# MATCH NOTES - DAY 5 - SUNDAY, MARCH 9

### Dayana Yastremska (UKR #46) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

#### Yastremska

- Making 6th appearance at Indian Wells, and this is her first time reaching 3r
- Has a 1-4 record against players ranked inside Top 2 at time of their meeting; the one win came over No.2 Karolina Pliskova at 2019 Wuhan
- Contesting 35th WTA 1000 main draw of career; her career-best WTA 1000 result is making the 2019 Wuhan QF
- One of 3 players from Ukraine to reach this week's 3r (also Kostyuk and Svitolina)

#### Swiatek:

- Two-time Indian Wells champion (2024 & 2022) and also made SF in 2023
- In her fifth Indian Wells main draw, her overall tournament win-loss record is 19-2, including 2025
- Looking to become the first player to win the Indian Wells title on three occasions
- One of only four players to have completed the Sunshine Double winning both Indian Wells and Miami in 2022 (also Azarenka, Clijsters & Graf)
- Contesting her 34th career WTA 1000 main draw; she is a 10-time WTA 1000 champion, most recently 2024 Rome

#### [22] Clara Tauson (DEN #21) vs. [9] Mirra Andreeva (#11)

**Andreeva leads 1-0** 

#### Tauson:

- Tour leader in match wins (16) and aces (142) this season
- Today's match against Mirra Andreeva is a rematch of last month's Dubai final, which Andreeva won 7-6(1), 6-1
- The run to her first WTA 1000 final in Dubai included wins over World No.1 Aryna Sabalenka, Karolina Muchova, Elina Svitolina, and Linda Noskova
- The Dubai final between 17-year-old Andreeva and 23-year-old Tauson was the youngest WTA 1000 final in the
- At a career-high No. 21 on the PIF WTA Rankings and closing in on a Top 20 debut

#### Andreeva:

- At 17 years old, youngest player in the PIF WTA Rankings Top 100; one of just two teenagers in the Top 100
- Last month, defeated today's opponent in the Dubai final to become the youngest WTA 1000 champion in the format's history and secure her Top 10 debut
- Currently riding a 7-match win streak; she is the youngest player to win 7 consecutive WTA matches since Coco Gauff in May 2021 and the youngest to win 7 consecutive WTA 1000 matches since the format's introduction

### [7] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #7) vs. [25] Katie Boulter (GBR #38)

Rybakina leads 1-0

#### Rybakina:

- 2023 Indian Wells champion is making her 4th appearance at the tournament
- Is one of two previous Indian Wells champions still in the field, along with Swiatek (2022, 2024)
- Owns a total of four hard court titles: Abu Dhabi & Brisbane in 2024, Indian Wells in 2023 and Hobart in 2020
- Has a 13-1 record against players ranked outside the Top 20 so far this season (the one loss was against eventual champion No.157 Belinda Bencic at Abu Dhabi)
- Contesting her 34th WTA 1000 main draw of career; she is a 2-time WTA 1000 champion (2023 Indian Wells and 2023 Rome)

#### **Boulter:**

- Making 3rd main draw appearance at Indian Wells; defeated Irina-Camelia Begu in 2r for her first ever Indian Wells main draw win
- Contesting her first event since the Australian Open in January
- Has a 3-13 career record vs. Top 10 players; her most recent Top 10 win was over No.5 Jessica Pegula at 2024 United Cup
- 1 of 2 players from Great Britain to make 3r (also lucky loser Sonay Kartal)

### Xinyu Wang (CHN #42) vs. [4] Jessica Pegula (USA #4)

Wang leads 2-0

#### Wang:

- Undefeated against Jessica Pegula, with her most recent win coming at Wuhan last fall
- Is 2-2 against Top 5 opponents with both wins over Pegula and losses against Swiatek and Sabalenka
- Along with Qinwen Zheng, one of two Chinese players in 3r at Indian Wells for the first time since 2018
- Defeated Jelena Ostapenko in 2r to make first WTA 1000 3r since posting best career result in 2024 Wuhan semifinals (I. Zheng)

#### Pegula:

- Riding a six-match win streak after capturing her seventh career title last week in Austin, where she defeated Kessler in an all-American final
- Looking to win seven consecutive matches for the first time since winning nine between Toronto and Cincinnati in 2024 (won Toronto and reached SF at Cincinnati)
- One of three players from USA in the Top 5 of the PIF WTA Rankings, along with No.3 Coco Gauff and No.5 Madison Keys
- Best Indian Wells result came in 2021 with a run to the quarterfinals (I. Azarenka)
- Last player from USA to win Indian Wells was Serena Williams in 2001

### [8] Qinwen Zheng (CHN #9) vs. Lulu Sun (NZL #49)

Sun leads 1-0

#### Zheng:

- Making 3rd appearance at Indian Wells and is into 3r for first time
- Best result at a WTA 1000 event was R-Up at Wuhan 2024 (I. Sabalenka in F); also reached SF at Beijing 2024 (I. Muchova)
- Defeated 2-time Indian Wells champion Victoria Azarenka in 2r for her first Top 50 win of this season
- Has reached one WTA 1000 final (2024 Wuhan, I. Sabalenka) and one WTA 1000 SF (2024 Beijing, I. Muchova)
- Lost to Sun in their only previous meeting, in the opening round of 2024 Wimbledon

