QUARTERFINALS – THU, 6 FEB 2025

[WC] Marketa Vondrousova (CZE #37) vs. [WC] Belinda Bencic (SUI #157) Bencic leads 2-1

Vondrousova:

- Playing second tournament of 2025 season, after R16 run at Adelaide (d. Pavlyuchenkova, I.Shnaider via retirement)
- Adelaide event was first tournament since 2024 Wimbledon, had six months off tour w/left shoulder injury
- Owns one hard court title, at Biel (Switzerland) in 2017
- Also through to the doubles QF this week (w/Laura Samson)

Bencic:

- Won the title here in 2023 (d. Samsonova in final)
- Seeking first semifinal appearance at a Tour-level main draw since 2023 Charleston (R-Up)
- Was ranked No.1213 in November; is playing this week at No.157 and is projected to move inside the Top 130 by reaching the QF this week and into Top 120 with SF
- The three previous meetings between Bencic and Vondrousova all came during 2021 season; Bencic won the most recent match-up at 2021 Cincinnati

[8] Leylah Fernandez (CAN #27) vs. Ashlyn Krueger (USA #51)

Tied 1-1

Fernandez:

- Through to the QF at a Tour-level event for the 18th time
- Bidding to reach the SF at a WTA 500 level event for the second time in her career also 2024 Eastbourne (R-Up)

Krueger:

- The two split their previous two meetings both during 2024 season; Krueger won the most recent meeting at 2024 Toronto
- This is her fifth career QF appearance and third at a WTA 500 level; she is seeking her first SF appearance at a WTA 500 level or higher having previously lost in QF twice this year Brisbane (QF) and Adelaide (QF)
- Has 10 wins over Top 30 opponents, including three this year defeating No.12 Paula Badosa (Adelaide), No.18 Matra Kostyuk (Adelaide) and No.14 Anna Kalinskaya (Brisbane)

[1] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #5) vs. Ons Jabeur (TUN #33)

Jabeur leads 3-2

Rybakina:

- Making 3rd appearance at Abu Dhabi, where she won the tournament in 2024 (d. Kasatkina in F)
- Has also won two other singles titles at WTA 500 events at Brisbane 2024 (d. Sabalenka) and Stuttgart 2024 (d. Kostyuk)
- Is No. 1 seed this week; has been top seed at 2 tournaments in her career last time also at Abu Dhabi in 2024
- Seeking first semifinal since 2024 Wimbledon (SF) and first hardcourt semifinal since 2024 Miami (R-Up)
- Rybakina's last win in the series came at 2022 Wimbledon final

Jabeur:

- Making 2nd appearance at Abu Dhabi, posting her best previous result last season with QF run (I. Haddad Maia)
- Has defeated No.7 seed Jelena Ostapenko and Wakana Sonobe en route to the quarterfinal
- Owns one singles titles on hard court, at Ningbo 2023 where she made her most recent SF appearance
- Seeking first Top 10 win on hardcourts since 2022 WTA Finals (d. No.3 Jessica Pegula)
- Jabeur won the most recent meeting 2023 Wimbledon (QF)

Magda Linette (POL #38) vs. Linda Noskova (CZE #39)

Linette leads 2-0

Linette:

- Through to first QF of 2025 season and first since winning the title at 2024 Prague
- Outside of United Cup, is seeking first SF appearance at a WTA 500 level event

Noskova:

- Making second appearance at Abu Dhabi after competing in opening round in 2024 (I. Sorribes Tormo)
- Win over Noskova in R16 was seventh career win over a Top 10 opponent
- Owns one hard court title: Monterrey in 2024
- Noskova is through to her 10th Tour-level QF and first since winning the title at 2024 Monterrey
- This is her 4th WTA 500 level QF appearance having previously reached SF at 2024 Brisbane, R-Up at 2023 Adelaide, in addition to winning the title at 2024 Monterrey

