Magda Linette (POL #33) v. [4] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #12)

Rybakina leads 2-0

Linette:

- Making her landmark 10th main draw appearance at Strasbourg, with her best result achieved in 2021 with SF (I. Cirstea), which is also her best result at a WTA 500 event
- Has beaten Barbora Krejčíková and Rebecca Sramková to reach her third QF of season, after Miami and Abu Dhabi
- Owns 16 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently over No.15 Krejčíková here at Strasbourg earlier this week
- Owns one singles title on clay at Prague 2024

Rybakina:

- Making 3rd appearance at Strasbourg, where her best result was reaching the final in 2020 (I. Svitolina)
- After 1r bye, defeated Xinyu Wang to reach her fourth QF of 2025 season, after Dubai, Doha, Abu Dhabi
- Record against opponents outside Top 20 stands at 18-3 in 2025, with the three losses coming against No. 121 Andreescu at Rome, No. 40 Krueger at Miami, No. 157 Bencic at Abu Dhabi

[9] Beatriz Haddad Maia (BRA #23) vs. [2] Emma Navarro (USA #9)

Haddad Maia:

- Owns one singles title at WTA-500 events: 2024 Seoul
- Has beaten Clara Tauson and Ashlyn Krueger to reach her first QF of 2025 season
- Career-best tour-level results on clay are two SFs at 2019 Bogota and 2023 Roland Garros
- With a win today would be first player from Brazil to reach SF at Strasbourg

Navarro:

- Career best result at a WTA-500 event was title run at Merida 2025 (d. Arango in F)
- After 1r bye, has beaten Anna Blinkova to reach her 5th QF of 2025 season (after Adelaide, Australian Open, Merida, Charleston)

Badosa:

- Making tournament debut at Strasbourg this week
- Owns two singles titles at WTA 500 events, triumphing at 2022 Sydney and 2024 Washington DC
- Is through to her third QF of 2025 season, after Merida and Australian Open
- Owns two wins in 2025 over Top 20 players, having defeated No.18 Marta Kostyuk and No.3 Coco Gauff at Australian Open 2025 (en route to SF)
- Owns one singles title on clay, at Belgrade in 2021

Samsonova:

- Reached semifinal here in 2024, losing to eventual champion Madison Keys
- Owns two singles titles at WTA 500 events on the grass of Berlin in 2021 and Tokyo 2022
- Has beaten Linda Noskova and Diane Parry to reach her third QF of 2025 season, after Australian Open and Adelaide
- Owns 8 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently over No.6 Jasmine Paolini at Indian Wells earlier this year
- Has reached additional semifinals on clay at Stuttgart 2022 and Palermo 2019

Anna Kalinskaya (#30) vs. Danielle Collins (USA #46)

Collins leads 2-0

Kalinskaya:

- Making 2nd appearance at Strasbourg; fell 1r last year (l. Wang Xinyu)
- Career-best WTA 500 result was her runner-up showing at 2024 Berlin (l. Pegula in final)
- Has beaten Caroline Dolehide and Jessica Pegula to reach her third QF on clay
- With a win today would be her second SF of 2025 season, after Singapore (l. Li), also her first career SF on clay
- Is currently ranked No.30 (peak rank at No.11 in Oct 2024); this time last year was ranked No.25

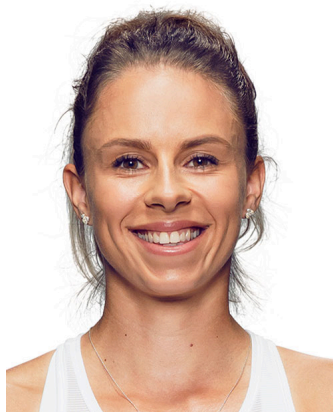
Collins:

