MATCH NOTES – DAY 4 – THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 27

[Q] Emiliana Arango (COL #133) vs. [Q] Francesca Jones (GBR #136)

Arango:

- Won their only meeting in SF of 125K event in Cancun earlier this year en route to the title
- Earned first main draw win of the year beating Maria Lourdes Carle in 1r after also defeating her in final round of qualifying (Lourdes Carle entered as a Lucky Loser)
- Looking to reach fourth career QF and first since 2023 Cluj-Napoca
- Best career result at a WTA 500 or higher level was reaching QF at WTA 1000 Guadalajara in 2023 (I. Sakkari)

Jones:

- Earned first main draw win since 2024 Nottingham with victory over Mayar Sherif in 1r
- Win was also first victory at a WTA 500 level event or higher
- Looking to reach third career QF also doing so at 2023 Bogota and 2024 Nottingham; with a win would reach first hard court QF of career

Rebecca Sramkova (SVK #40) vs. [3] Beatriz Haddad Maia (BRA #17) Haddad Maia leads 4-1

Sramkova:

- Looking to reach sixth career QF but first at a WTA 500 level or higher event
- Owns four wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.15 Mirra Andreeva at Doha earlier this year
- Looking to beat today's opponent for first time at Tour-level; sole win came on ITF circuit in 2021
- Sole career title came on hard courts at Hua Hin #2 in 2024

Haddad Maia:

- Making debut appearance at Merida
- Owns one WTA 500 title winning at Seoul last year (d. Kasatkina in F)
- Has won their only two Tour-level meetings, most recently at Indian Wells last year
- Lost her last three matches to players outside the Top 20 with a 2-5 record this year
- Looking to reach first QF of the year

Magda Linette (POL #37) vs. [WC] Zeynep Sonmez (TUR #88)

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2024 won main draw matches at WTA 1000 events Miami and Madrid as a qualifier; also made the final at WTA 125 Santa Cruz and semifinal at WTA 125 Guadalajara
- Moved into Top 150 for first time in 2023 with breakthrough QF performances at Guadalajara (l. eventual champion Sakkari) and Cluj Napoca (l. Ruse).
- Missed first half of 2022 campaign. Best result on return was SF showing at W60 ITF Circuit event at Caldas da Rainha
- Posted 38-20 win-loss record in 2021, lifting two ITF Circuit titles
- Won maiden ITF Circuit title at W15 Antalya in 2017
- Fell 1r on WTA debut at 2016 Bogota
- Owns three ITF Circuit singles titles
- On the ITF Junior Circuit, posted career-high ranking of No.8 in January 2018, having reached SF at previous year's US Open (l. eventual champion Anisimova)

- Highlights of 2024 were reaching quarterfinal at Nottingham and her first WTA 125 final at San Luis Potosi (l. Podoroska in F); also made semifinal at WTA 125 Ljubljana and played Wimbledon main draw for the second time in her career (l. Martic in 1r).
- Additionally in 2024 earned her seventh career ITF title at W75 Grado.
- Returned to the courts in 2023 playing the ITF circuit before reaching SF at Bogota (l. Maria) in her strongest result of the year.
- Reached career-high ranking of No.149 on February 21, 2022, but did not play rest of 2022 season with injuries.
- Made Grand Slam main-draw debut at Australian Open (as qualifier, l. Rogers in 1r) and Wimbledon (l. Gauff in 1r)
- Won most recent of six career ITF Circuit titles in 2021 at W60 event in Biarritz
- Best results in 2020 were QF run at WTA 125K Series event in Prague (l. eventual champion Kucova) and three SF showings on ITF Circuit
- Won fourth and fifth ITF Circuit titles in 2019 and fell in qualifying at Wimbledon, Bucharest and Jurmala
- Ended 2018 inside Top 400 for the first time; posted 37-18 record across the season, lifting two singles titles on ITF Circuit
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2018 Wimbledon
- Lifted first ITF Circuit singles title at \$15k ITF/Asunción-PAR in 2017; overall owns six singles titles at this level
- Made professional debut on ITF Circuit in Italy in 2015
- Contested girls' singles at Roland Garros (2017) and Wimbledon (2016-18) and achieved careerhigh ITF juniors ranking of 31 on May 1, 2017

CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached first three WTA finals of career in 2024, at Monastir, Hua Hin (defeated Siegemund for maiden title) and Jiujiang; finished season by guiding Slovakia to Billie Jean King Cup finals for first time since 2002; ended year in Top 50 for first time.
- Standout performance of 2023 was reaching QF at Warsaw (l. Maria). Also achieved R-Up at WTA 125 Bari on clay (l. Zidansek).
- Best result in 2022 was making 1r as a qualifier at Roland Garros (as LL, l. Kasatkina).
- Continued on ITF circuit from 2019 2021, also making 2r at Tour level at Prague 2020 (l. Jones) and again at Prague 2021 (as qualifier, l. Kuzmova).
- Reached Grand Slam main draw in 2017 at Australian Open (as qualifier, l. Duan) and won first WTA main draw match at Gstaad over Nina Stojanovic.
- Broke into Top 200 for first time in 2016 following title run at ITF Rome \$25K and also made Grand Slam debut at US Open that season (l. Karatantcheva in Q1).
- Played first WTA match in qualifying at Nottingham in 2015 (l. Zhu).
- Won first ITF title in 2013 on clay at Vrnjacka Banja \$10K.
- Began on professional circuit in 2012 at Velenje \$10K at the age of 15.

- Won fourth career title at 2024 Seoul, her first WTA 500 title and finished runner-up in Cleveland. Also reached quarterfinals at the 2024 US Open for best career result in New York and ended the season at No.17, her third consecutive Top 20 finish
- In doubles in 2024, won seventh career title at Adelaide (with Taylor Townsend)
- Broke into Top 10 in June 2023 after a strong clay season with SF at Roland Garros and QF at Rome and Stuttgart; ended year at No.11
- Also in 2023, won third career title at WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai (d. Q.Zheng) and reached SF at Abu Dhabi and QF at Adelaide 2, Doha and San Diego
- In doubles, won titles at Madrid w/Victoria Azarenka (d. Gauff/Pegula) and WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai w/Veronika Kudermetova (d. Kato/Sutjiadi)
- 2022 season highlighted by a stellar sequence of results on grass, when she became the first woman ever to win Nottingham and Birmingham back-to-back, her first career WTA titles
- Broke into the Top 20 following her run to the first WTA 1000 final at 2022 Toronto (l. Halep); also in 2022 advanced to SF at Monterrey and Eastbourne and three further QFs
- Also in 2022, won two titles at WTA 125K events in Saint Malo and Paris
- Won third doubles title at 2022 Nottingham w/Shuai Zhang (d. Dolehide/Niculescu), also reached final at Australian Open w/Anhelina Danilina (Krejcikova/Siniakova) and Guadalajara 1000 w/Danilina (l. Hunter/Stefani); earned spot at WTA Finals Fort Worth in doubles with Danilina going 1-2 in group play
