Series tied 1-1

Rybakina:

- Making 3rd appearance at Abu Dhabi, where she won the tournament in 2024 (d. Kasatkina in F)

- Has also won two other singles titles at WTA 500 events at Brisbane 2024 (d. Sabalenka) and Stuttgart 2024 (d. Kostvuk)

- This is her 30th Tour level SF – owns a 19-10 record at this stage

- Is No. 1 seed this week; has been top seed at 2 tournaments in her career - last time also at Abu Dhabi in 2024

- Through to her first semifinal since 2024 Wimbledon (SF) and first hardcourt semifinal since 2024 Miami (R-Up)

Bencic:

- Won the title here in 2023 (d. Samsonova in final)

- Looking for her first Top 5 win in 2025, having fallen to No.4 Paolini at United Cup and No. 3 Gauff at Australian Open

- Is through to first semifinal at a Tour-level main draw since reaching the final at 2023 Charleston (R-Up), having spent 18 months away from the court due to pregnancy

- Owns six hard court titles: Abu Dhabi, Adelaide in 2023; Tokyo Olympics in 2021; Moscow, Dubai in 2019; Toronto in 2015

- Was ranked No.1213 in November; is playing this week at No.157 and is projected to move inside the Top 120 with SF

Ashlyn Krueger (USA #51) vs. Linda Noskova (CZE #39)

First meeting

Krueger:

- Through to her first WTA 500 SF, bettering four previous QFs at this level

- Owns one singles title, which came on hard court at Osaka in 2023 (d. Zhu in F)

- Is currently ranked No.51, with career-high No.50 achieved in Jan 2025 – will break into the Top 45 following Abu Dhabi SF

Noskova:


- Making second appearance at Abu Dhabi, with 2025 being a great improvement on opening match exit in 2024

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2024 made main draw at all four majors for the first time, posting her best career Slam result at US Open with 3r (l. Samsonova). Further notable results were reaching 3r at WTA 1000s Madrid, Toronto and Beijing and peaking at a career high of No.51 in September. Also claimed first career doubles title at WTA 500 Charleston with Sloane Stephens.
- In 2023, captured first career singles title in Osaka; did not drop a set en route to the title, defeating World No.35 and top seed Zhu Lin in the final. As a result of the title run, made Top 100 debut (week of September 18, 2023).
- Also reached tour level QF at 2023 S'Hertogenbosch (l. Hruncakova).
- Highlight of 2022 season was playing main draw Indian Wells, Miami, San Jose and US Open
- On ITF circuit in 2022, won title at W60 Evansville, IN, USA and reached final at W25 Sarasota, FL, USA
- In 2021, also received WC to Indian Wells, where she was defeated in 1r (l. Martincova)
- Fell 1r on Tour-level debut at 2021 US Open (as WC, l. Schmiedlova in 3s)
- Also made 2r as WC in doubles at 2021 US Open (w/Montgomery, l. Fernandez/Routliffe) WTA qualifying debut came at 2021 San Jose
- Earned wild cards into the singles and doubles draws at 2021 US Open after sweeping the USTA National Championships
- Best career result on ITF Circuit was coming through qualifying to reach SF on professional debut in 2019 at W15 event in Carson, CA, USA
- As a junior won 2020 Orange Bowl tournament as a wildcard. Also lifted girls' doubles title at 2021 US Open (w/Montgomery)

- In 2024, achieved first Grand Slam singles quarterfinal at the Australian Open (l. Yastremska), where she also defeated then-World No.1 Iga Swiatek in the 3r; won her first singles title at Monterrey (d. Sun in F); reached SF at Prague (l. eventual champion Linette) and Brisbane (l. eventual champion Rybakina); earned a new career-high ranking of No.25 on August 26, 2024
- Breakthrough year in 2023, achieving runner-up twice; Adelaide 1 (as qualifier, l. Sabalenka) and Prague (l. Hibino). Also reached quarterfinals at Lyon (l. Osorio) and 3r at Indian Wells (l. Gauff) and Cincinnati (as qualifier, l. Gauff). Broke into Top 40 on October 9, 2023.
- Made Top-100 debut on August 1, 2022, following SF run at Prague (l. eventual champion Bouzkova); overtook Gauff at the youngest player in Top 100
- Also reached 2r at Tallinn (as qualifier, l. Haddad Maia) and fell 1r at both Roland Garros (as qualifier, l. Raducanu) and US Open (as qualifier, l. Bouzkova). On ITF Circuit, lifted fifth and sixth titles at this level, winning W60 tournament in Croissy-Beaubourg, France and W100 event in Versmold, Germany
- Finished 2021 campaign with 38-9 win-loss record, winning four ITF Circuit titles, including at W60 event in Prerov, Czech Republic
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2020 Prague
- On ITF Circuit, owns six titles in singles and one in doubles
- As a junior, won 2021 girls' singles at Roland Garros.

CAREER MILESTONES

- Won three titles from five finals in 2024, tasting success at Brisbane, Abu Dhabi and Stuttgart and finishing R-Up at Doha and Miami. Qualified for her second WTA Finals and defeated WTA World No.1 Sabalenka in the group stage

- Lifted maiden major at 2022 Wimbledon (d. Jabeur in F)
