MATCH NOTES - DAY 3 - FRIDAY, MARCH 7

[WC] Alycia Parks (USA #61) vs. Anna Kalinskaya (#33)

Kalinskaya leads 2-0

Parks:

- Parks is making 12th WTA 1000 appearance overall, her third at Indian Wells
- Winner will face No.13 Diana Shnaider in 3r
- Has reached the R32 at WTA 1000 five times
- 1 of 24 Americans in the main draw; only in 1992 (26) and 1990 (26) have there been more Americans in the draw

Kalinskaya:

- Has won both previous meetings, including a win in the opening round of 2023 Indian Wells (6-1, 6-1)
- Climbed as high as No.11 in the WTA Rankings (on October 27, 2024)
- Making 24th WTA 1000 appearance, with this being her fifth appearance at Indian Wells; her best result here came in 2021, advancing to R16
- Played 2024 Indian Wells as the No.21 seed prompted by her runner-up finish at 2024 Dubai; returns unseeded this year

Caroline Garcia (FRA #71) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

Swiatek leads 4-1

Garcia:

- Making 11th main draw appearance at Indian Wells, with a best result of R16 which she has reached four times (2015, 2017, 2018 and 2023)
- Owns one career win over Swiatek, defeating the Polish player at home in Warsaw in the 2022 quarterfinal; their
 only meeting on clay
- During last season's sunshine swing made 3r at Indian Wells (I. Sakkari) and QF at Miami (I. Collins)
- Owns five hard court titles, most recently the WTA Finals and Cincinnati in 2022
- Owns 25 career wins over Top 10 players, most recently over No.3 Gauff at 2024 Miami

Swiatek:

- Two-time Indian Wells champion (2024 & 2022) and also made SF in 2023
- In her fifth Indian Wells main draw, has a tournament match record of 18-2
- Is undefeated in opening matches at Indian Wells
- Looking to become the first player to win the Indian Wells title on three occasions
- One of only four players to have completed the Sunshine Double winning both Indian Wells and Miami in 2022 (also Azarenka, Clijsters & Graf)
- Is undefeated against Garcia on hard court
- Her last defeat to a player ranked outside the Top 50 was No.76 Svitolina at 2023 Wimbledon; on hard court her last defeat was No.338 Konjuh at 2021 Miami

Magda Linette (POL #36) vs. [4] Jessica Pegula (USA #4)

Pegula leads 2-0

Linette:

- Making her 8th main draw appearance at Indian Wells, and bidding to make it past the second round for the first time today
- Fell in her opening round match here for the past three editions and owns an overall tournament match record of 3-7
- Owns a 4-16 career record against Top 5 opponents, with her most recent victory against No.5 Paolini at 2024
 Beijing 2024
- Is one of three players from Poland to reach the second round along with Swiatek and Frech

Pegula:

- Riding a five-match win streak after capturing her seventh career title last week in Austin, where she defeated Kessler in an all-American final
- One of three players from USA in the Top 5 of the PIF WTA Rankings, along with No.3 Coco Gauff and No.5 Madison Keys
- Best Indian Wells result came in 2021 with a run to the quarterfinals (I. Azarenka)
- Last player from USA to win Indian Wells was Serena Williams in 2001

[8] Qinwen Zheng (CHN #9) vs. Victoria Azarenka (#35)

Azarenka leads 2-0

Zheng:

- Making 3rd appearance at Indian Wells, has a tournament match record of 1-2 with her only win in the opening round in 2022
- Best result at a WTA 1000 event was R-Up at Wuhan 2024 (I. Sabalenka in F); also reached SF at Beijing 2024 (I. Muchova)
- Is looking for her first Top 50 win of 2025, losing both matches so far this season (I. No.35 Jabeur at Doha; I. No.46 Stearns at Dubai)
- Owns two hard court titles at Tokyo 2024 and Zhengzhou 2023

Azarenka:

