is runner-up showing at 2010 Eastbourne (l. Makarova)
- This is her first week ranked outside the Top 100 since July 30, 2018
- Together, Azarenka (51) and Swiatek (125) have held the WTA World No.1 Ranking for 176 weeks

### *Swiatek*

- Making 2nd appearance at Bad Homburg, where she previously reached the SF in 2023
- After her first-round bye, she is playing her first grass-court match of the season today
- Since the start of 2022, Swiatek is 36-1 vs. players ranked outside the Top 100 (the one loss was to Eala at 2025 Miami)
- Has won 32 tour-level matches so far in 2025, 2nd-most on tour (trailing only Sabalenka's 43)
- Currently ranked No.8; this is her lowest ranking since she was ranked No.9 on February 14, 2022

## [WC] Naomi Osaka (JPN #56) vs. [5] Emma Navarro (USA #10)

**Navarro leads 1-0**

### *Osaka:*

- Making her first appearance at Bad Homburg
- Defeated Olga Danilovic in 1r for her first match-win since Rome 3r (ended 3-match losing streak), and her first grass-court win of the year
- Owns 13 wins in career over Top 10 players (0-2 vs. Top 10 in 2025)
- Only the 2nd time a player from Japan has made Bad Homburg R16 (Misaki Doi made R16 in 2021)

### *Navarro*

- Making 3rd appearance at Bad Homburg; she made SF in both of her previous appearances in 2023 (l. eventual champion Siniakova) and 2024 (l. eventual champion Shnaider)
- Her 2 Bad Homburg SFs are her career-best tour-level results on grass, and they are also the best Bad Homburg finishes by an American
- Owns 1-0 career tour-level record against players from Japan (d. Osaka at 2024 Wimbledon)
- 10-4 this year vs. players ranked outside the Top 50

## CAREER MILESTONES

- 2024 season highlights were reaching first final on grass finishing R-Up at Eastbourne (L. Kasatkina) and as part of title defence made SF at Hong Kong. Also reached final of Cincinnati in doubles w/ Putintseva
- In 2023, earned third career title at Hong Kong (d. Siniakova). Prevented from a consecutive title run by Siniakova who defeated her in Nanchang SF. Other notable results where quarterfinals at Guadalajara (L. Kenin), Cleveland (L. Maria) and Auckland (L. Bonaventure). Also defeated Paolini at Billie Jean King Cup Finals to lift title with Canada.
- Broke into the Top 20 in doubles in 2023, after reaching final at Roland Garros, Miami (both w/Townsend) and Auckland (w/Mattek-Sands) as well as QF at US Open (w/Townsend).

In 2022 won her second title at Monterrey (d. Osorio in F; saved 5MP), and reached the QF at Roland Garros (L. Trevisan); missed grass-court season due to grade three stress fracture in her right foot suffered during match vs. Trevisan in Paris

- Enjoyed a memorable 2021 campaign, lifting first career title in Monterrey and advancing to maiden Grand Slam final, at US Open (L. Raducanu)
- En route to the final at Flushing Meadows in 2021, upset defending champion and No. 3 Osaka in 3r, 2016 winner Kerber in R16, No.5 Svitolina in QF and No. 2 Sabalenka in SF, becoming the youngest woman to beat multiple Top-5 opponents at the same major since S. Williams at 1999 US Open
- Breakout year in 2020 saw her crack Top 100 for the first time on September 14 and finish campaign by reaching 3r at Roland Garros
- Earned first career Grand Slam win at 2020 US Open (d. Zvonareva, L. Kenin in 2r) and made Grand Slam debut at 2020 Australian Open as qualifier (L. Davis in 1r)
- Reached first career WTA final and notched first tour-level back-to-back wins at 2020 Acapulco as qualifier (L. Watson in F); at 17y, 177d, she was the youngest Canadian to reach a WTA singles final in 34 years (since Helen Kelesi at 1986 Tokyo [Japan Open] won at 16y, 338d)
- Also in 2020, earned first Top-100 win over No.5 Bencic in Billie Jean King Cup
- Owns one singles title and two doubles titles on ITF Circuit

