[3] Coco Gauff (USA #3) vs. [WC] Belinda Bencic (SUI #58)

Series tied 2-2

Gauff:

- *Youngest player to reach the Round of 16 in three consecutive years in the Women's Singles draw at Indian Wells since Caroline Wozniacki between 2008-11*
- *Has won eight of her nine career titles on hard courts, including two WTA 1000 titles, at 2023 Cincinnati and 2024 Beijing*
- *Record against opponents outside Top 50 stands at 5-1 in 2025, with the only loss coming against No.53 Kessler at Dubai*
- *Since the tournament's inception in 1989, only Lindsay Davenport (15) and Serena Williams (14) have won more main draw matches in Indian Wells than Coco Gauff (11) before turning 21 among American players*

Bencic:

- *Making 9th appearance at Indian Wells, where her previous best result was reaching the semifinals in 2019 (falling to Kerber)*
- *Best result at a WTA 1000 event was title run at Toronto in 2015*
- *Best result by a wildcard at Indian Wells was title-winning run by Bianca Andreescu in 2019*

[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. [LL] Sonay Kartal (GBR #83)

First meeting

Sabalenka:

- *Making 6th appearance at Indian Wells, reaching the final in 2023 (l. Rybakina)*
- *Will stay as the PIF WTA World No.1 after Indian Wells; during the tournament will be spending her 28th and 29th weeks at No.1*
- *Record against opponents outside Top 50 stands at 18-1 in the past 52 weeks, with the only loss coming against No.132 Anisimova at Toronto 2024*
- *Has won seven WTA 1000 titles in her career, most recently at 2024 Wuhan*
- *Has won her last 16 matches against qualifiers/lucky losers, last losing to Donna Vekic at San Diego in 2022*

Kartal:

- *Making WTA 1000 main draw debut here at Indian Wells*
- *As Lucky Loser, has beaten Varvara Lepchenko, Beatriz Haddad Maia and Polina Kudermetova to make R16*
- *Faces No.1 Aryna Sabalenka in 4r today – first time playing a Top 10 player in her career. Best career win by ranking was defeating No.17 Haddad Maia in 2r here at Indian Wells*

Samsonova leads 2-0

Samsonova:

- *Through to the R16 at Indian Wells for the second time, also making this stage in 2022*
- *Owns 7 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently defeating No.8 Emma Navarro at Adelaide earlier this season*
- *Looking to reach her fifth quarterfinal in WTA 1000 events after Beijing and Montreal in 2023 and Toronto and Cincinnati in 2024*

Paolini:

- *Also through to the R16 for the second time, reaching this stage in 2024*
- *Contesting her 30th career WTA 1000 main draw this fortnight; she has won one WTA 1000 title (2024 Dubai)*
- *Scored first Top 10 win and best win of career here in 2024, defeating No.3 Sabalenka in 2r – could face Sabalenka in QF*
- *Bidding to become the first Italian to reach the quarterfinals of the Women's Singles draw at Indian Wells since Flavia Pennetta in 2015*

[19] Donna Vekic (CRO #22) vs. [5] Madison Keys (USA #5)

Keys leads 2-1

Vekic:

- *Looking to reach first WTA 1000 quarterfinal; could become third Croatian to reach the quarterfinals in Women's Singles at Indian Wells (Iva Majoli, Petra Martic)*
- *Owns 16 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.8 Emma Navarro here this fortnight*
- *Bidding to become first Croatian player to earn Top 5 win at Indian Wells*
- *Has won three titles on hard courts: Monterrey in 2023; Courmayeur in 2021; Kuala Lumpur in 2014*

Keys:

- *Making 12th main draw appearance at Indian Wells; her career-best tournament result is reaching the 2022 QF (l. eventual champion Swiatek)*
- *Contesting her first event since she won her 1st Grand Slam title at the 2025 Australian Open (d. No2 Swiatek in SF and No.1 Sabalenka in F)*
- *Making 81st WTA 1000 main draw appearance of her career this week; she has won one WTA 1000 title (2019 Cincinnati) and has reached 2 other WTA 1000 finals (2016 Rome and 2016 Montreal)*
- *Bidding to reach four consecutive quarterfinals at WTA level events for the first time in her career and first quarterfinal at a WTA 1000 since 2023 Dubai (has made 12 quarterfinal appearances at such events)*
- *After 1r bye, has defeated Anastasia Potapova and Elise Mertens to mark 16 match wins so far in 2025 (equalling Tauson and Swiatek - 16 each)*
- *One of 3 players from United States of America to reach 4r (Gauff, Pegula)*

CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan. Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (L. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid.
- Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (L. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- Rose to career-high No.2 in rankings on August 23, 2021
- In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F)
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10
- Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitová in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the 'Sunshine Double' by winning back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F) and Miami (d. Stosur/ Zhang in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Shenzhen in doubles (w/Mertens), going 1-2 in the round-robin stage
- Enjoyed breakthrough season in 2018, lifting two titles, at New Haven (d. Su- Navarro in F) and Wuhan (d. Kontaveit in F), winning 46 matches and finishing at No.11 in the rankings
- Also in 2018, was R-Up at Lugano (l. Mertens) and Eastbourne (l. Wozniacki), made SF at Cincinnati, reached five QFs and produced a career-best Grand Slam run to R16 at US Open
- Entered Top 50 on April 16, 2018, after Lugano run, and Top 20 on August 27 of the same year, following New Haven title
- Broke into Top 100 at No.76 on October 16, 2017 after reaching first Tour-level final at Tianjin (l. Sharapova). Also in 2017 made SF at Tashkent (l. Babos) and lifting WTA 125k Series title at Mumbai (d. Jakupovic)
- Made Grand Slam main draw debut 2017 Wimbledon, falling in 2r (as qualifier, d. Khromacheva, l. Witthoeft)
- Fell 1r on main draw debut at 2017 Dubai (as qualifier, l. Ka.Bondarenko)
- Member of Belarus Billie Jean King Cup team that lost to USA in 2017 final - scored first Top-20 win of career with defeat of No.13 Stephens during final in Minsk
- WTA qualifying debut came at 2016 Rabat
- Lifted first three ITF Circuit titles in 2015, including a 13-match win streak towards the year's end, bringing back-to-back trophies in Antalya, Turkey

- Breakthrough year in 2024 saw her win first title at Monastir and reach 3r at Wimbledon as a qualifier. Her ranking entered the Top 100 for the first time and peaked at No.85 by year-end.
- In 2023 reached main draw at Nottingham as a qualifier
- Played first WTA main draw matches in 2022 on grass at Nottingham and Wimbledon
- Began on the ITF circuit in 2019 and won her first ITF titles in 2021 at W15 Antalya and W15 Monastir

- Made debut on ITF Circuit in Minsk in 2012

- Previously coached by Dmitry Tursunov and Didi Kindlmann
- Started playing tennis when she was 6 by an accident when her father Sergey drove by the tennis courts and decided to give it a try

- At 2022 Adelaide, won first title in over two years (d. Riske in F), followed by SF run at Australian Open - best Slam showing since 2018

- Earned first Top 20 win over No.17 Lucie Safarova while ranked No.135 at 2013 Sydney; then earned first Top 10 win over No.5 Na Li as LL at Madrid

- In 2012, reached 2r at Miami and played main draw at Australian Open, Memphis and Cincinnati; also won two titles on ITF circuit
- Earned first Grand Slam win at 2011 US Open (d. Craybas, l. Safarova in 2r), also played main draw at Miami and contested qualifying at Indian Wells
