[15] Karolina Muchova (CZE #15) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

Swiatek leads 3-1

Muchova

- Making 2nd appearance at Indian Wells, reaching quarterfinal in 2023 (l. eventual champion Rybakina)
- Owns 15 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.4 Jasmine Paolini at 2025 United Cup
- Boasts a 5-3 win-loss record against players ranked inside the Top 2 at the time of their meeting
- Is a 2-time WTA 1000 finalist, both times on hard court (2023 Cincinnati and 2024 Beijing - lost both of those finals to Coco Gauff)
- A win today would be her seventh career WTA 1000 quarterfinal (second at Indian Wells)
- Only player from the Czech Republic to reach this week's R16

Swiatek:

- Two-time Indian Wells champion (2024 & 2022); she is currently on an 8-match winning streak at this tournament
- In her fifth Indian Wells main draw, her overall tournament win-loss record is 20-2, including 2025
- Looking to become the first player to win the Indian Wells title on three occasions
- One of only four players to have completed the Sunshine Double winning both Indian Wells and Miami in 2022 (also Azarenka, Clijsters & Graf)
- Contesting her 34th career WTA 1000 main draw; she is a 10-time WTA 1000 champion, most recently 2024 Rome
- Since the format was introduced in 2009, Swiatek (81.9%, 104-23) trails only Serena Williams (84.1%, 148-28) for winning percentage at WTA 1000 events
- Has won 16 Tour-level matches in 2025, tied for 1st place in main draw match wins this year along with Tauson and Keys

[8] Qinwen Zheng (CHN #9) vs. [18] Marta Kostyuk (UKR #24)

Tied 1-1

Zheng:

- Making 3rd appearance at Indian Wells and is through to the 4r for the first time
- Best result at a WTA 1000 event was R-Up at Wuhan 2024 (l. Sabalenka in F); also reached SF at Beijing 2024 (l. Muchova)
- Defeated 2-time Indian Wells champion Victoria Azarenka in 2r and Lulu Sun in 3r for back-to-back wins for the first time this season
- Looking to become the fifth and youngest player from China to reach Indian Wells quarterfinal (Na Li, Yue Yuan, Jie Zheng and Shuai Peng)
- Could reach her seventh WTA 1000 quarterfinal and her fifth on hard court in such events

Kostyuk:

- Making 5th appearance at Indian Wells, where her previous and best result was reaching SF in 2024 (l. eventual champion Swiatek)
- Making 32nd appearance at WTA 1000 level; best result was her SF at 2024 Indian Wells
- Could reach her third WTA 1000 quarterfinal after Indian Wells 2024 and Doha 2025
- Owns 9 wins in career over Top 10 players, with her most recent win coming against No.3 Coco Gauff at Doha 2025 (R32)
- Holds a career win-loss record of 4-15 on hard court against opponents ranked in the Top 10

[23] Elina Svitolina (UKR #23) vs. [4] Jessica Pegula (USA #4)

Pegula leads 5-2

Svitolina:

- Making her 11th appearance at Indian Wells, with best result coming in 2019 with semifinal run
- Five of her 12 matches so far in 2025 have been against opponents from USA with a record of 3-2 including two wins this week (Ashlyn Krueger and Danielle Collins)
- Has posted back-to-back wins for second time this season after Australian Open
- Has 1-1 record so far in 2025 against Top 10 opponents, defeating No.4 Paolini at Australian Open and loss to Pegula at Doha
- Could reach her 21st WTA 1000 quarterfinal; it would be the eighth WTA 1000 event where she has multiple quarterfinal appearances after Rome, Beijing, Cincinnati, Canada, Wuhan, Dubai and Miami
- A win today would be her first WTA 1000 quarterfinal since Rome 2021 (l. Swiatek) and first WTA 1000 QF on hard court since Miami 2021 (l. Barty in SF)

Pegula:

- Currently on a seven-match win streak after capturing her seventh career title last week in Austin
- Looking to win eight consecutive matches for the first time since winning nine between Toronto and Cincinnati in 2024 (won Toronto and reached SF at Cincinnati)
- Best Indian Wells result came in 2021 with a run to the quarterfinals (l. Azarenka)
- Could reach her 19th quarterfinal in WTA 1000 events, amongst Americans only Serena Williams (30) and Venus Williams (21) have more since the format introduction in 2009
- Holds the best rate on second serve points won (54%) among players who have played a minimum of 10 WTA matches this season
- Owns three WTA 1000 titles on hard court, at 2022 Guadalajara, 2023 Montreal and 2024 Toronto

[7] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #7) vs. [9] Mirra Andreeva (#11)

Tied 1-1

Rybakina:

- 2023 Indian Wells champion is making her 4th appearance at the tournament
- Is one of two previous Indian Wells champions still in the field, along with Swiatek (2022, 2024)
- Owns a total of four hard court titles: Abu Dhabi & Brisbane in 2024, Indian Wells in 2023 and Hobart in 2020
- Has won only one of her five meetings against Top 20 players so far in 2025, defeating No.10 Badosa at Dubai; losses came to No.12 M.Andreeva at Dubai, No.14 Keys at Australian Open and No.2 Swiatek at Doha and United Cup
- Contesting 34th WTA 1000 main draw of her career; she is a 2-time WTA 1000 champion (2023 Indian Wells and 2023 Rome)
- Rybakina (263) and M.Andreeva (247) are the players with the most winners in WTA 1000 events so far this season
- Rybakina (101) ranks third for aces in 2025, behind Clara Tauson (145) and Linda Noskova (102)

Andreeva:

- At 17 years old, is the youngest player in the PIF WTA Rankings Top 100; one of just two teenagers in the Top 100
- Owns six career wins over Top 10 players with a record of 2-2 in 2025; defeated No.7 Rybakina and No.2 Swiatek on the way to claiming the Dubai title and both losses were to No.1 Sabalenka at Australian Open and Brisbane
- By winning the Dubai title last month, became the youngest WTA 1000 champion in the format's history and secured her Top 10 debut
- Both Andreeva and Rybakina have posted 15 match wins in 2025; only Swiatek, Tauson and Keys have more with 16 each
- Could become the youngest player to reach Indian Wells quarterfinals since Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova (17) in 2009
- Currently on the longest winning streak of her career with 8; she is the youngest player to win 8 consecutive WTA matches since Coco Gauff in May 2021 (won 9) and the youngest to win 8 consecutive WTA 1000 matches since the format's introduction

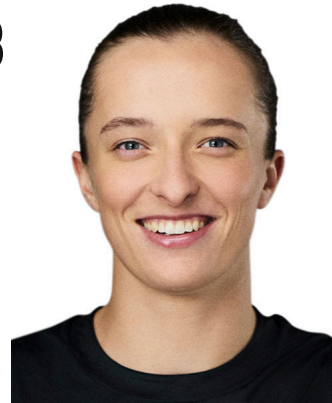

- Making her 2nd appearance at Indian Wells; in her sole previous appearance, she reached the 2023 QF (l. eventual champion Rybakina)
- After 1r bye, defeated Elisabetta Cocciaretto and her countrywoman Katerina Siniakova so far this week; Muchova came back from 5-3 down in the first set against Siniakova to win in straight sets
- Faces No.2 Iga Swiatek in 4r today; owns 15 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.4 Jasmine Paolini at 2025 United Cup
- Boasts a 5-3 win-loss record against players ranked inside the Top 2 at the time of their meeting
- Owns 6-4 career tour-level record against players from Poland (0-1 in 2025, l. Swiatek at United Cup)
- Contesting her 21st WTA 1000 main draw of career; she is a 2-time WTA 1000 runner-up, both times on hard court (2023 Cincinnati and 2024 Beijing - lost both of those finals to Coco Gauff)
- Owns 1 career WTA singles title and it came on hard court: 2019 Seoul
- Only player from the Czech Republic to reach this week's R16
- Is currently ranked No.15; this time last year was ranked No.11. Reached career-high of No.8 for the first time in 2023