- Two-time Indian Wells champion (2012 & 2016) is making her 16th appearance at Indian Wells
- Also reached the final in 2021 (I. Badosa) and semifinal in 2009 (I. Zvonareva)
- Has won a total of 35 main draw matches at Indian Wells, only Davenport (47), Sharapova (38) and Wozniacki (36) have more
- Has a record of 10-5 in 2r matches at Indian Wells
- Looking for her first Top 10 win since defeating No.4 Rybakina at 2024 Berlin
- Has won 207 and appeared in 285 WTA 1000 matches since 2009, the most of any player
- Since 2009, has the most WTA 1000 match wins on hard court of any player with 159

[7] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #7) vs. Suzan Lamens (NED #64)

First meeting

Rybakina:

- 2023 Indian Wells champion is making her 4th appearance at the tournament
- Is one of four previous Indian Wells champions still in the field, along with Swiatek (2022, 2024), Paula Badosa (2021) and Victoria Azarenka (2016, 2012)
- Has a 7-1 record against players ranked outside the Top 50 so far this season with her only loss against No.157
 Bencic at Abu Dhabi
- Owns a total of four hard court titles: Abu Dhabi & Brisbane in 2024, Indian Wells in 2023 and Hobart in 2020
- One of two players from Kazakhstan to compete in the 2r along with Putintseva

Lamens:

- Making her Indian Wells debut
- Faces a Top 10 player for the first time in her career
- Faces a player from Kazakhstan for the first time at Tour-level
- This time last year was ranked No.195, steadily climbing up the rankings and culminated in a title run at Osaka 2024 (d. Birrell in final) securing her spot in the Top 100 for the first time

Varvara Gracheva (FRA #70) vs. [9] Mirra Andreeva (#11)

Andreeva leads 1-0

Gracheva:

- Making her third appearance at Indian Wells, where her best previous result was reaching 4r as a qualifier in 2023 (I. eventual champion Rybakina)
- Also reached 4r at Miami in 2023 (I. Kvitova who she defeated in her 1r Indian Wells match this week)
- Owns four Top 20 career wins, most recently No.7 Maria Sakkari at Roland Garros 2024
- Best career win by ranking was against No.5 Jabeur at Miami 2023
- Best result by France at Indian Wells was runner-up by Marion Bartoli in 2011
- Best career result on hard court is runner-up which she has reached once: Austin in 2023 (I. Kostyuk)

Andreeva:

- Making her second appearance at Indian Wells, playing 1r in 2024 (I. Volynets)
- Best result at a WTA 1000 event was winning Dubai 2025, becoming the youngest WTA 1000 singles champion at 17 years old
- Holds the record for most WTA 1000 wins (23) prior to turning 18 years old
- Is currently on a six-match winning streak, the most of her career
- Is currently ranked No.11, having made Top 10 debut at No.9 on Feb 24, 2025

CAREER MILESTONES

- Highlight of 2024 season was posting best Grand Slam result courtesy of run to 3r at Australian Open (l. Gauff). Also won two WTA 125 titles, at Warsaw and Gaiba
- Won first singles title in 2023 at Lyon (d. Garcia).
 In doubles won Cincinnati (w/Townsend) and achieved R-Up at Birmingham (w/Hunter).
- Contested three WTA main draws in 2022, highlighted by maiden QF at this level at Ostrava (as qualifier, l. eventual champion Krejcikova)
- In 2022, also made 2r at Berlin (as qualifier, l. eventual champion Jabeur) and finished the campaign with a 10-match winning streak that brought WTA 125K Series titles at Andorra and Angers
- Closed out 2021 with R-Up finish at W25 event in Daytona Beach-Fl, USA
- In 2021, also made 2r at Lausanne and fell 1r at US Open (as WC, l. Danilovic) and Indian Wells (as qualifier, l. Rus); struck 129mph serve during 1r defeat at US Open, matching V.Williams' record for the fastest serve in the tournament's history Reached 2r on WTA main-draw debut at 2021 Charleston [250] (as qualifier, l. Jabeur)
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2021 Charleston [250] (l. Vikhlyantseva in final round)
- Owns one ITF Circuit singles title from six finals, triumphing at \$25k Orlando-FL in November 2020 (also won doubles title)
- Made ITF Circuit debut at a \$15k event in Orlando-FL, USA in March 2017

