MATCH NOTES – DAY 1 – WEDNESDAY, MARCH 5

[WC] Petra Kvitova (CZE #1448) vs. Varvara Gracheva (FRA #70)

Kvitova leads 1-0

Kvitova:

- Returns to the court after 17 months maternity leave, playing her first tournament last week at Austin (l. Burrage in 1r)
- Making her 13th appearance at Indian Wells – has reached quarterfinals on three occasions; 2023 (l. Sakkari), 2016 (l. Radwanska) and 2013 (l. Kirilenko)
- Defeated Gracheva in their only previous career meeting on the way to claiming the 2023 Miami title
- Owns 20 hard court titles with the 2023 Miami trophy her most recent
- No. 1476 Kim Clijsters was the lowest ranked player to play 1r at 2021 Indian Wells; Clijsters' 1r loss against Siniakova was the last WTA match of her career

Gracheva:

- Making her third appearance at Indian Wells, where her best previous result was reaching 4r as a qualifier in 2023 (l. eventual champion Rybakina)
- Also reached 4r at Miami in 2023, falling to eventual champion and today's opponent Kvitova
- Looking for her third main draw match win of 2025 after progressing to 2r at Austin and Australian Open
- Best result by France at Indian Wells was runner-up by Marion Bartoli in 2011
- Best career result on hard court is runner-up which she has reached once: Austin in 2023 (l. Kostyuk)

Camila Osorio (COL #53) vs. Naomi Osaka (JPN #56)

Osaka leads 1-0

Osorio:

- Bidding for first main draw match win at Indian Wells today in third appearance
- 2025 Indian Wells is the first event she has contested since Singapore at the end of January
- Best result by a Colombian woman at Indian Wells was quarterfinal by Fabiola Zuluaga in 2004
- Could become the first player from Colombia since rankings were published in 1975 to defeat a former World No.1

Osaka:

- Former Indian Wells champion, enjoyed breakthrough title run here in 2018 (d. Kasatkina in F)
- Was ranked No.44 for her title run in 2018, the third lowest ranked Indian Wells champion since 1989 (No.133 Clijsters won in 2005; No. 60 Andreescu won in 2019)
- Making her sixth main draw appearance, she is undefeated in opening round matches, with an overall tournament match record of 14-4
- This is her third tournament of 2025 retiring in the final at Auckland and again in 3r at Australian Open w/abdominal issue

Peyton Stearns (USA #44) vs. Magda Linette (POL #36)

First meeting

Stearns:

- Making third main draw appearance at Indian Wells, having fallen in 2r on both previous showings (l. Sabalenka in 2024 and Andreescu in 2023)
- Owns 12 wins in her career against Top 50 players, most recently against No.32 Jabeur in Dubai 2025
- Having reached her career-high ranking of No.43 on the PIF WTA Rankings in September 2023, she is currently a spot below at No.44
- One of 24 players from USA to feature in the main draw

Linette:

- Making her 8th main draw appearance at Indian Wells, where she has yet to make in further than the second round
- Fell in her opening round match here for the past three editions and owns an overall tournament match record of 3-7
- Owns a 2-3 record against Top 50 players so far in 2025, with the only fully completed win against No.28 Frech at Doha
- Having reached her career-best of No.19 on the PIF WTA Rankings, she currently stands at No.36

[Q] Clervie Ngounoue (USA #259) vs. Victoria Azarenka (#35)

First meeting

Ngounoue:

- Makes her Indian Wells main draw debut after competing in qualifying in 2024
- Has faced a Top 50 player only once before, falling to No.35 Anna Blinkova in qualifying at Washington 2023
- In her fifth Tour-level main draw match, is looking for her first win today
- Is one of five players from USA to earn their main draw spot through qualification, along with Lepchenko, Osuigwe, Liu and Baptiste

Azarenka:

- Two-time Indian Wells champion (2012 & 2016) is making her 16th appearance at Indian Wells
- Also reached the final in 2021 (l. Badosa) and semifinal in 2009 (l. Zvonareva)
- Has won a total of 34 main draw matches at Indian Wells, only Davenport (47), Sharapova (38) and Wozniacki (36) have more
- Is 12-3 in opening matches at Indian Wells with two of those losses in the past two editions (l. Dolehide in 2024 and Muchova in 2023)
- Her most recent loss to a player ranked outside the Top 100 was No.152 Krueger at 2023 s'Hertogenbosch
- Has won 206 and appeared in 284 WTA 1000 matches since 2009, the most of any player

Ashlyn Krueger (USA #41) vs. Katie Volynets (USA #65)

Krueger leads 1-0

Krueger:

- Making her 5th appearance at Indian Wells, and looking to secure her first main draw win at the tournament
- Owns a 2-7 career match record against players from the United States of America, with a record of 1-2 in 2025 (d. Kessler at Abu Dhabi; I. Pegula at Adelaide and I. Kenin at Doha)
- Reached the second final of her career last month at Abu Dhabi (I. Bencic)
- Won her only previous meeting against Volynets at ITF level in 2022 at W60 Berkeley
- Is currently ranked at No.41, one spot off her career-best No.40, which she secured earlier this season