- Returns to Indian Wells as defending champion and is making her 5th main-draw appearance here
- Is a two-time Indian Wells champion (2022 and 2024) and also made SF in 2023; overall Indian Wells main-draw win-loss record is 20-2
- Looking to become the first woman to win the Indian Wells singles title 3 times
- 1 of only 4 women to have completed the Sunshine Double, winning both Indian Wells and Miami in 2022 (also Azarenka, Clijsters & Graf)
- After 1r bye, defeated Caroline Garcia and Dayana Yastremska so far this week; currently on an 8-match winning streak at this tournament
- Has now won 16 tour-level matches in 2025, tied for 1st place on tour in main-draw match-wins so far this year
- Faces No.15 Karolina Muchova in 4r today; owns 80 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.7 Elena Rybakina at 2025 Doha
- Owns 21-4 career tour-level record against players from the Czech Republic (3-0 in 2025, one win each over Muchova, Siniakova and Noskova)
- Contesting her 34th career WTA 1000 main draw; she is a 10-time WTA 1000 champion, most recently 2024 Rome
- 12 of her 22 career WTA singles titles have come on hard court; her most recent hard-court title is her Indian Wells triumph last year
- Only player from Poland to reach this week's R16
- Is currently ranked No.2; this time last year was ranked No.1. Has held the World No.1 ranking for 125 weeks during her career

CAREER MILESTONES

- Started 2024 season by reaching QF (l. Keys) at Eastbourne, her first event since US Open 2023. Reached two finals at Beijing (l. Gauff in F) and Palermo (l. Zheng in F). Made consecutive SF at US Open (l. Pegula) and reached another SF at Ningbo (l. M. Andreeva, retired in 2nd set).
- Enjoyed break-out season in 2023, reaching debut Slam final at Roland-Garros (l. Swiatek), debut WTA 1000 final at Cincinnati (l. Gauff) and made Top 10 debut in August. Also secured debut qualification for WTA Finals but did not compete due to injury.
- Best result in 2022 was QF showing at Tallinn (l. Kanepi). Also made 3r at Roland Garros and 2r at Ostrava.
- Back, abdominal and ankle injuries restricted her to just four tournaments in first half of 2022.
- Broke into Top 20 for first time in career in 2021, peaking at No.19 (May 17).
- Posted best result at the Grand Slams with SF run at Australian Open (l. Brady) and matched best return at Wimbledon by making QF (l. Kerber, made QF in 2019). Also made last eight at Madrid (l. Pavlyuchenkova).
- Defeated the World No.1 and No.2 during 2021, defeating No.1 Barty at Australian Open and No.2 Osaka at Madrid (only other player to manage this was Badosa).
- Broke into Top 20 for first time in career in 2021, peaking at No.19 (May 17).
- Posted best result at the Grand Slams with SF run at Australian Open (l. Brady) and matched best return at Wimbledon by making QF (l. Kerber, made QF in 2019). Also made last eight at Madrid (l. Pavlyuchenkova).
- Defeated the World No.1 and No.2 during 2021, defeating No.1 Barty at Australian Open and No.2 Osaka at Madrid (only other player to manage this was Badosa).
- Posted best result at US Open by reaching R16 in 2020 - handed V.Williams her first-ever opening round loss in New York in 22 appearances, then saved three MPs vs. Cirstea in 3r, before falling to eventual R-Up Azarenka.
- Finished 2019 season in rich vein of form, winning 18 of last 24 matches, including capturing maiden WTA title at Seoul (d. Linette in F), SFs at Zhuhai (l. eventual champion Sabalenka) and Moscow (l. Pavlyuchenkova) and maiden major QF at Wimbledon (l. Svitolina)
- During run to last eight at 2019 Wimbledon upset No.3 Ka.Pliskova in R16 to record her first
- Claimed five titles in 2024, making it a three-peat at Roland-Garros and also winning Doha, Indian Wells, Madrid and Rome. Crossed \$30m in prize money and qualified for her fourth WTA Finals
- Won six titles across 2023, including winning fourth Grand Slam title at Roland-Garros (d. Muchova in F) and going undefeated at the WTA Finals in Cancun (d. Pegula in F). Finished season as WTA World No.1 player for second consecutive year.
- In 2022, lifted second and third Grand Slam titles, at Roland-Garros (d. Gauff in F) and US Open (d. Jabeur in F)
- Triumph in Paris was the last of six straight titles during 37-match winning streak - joint-longest unbeaten run on Tour since 1990
- Won two titles in 2021, at Adelaide and Rome. Other highlights included QF at Roland-Garros and SF at Ostrava and qualifying for WTA Finals Guadalajara (fell in group stage)
- Also finished doubles R-Up at 2021 Roland-Garros (w/Mattek-Sands, l. Krejciikova/Siniakova)
- Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland-Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland - man or woman - to win a Grand Slam singles title and first from her country to reach a major final since A.Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon
- Ranked No.54, she became the lowest-ranked woman to win the Roland-Garros title in the Open Era and the lowest-ranked finalist since 1977 (No.56 Mihai). At 19y 132d, is the youngest champion in Paris since Monica Seles (18y 187d) in 1992
- Also became the first player to win her debut Tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Jelena Ostapenko at 2017 Roland-Garros
- Won WTA Most Improved Player of the Year for 2020, as voted on by members of the media. Also won the 2020 WTA Fan Favorite Award
- Ended 2019 season ranked No.61 after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Lugano (l. Hercog) and R16 run at Roland-Garros (l. Halep). That year also reached 3r at Toronto (l. Osaka) and made 2r five times (incl. Australian and US Open)
- Broke into Top 100 at No.88 after R-Up finish at 2019 Lugano
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2019 Auckland
- Ended 2018 season ranked No.175 (up from No.690 in 2017), after posting 42-6 record and winning four titles on ITF Circuit