CAREER MILESTONES

- Won her third career title in 2024 at Prague; also reached the final at Rouen and made her first career WTA 1000 quarterfinal at Wuhan (l. Gauff)
- Opened 2023 by going 3-1 in singles for Poland in the City Final in Sydney at inaugural United Cup (l. Keys), then achieved best Grand Slam result with SF at Australian Open (l. eventual champion Sabalenka). Broke into Top 20 for first time reaching No. 19 on March 20, 2023.
- Reached final at Guangzhou (l. Wang Xiyu) and ended 2023 by qualifying for Zhuhai Elite Trophy (0-2 in group stage).
- 2022 season highlight was R-Up finish at Chennai (l. Fruhvirtova). Also won two doubles titles, at Charleston (w/Klepac) and Eastbourne (w/Krunic)
- Posted seventh successive Top 100 season in 2021, finishing at No.57 after starting her season at Miami in March, due to a knee injury
- Reached two semifinals in 2021, at Strasbourg (l. Cirstea) and Cleveland (l. Begu)
- Matched previous best results at Grand Slams in 2021 with 3r runs at Roland Garros (d. World No.1 Barty via ret. in 2r; l. Jabeur) and Wimbledon (d. No.5 Svitolina in 2r for best win of career in a completed match, before falling to Badosa)
- Won second WTA singles title at Hua Hin in 2020 (d. Kung in F), rising to new career-high ranking of No.33 (on February 17)
- Posted best result at US Open by advancing to 3r (l. Kontaveit); now has reached this stage at all four Grand Slams
- Winner of 2020 WTA Shot of the Year; became the third Polish woman to win this award (after A.Radwanska and Swiatek)
- Her 2019 campaign was highlighted by lifting maiden WTA title at the Bronx and finished R-Up at Seoul (l. Muchova); broke into Top 50 on September 9, 2019
- Season highlights in 2018 included QF run at Washington DC (l. Vekic); win over No.17 Osaka in 2r was first Top 20 victory - previous career-best win came over No.21 Gavrilova at 2017 Tokyo [PPO]
- Posted first career victories at 2018 Australian Open during 3r run (d. Brady in 1r and No.22 seed Kasatkina in 2r, l. Allertova)
- Highlight of 2017 campaign was SF at Kuala Lumpur (l. Hibino). Also made QF at Bogota and reached 3r at major for first time at Roland Garros
- In 2016 enjoyed run to first Premier-level quarterfinal of career at Tokyo [PPO] (as

- Won three titles from five finals in 2024, tasting success at Brisbane, Abu Dhabi and Stuttgart and finishing R-Up at Doha and Miami. Qualified for her second WTA Finals and defeated WTA World No.1 Sabalenka in the group stage
- Reached second Grand Slam final at 2023 Australian Open (l. Sabalenka in 3s); made Top-10 debut following tournament (January 30, 2023). Also in 2023 won first two WTA 1000 title at Indian Wells and Rome and finished R-Up at Miami. Qualified for first WTA Finals, going 1-2 in group stage.
- Lifted maiden major at 2022 Wimbledon (d. Jabeur in F)
- In 2022 also finished R-Up at Adelaide (l. Barty) and Portoroz (l. Siniakova)
- Best result of 2021 were SFs at Eastbourne, Olympics and Chicago [500], and QFs at Abu Dhabi, Roland Garros, San Jose and Ostrava
- Opened 2020 season by reaching the championship match at four of her first five tournaments, including a title run at Hobart (d. Zhang in F)
- Made first final appearance at a Premier-level tournament with R-Up finish at St. Petersburg (l. Bertens); was rewarded with Top 20 debut at No.19 following run in Russia (February 17, 2020)
- First win over a Top-5 ranked opponent came over No.3 Ka.Pliskova during R-Up finish at 2020 Dubai
- Won back-to-back Slam matches for the first time during 3r showing at 2020 Australian Open (l. Barty)
- Won maiden WTA singles title at 2019 Bucharest (d. Tig in F), breaking into Top 100 for the first time in the following week's rankings at No.65 (July 22, 2019)
- Also in 2019, went on to make Top 50 debut on September 16, 2019, after reaching second career final at Nanchang (l. Peterson), produced SF appearances at Luxembourg and 's-Hertogenbosch, and made Grand Slam main draw debut at 2019 Roland Garros, falling 1r (as qualifier, l. Siniakova)
- Finished 2019 campaign with 57-21 win-loss record (across all levels) to end season at No.37, up from 2018's final ranking of No.191. On the ITF Circuit in 2019, lifted silverware on three occasions: back-to-back at \$25k Moscow-RUS and \$25k Kazan-RUS, and at \$60k ITF/Launceston-AUS
- Highlights of 2018 included reaching maiden WTA QF at St. Petersburg (l. Goerges) and

- qualifier, l. eventual champion Wozniacki); also advanced to QF at Katowice (l. Parmentier)
- Reached maiden WTA singles final at 2015 Tokyo [Japan Open] (l. Wickmayer)
- Broke into Top 100 on June 15, 2015
- Played first two WTA main draws in 2013: 2r at Strasbourg (l. Cornet) and SF at Baku (l. Peer)
- Made professional debut on ITF Circuit in Poland in 2007; owns 12 singles titles and eight doubles titles on ITF Circuit

- clinging title at \$15k ITF/Kazan-RUS
- First Top 10 win came over No.7 Garcia at 2018 St. Petersburg
- Made WTA qualifying and main draw debut at 2017 Moscow (as qualifier, l. Begu in 1r)
- Professional debut came at \$10k ITF/Antalya-TUR in 2014

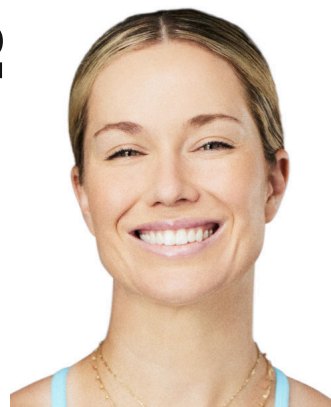
