MATCH NOTES - DAY 4 - SATURDAY, MARCH 8

Anastasia Potapova (#34) vs [5] Madison Keys (USA #5) *Potapova:*

Tied 1-1

- Best WTA 1000 result of career so far came here at Indian Wells in 2024 with QF run (also made same stage at Miami in 2023)
- Owns 6 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently defeating No.7 Ons Jabeur at San Diego 2023; since last Top 10 win, is 0-7 vs. Top 10 (all in 2024)
- Owns three wins in career over Top 5 players, best of which was over No.2 Kontaveit at 2022 Prague
- Owns two hard court titles, at 2025 Cluj-Napoca and 2023 Linz

Keys:

- Won the most recent match-up at Australian Open 2019
- Playing first event as a Grand Slam champion, having won Australian Open in January
- Moved to a career-high ranking of No.5 on Monday (March 3)
- Also enters Indian Wells on 12-match winning streak, having won Adelaide prior to Melbourne success
- Only Clara Tauson (15) has won more matches in 2025 than Keys (14)
- Three of 10 titles have come on US soil 2019 Charleston and Cincinnati and 2017 Stanford
- Making 12th appearance in main draw at Indian Wells, she managed to reach the quarterfinals of the tournament in 2022
- Has 7 wins in 3-set matches in 2025 (7-0), the most of any player on Tour

[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs McCartney Kessler (USA #48) Sabalenka:

First meeting

- Making 6th appearance at Indian Wells, where previous best result was reaching Final in 2023 (I. Rybakina)
- Making 54th appearance at WTA 1000, having reached the final 10 times, winning 7 titles
- Will stay at No.1 after Indian Wells; during the tournament will be spending her 28th and 29th weeks at No.1
- The World No.1 has never lost opening match at Indian Wells, since the inception of the Women's Singles event in 1989. Sabalenka has lost just one of her last 10 opening matches at WTA 1000 events (2025 Doha)
- 16 of her 18 career titles have come on hard courts including one this year at Brisbane
- Has won seven WTA 1000 titles in her career, most recently at 2024 Wuhan

Kessler:

- Making her 2nd Indian Wells main draw, lost in the 1r in her previous appearance (I. Parrizas Diaz)
- Stands at No.19 on the PIF Race to WTA Finals Leaderboard following start to season that has included finals runs at two WTA 250 events Hobart (Won) and last week at Austin (Runner-Up)
- Bidding to become only the second American in the last two decades to defeat the World No.1 at Indian Wells (Navarro d. Sabalenka in 2024)
- Owns 1 career win over Top 10 players, most recently No.3 Coco Gauff at Dubai 2025
- Reached her career-high ranking of No.47 in January 2025, she is now ranked one spot below at No.48

- 1 of 24 Americans in the main draw; only in 1992 (26) and 1990 (26) have there been more Americans in draw
- Has won 13 matches already in 2025 after winning eight main draw matches in 2024; she is ranked No.3 on tour for match wins, behind Clara Tauson, Madison Keys
- Winner of today's match will face either Lucia Bronzetti or No.30 Magdalena Frech

[3] Coco Gauff (USA #3) vs. Moyuka Uchijima (JPN #52)

First meeting

- Gauff:
 - Gauff has won 71 matches at the WTA 1000 level, the most wins in WTA 1000 events before turning 21
 Making 5th appearance at Indian Wells, only Maria Sharapova (7) has made more appearance at this event before turning 21
 - A semifinalist at Indian Wells last year, became only the second American teenager this century to reach the semifinals of Indian Wells along with Serena Williams
 - Bidding to be only the fourth American player to register 10+ wins in Women's Singles at Indian Wells before turning 21 along with Lindsay Davenport, Serena Williams and Venus Williams.