- Reached two finals in 2024 at Dubai and Berlin; Dubai was first time reaching a WTA 1000 final; made best career round at each Grand Slam in 2024 including first major quarterfinal at Australian Open and R16 at Wimbledon.
- Made Top 20 debut on June 24, 2024 finishing the year at World No.14
- Made three QF runs across 2023 Austin (l. Collins), Charleston (l. Jabeur), and Osaka (l. Krueger).
- Highlight of 2022 was SF run at Guadalajara 250 (l. eventual champion Stephens). Also made QFs at Washington DC (l. Kanepi) and Guadalajara 1000 (l. Bouzkova)
- Won third WTA doubles title in 2022 at St. Petersburg (w/McNally)
- Ended 2021 campaign in good form, advancing to R16 at Indian Wells (as qualifier, l. Jabeur), 2r at Moscow (as qualifier, l. Sakkari) and QF at Courmayeur (l. Samsonova)
- At 2021 Monterrey, posted first QF since 2019 (as qualifier, l. Golubic), then reached 3r at Miami (as WC, l. Muguruza)
- Lifted second WTA doubles title at 2021 Portoroz (w/Mihalikova)
- Broke into Top 100 on September 30, 2019, following QF run at Tashkent
- Scored first Top-10 win over No.10 Stephens in 1r at 2019 US Open
- Reached maiden WTA SF at 2019 Washington DC (l. eventual champion Pegula)
- Enjoyed doubles success in 2019, winning Prague and finishing R-Up at St. Petersburg (both w/Kuzmova)
- Season highlights in 2018 were making Grand Slam main draw debuts at Australian Open (l. Giorgi) and US Open (l. Goerges), coming through qualifying but falling in 1r at each
- Advanced through qualifying to reach the 2r for the first time at a WTA-tour level event at 2017 Kuala Lumpur (l. Han). Backed that performance up with two more 2r finishes that year at Istanbul (l. Yastremska) and Gstaad (l. Kontaveit)
 both as a qualifier
- Hoisted her fifth career ITF title in 2017 at \$25k ITF/Obidos 4-POR (d. Frech)
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2016 Moscow (as WC, l. Mladenovic in 1r). Also won a career-high four ITF titles in 2016 and made four runner-up finishes
- Produced a successful 2015 campaign on the ITF Circuit, reaching the finals at \$10K ITF/Antalya-TUR and \$10k ITF/El Kantaoui 29-TUN. Also made a SF run at \$10K ITF/El Kantoui 28-TUN

- Made professional debut as a qualifier at Premier event at 2014 Moscow (l. Monova)
- R-Up in girls' singles at 2015 Roland Garros (l. Badosa) and won doubles at 2016 Australian Open (w/Mihalikova)

- Has been coached by her father Michael Parks since childhood
- Born in Atlanta, Georgia
- Started playing tennis at the age of 7 and she and her older sister moved to Florida at the age of 10 for better training to develop their game
- Graduated high school in 2019 and declined several scholarship offers to pursue playing tennis professionally
- Hobbies include, cooking, rollerblading, and playing with her Jack Russell Terrier and Giant Schnauzer puppies
- In 2017, started clothing line called 'Alyciamikay' alongside sister Mikayla
- · Favorite tennis player is Serena Williams

- · Currently coached by Patricia Tarabini
- Both parents are former professional badminton players - now father works at the Federation and mother is coached junior players; brother is a soccer player in Russia. Started playing tennis when she was five after watching cousin play whilst spending summer at her my grandmother's house
- Thinks she has a good reading of the game and likes to mix up her shot selection; favorite surface is hard and favorite tournament is the St. Petersburg Ladies Trophy
- Did not have a tennis idol when growing up but watched a lot of Justine Henin, Rafael Nadal, Roger Federer and Kim Clijsters
- Best tennis memories are playing in the Fed Cup for the first time and also the amazing atmosphere when she beat Sloane Stephens in the Arthur Ashe Stadium at the 2019 US Open
- Away from the court likes to watch basketball, cook and go shopping; describes her perfect day as spending time with her closest friends; has two dogs; first was given one for her 13th birthday and stays in Moscow with her parents, while the second is a Pomsky called Kobe and travels with her most of the time on tour; loves documentaries and romantic movies; favorite musicians are Dua Lipa, Post Malone, Rihanna, Justin Bieber and DJ Khaled