Volynets:

- Making her 5th appearance at Indian Wells, where her best result was 3r last season (I. Wozniacki)
- Owns six career wins against Top 50 players, most recently against No.18 Marta Kostyuk at 2024 Beijing
- Achieved the best result of her 2025 season so far at Auckland with quarterfinal (I. Parks)
- Having secured her career-high ranking of No.56 in July 2024, she is currently ranked at No.65

CAREER MILESTONES

- After Beijing 2023 took 17 months maternity leave giving birth to Petr in July 2024. Returned to the courts at Austin 2025
- In 2023, won 30th and 31st titles at Miami (d. Rybakina in F) and Berlin (d. Vekic in F) and reached QF at Adelaide 2, Indian Wells and Ningbo
- Won title at 2022 Eastbourne (d. Ostapenko in F) and finished R-Up later that summer at Cincinnati (l. Garcia)
- Best result in 2021 was title run at Doha (d. Muguruza in F). Also made SFs at Bad Homburg and Ostrava, and QFs at Stuttgart, Madrid and Cincinnati
- Reached one final in 2020 at Doha (l. Sabalenka)
- Reached title match at 2019 Australian Open for third career Grand Slam final appearance -result moved her to World No.2, matching her career high ranking. Had she beaten Naomi Osaka in the final, would have claimed World No.1 ranking
- Also in 2019, won title at Sydney and Stuttgart and qualified for WTA Finals in Shenzhen for seventh time (went 0-3 in group play)
- Won a WTA-leading five titles in 2018, at St. Petersburg (d. Mladenovic in F), Doha (d. Muguruza in F), Prague (d. Buzarnescu in F), Madrid (d. Bertens in F) and Birmingham (d. Rybarikova in F); qualified for WTA Finals going 0-3 in group play
- Titles in 2018 came on all three surfaces - first player to win a title on three difference surfaces in a season since S.Williams in 2015
- Began 2017 season in May at Roland Garros (2r, l. Mattek-Sands) after a knife attack in her home in Czech Republic on December 20, 2016; required extensive surgery to left hand. Won title at 2017 Birmingham only a month later
- Contested Rio Olympics in August 2016, winning the singles bronze medal (l. Puig in SF, d. Keys in bronze medal play-off); also won titles at Wuhan and WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai
- Won three titles in 2015 at Sydney, Madrid and New Haven
- Runner-up at 2015 WTA Finals in Singapore (l. A.Radwanska in 3s). Former champion at the season finale, which she won on her event debut in 2011 (d. Azarenka in F)
- Earned second Grand Slam title at 2014 Wimbledon (d. Bouchard in F); also won title at New Haven and Wuhan and qualified for WTA Finals going 1-2 in group play
- Won two titles in 2012 at Montreal and New Haven and qualified for WTA Finals going 0-1 in group play; also won two titles in 2013 at Dubai
- Began the year at a career high ranking of No.39 and a strong opening result at Auckland with quarterfinal (l. Gauff). Posted her best Grand Slam result to date with R16 at Roland Garros (l. M.Andreeva) and reached semifinals at WTA 125s Paris (l. Shnaider) and Hong Kong (l. Tauson)
- Stand out results of 2023 were achieving runner-up at Austin and two quarterfinals, firstly on clay at Strasbourg (l. Svitolina) and then on grass at Bad Homburg (l. Bronzetti). Also advanced to R16 at both Indian Wells (as qualifier, l. eventual champion Rybakina) and Miami (as qualifier, l. eventual champion Kvitova). Top ranking of the season of No. 40 was achieved on August 7, 2023.
- Best results of 2022 were runs to QF at Chennai (l. eventual champion Fruhvirtova) and 3r at Roland Garros (l. Mertens). Also reached 2r on four occasions
- Second Top 100 season in 2021 finishing the year at No.79, in a season highlighted by making her WTA SF debut at Chicago 250 and posting a career-best 14 main draw match wins
- Highlight of 2020 campaign was 3r showing at US Open (l. Martic); in 2r recovered from 6-1 5-1 down, saving 4MP to upset No.44 Mladenovic
- Ended 2019 at No.105, nearly 300 places up from her 2018 finish after a campaign in which she posted a 70-26 win-loss record, lifting five titles on the ITF Circuit, including at \$60K Valencia and \$60K Saint-Malo
- Recorded first WTA victory during 2r run at 2019 Washington DC (as qualifier, d. Blinkova, l. Hsieh)
- Fell 1r on WTA debut (main draw and qualifying) at 2019 Lausanne (as qualifier, l. X.Han), while made Grand Slam qualifying debut at US Open later that summer
- During 2018 season, won second ITF Circuit title of career at \$15k/Antalya-TUR and reached three other QFs at this level
- On ITF Circuit, winner of seven singles titles
- Played first professional events of career on ITF Circuit in Egypt in 2016
- Contested Roland Garros, Wimbledon and US Open as a junior, with best result a 3r run at 2016 Wimbledon