- Breakout 2024 season saw her win the biggest title of her career at WTA 1000 Dubai and also reach her first Grand Slam finals, finishing R-Up at Roland-Garros and Wimbledon. Qualified for her first WTA Finals in singles and doubles, broke into the Top 10 for the first time in her career and finished the season as the World No.4
- Finished 2023 by breaking into Top 30 for first time, achieving No. 29 on Oct 23, 2023 after becoming runner-up at Monastir (L. Mertens). Also achieved runner-up at Palermo and SF at Zhengzhou (L. Zheng both times) as well as QFs at Lyon (L. Garcia) and Cincinnati as a qualifier (L. eventual champion Gauff). Enjoyed two Top 10 wins (No.10 Garcia and No.4 Rybakina).
- In 2022, finished R-Up at Cluj-Napoca (L. Blinkova), while made back-to-back SF at Palermo (L. Bronzetti) and Warsaw (L. eventual champion Garcia)
- Also reached QF at Lyon (L. Yastremska), Portoroz (L. eventual champion Siniakova) and Parma (L. Kovinic)
- Broke into Top 50 on January 31, 2021
- Posted near-Top 50 season finish in 2021 after capturing first WTA singles title of career at Portoroz (d. Riske in F)
- Strong season finish also brought SF run at Courmayeur (L. eventual champion Vekic) and QF effort at Linz (L. Halep); posted best win of season over No.18 Mertens en route to 3r at Indian Wells (L. Pegula)
- Also in 2021 won the WTA 125K event in Bol, Croatia (d. Rus in F) and was R-Up at the same level in Saint Malo (L. Golubic) Captured first WTA doubles title in 2021, at Hamburg (w/Teichmann)
- In 2021, for first time in career, contested the full suite of all four Grand Slam events; reached 2r at Roland Garros and US Open, equalling best previous Slam result
- In 2020, reached 2r four times at WTA tournaments, including Roland Garros (L. Kvitova)
- Highlights of 2019 included QF showings at Guangzhou and Palermo, a SF run at the WTA 125K Series event at Karlsruhe, lifting seventh, eighth and ninth ITF Circuit titles of her career, at \$60KBrescia-ITA, \$25K ITF/Curtiba-BRA and \$100K ITF/Tokyo-JPN, and qualifying for maiden Grand Slam main draw at Roland Garros (L. Kasatkina in 1r)

- Won 2019 Roland Garros junior's title (d. Navarro) becoming first Canadian to win a junior Grand Slam since Bouchard in 2012
- Played first WTA main draw and earned first main draw win of career at 2018 Quebec City defeating countrywoman Dabrowski in 1r (L. Watson in 2r)
- Member of Canadian Billie Jean King Cup Team 2019, 2021-22
- Made professional debut on ITF Circuit in USA in 2016

- Ended 2018 ranked No.180, with season highlight a maiden WTA singles QF at Prague (d. No.15 Kasatkina, L. Zhang)
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2017 Bastad (L. Suarez Navarro in 1r) and also fell 1r at Guangzhou and in qualifying a further three times
- Part of Italy's Billie Jean King Cup team 2017-19
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2015 Rome
- Made professional debut on ITF Circuit in Italy in 2011

