[8] Ekaterina Alexandrova (#18) vs. [WC] Maria Sakkari (GRE #85)

Sakkari leads 6-1

Alexandrova:

- Making 2nd appearance at Bad Homburg, where her previous result was reaching 2r in 2024 (l. eventual finalist Vekic)
- Defeated Belinda Bencic so far this week for her 4th grass-court match-win of the year (also reached 's-Hertogenbosch SF)
- Is 4-0 this year vs. players ranked outside the Top 75
- Owns two singles titles on grass, both at 's-Hertogenbosch, in 2022 (d. Sabalenka in final) and 2023 (d. V. Kudermetova in final)

Sakkari:

- Making 2nd appearance at Bad Homburg; lost to Jule Niemeier in her opening match here last year
- Defeated Yulia Putintseva so far this week for her 2nd grass-court win of the year (made 's-Hertogenbosch R16, then lost in Berlin qualifying)
- Owns 52 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.6 Jasmine Paolini at 2025 Madrid (Sakkari is 1-7 vs. Top 20 in 2025)
- Best results by wild cards at Bad Homburg were QF runs by Victoria Azarenka in 2021, Sabine Lisicki in 2022, Paula Badosa in 2024 and Caroline Wozniacki in 2024

[7] Elina Svitolina (UKR #14) vs. Beatriz Haddad Maia (BRA #21)

First meeting

Svitolina:

- Making 2nd appearance at Bad Homburg; fell in last year's 1r to Wozniacki
- In her first grass-court match of the season, defeated Elise Mertens in this week's 1r
- Best career tour-level results on grass are 2 Wimbledon SFs, in 2019 (l. eventual champion Halep) and 2023 (l. eventual champion Vondrousova)
- Has won 28 matches so far in 2025, 7th-most on tour this year

Siniakova:

- Making 2nd appearance at Bad Homburg; also reached 2r last year (l. Blinkova)
- Defeated lucky loser Ashlyn Krueger in 1r for her 2nd grass-court win of season (also d. Kvitova at Queen's Club)
- Owns 27 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.9 Emma Navarro at 2025 Strasbourg
- Two-time WTA singles champion on grass, winning consecutive titles at 2022 Nottingham and Birmingham (as part of a 12-match grass-court winning streak)

Noskova leads 1-0

Noskova:

- With a win today would be through to her first career QF on grass and overall 4th of 2025 season (Abu Dhabi, Dubai and Nottingham)
- Owns 26 wins in career over Top 50 players (9 wins in 2025), most recently No.23 Putintseva, No.13 Shnaider and No.5 Pegula at Dubai 2025 (en route to QF)
- Having also reached R16 twice at Bad Homburg in 2024 and 2023, which is her current best result at Bad Homburg, along with Berlin in 2024
- Best result by Czech Republic at Bad Homburg was Katerina Siniakova's title run in 2023
- Is currently ranked No.30; this time last year was ranked No.26

Vekic:

- Making 2nd appearance at Bad Homburg, where her previous result was R-Up in 2024 (l. Shnaider in F)
- Has beaten Diana Shnaider in their rematch of 2024 Bad Homburg final in first round
- With a win today would be through to her first QF of 2025 season
- Owns one singles title on grass at Nottingham 2017 (d. Konta in F)
- Is currently ranked No.22 (peak rank at No.17 in Jan 2025); this time last year was ranked No.49

[3] Mirra Andreeva (#7) vs. Clara Tauson (DEN #23)

Andreeva leads 3-0

Andreeva:

- Record against opponents outside Top 20 stands at 25-4 in 2025 with the most recent at Berlin 2025 last week to No. 25 Frech
- Owns 3-0 career record against players from Denmark, all against today's opponent Tauson in 2025 including their first meeting in champion match at Dubai 2025
- Looking to her first win on grass since Wimbledon 2023 where she made R16, her best result on grass so far (l. Keys)
- Is currently ranked No.7 (peak rank at No.4 in March 2025); this time last year was ranked No.24
- Has won 31 matches so far in 2025; she is ranked No.4 on tour for match wins, tied with Coco Gauff (31), behind Aryna Sabalenka (43), Iga Swiatek (33), Jessica Pegula (32)

Tauson:

- Has beaten Magdalena Frech in 1r to score her first win Bad Homburg
- Owns 3 wins in career over Top 10 players, with the best win defeating world No.1 Aryna Sabalenka at Dubai 2025 (en route to final)
- Best career result on grass is QF run at Nottingham 2025 (l. Linette)
- Is currently ranked No.23 (close to her peak rank No.21 in March 2025); this time last year was ranked No.67