#### Sun:

- Making her Indian Wells tournament debut this week
- Defeated Top 40 players Rebecca Sramkova and Linda Noskova so far this week, snapping a 4-match losing streak coming into the tournament
- Playing in only her 6th WTA 1000 main draw of career; aiming to reach a WTA 1000 R16 for the first time
- Sole career Top 10 win came over No.8 Zheng in the 1r of 2024 Wimbledon (went on to reach the QF as a qualifier)



- Best results by Ukraine at Indian Wells were SF runs by Elina Svitolina in 2019 and Marta Kostyuk last year

- Looking to become the first woman to win the Indian Wells singles title 3 times
- 1 of only 4 women to have completed the Sunshine Double, winning both Indian Wells and Miami in 2022 (also Azarenka, Clijsters & Graf)
- After 1r bye, defeated Caroline Garcia in 2r to notch her 15th tour-level match-win of 2025 (2nd-most on tour, trailing only Tauson's 16)
- Faces No.46 Dayana Yastremska in 3r today; lost to Yastremska at 2019 Billie Jean King Cup but leveled their head-to-head with a win last month in Dubai
- Owns 11-1 career tour-level record against players from Ukraine (1-0 in 2025, d. Yastremska in Dubai)
- Contesting her 34th career WTA 1000 main draw; she is a 10-time WTA 1000 champion, most recently 2024 Rome
- 12 of her 22 career WTA singles titles have come on hard court; her most recent hard-court title is her Indian Wells triumph last year
- Only player from Poland to reach this week's 3r
- Is currently ranked No.2; this time last year was ranked No.1. Has held the World No.1 ranking for 125 weeks during her career

### **CAREER MILESTONES**

- In 2024 enjoyed fairytale run to first Grand Slam semifinal at Australian Open (as qualifier), including defeat of No.7 Vondrousova and twotime major champion Azarenka. Posted highest ranking for almost four years, rising to No.25 in July.
- In 2023, achieved best results at WTA 125 series events, winning Kozerki (d. Minnen) and SF finishes at Reus (l. Mandlik) and Angers (l. Burel).
- Best result of 2022 was R-Up finish at Lyon (as WC, l. Zhang). Also made QF at Dubai (as qualifier, l. Vondrousova), Bogota (l. Pigossi) and Birmingham (l. Zhang)
- In first tournament of 2021, reached SF at Hamburg (l. eventual champion Ruse). Also made QF at Courmayeur (l. Paolini)
- Highlight of 2020 was finishing R-Up at Adelaide (l. Barty); scored three consecutive Top 20 wins en route to final, over No.18 Kerber, No.20 Vekic and No.12 Sabalenka
- Captured two WTA singles titles in 2019 at Hua Hin (d. Tomljanovic in F after trailing 5-2 in third set) and Strasbourg (d. Garcia after saving 1mp)
- Advanced to QF at 2019 Wuhan, where she recorded maiden Top 5 win against No.2 Ka.Pliskova in R16 (l. Kvitova), and made Grand Slam breakthrough with R16 run at 2019 Wimbledon (l. Zhang)
- Qualified for WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai in 2019, going 1-1 in RR stage (d. No.20 Vekic, l. eventual R-Up Bertens) and reached maiden doubles final, at Beijing (w/Ostapenko, l. Kenin/Mattek-Sands)
- During 2018 campaign, won first career WTA title at 2018 Hong Kong (d. Q.Wang in F) and scored first Top 20 win over No.13 Muguruza in SF showing at Luxembourg (l. Bencic)
- Became first woman born in the 2000s to crack the Top 100 on the WTA rankings, debuting at No.100 (July 16, 2018)
- Also in 2018, won third and most recent ITF singles title in at \$60k ITF/Rome-ITA and reached two further finals
- Won first WTA main draw match and reached first tour-level QF at 2017 Istanbul, defeating former World No.9 Petkovic en route (l. Cepelova)
- Made WTA main draw debut as a WC at 2016 Istanbul (l. Hibino in 1r)
- Played first matches of career on ITF Circuit in 2015
- In juniors, rose as high as No.6 in the ITF rankings and was R-up in 2016 Wimbledon girls'