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2024 reached QF at Roland Garros (l. eventual champion Swiatek); further highlights included semifinal at Stuttgart and quarterfinals at Strasbourg and Dubai. Ended her season after Wimbledon through shoulder injury
- Following injury issues in second half of 2022, bounced back in 2023 for best-ever season, winning debut Slam title at Wimbledon (d. Jabeur in F - becoming the first unseeded player in the open era to claim the Wimbledon title), making Top 10 debut and qualifying for first WTA Finals.
- Best result of 2022 season was SF run at Dubai (withdrew prior to match vs. w/right adductor injury). Missed most of second half of the season due to left wrist injury, returning in October to play a few ITF Circuit events and Billie Jean King Cup Finals
- Finished 2021 with SF runs at Luxembourg, Chicago [500] and Moscow
- Won silver medal in singles at Olympics in Tokyo
 (I. Bencic)
- Opened 2021 campaign with SF at Yarra Valley Classic before R16 showing at Australian Open
- Highlights of 2020 include defeating No.6
 Svitolina to reach SFs at Rome (l. Ka.Pliskova) as well as a QF run to kick off the season at Adelaide (l. No.1 Barty)
- Enjoyed break-out season in 2019, reaching three finals across the year and posting careerhigh ranking of No.14 on July 1, 2019
- Finished R-Up at Budapest (l. Van Uytvanck) and Istanbul (l. Martic) before reaching championship match at Roland Garros (l. Barty); did not drop a set en route to final in Paris
- Ranked No.38, was joint-third lowest-ranked woman to reach Roland Garros final, and aged 19, was first teenager to reach title match there since Ivanovic in 2007
- Posted first win of career over a Top 2 player in 2019, defeating No.2 Halep at Indian Wells and then Rome
- Forced to end 2019 season down early due to left wrist injury - did not play again following 1r exit at Wimbledon
- In doubles, has reached SF at 2019 Australian Open (w/Strycova) and QF at 2017 Wimbledon (w/Bellis)
- At 2018 US Open, became the first teenager to reach the last 16 at Flushing Meadows since 2016 (Konjuh, QF - 18) and the youngest Czech player to advance to this stage in New York since 2005 (Vaidisova, R16 - 16)

- After giving birth to daughter Bella, returned to the courts in October 2024 to play a handful of ITF matches, as well as winning her Billie Jean King Cup Playoff match for Switzerland over Serbia's Lola Radivojevic in November
- Played last tournament of 2023 at San Diego before taking maternity leave
- In 2023, won two titles at Adelaide 2 (d. Kasatkina in F) and Abu Dhabi (d. Samsonova in F); also finished R-Up at Charleston (l. Jabeur)
- Won sixth career title in 2022, triumphing at Charleston, while finishing R-Up at Berlin (l. Jabeur) and helped Switzerland lift Billie Jean King Cup Finals in Glasgow; also reached SF at Miami (l. Osaka) and Tallinn (l. Krejcikova) Captured gold medal for Switzerland at Tokyo Olympics in 2021 (d. Vondrousova in F); also claimed silver in doubles (w/Golubic)
- Other 2021 highlights included R-Up finish at Adelaide (l. Swiatek) and Berlin (l. Samsonova), and six further QFs (including US Open)
- Across a disrupted 2020 reached three QFs, at Adelaide, St. Petersburg and Doha
- Was voted WTA Comeback Player of the Year in 2019 - lifted two titles at Dubai (d. Kvitova in F) and Moscow (d. Pavlyuchenkova in F) and posted a career-best 49 Tour-level match wins in 2019 fourth most among all players and breaking back into Top 10 on September 9
- Earned spot at WTA Finals in Shenzhen becoming first Swiss player to compete in singles at the WTA Finals since Hingis in 2006, going on to reach SF at the season-ending showpiece (l. Svitolina)
- Also in 2019, marked 20th Grand Slam main draw by reaching her maiden major SF at US Open (l. eventual champion Andreescu) and finished R-Up at Mallorca (l. Kenin)
- Led the WTA with six victories over Top 5 players in 2019, including upsets over No.1 Naomi Osaka at Indian Wells, Madrid and US Open
- Standout result in 2018 was R-Up finish at Luxembourg (as qualifier, l. Goerges)
- In first round at 2018 Australian Open, defeated No.5 Venus Williams. Having also upset then-No.1 Serena Williams in SF at 2015 Toronto is one of seven women to defeat both Williams sisters before their 21st birthday (also Hingis, Sharapova, Clijsters, Henin, Chakvetadze and Osaka)
- Underwent left wrist surgery in spring 2017, missing five months - ranking fell outside Top