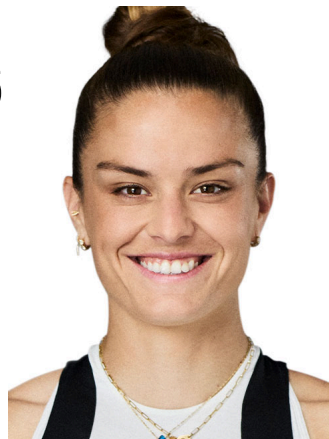

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2024, highlights included reaching the final at Linz (l. Ostapenko in Final) and semifinals at Adelaide (l. eventual champion Ostapenko), Miami (l. eventual champion Collins), 's-Hertogenbosch (l. eventual champion Samsonova) and Monterrey (l. Sun); also made quarterfinals at Wuhan (l. Xin. Wang) and her best Grand Slam result of the season came during a 3r run at US Open (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- In 2023, won fourth career singles title at 's-Hertogenbosch, successfully defending the title and defeating top seed, Kudermetova in the final. A run of successful results followed with SF at Berlin (l. eventual champion, Kvitova), 4r at Wimbledon (l. Sabalenka) - a career best result at any of the majors and runner-up at Cleveland (l. Sorribes Tormo).
- Reached a 2023 peak ranking of No. 16 on February 20, 2023 following a 3r finish at Australian Open (l. Linette), before posting two QF results at Miami (l. eventual champion Kvitova) and Charleston (l. Bencic). Another QF then came in the Asian Swing at Tokyo (l. Pavlyuchenkova).
- In 2022, won titles at 's-Hertogenbosch (d. Sabalenka in F) and Seoul (d. Ostapenko in F). Also advanced to SF at Charleston, Madrid and Ostrava, making Top-20 debut on October 10, 2022
- Reached third WTA singles final in 2021, enjoying run to final at home tournament of Moscow (l. Kontaveit). Other key result was SF run at Gippsland Trophy (l. Kanepi)
- Posted two best wins-by-ranking of career in 2021, defeating No.2 Halep (Gippsland Trophy) and No.2 Sabalenka (Moscow)
- Reached 2r on Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020
- Opened 2020 season by lifting her maiden WTA singles title, at Shenzhen (d. Rybakina in F)
- Won both singles rubbers on Billie Jean King Cup debut in 3-2 win over Romania in February 2020
- Made Top-50 debut on June 17, 2019 after QF run at 's-Hertogenbosch
- Registered 30 Tour-level match wins during 2019, in which she reached SF at Budapest, Seoul and Linz and made QF at St. Petersburg, 's-Hertogenbosch, Eastbourne and Moscow. Also advanced to 3r at a major for the first time, at Roland Garros
- Won sole WTA doubles title at 2019 Budapest (w/Zvonareva)
- Key result of 2024 was reaching Indian Wells final for the second time, losing to Swiatek who also defeated her in 2022 final. Also reached SF at Charleston (l. Collins). Did not play after US Open
- Won first WTA 1000 title in 2023 at Guadalajara (d. Dolehide in F). Also finished R-Up at Washington (l. Gauff). Contested WTA Finals for third consecutive season (was first alternate and went 0-3 in Group Stage following Muchova withdrawal).
- Finished 2022 ranked No.6 for the second consecutive year; a four-time finalist in 2022 including runs to the final at two WTA 1000 tournaments - Indian Wells and Guadalajara [1000]; returned to the WTA Finals advancing to the semifinals, falling to eventual champion Caroline Garcia.
- Climbed as high as No.3 in the rankings (March 21, 2022), the highest ranking every achieved by a Greek woman.
- Historic 2021 season was highlighted by her becoming first Greek woman to break into the Top 10 (at No.10, September 27) as well as the first from her country to qualify for the WTA Finals.
- In 2021, also reached third WTA final at Ostrava (l. Kontaveit), while advanced to SF at Roland-Garros, US Open - defeating three Top-20 ranked opponents at both events - and WTA Finals in Guadalajara
- Posted a Tour-leading nine Top-10 wins in 2021, including two over the World No.2 (Osaka at Miami and No.2 Sabalenka at WTA Finals)
- Broke into Top 20 on February 24, 2020 for first time, at No.20
- Scored third and fourth Top-5 wins of her career in 2020, over No.5 Svitolina at Ostrava and No.5 Bencic at St. Petersburg. Previous wins came over No.5 Ka.Pliskova (2018 Rome) and No.5 Kvitova (2019 Rome, via ret.)
- Upset No.10 seed Keys to reach the R16 for the first time at one of the four Slams, at 2020 Australian Open (l. Kvitova)
- Qualified for WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai in 2019 for first time in career (fell in RR stage). That season won maiden WTA title at Rabat, recovering from a set and break down to defeat Konta in final
- Highlights of 2018 were reaching her first tour-level final at San Jose (l. Buzarnescu) and scoring maiden Top-5 win over No.5 Ka.Pliskova in 2r at Rome