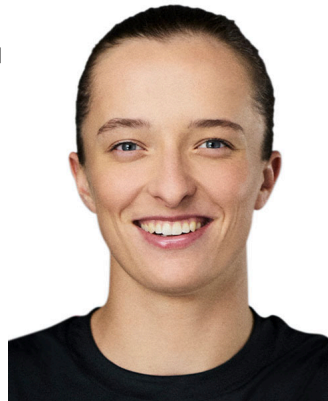

- Also last season was R-Up at Western & Southern Open - withdrew w/left hamstring injury before final against Azarenka
- Won second Grand Slam at Australian Open (d. Kvitova in F); became first Japanese player to reach World No.1 ranking following the tournament
- In addition, won back-to-back titles for first time in her career at Osaka (d. Pavlyuchenkova in F) and Beijing (d. Barty in F); defeated No.1 Barty in Beijing final for second career victory over world No.1 (also beat Halep at 2018 Indian Wells)
- Enjoyed break-out season in 2018, posting a 40-20 record resulting in a No.5 (first Top 10 season), up from No.68 in 2017
- Won the first two titles of her career in 2018, at Indian Wells (d. Kasatkina in F) and debut Grand Slam crown at US Open (d. S.Williams in F)
- En route to the Indian Wells title, defeated five-time major champion Sharapova, and A.Radwanska, Ka.Pliskova and Halep. Only set dropped all fortnight was against Sakkari in R16
- Reached one further final in 2018, at Tokyo [PPO] (l. Ka.Pliskova)
- In reaching R16 at 2018 Australian Open, became youngest Japanese player to reach R16 at a Slam since Sugiyama at 1995 Roland Garros (19y, 342d) and the youngest player from Japan to reach R16 in Melbourne since Date in 1990 (197, 122d)

- Voted 2024 WTA Most Improved Player of the Year Award, finished the year ranked No.8 with a singles record of 54-24, winning her first career title at 2024 Hobart; climbed to a year-end ranking at No.8 after finishing 2023 at No.38 (and No.143 in 2022)
- 2023 was a stand-out year, achieving a career best with semifinal at WTA 500 San Diego (l. Kenin) and ending season with a ranking of No. 32. Also reached two quarterfinals on clay; Strasbourg (l. Blinkova) and Palermo (l. eventual champion Zheng) and one semifinal on grass; Bad Homburg (l. Siniakova).
- In 2022, posted 31-18 win-loss record. At Tour-level, made 2r at Charleston (as WC, l. Jabeur), fell 1r at Monterrey (as WC, l. Zacarias) and Indian Wells (as WC, l. Anisimova), and contested qualifying at San Diego
- Elsewhere in 2022, reached three ITF Circuit finals, including lifting second career title at this level at W60 tournament in Liepaja, Latvia, while made SF at WTA 125K Series event in Vancouver
- Broke into Top 200 for the first time on March 7, 2022
- Lifted maiden ITF Circuit title at W25 event in Orlando in November 2021
- Won the NCAA division 1 women's singles title in May 2021 to earn a WC into US Open, where she fell 1r (l. McHale)
- In 2021, reached 2r at both Charleston [500] and Charleston [250]
- Fell 1r at 2020 Monterrey (l. Stephens)
- Only other events in 2020 came on ITF Circuit, ending year ranked No.463
- Owns three ITF Circuit titles in singles and one in doubles
- Fell 2r on professional debut at \$10k Charleston, SC-USA (l. Di Lorenzo) in 2015
- Began her collegiate career by winning her first 14 NCAA singles matches and moving up to a No.6 ITA ranking
- Ended 2019 at No.3 in ITF Junior rankings, following a season that included a R-Up finish at Roland Garros (l. Fernandez), a SF run at Wimbledon and victory at the Adidas Easter Bowl
- Also R-Up in girls' doubles at 2019 Australian Open w/Beck

- Book-ended 2017 season with QF showings at Auckland and Hong Kong; other highlights included 3r runs at Wimbledon and US Open
- Scored first Top 5 win of career when she defeated No.5 V.Williams at 2017 Hong Kong. Upset win over defending champion and No.6-ranked Kerber at 2017 US Open marked first career Top 10 win
- Voted 2016 WTA Newcomer of the Year; highlight was career-first WTA final at Tokyo [PPO] (L. Wozniacki). Also reached QF on three occasions and 3r at Australian Open, Roland Garros and US Open
- Ranked No.406, made WTA main draw debut at 2014 Stanford. As an alternate, won through qualifying (achieving first WTA qualifying wins), and came from match point down to shock No.19 Stosur in 1r of main draw, before losing to No.18 Petkovic in 2r
- Made WTA qualifying debut at Quebec City in 2013 (L. Dabrowski)