Uchijima:

- Making first appearance at Indian Wells
- Best career result on hard court is quarterfinal run at 2022 Monastir (I. eventual champion Mertens)
- Best result by Japanese player at Indian Wells was title run by Naomi Osaka in 2018
- This is her sixth WTA 1000 appearance (4-12 record In WTA 1000 main draw)
- Is 0-5 against Top 10 opponents with four of those losses were during 2024 and one in 2025
- Could become the second player representing Japan to defeat a Top 5 opponent at Indian Wells after Naomi Osaka
- Currently the top ranked Japanese woman in PIF WTA Rankings at No.52, ahead of Naomi Osaka (No.56) the only two ranked in the Top 100

[10] Emma Navarro (USA #8) vs Sorana Cirstea (ROU #111) *Navarro:*

Cirstea leads 1-0

- It has been 24 years since an American woman won the title at Indian Wells (2001, Serena Williams at 19
- Currently there are four Americans in the Top 8 of the PIF WTA Rankings No.3 Coco Gauff, No.4 Jessica Pegula, No.5 Madison Keys and No.8 Emma Navarro. It is the first time in 22 years (week of Nov 3, 2003) that there are 4 Americans are in the Top 8 and already have seen another American win a WTA 1000 tile this year (Amanda Anisimova, Doha)
- Making 4th Indian Wells appearance, where her best result was reaching quarterfinal in 2024 (I. Sakkari)
- Continues to climb the rankings as she is currently ranked No.8; this time last year was ranked No.23
- Making 17th WTA 1000 appearance, playing to secure her first WTA 1000 title; best result at a WTA 1000 has been a semifinal run at 2024 Toronto

Cirstea:

- Making 83rd appearance at a WTA 1000
- This is her 13th appearance at Indian Wells, dating back to tournament debut in 2009 at 18 years old
- Best result at Indian Wells came in 2023 advancing to the guarterfinals
- For second time this year, faces a Top 10 ranked opponent having previously defeated then No.9 Navarro at WTA 1000 in Dubai R16

[17] Amanda Anisimova (USA #18) vs. [WC] Belinda Bencic (SUI #58) Anisimova:

Anisimova leads 2-1

- Making 6th appearance at Indian Wells, where her best result was reaching 4r in 2018 (as WC, I. Pliskova)
- Owns a strong career record of 17-3 against wildcards
 Is currently ranked No.18; this time last year was ranked No.252, marking an impressive jump in the rankings
- Making 37th WTA 1000 appearance having reached the final twice R-Up at Toronto 2024, Won at Doha 2025

Bencic:

- Making her 9th appearance at Indian Wells, with best result reaching semifinal in 2019 (I. Kerber)
- Following maternity leave, made return to the Tour earlier this season at United Cup; on her return she was ranked at No.421 on PIF WTA Rankings and following a successful season start, including the Abu Dhabi title, she is now ranked at No.58
- Is positioned at No.13 on the PIF Race to WTA Finals Leaderboard
- Is 2-3 vs Top 20 opponents since return to Tour in 2024 with all matches coming in 2025
- Making 57th WTA 1000 appearance, including title runs at 2015 Toronto and 2019 Dubai
- One of 25 active mothers on Tour, including today's opponent Tatjana Maria