- Came through qualifying to make maiden WTA final appearance at 2018 Linz (l. Giorgi)
- Advanced to first WTA QF at 2018 Seoul, scoring maiden Top 10 win of her career en route, over No.10 Ostapenko
- Made Top-100 debut at No.93 on March 20, 2017 after winning title at \$60K ITF/Shenzhen-CHN
- At 2016 Wimbledon, ranked No.223, won her way through qualifying on her maiden Slam appearance, going on to reach 2r (upset No.23 seed Ivanovic in 1r)
- Won WTA 125K Series title at Limoges in 2016, 2018-19
- Reached 2r on WTA main draw debut at 2016 Katowice (as qualifier, l. eventual R-Up Giorgi)
- Contested qualifying for the first time at a WTA-level tournament at 2014 Bad Gastein
- Played first professional events of career on ITF Circuit in Europe in 2011

- Notched first Top-10 victory of career over No.6 Wozniacki en route to first WTA SF of career at 2017 Wuhan
- Broke into Top 50 for first time at No.49 on October 9, 2017
- At 2016 Australian Open, by reaching 2r (d. Y.Wang, l. Suarez Navarro) became the first woman from Greece to win a main draw match at a Slam since Daniilidou d. Ka.Pliskova at 2013 Australian Open
- Reached first career WTA QF at 2016 Istanbul (as qualifier, l. Kovinic)
- Fell 1r on WTA main draw debut at 2015 US Open (as qualifier, l. Q.Wang)
- WTA qualifying debut came at 2012 Palermo
- Made debut on ITF Circuit in 2010; owns seven ITF Circuit singles titles and five in doubles

- Worked with her father, Evgeny. Was previously coached by Vojta Flegl
- Mother is Julia, also has sister, Anna, and brother Jury. Began playing tennis at age 6

- Admires Serena Williams

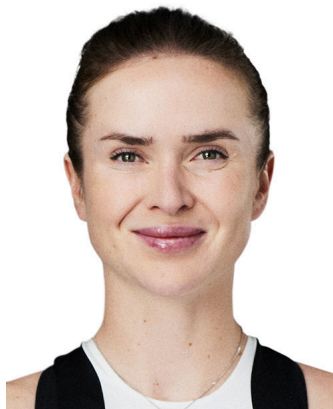

- Returned to the Tour in April 2023, following birth of daughter Skai. Won Strasbourg (d. Blinkova) for a second time (also in 2020) before achieving Grand Slam results of QF at Roland Garros (l. Sabalenka) and SF at Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Vondrousova)

- In 2018, won 13th - and most prestigious - career title at 2018 WTA Finals (d. Stephens in F), after going 3-0 during round robin stage. Ended year ranked No.4. Also won titles at Rome (as defending champion, d. No.1 Halep in F), Dubai (as defending champion, d. Kasatkina in F) and Brisbane (d. Sasnovich in F)
- Enjoyed standout 2017, finishing year at No.6, winning a tour-leading five titles and posting second-most wins (53, behind Wozniacki with 60). 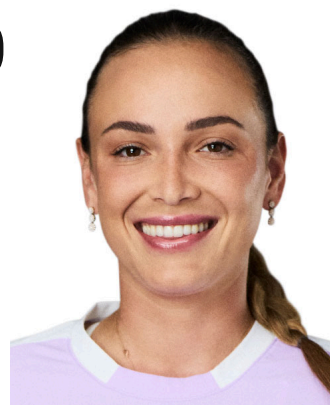

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2024, achieved first Grand Slam singles quarterfinal at the Australian Open (l. Yastremska), where she also defeated then-World No.1 Iga Swiatek in the 3r; won her first singles title at Monterrey (d. Sun in F); reached SF at Prague (l. eventual champion Linette) and Brisbane (l. eventual champion Rybakina); earned a new career-high ranking of No.25 on August 26, 2024
- Breakthrough year in 2023, achieving runner-up twice; Adelaide 1 (as qualifier, l. Sabalenka) and Prague (l. Hibino). Also reached quarterfinals at Lyon (l. Osorio) and 3r at Indian Wells (l. Gauff) and Cincinnati (as qualifier, l. Gauff). Broke into Top 40 on October 9, 2023.

- In 2023, posted best Australian Open result with QF (l. eventual champion Sabalenka), equalling best Grand Slam result (QF finish at 2019 US Open). Claimed fourth career title at Monterrey (d.