and Tokyo then reached SF at WTA Finals after going 2-1 in group play

- At 2012 Sydney was two wins from becoming No.1 (had won Wimbledon and WTA Finals in previous six months)
- Won maiden Grand Slam title at 2011 Wimbledon (d. Sharapova in F); also won titles in 2011 at Brisbane, Paris [Indoor], Madrid and Linz
- Was first player born in 1990s to win a Grand Slam title at 2011 Wimbledon
- Entered Top 10 on May 16, 2011; qualified for and won WTA Finals in 2011 (d. Azarenka in F) Reached SF at 2010 Wimbledon
- Won first career title at 2009 Hobart (d. Benesova in F) and reached final at Linz (l. Wickmayer)
- Earned first WTA main draw win at 2008 Paris [Indoor] defeating No.30 Anabel Medina Garrigues and reached first QFs at Budapest and Zurich propelling her into Top 50 for the first time ending year at No.44
- Earned first Top 10 win of career over No.8 Venus Williams while ranked No.143 at 2008 February
- Made WTA debut at 2007 Prague qualifying and main draw debut at 2007 Stockholm; also played US Open qualifying that year Member of Czech Republic's Billie Jean King Cup winning team in 2011-12, 2014-16 and 2018
- Made professional debut on ITF Circuit in Czech Republic in 2006; owns seven ITF titles

OTHER INFORMATION

- Coached by Jiri Vanek; fitness trainer is Ivan Trebaticky and physio/trainer is Florian Zitzelsberger; trains at TK Sparta Praha
- Father is Jiri (vice mayor); mother is Pavla; brothers are Jiri (engineer) and Libor (teacher). Introduced to tennis by father
- Favorite type of movie is comedy. Favorite types of music are pop, rock. Favorite foods are sushi, Italian. Also enjoys basketball and volleyball
- Favorite city to visit is Melbourne; favorite tournament is Wimbledon
- Self-described as friendly, happy
- Tennis idol growing up was Martina Navratilova (because she's left-handed like her)
- Currently coached by Griffin Foster Physical trainer is Benjamin Vaiarello; previously worked with Gerald Solves
- Currently based mainly in France, at the ETC Academy in Cannes, where she trains alongside several touring pros, including Daniil Medvedev
- Introduced to tennis by her mother Natalia Kazakova, who was her coach until the age of 14
- Studied at the meteor sports center in Zhukovsky, before moving to Germany to train with Nina Bratchikova
- Favorite hobby is drawing, and her favorite artist is Vincent Van Gogh - particularly 'self-portrait with a severed ear'
- She owns two dogs - a Yorkshire Terrier and a Parson Russell - named Tutsi and Enya, and a parrot called Boy
- Also likes to listen to alternative rock music, particularly the band Skillet

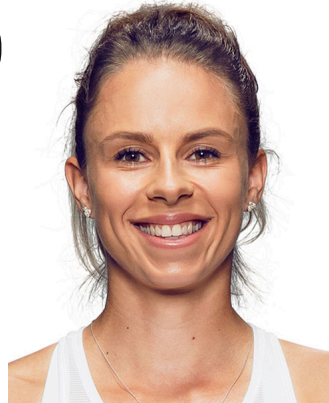

- In 2023, captured first career singles title in Osaka; did not drop a set en route to the title, defeating World No.35 and top seed Zhu Lin in the final. As a result of the title run, made Top 100 debut (week of September 18, 2023).
- Also reached tour level QF at 2023 S¹ Hertogenbosch (l. Hrucakova).
- Highlight of 2022 season was playing main draw Indian Wells, Miami, San Jose and US Open
- On ITF circuit in 2022, won title at W60 Evansville, IN, USA and reached final at W25 Sarasota, FL, USA
- In 2021, also received WC to Indian Wells, where she was defeated in 1r (l. Martincova)
- Fell 1r on Tour-level debut at 2021 US Open (as WC, l. Schmiedlova in 3s)
- Also made 2r as WC in doubles at 2021 US Open (w/Montgomery, l. Fernandez/Routliffe) WTA qualifying debut came at 2021 San Jose

- Performed well on clay in 2022, lifting a title at W100 event in Palm Harbor, Florida and compiling 11-3 win-loss record at a series of ITF Circuit events before making 2r at Roland Garros (l. Rybakina)
- Won first ITF Circuit title in 2021, at W100 Bonita Springs, FL, USA
- Fell 1r on Grand Slam debut at 2019 US Open (l. eventual champion Andreescu)
- Ended 2018 ranked No.743 after posting 21-5 record from five tour outings
- Best results in 2018 came in October and November when she came through qualifying to reach SFs at \$25k ITF/Florence-SC, USA and \$25k ITF/Norman-OK, USA
- Achieved career-high ranking of No.387 on July 29, 2019
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2019 San Jose
- As a junior, contested three of the four majors and reached No.21 in the rankings