CAREER MILESTONES

- Posted best Grand Slam result in 2024 by reaching R16 at Roland-Garros. Also made SF of Birmingham and Cleveland and her first WTA 1000 QF at Indian Wells
- A successful 2023 season saw her lift her second career title in Linz (d. Martic), she also reached semifinals at Stuttgart (l. Sabalenka) and Birmingham (l. eventual champion Ostapenko) and quarterfinals at Lyon (l. Zanevska), Miami (l. Pegula) and San Diego (l. Kenin). Equalled her best Grand Slam result with 3r at Roland Garros (also 3r at Australian Open in 2021) and moved up ranking to peak at No. 21 on Jun 19, 2023.
 - Had a breakthrough year in 2022, where she won her first title at Istanbul (d. Kudermetova) and finished R-Up at Prague (l. Bouzkova); broke into Top 50 following Prague (August 1, 2022)
- In 2021 reached QFs at Dubai (l. Krejcikova), Birmingham (l. Jabeur) and Nur-Sultan (l. Peterson)
- Posted three straight QFs in 2020, at Acapulco, St. Petersburg and Monterrey; did not play after the tour's resumption in August
- Finished 2019 season ranked No.93 after a season highlighted by SF at Budapest (l. Vondrousova) and Jurmala (l. Sevastova)
- Scored first Top-10 win over No.5 Kerber in 1r at 2019 Roland Garros
- In doubles, won titles at 2018 Moscow [River Cup] (w/Zvonareva) and 2019 Lausanne (w/Sizikova)
- Highlights of 2018 season were R-Up finishes at Tashkent (as qualifier, l. Gasparyan) and at Moscow [River Cup] (l. Danilovic)
- Made Billie Jean King Cup debut during 2018's defeat to Slovakia in February (l. Kuzmova)
- Reached 2r at St. Petersburg in February 2018 (l. Wozniacki). Win over Maria in 1r was first at tour level
- On ITF Circuit owns one singles and two doubles titles
- Fell 1r on Grand Slam main draw debut at 2017 Wimbledon (as qualifier, l. Maria); at 16 years and three months, became youngest player to successfully navigate Slam qualifying since Ana Konjuh, who had just turned 16 when she did it at 2014 Australian Open
- Captured 2016 Wimbledon girls junior title, having to win final point three separate times after two challenge overrules - title lifted her to Junior World No.1. In junior doubles, posted two runner-up finishes at 2015 US Open and 2016 Roland Garros

- In 2024, won eighth career title at Strasbourg (d. Collins in F dropping only three games). Reached SF at Madrid (l. eventual champion Swiatek) and Eastbourne (l. Fernandez), and another QF at Rome (l. eventual champion Swiatek). At Grand Slams, reached 4r at Wimbledon (l. Paolini, retired in 3r set due to left thigh injury), made 3r at Roland Garros (l. Navarro) and US Open (l. Mertens).
- In 2023, won seventh career title at Eastbourne (d. Kasatkina in F), reached SF at US Open and reached four QFs including Wimbledon; also qualified for WTA Elite Trophy in Zhuhai (0-2 in group play)
- At 2022 Adelaide, won first title in over two years (d. Riske in F), followed by SF run at Australian Open - best Slam showing since 2018
- Other highlights in 2022 were SF at Cincinnati and two further QF runs, including at Indian Wells
- In Grand Slam play, 2021 season was highlighted by R16 run at Wimbledon (l. Golubic). Finished campaign inside Top 100 for ninth successive year, but outside Top 20 for first time since 2014
- Ended 2020 ranked No.16, with best result being R-Up finish at Brisbane (l. Ka. Pliskova)
- Lifted biggest title of career during 2019 season at WTA 1000 Cincinnati (d. Kuznetsova in F); afterwards returned to Top 10 for first time since week of June 25, 2018
- Also won title at Charleston (d. Wozniacki) and reached QF at 2019 Roland Garros (l. Barty), one of three Americans to make last eight (also Anisimova and Stephens) - the first time since 2004 (Capriati, S.Williams and V.Williams) Reached three SFs in 2018 at Charleston, Roland Garros and US Open
- Reached first Grand Slam final in 2017 at US Open, losing to Sloane Stephens in 10th all-American final in the Open Era. At 22, became the youngest Flushing Meadows finalist since 19-year-old Caroline Wozniacki lost to Kim Clijsters in 2009 Also in 2017, won third WTA title at Stanford (d. Vandeweghe)
- Enjoyed first Top-10 year-end finish in 2016 (at No.8), was youngest player in Top 20; won second title at Birmingham (d. Strycova) and reached final at Rome (l. S.Williams) and Montreal (l. Halep)
- Broke into Top 10 on June 20 as first American to make Top-10 debut since S.Williams in 1999
- Made WTA Finals debut at Singapore in 2016, going 1-2 in round-robin play
- Represented USA at 2016 Rio Olympics, reaching SF (l. Bronze medal match to Petra Kvitova)
- Qualified for WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai in 2015, 2018-19; went 1-1 in round-robin stage on all three appearances, with best result SF run in 2018 (withdrew before match vs. Muguruza w/left knee injury)