- Was the biggest ranking mover on tour in 2017, moving from No.376 to No.67 (309 places)
- Made WTA breakthrough by winning International-level title at 2017 Biel/Bienne (d. Kontaveit in F), in just her second WTA main draw. At No.233, was the lowest-ranked title winner in 2017 and aged 17 years, 293 days was the youngest since Konjuh (17 years, 169 days) at 2015 Nottingham
- Advanced to 2r on tour-level debut at 2016
 Prague as wildcard
- Made professional debut at 2014 \$100k
 ITF/Prague-CZE (d. Suk, l. Brengle in 2r); on ITF
 Circuit, winner of seven singles and four doubles
 titles
- In juniors won doubles at Australian Open and Roland Garros in 2015 (both w/Kolodziejova). In singles, was semifinalist at both Roland Garros and Wimbledon and rose to No.1 on ITF junior rankings in 2015

- 300; reached QF at Linz as WC in first WTA event back after surgery
- Run to 2016 St. Petersburg final (l. Vinci in F) saw her break into Top 10 at No.9 for the first time in her career. Also in 2016, reached SF at Sydney and 's-Hertogenbosch.
- Won first career titles in 2015 at Eastbourne (d. Radwanska in F) and Toronto (d. Halep in F); also reached final at 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Giorgi) and Tokyo (l. Radwanska)
- At Toronto, beat four Top 10 players en route to the title including World No.1 Serena Williams
- Qualified for 2015 WTA Elite Trophy in Zhuhai however withdrew due to hand injury
- Won second WTA doubles title of career in 2015 at Washington, DC (w/Mladenovic), the first coming earlier in the year at Prague(w/Siniakova)
- Voted 2014 WTA Newcomer of the Year after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Tianjin (l. Riske), SF at Charleston and QF run at 2014 US Open (defeated No.7 Kerber in 3r, No.10 Jankovic in R16); at 17 years of age, was youngest player through to last eight at Flushing Meadows since 1997 when Hingis won the title and broke into Top 50 on Sept 8, 2014
- Won junior singles titles at Roland Garros and Wimbledon in 2013; was named ITF Junior World Champion for 2013
- Played first WTA qualifying event at Luxembourg in October 2011, and first WTA main draw 12 months later at same event as WC (l. V.Williams, 1r); only 15 years, 7 months at the time
- Also in 2022, played qualifying at Brussels and 's-Hertogenbosch
- Made professional debut on ITF circuit in 2011; owns five career ITF titles

OTHER INFORMATION

- · Coached by Jan Hernych
- Lives and trains in Prague; moved to the city on her own to train at 15 years old
- Began playing tennis at 4 years old with her father, David Voundrous, and by 10-years-old she was practicing in Prague. Mother, Jindriska Anderlova played volleyball in the top Czech league
- Married partner Stepan Simek in the summer of 2022
- Favorite surface is clay because she grew up on it, but believes her game is more suited for hard courts
- Chose tennis over soccer because she prefers the individual nature of the sport
- Tennis idol is Roger Federer
- · Has a Sphynx cat named Frankie
- Describes herself as "quiet" and "calm"

- · Coached by Iain Hughes
- Father, Ivan, sometimes serves as her tennis coach, and Martin Hromkovic as her fitness coach. Mother is Dana; younger brother is Brian who also plays and coaches tennis; father emigrated to Switzerland from then-Czechoslovakia in 1968
- Started playing at Melanie Molitor's (mother of Martina Hingis) tennis school at age 3 until age 19 (started daily training with her from age 6 for eight years)
- Also visit the Nick Bollettieri and Evert Tennis Academy as a Junior
- Enjoys watching movies, reading, playing with dogs, baking, painting, and seeing friends