- Claimed five titles in 2024, making it a threepeat at Roland-Garros and also winning Doha, Indian Wells, Madrid and Rome. Crossed \$30m in prize money and qualified for her fourth WTA Finals
- Won six titles across 2023, including winning fourth Grand Slam title at Roland-Garros (d. Muchova in F) and going undefeated at the WTA Finals in Cancun (d. Pegula in F). Finished season as WTA World No.1 player for second consecutive year.
- In 2022, lifted second and third Grand Slam titles, at Roland-Garros (d. Gauff in F) and US Open (d. Jabeur in F)
- Triumph in Paris was the last of six straight titles during 37-match winning streak - jointlongest unbeaten run on Tour since 1990
- Won two titles in 2021, at Adelaide and Rome.
   Other highlights included QF at Roland-Garros and SF at Ostrava and qualifying for WTA Finals Guadalajara (fell in group stage)
- Also finished doubles R-Up at 2021 Roland-Garros (w/Mattek-Sands, l. Krejcikova/Siniakova)
- Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland-Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland - man or woman - to win a Grand Slam singles title and first from her country to reach a major final since A.Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon
- Ranked No.54, she became the lowest-ranked woman to win the Roland-Garros title in the Open Era and the lowest-ranked finalist since 1977 (No.56 Mihai). At 19y 132d, is the youngest champion in Paris since Monica Seles (18y 187d) in 1992
- Also became the first player to win her debut Tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Jelena Ostapenko at 2017 Roland-Garros
- Won WTA Most Improved Player of the Year for 2020, as voted on by members of the media.
   Also won the 2020 WTA Fan Favorite Award
- Ended 2019 season ranked No.61 after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Lugano (l. Hercog) and R16 run at Roland-Garros (l. Halep). That year also reached 3r at Toronto (l. Osaka) and made 2r five times (incl. Australian and US Open)
- Broke into Top 100 at No.88 after R-Up finish at 2019 Lugano
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2019 Auckland
- Ended 2018 season ranked No.175 (up from No.690 in 2017), after posting 42-6 record and winning four titles on ITF Circuit

- Member of Poland's Billie Jean King Cup team, 2018-20, 2021-22
- On professional debut, came through qualifying to win title at \$10k ITF/Stockholm-SWE in 2016; owns seven singles titles at this level
- Enjoyed stellar junior career, including winning girls' singles at 2018 Wimbledon (d. Kung in F) and leading Poland to Junior Fed Cup in 2016

### **CAREER MILESTONES**

 Enjoyed best season of career in 2024, reaching her first Grand Slam final at the Australian Open, winning titles at Tokyo and Palermo, contesting the title match at her home tournament in Wuhan and closing out the season at her first WTA Finals, losing to Gauff in the final

An outstanding 2024 also saw her make her Top 10 and Top 5 debuts in the PIF WTA Rankings and the gold medal placed around her neck at the 2024 Paris Olympics

- Earned 2023 WTA Most Improved Player of year ending the season at No.15 and inside the Top 20 for the first time
- Won maiden WTA titles in 2023 at Palermo (d. Paolini in F) and Zhengzhou (d. Krejcikova in F); also reached final at WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai (l. Haddad Maia), SF at Abu Dhabi and first career Grand Slam QF at US Open (l. Sabalenka)
- Broke into Top 20 for the first time on May 22, 2023
- Won WTA Newcomer of the Year in 2022; reached first WTA final at Tokyo (l. Samsonova) and also made SF at Melbourne Summer Set 1, as qualifier), QF at Toronto and R16 at Roland Garros
- Broke into Top 50 at No.46 after run to fourth round in Paris that year
- Scored first Top 20 win over No.19 Simona Halep at 2022 Roland Garros then earned two Top 10 wins over No.5 Ons Jabeur at Toronto and No.4 Paula Badosa at Tokyo
- Broke into Top 100 on January 31, 2022, following run through qualifying to 2r at Australian Open
- Also won title at WTA 125K event in Valencia in June 2022
- Ended 2021 at No.143, her first Top 150 finish
- Reached 2r on WTA main draw debut in 2021 at Palermo (as qualifier, l. Cristian)
- Made further main draw appearances in 2021 at Moscow (as qualifier, l. Tsurenko in 1r) and Courmayeur (as qualifier, l. Vekic in 1r); also contested qualifying in Strasbourg
- Made WTA debut in 2019, appearing in qualifying at Miami, Tianjin and Wuhan
- Made ITF debut in 2018; gone on to amass nine ITF singles titles with 9-0 record in finals

- A breakthrough season in 2014 saw her climb from No.214 to a career high of No.39 by September. At Wimbledon she reached the quarterfinals as a qualifier and became the first New Zealand woman to reach that stage in the Open Era. Her first round Wimbledon win over No.8 Zheng Qinwen marked her first Top 10 win, as well as her first completed victory over any Top 100 player, her first main draw win at a Grand Slam and first main draw win on grass.
- She then went on to reach her first Tour level final in 2024 at WTA 500 Monterrey (l. Noskova) and was voted WTA Newcomer of the Year
- Broke into Top 200 in 2023 for first time following title run at ITF Brasilia \$80K
- Played two WTA 125 series main draw matches in 2023
- Made breakthrough at Seoul 2022, scoring her first career main draw win (d. Lizette Cabrera) en route to QF (l. eventual champion Ekaterina Alexandrova)
- Fell 1r at Granby 2022 (l. Parry)
- Played first career Grand Slam at Wimbledon 2022, falling last round of qualifying
- Made WTA main draw debut at Rabat 2022 (l. Rus in 1r)
- Played first WTA event at Bogota 2018 qualifying