- Advanced to maiden major SF at 2015 Australian Open (l. eventual champion S.Williams); broke into Top 20 following conclusion of tournament, on February 2
- Also in 2015, reached second career title at Charleston (l. Kerber) and reached QF at Wimbledon
- Won first career title at 2014 Eastbourne (d. No.9 Kerber in F); was second-youngest player to win a WTA title in 2014, (after Vekic at Kuala Lumpur); also, youngest American to win a title since Vania King in October 2006 (17y 254d at Bangkok)
- Broke into Top 100 at beginning of 2013 season and finished the year No.39; highlights were SF at Osaka, QFs at Sydney, Charleston and Birmingham and 3r at Australian Open and Wimbledon
- Earned first Top 20 win over No.17 Lucie Safarova while ranked No.135 at 2013 Sydney; then earned first Top 10 win over No.5 Na Li as LL at Madrid
- In 2012, reached 2r at Miami and played main draw at Australian Open, Memphis and Cincinnati; also won two titles on ITF circuit
- Earned first Grand Slam win at 2011 US Open (d. Craybas, l. Safarova in 2r), also played main draw at Miami and contested qualifying at Indian Wells
- Won first title on ITF circuit at 2010 \$10k/ITF Cleveland, OH, USA; also contested qualifying at US Open in 2010 Member of USA Billie Jean King Cup team in 2014, 2016, 2018-19, 2022
- Made professional debut in 2009 and Tour-level debut at 2009 Ponte Vedra Beach (as WC, d. Kudryavtseva, l. No.10 Nadia Petrova); was seventh youngest player to win a WTA main draw match at 14y 48d and youngest since Hingis in 1994

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2024 made first WTA 1000 final of career at Toronto, finishing R-Up to Pegula (defeated No.3 Sabalenka en route). Also enjoyed run to R16 at Australian Open, her third time reaching that stage in Melbourne
- Played a small number of tournaments in 2023 before taking a break away from the sport after Madrid in April
- Lifted second career title at Melbourne Summer Set 2 (d. Sasnovich in F) in January 2022
- In 2022, also made SF at Charleston (l. Jabeur) and five further QFs, including at Wimbledon (l. Halep)
- Ended 2021 season with 3r run at Indian Wells to secure her fourth consecutive Top-100 finish. Best results were QF runs at Parma and Bad Homburg
- Opened 2020 with SF showing at Auckland, going on to reach 3r at US Open, Roland Garros and Doha; during Doha run, earned third career Top 10 win over No.7 Svitolina (l. Kuznetsova in 3r due to walkover)
- Finished 2019 ranked No.24 the youngest of three teenagers in the Top 50 (also Andreescu and Yastremska)
- Posted career best Grand Slam result with SF run at 2019 Roland Garros - first player (man or woman) born in 2000s to advance to this stage of a major. Scored maiden win over a Top 5 player during 2019 Roland Garros, upsetting No.3 and defending champion Halep in QF
- Result boosted her into Top 50 for first time at No.26 on June 10, 2019
- Won maiden title at 2019 Bogota (d. Sharma in F); at 17y 222d was the youngest American to win a title since S.Williams at 1999 Indian Wells (17y 169d)
- Made Top 100 debut at No.95 on September 17, 2018, after reaching first WTA final at Hiroshima (as qualifier, l. Hsieh)
- Also in 2018, upset No.9 Kvitova to become the joint-youngest player to reach R16 at Indian Wells, along with Majoli, who made SF in 1994 (both aged 16 years, 199 days)
- Played only two ITF tournaments before making WTA main draw debut at 2017 Miami (l. Townsend in 3s), with Grand Slam bow coming at 2017 Roland Garros (l. Nara in 1r)
- Owns six Top 20 wins: No.9 Kvitova (2018 Indian Wells), No.11 Sabalenka (2019 Australian Open), No.11 Sabalenka (2019 Roland Garros), No.3 Halep (2019 Roland Garros), No.7 Svitolina (2020 Doha) and No.19 Riske (2020 Western & Southern Open)