- Top 10 victory; following the tournament, broke into Top 50 at No.43 on July 15, 2019
- First WTA final appearance came during R-Up finish on home soil at 2019 Prague (l. Teichmann) - made Top 100 debut at No.74 following the tournament (May 6, 2019)
 - Advanced to maiden WTA QF at 2019 Doha (as qualifier, l. Svitolina)
 - Billie Jean King Cup debut came during 4-0 World Group play-off win over Canada in 2019
 - Reached 3r on Grand Slam main draw debut at 2018 US Open (as qualifier, d. No.12 Muguruza in 2r, l. Barty in 3r)
 - Fell 1r on WTA main draw debut at 2017 Seoul (as qualifier, l. Hon)
 - Won second - and most recent - career ITF Circuit title in 2016 and posted 39-18 win-loss record; at tour-level fell in qualifying at US Open
 - Played first events of career on ITF Circuit in Croatia in 2013

- Member of Poland's Billie Jean King Cup team, 2018-20, 2021-22
- On professional debut, came through qualifying to win title at \$10k ITF/Stockholm-SWE in 2016; owns seven singles titles at this level
- Enjoyed stellar junior career, including winning girls' singles at 2018 Wimbledon (d. Kung in F) and leading Poland to Junior Fed Cup in 2016

- Born in city of Olomouc in eastern Czech Republic, but moved to train in Prague in 2019
- Started playing tennis at aged seven with dad, a former professional footballer in Czech Republic
- Roger Federer was tennis idol growing up

- Previously worked with Tomasz Wiktorowski and Piotr Sierzputowski
- Father is former Olympic rower Tomasz Swiatek, who competed in the men's quadruple sculls event at the 1988 Summer Olympics in Seoul

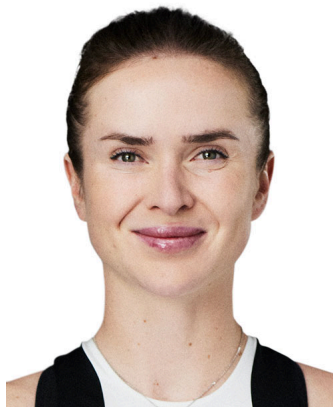

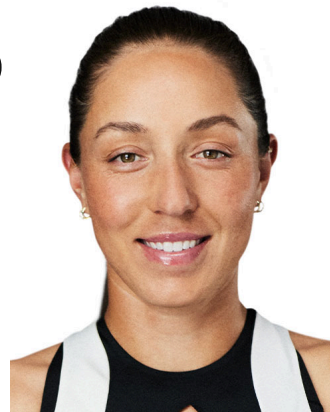