- After giving birth to daughter Bella, returned to the courts in October 2024 to play a handful of ITF matches, as well as winning her Billie Jean King Cup Playoff match for Switzerland over Serbia's Lola Radivojevic in November
- Played last tournament of 2023 at San Diego before taking maternity leave
- In 2023, won two titles at Adelaide 2 (d. Kasatkina in F) and Abu Dhabi (d. Samsonova in F); also finished R-Up at Charleston (l. Jabeur)
- Won sixth career title in 2022, triumphing at Charleston, while finishing R-Up at Berlin (l. Jabeur) and helped Switzerland lift Billie Jean King Cup Finals in Glasgow; also reached SF at Miami (l. Osaka) and Tallinn (l. Krejcikova) Captured gold medal for Switzerland at Tokyo Olympics in 2021 (d. Vondrousova in F); also claimed silver in doubles (w/Golubic)
- Other 2021 highlights included R-Up finish at Adelaide (l. Swiatek) and Berlin (l. Samsonova), and six further QFs (including US Open)
- Across a disrupted 2020 reached three QFs, at Adelaide, St. Petersburg and Doha
- Was voted WTA Comeback Player of the Year in 2019 - lifted two titles at Dubai (d. Kvitova in F) and Moscow (d. Pavlyuchenkova in F) and posted a career-best 49 Tour-level match wins in 2019 fourth most among all players and breaking back into Top 10 on September 9
- Earned spot at WTA Finals in Shenzhen becoming first Swiss player to compete in singles at the WTA Finals since Hingis in 2006, going on to reach SF at the season-ending showpiece (l. Svitolina)
- Also in 2019, marked 20th Grand Slam main draw by reaching her maiden major SF at US Open (l. eventual champion Andreescu) and finished R-Up at Mallorca (l. Kenin)
- Led the WTA with six victories over Top 5 players in 2019, including upsets over No.1 Naomi Osaka at Indian Wells, Madrid and US Open
- Standout result in 2018 was R-Up finish at Luxembourg (as qualifier, l. Goerges)
- In first round at 2018 Australian Open, defeated No.5 Venus Williams. Having also upset then-No.1 Serena Williams in SF at 2015 Toronto is one of seven women to defeat both Williams sisters before their 21st birthday (also Hingis, Sharapova, Clijsters, Henin, Chakvetadze and Osaka)
- Underwent left wrist surgery in spring 2017, missing five months - ranking fell outside Top 300; reached QF at Linz as WC in first WTA event back after surgery

- In juniors, won US Open girls' singles in 2017 (d. Gauff in F) and was R-Up at 2016 Roland Garros; reached No.2 in junior world rankings
- · Owns one singles title on ITF Circuit

- Qualified for 2015 WTA Elite Trophy in Zhuhai however withdrew due to hand injury

- Voted 2014 WTA Newcomer of the Year after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Tianjin (l. Riske), SF at Charleston and QF run at 2014 US Open (defeated No.7 Kerber in 3r, No.10 Jankovic in R16); at 17 years of age, was youngest player through to last eight at Flushing Meadows since 1997 when Hingis won the title and broke into Top 50 on Sept 8, 2014
- Won junior singles titles at Roland Garros and Wimbledon in 2013; was named ITF Junior World Champion for 2013
- Played first WTA qualifying event at Luxembourg in October 2011, and first WTA main draw 12 months later at same event as WC (l. V.Williams, 1r); only 15 years, 7 months at the time
- Also in 2022, played qualifying at Brussels and

 s-Hertogenbosch
- Made professional debut on ITF circuit in 2011; owns five career ITF titles
